## INTRODUCTION.

The Board of Control herewith presents to the membership of the I. H. S. A. A. its third annual report and hand book. This report shows a very satisfactory growth in the membership of the Association, one hundred and sixteen schools being enrolled at the close of the football season. The financial condition of the Association is such that legitimate and necessary expenses can be met while on the other hand no large and unnecessary surplus remains in the treasury.

The general athletic condition in the schools of the State is very encouraging. Few, if any, schools have sought deliberately to violate the letter or spirit of the Constitution and the Board has been called upon to settle few disputes between schools. The greater part of its work for the year has consisted in the interpretation of the rules.

The State Meet at Crawfordsville was in many ways the most successful yet held by the Association. Several records were broken and the number of contestants was larger than ever before. The new rules in football have improved the game from a high school standpoint so much that in the opinion of the Board, further agitation for revision is unnecessary. The reports contained in the following pages show a very successful season.

Probably the most important action of the year was the establishment of a closer relationship between the Association and the colleges of the State whereby students who are ineligible to play under I. H. S. A. A. rules shall not be permitted to leave high school and become members of college athletic teams. Such a resolution was adopted on December 8, 1906 by all the colleges and universities of the State.

In view of the above facts the members of the Board feel that the Association is to be congratulated on the high standard of athletics it has maintained, on its present prosperity and on its bright outlook for the future.

## THIRD ANNUAL FIELD AND TRACK MEET ANNOUNCEMENT.

The third annual Track and Field Meet of the Indiana High School Athletic Association will be held on the Athletic Field of Wabash College, May 19, 1906, in the afternoon. Entries for the Meet will close May 9, and all schools desiring to participate in the Meet must become members of the Association before that date.

ELIGIBILITY-Every contestant in this Meet must have previously made in a fair test a record equal to the following in every event in which he is entered:

The above, together with a mile relay, will constitute the events of the meet. Winning first place in any event counts five points; second place, three points; and third place, one point. Points in the relay will not be counted in determining the winning team.

ENTRIES-The entries in each event are limited to three, and the contestants in each two, from any school; except in the relay race, where entries will be limited to six and the number placed in competition to four, each running one-fourth mile.

All schools, in order to enter the contests of the State Meet, will be required to certify that all athletic contests in which they have taken part since becoming members of the Association have been conducted in accordance with the rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association and that all their contestants in such contests have been qualified according to the rules.

Principals will be required to certify in writing that the contestants from their respective schools have all qualified in every event for which they are entered in the State Meet. Each principal must fill out entry blanks with the names of the contestants from his school and all the required data, and send to Geo. W. Benton, Secretary of the Board of Control, Indianapolis, Indiana, on or before May 9, 1906.

This requirement must be strictly complied with. Special blanks for this purpose will be furnished to all members of the Association.

PROTESTS-All protests and complaints against members of the Association for violation of the rules must be made in writing and filed with the Secretary on or before May 9. Protests as to the eligibility of individual contestants under the constitution are to be decided by the Board of Control, and may be filed with the Secretary at any time.

MANAGEMENT-The management of this Meet rests solely with the Board of Control. The selection of officials to be approved by the Board, has been delegated to Coach Cayou, of Wabash College. The referee and starter are to be chosen from the A. A. U., in order that records made at the Meet may be recognized by that body. The Board will arrange a program, assigning place on the track by lot, and the printed program will indicate the order in which men will be called upon the track. The rules governing the Meet correspond to those of the Western Inter-Collegiate Amateur Athletic Association except where these have been modified by the Board of Control. These rules, as adopted by the Board, are printed in the I. H. S. A. A. Hand Book of Athletics and Annual Report of the Board of Control. Copies may be had of the Secretary for 10 cents each, post paid.

PRIZES - No prizes will be awarded except a cup to the winning team, a pennant to the winning relay team, and badges for point winners. Admission to all high school pupils, 25 cents. Contestants and one rubber from each school admitted free.

ENTERTAINMENT-Wabash College will furnish free board and rooms to all contestants during the Meet.

FEE-In previous Meets no entry fee was charged and as a result many were entered who did not take part in the meet and who had little expectation of doing so when they entered. This worked an injustice on the town entering the Meet since it gave no basis for estimating the number to be entertained and many received entertainment who were not entitled to it. For this reason a fee of twentyfive cents will hereafter be required from each individual enteredthis fee to be returned when the individual appears on the field.

A low railroad rate, probably a single fare, is assured.
Further information regarding rates and entertainment will be sent to entering schools previous to the Meet.

THE THIRD ANNUAL MEET. By PROF. D. D. HAINS.
The Third Annual Track and Field Meet of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, which was held on Ingalls Field under the auspices of Wabash College was the most successful in the history of the Association both in number of schools entered and in the quality of the contestants. Competitors from twenty-seven schools entered and the various events were won only after close contests.
Many came on Friday and were entertained by the students of the college or at the homes of Crawfordsville High School pupils, who did all in their power to make the Meet a success. Weather conditions were perfect for track and field events and a large and enthusiastic crowd spurred on the young athletes. The result was evident in the shattered records. Of fourteen I. H. S. A. A. marks six only escaped, new records being set in the hundred, half mile, pole vault, discus,

shot, hammer, running broad jump and relay. Hammond High School, which tied with Shortridge for first place in 1905, won by a margin of three fourths of a point from M. T. H. S. in a contest which lasted until the last event of the program had been finished, while the relay, the most exciting event of the day, was taken by the fast sprinters of Manual Training in record time.
The Meet proved one thing conclusively, that the Indiana High School Athletic Association is succeeding wonderfully well in bringing about the end for which it was organized. It would be hard to find in the State of Indiana a set of boys more manly, courteous and gentlemanly than those who assembled on Ingalls Field to battle for the high school championship. The spirit of fair play was always in evidence and at no time was there any attempt to take unfair advantage of a competitor, although the rivalry for honors was intense in all events of the day. The Indiana High School Athletic Association has stood not only for purity in athletics but in athletics for sport's sake, not merely for the sake of winning, the true spriit which should be found in all contests of diamond, gridiron and track. It has done a great work in its three years of existence and will undoubtedly do much more in the future.

## THE CRAWFORDSVILLE JOURNAL OF MAY 19, GAVE THE FOLLOWING REPORT OF THE MEET :

The greatest athletic event in the history of Crawfordsville and Wabash College was that of today when the State High School Track and Field Meet was held on the newly improved grounds at Wabash, the State Association being the guests jointly of the college and local high school. As early as Friday noon the athletically inclined young men from over the State began to arrive and from that time on until this morning every train brought in some candidates for honors besides many visitors and friends of the contestants. Committees from the college met the various trains and took the young men in charge and every attention was given them which would add to their convenience and pleasure while in the city. The college buildings were thrown open and they were given a hearty welcome to the precincts of this institution, which, while in size will not compare with some of the large institutions of learning of the State, is not in any other respect their inferiors and in athletics the school has been able to hold her own with the best in the State.
No arrangements could have been made for a day more propitious for such an occasion as the morning dawned on a clear sky and everything in the weather conditions was conducive to fast work in the Meet.

That everything should be in ship shape for the occasion the Athletic Association has left nothing undone. For the past week men have been engaged putting the track in condition, and in lieu of a drenching rain which was so much needed a sprinkler has been kept busy for days soaking the cinder course while the heavy roller has followed packing it. The rain of Friday came as a great aid and all Friday night the heavy roller was kept in action so that when the sprinters stepped upon it today they found a surface almost as smooth as velvet. This new track is one to which Wabash can point with pride. It is a quarter of a mile course and ten inches of cinders cover it in its entire length. In its building no expense was spared for once in shape it will need but little attention to keep in perfect condition. And with it interest in track events has grown until now the school is able to go forth with teams that are able to make a favorable showing against the best athletes in the State, something in former years she has been unable to do.

When time for the Meet to open a crowd of 1,500 people had assembled on the bleachers which were entirely filled, a generous proportion of the crowd being ladies who took a lively interest in the events and showed their appreciation by generous applause as the different events were pulled off. None were allowed-inside the field except the contestants and those in some official capacity. The inner field was a perfect beehive of athletic young men and the rivalry between the contending schools was intense. Hammond, the winner of last years, Meet at Purdue, was represented by a full team as was also Shortridge. M. T. H. S. and several other schools with entries in almost every event.

The work of the officials was impartial, all the contestants being given an equal opportunity, The work of Starter Herbert was first class and much of the success of the meeting was due to the efficient manner in which he pulled off the events. The track events proved the most interesting to the spectators and there were many close finishes in these events.

The first event pulled off, the 100 yard dash, resulted in a record breaker, Blair, of Hammond, running the distance in ten seconds flat; Smith, of Hebron, second; Lawrence, of Michigan City, third. Former record 10 1-5.

The second event, the discus hurl, also resuilted in a broken record, Shade, of Montpelier, winning first, Shaeffer, of Elkhart, second, and Lawrence, of Michigan City, third. Distance 105 feet 10 inches. Former record 103 feet.

The mile run proved an interesting event Meuer, of M. T. H. S.,
winning first; Weybright, of Bloomington, second; Cain, of Richmond, third. Time 5:01 2-5.
In the quarter mile, Sherble Deming, of Manual, won first; Carl Adam, of Manual, second, and Cutshall, of Brazil, third; Manual getting eight points. The time was 54:4. State record 54:2.
In the final heat of the 120 yards hurdle Billman, of Hammond, won first; Rhode, of Hammond, second, and Houter, of Rensselaer, third. Time $174-5$. State record 17 seconds.
The running high jump resulted in a tie between Holtzman, of M. T. H. S.; DeWees, of Shortridge; Morgan, of Rensselaer, and Hessler, of Veedersburg. They drew for positions Morgan, of Rensselaer, winning first; DeWees, of Shortridge, second and Holtzman, of M. T. H. S., third. Height 5 feet 4 inches. State, record 5 feet $43-4$ inches.

At the hour of going to press the Meet had resolved itself into a battle between Manual Training High School and the Hammond school, the athletes from these schools showing exceptional form.

## THE SAME PAPER MAY 21 CONTINUED AS FOLLOWS:

The annual Meet of the State High School Athletic Association closed on Saturday as it had opened, in a most pleasing manner, everything during the day having gone off smoothly, nothing happening to mar the pleasure of the day. Those who have attended all the Meets and who were in a position to know do not hesitate to designate this the most successful yet held and were loud in their praise of the manner in which the affair was conducted. A pleasing feature of the meeting was the promptness with which the events were pulled off and at no time did they miss their scheduled time to start over two minutes. All went away satisfied that they were given an even chance by the officials to whom great credit for the success of the occasion is due.

## Hammond Won the Meet.

Hammond won the Meet over the strong Manual Training High School team by the narrow margin of three-quarters of one point and there was great interest shown during the last few events. Hammond would have won by a good margin had not Rhode stumbled in the 220 yards hurdles. He had a commanding lead and the event as good as won when his foot hit the top of one of the hurdles when about half the distance had been covered and he was thrown sprawling to the ground injuring him to the extent that he was unable to enter the mile relay race with his team.
Meuer, of M. T. H. S., captured the high individual honor, breaking the record in the half mile after a sensational run, crossing the tape
in 2 minutes and $84-5$ second, winning the mile by good head work in 5 minutes $12-5$ seconds from Weybright, of Bloomington, who beat him last Saturday at Indiana in the time of $4: 51$, and tearing off a great quarter mile in the first 440 yards of the relay race.

Blair, of Hammond; and Shade, of Montpelier, also seeured ten points. The mile relay was not run for points but Meuer was declared individual champion of this event having participated with the winning team.

Blair, Hammond's star, broke the record in the hundred yard dash of $101-5$ seconds, doing the dash without being pushed against the wind in 10 flat. Shade, of Montpelier, broke his own record of 103 feet by casting the discus 105 feet and 10 inches. He also posted a new mark in the pole vault, clearing the bar at 10 feet $71 / 2$ inches, the old record being 10 feet 6 inches, held by Rudolph, of Crown Point. Lawrence, Michigan City's giant, made a new mark in the shot put, increasing the distance of 40 feet 3 inches held by Muir, by 1 foot and 4 inches. Carlson smashed the high water mark of 131 feet and 1 inch for the hammer by a margin of 3 feet $21 / 2$ inches. DeWeese, of the Shortridge High School of Indianapolis, created a new record for the running broad jump, clearing 20 feet and $61 / 2$ inches, over the mark of 20 feet 1 3-4 inches held by Yelch, of the Washington High School.

S., fifth, $81 / 4$ points; Michigan City, sixth, 8 points; Bloomington, seventh, 8 points; Rensselaer, eighth, $61 / 4$ points; Richmond, ninth, 6 points; Hebron, tenth, 6 points; Hobart, eleventh, 5 points; Goshen, twelfth, 4 points; Veedersburg, thirteenth, $21 / 4$ points; Huntington and Brazil, 1 point each.

## THE TROPHIES PRESENTED.

The great Indiana High School Track and Field Meet closed Saturday night with a big reception tendered by Wabash College to the visitors at Yandes Hall. The rooms were tastefully decorated with Wabash colors and banners and by 8 o'clock nearly 600 guests had arrived. President Kane delivered an address of welcome in which he touched on the relations of college and high school athletics. Prof. George W. Benton, principal of Shortridge High School, gave a report of the conference held the evening before and announced the names of the committee which is instructed to prepare regulations governing the relations of high school and college athletics. The members of the committee are: Joseph T. Giles, principal of the Marion High School, chairman; E, H. K. MeComb; of the Manual

Training High School; Prof. Sampson, of Indiana University, and Prof. Thomas, of Wabash College. This eommittee will meet next fall and have a report ready to present to the inter-collegiate athletic association which has a session during the holidays. Professor Giles was the presiding officer of the evening and it became his duty to present the trophies to the winners of the Meet. A large scarlet banner was presented to Manual Training High School for winning the relay race, while a handsome cup of silver and copper costing $\$ 25$ went to Hammond as the winner of the Meet. Besides these, each individual winning an event received a searlet badge appropriately inscribed.
During the informal part of the reception which followed Harry Rees sang, Mrs. Black played selections on the violin and the students sang the college song, "Old Wabash." Everybody had a fine time The visitors from a distance for the most part left on the half past nine trolley.

The next Meet goes to Richmond and will be held under the auspices of Earlham College. Professor Sackett, of that institution, was here getting pointers on how to run a first-class Meet.

## THE ATHLETIC CONFERENCE.

A conference was held Friday evening in Yandes hall between the superintendents and principals of the various visiting high schools and representatives from the colleges of the State.

Principal C. W. Knouf, of Wabash High School, a Wabash College man, was chairman of the meeting. The principal discussion of the evening was on the subject of admitting on college teams athletes who had left high school on account of being declared ineligible. The sentiment of the meeting was unanimous for putting a stop to this. Professors Sampson, of Indiana; Hathaway, of Rose Poly; Golden, of Purdue; Kleinschmidt, of DePauw, and Thomas, Cragwall and Hains of Wabash, participated in the discussion. A committee was provided for to be appointed later by the chairman, consisting of two men for the colleges and two for the high schools to take charge of the matter. Professors James H. Gray, of Rensselaer, chairman of the football committee, presented his report, which recommended that each school be limited to six games, and that greater care be taken in the securing of competent officials. The committee was continued for final report at the December meeting of the Indiana Inter-scholastic Association.


## ATHLETIC CONFERENCE.

## By C. W KNOUFF.

At the last meeting of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, 1905, a committee was appointed to arrange for an athletic conference of college and high school men at Wabash College on Friday evening, May 18, 1906, this being the evening just preceding the annual track and field Meet of the Association. At this conference "Athletic Relations of High Schools and Colleges" was vigorously discussed by representative high school and college men with the result that a committee on high school and college relations, composed of two college and two high school men, was appointed to make a report at the next annual meeting of the Association. The following persons were appointed on this committee: J. T. Giles, of Marion; Kemper McComb, of Indianapolis; M. W. Sampson, of Indiana University, and M. B. Thomas, of Wabash College. Later, because of the removal from the State of Prof. Sampson, of Indiana University, E. O. Holland, of the same institution was substituted on the committee.
The committee on】football revision appointed at the last annual meeting of the Association, 1905, reported at this conference as follows:

Crawfordsville, Ind., May 18, 1906.
Your committee on football revision for the high schools in the Indiana High School Athletic Association, beg leave to submit the following recommendations:

1. That the rules governing the game of football in the I. H. S. A. A. shall be those adopted by the National Rules Committee.
2. That the number of football games played by a team in one season shall not exceed six.
3. That professional coaches shall not be employed.
4. That neither the referee nor the umpire shall be in any way connected with either school.
5. That the managers of teams demand of the officials a rigid enforcement of the rules.

After the above recommendations were read and discussed the committee was instructed to report at the next annual meeting of the Association.
The conference adjourned with its members feeling it had been an epoch making occasion if, in the appointment of a committee on high school and college relations, it had launched a movement that would prevent colleges from taking and giving good berths to high school fellows who are ineligible for athletics in the high school.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ATHLETIC RELATIONS OF HIGH SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES.

The committee on high school and college relations begs leave to submit the following report:

The two college athletic organizations of the State include in their membership Indiana University, Purdue University, Notre Dame University, DePauw University, Rose Polytechnic Institute, the Indiana State Normal, and Wabash, Franklin, Hanover, and Earlham Colleges. Each of these organizations at their annual meeting in Indianapolis on December 8, 1906 adopted the following resolution agreeing to be bound by it until by amendment it may become a part of their constitutions:

No student leaving high school before graduation shall be eligible for college athletics during his first year in college unless he presents a certificate from the high school principal showing that he was eligible to engage in athletics under I. H. S. A. A. rules at the time of leaving high school.

## INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION.

Dear Mr. Camp-The Indiana High School Athletic Association at its last meeting December 27,1905, appointed a committee composed of President Giles, E. H. K. McComb and myself to communicate with your committee in reference to the revision of the football rules.

As you will see by the enclosed copy of our constitution, we represent the athletic interests in high schools throughout the State. Our Association is not in sympathy with the very prevalent demand that football should be abolished; but we believe that certain changes might be introduced into the game which would render the sport subject to less just criticism.

We would simply call your attention to the fact that thousands of boys of secondary schools are playing and will continue to play football according to college rules. They are coached, for the most part, by college men, and we are writing you to ask that in the revision of the rules you keep in mind the needs of these boys so far as would be consistent with proper recognition of the college conditions. We think a more open game, with less opportunity for mass plays, would be much safer for immature boys whom we represent. We also believe that an additional official should be procured, and that disbar-
ment for the season, of contestants who are detected in employing brutal tactics should be strictly enforced.
We wish to express through you to the committee our confidence in its good intentions in the interest of amateur sport, and shall be glad to render the committee any assistance in our power as requested. Yours sincerely,

## THE '07 MEET.

The Fourth Annual State Meet will be held at Richmond under the auspices of Earlham College, May 18, 1907. Entries will close ten days before the Meet. Special entry blanks and a detailed announcement of the Meet will be furnished to all members of the Association in due time.

Richmond is centrally and conveniently located and the railroads will undoubtedly offer a satisfactory rate. Entertainment to actual contestants in the Meet will be free. These things together with the increasing membership of the Association and the growing interest

throughout the State in track and field athletics all give promise of the largest and best Meet in the history of the Association.

The arrangements for the Meet will be similar to those given in the announcement for the third Meet given on a previous page, with the following exceptions: Experience has shown that the proceeds of the Meet are not sufficient to pay the mileage of the contestants in addition to the necessary expenses of the Association. For this reason the Board of Control makes no promise of a money rebate to the schools entered in the Meet, but will use any surplus proceeds to further the interests of the Association and increase its usefulness.

Previous to the Crawfordsville Meet no entry fee was charged and as a result many were entered who did not take part in the Meet and who had little expectation of doing so when they entered. This worked an injustice on the town entertaining the Meet, since it gave no basis for estimating the number to be entertained and many received entertainment who were not entitled to it. For this reason a fee of twenty-five cents will hereafter be required from each individual entered-this fee to be returned when the individual appears on the field.

## CONSTITUTION

## of the

## INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION.

Revised December 27, 1905.

## ADMINISTRATION.

Section 1. A Board of Control, composed of three members (principals, vice-principals or superintendents), shall be elected by the Association December 29, 1903 as follows: One for one year, one for two years, and one for three years, the chairman each year to be the one whose term expires at the end of that year. Thereafter each member of the Board shall be elected for three years. This election is to take place at the annual meeting of the Indiana State Teachers' Association. In case of vacancy, the remaining members of the Board may appoint a person to fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting of the Association.

Sec. 2. The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties: (a) It shall have general control over all athletic contests between secondary schools in this Association; (b) It shall have exclusive control of the annual Interscholastic Meet; (c) It shall give interpretations of the rules of the Association; (d) It shall determine forfeitures under Section 11; (e) The Board of Control at the end of any athletic season may, at its discretion, issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standing of the teams. No school which has violated the rules of the Association in regard to the qualifications of players shall be awarded special honors in that particular branch of athletics.

Sec. 3. (a) When charges are made in writing by a member of the Association against another member for violation of the rules of the Association, the Board of Control after giving due notice of place and time for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges, and may suspend the offending school for a period not exceeding one year. (b) The Board of Control shall decide all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants in the Interscholastic Meet. (c) When any matter comes before the Board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a
member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.

Sec. 4. Membership in this Association shall be limited to public high schools of the State, and each school shall have one vote. The annual dues shall be $\$ 2.00$, payable when the school becomes a member, and thereafter by December 1 of each year in advance.

Sec. 5. The principal of the school or high school teachers authorized by him shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.

Sec. 6. No games shall be played without the sanction of the principal.

Sec. 7. No game shall be played with public high schools of this State not belonging to this Association.

Sec. 8. Non-playing student officials or assistants shall conform to the same rules as the players.

Sec. 9. The principal or his authorized representative shall accompany his team to all contests.

Sec. 10. In football contests held under these rules, the length of each half shall be twenty-five minutes, unless changed by mutual consent.

Sec. 11. It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, provide a forfeiture of $\$ 10$, to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeiture be stipulated and not paid during the same season, the Board of Control, after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the Association. Notification of such expulsion shall be published in the papers, with the cause therefor.

Sec. 12. No retiring member of the Board of Control, having served three years, shall be eligible for re-election for a period of one year after date of retirement.

## RULES.

Rule 1. To represent a school in any interscholastic contest a person must be under twenty-one years of age; must have entered some public high school within the first twenty school days of the term or semester in which the contest occurs, and must be an amateur as defined by the A. A. U. Eighth grade pupils are not eligible.

Rule 2. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current term or semester a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen regular high school recitations per week, exclusive of rhetoricals, physical culture, military drill
and deportment; in his last preceding term or semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire term.

Pupils enrolled for the first time must comply with all the requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding term or semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

Back work may be made up, providing that it be done in accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes a matter of final record before the opening of the next term or semester.

Rule 3. The eligibility of all the contestants shall be certified to by the principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statement shall be presented in writing within ten days before any contest. In case of disputes the principal must furnish to the Board of Control the following data in regard to each contestant: The date of last enrollment; the number of years he has been a member of a secondary school athletic team; date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the preceding term or semester; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term or semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be denied championship honors, and may be excluded from the annual Interscholastic Meet.

Rule 4. No person shall take part in athletic contests between secondary schools for more than four years, and no post-graduate pupil shall take part in such contests. Persons graduating from regular three-year courses shall not be deemed post-graduates.

Time spent in athletic sport by pupils while in grades below the high school shall not be counted as part of the four years.

Rule 5. No person shall enter a contest under an assumed name.
Rule 6. The principal shall have power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner.

Rule 7. Any member of a high school athletic team, who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that season. This rule was amended December 27,1905 by the addition of the following clause: "This rule shall not apply to basketball games."

Rule 8. These rules may be amended by a majority vote of the members present at the annual meeting.

INTERPRETATIONS OF THE BOARD OF CONTROL.

1. Inasmuch as questions have arisen concerning practice games

with high schools not in the Association, the Board of Control feel warranted in calling attention to Sec. 7, which says that "No game shall be played with public high schools of the State not belonging to the Association."
2. The football season is defined as beginning with the opening of school and closing with November 30.
3. No student who violates the rules of the Association will be reinstated by the Board.
4. When a member or members of any team are protested, the game should be played as scheduled and the protest filed with the Board for settlement later.
5. By mutual agreement of both teams, pupils over the age limit may be allowed to enter the contests played under I. H. S. A. A. rules.
6. Pupils under twenty-one at the time of registration in school shall be so regarded until the time of their next registration.
7. Rule 7 shall apply only to games and contests where an admission fee is charged.
8. Adopted by the annual meeting, December 27, 1905. Rule 2 shall be interpreted as follows: (a) The contestant must have an average equal to a passing grade in the amount of work specified for the school months of the current term or semester up to the month in which the contest occurs; (b) during the current school month he must be maintaining said passing grade up to the date of certification by the principal; (c) If his average monthly grade in any study at the beginning of the current month is below passing, the contestant is ineligible so far as that study is concerned during the entire current month.
9. A student is a post-graduate of a school after he has completed the work required for graduation by that school irrespective of the time of granting the diploma.
10. The amendment to Rule 7 was made for the relief of schools not having a gymnasium of their own, but whose basketball athletics depend upon a Y. M. C. A. or other local gymnasium.

3. Printed blanks for reporting the data of all games will be sent by the Secretary on application. Reports on basketball, baseball and track athletics should be in the hands of the Secretary by June 1; football reports are due December 1.
4. The annual dues for 1907 are payable to the Secretary on or before December 1, 1906.
5. Any high school in Indiana may become a member of the Association by the payment of two dollars to the Secretary. (See Sec. 4.)

## ATHLETIC RULES

## of <br> INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION. <br> Based on Rules of Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association.

RULE I.
Officials.
Section 1. All meetings must be under the direction of
The Board of Control.
One referee.
Two or more inspectors.
Three or more field judges.
Three judges at finish.
Three or more timekeepers
One starter.
One clerk of the course.
One scorer.
One marshal.
Sec. 2. If deemed necessary, assistants may be provided for the clerk of the course, the scorer, and the marshal. and an official announcer may be appointed.

## RULE II.

The Board of Control.
Shall have jurisdiction of all matters not assigned by these rules to the referee or other game officials.

> RULE III.
> The Referee.

Must decide all questions relating to the actual conduct of the Meet, whose final settlement is not otherwise covered by these rules; have the power to add to or alter the announced arrangements of heats in any event. A referee has no authority, after heats have been drawn and published in a program, to transfer a contestant from one heat to another.
When in any but the final heat of a race a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to culpable
carelessness and shall also have the power to allow the hindered competitor to start in the next round of heats, just as if he had been placed in his trial.

When in a final heat a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to his carelessness or conduct, and he shall also have the power to order a new race between such of the competitors as he thinks entitled to such a privilege.

If, during any athletic contest under the rules of the I. H. S. A. A., a competitor shall conduct himself in a manner unbecoming a gentleman or offensive to the officials, spectators, or competitors, the referee shall have the power to disqualify him from further competition at the Meet; and, if he thinks the offense worthy of additional punishment, must promptly make a detailed statement of the facts to the Board of Control.

Power to change the order of events as laid down in the official program is reserved to the Board of Control, which shall, through its chairman, exercise this authority, unless it sees fit to expressly delegate this power to the referee.

The referee shall not have authority to disqualify any competitor for violation of the eligibility rules of the I. H. S. A. A. All protests as to eligibility made on the field must be referred to the Board of Control, and the protested competitor must be allowed to compete until disqualified by the arbitrator of the I. H. S. A. A.

## RULE IV. <br> The Inspectors.

It shall be the duty of an inspector to stand at such point as the referee may designate, to watch the competition closely, and, in case of a claim of foul, to report to the referee what he saw of the incident.

Such inspectors are merely assistants to the referee, to whom they must report, and have no power to make any decision.

RULE V.

## The Judges at the Finish.

Must determine the order of finishing of contestants and must arrange among themselves as to noting the winner, second, third, fourth, etc.. as the case may require, and there must always be two judges whose duty it must be to choose the winner.

Their decision in this respect must be without_appeal, and, in case of a disagreement, a majority must govern.

RULE VI.
The Field Judges.
Must make an accurate measurement and keep a tally of all trials of competitors in the high and broad jumps, the pole vaults and the weight competitions.

They must act as judges in these events, and their decisions must likewise be without appeal. In cases of disagreement, a majority must govern. There must be at least three judges for every event.

RULE VII.

## The Timekeepers.

Must be three in number and must individually time all events where time record is called for. At the conclusion of each heat, each timekeeper must present his watch to the referee for inspection, and he must decide the official time. Should two or three watches mark the same time and the third disagree, the time marked by said two watches must be accepted. Should all three disagree, the time marked by the intermediate watch must be accepted.

The flash of the pistol must denote the actual time of starting.
If, for any reason, only two watches are held on an event, and they fail to agree, the longer time of the two must be accepted.

Note-For record, however, three watches must be held on an event.
RULE VIII.

## The Starter.

Must have sole juirisdiction over the competitors after the clerk of the course has properly placed them in their positions for the start-

The method of starting must be by pistol report, except that in time handicap races the word "go" must be used.

An actual start is not effected until the pistol has been pur. posely discharged after the competitors have been warned to get ready.
In case the pistol was not purposely discharged, the competitors shall be called back by the starter by pistol fire. (Note-The starter must have at least two good cartridges in his pistol before starting a heat.)

When any part of the person of a competitor touches the ground in front of his mark before the signal is given, it must be considered a false start.

Penalties for false starting must be inflicted by the starter, as follows:

In all races to and including 125 yards, the competitor must be put back one yard for the first and another yard for the second attempt; in races over 215 yards and including 300 yards, two yards for the first
and two more for the second attempt; in races over 300 yards and including 600 yards, three yards for the first and three more for the second attempt; in races over 600 yards and including 1,000 yards, four yards for the first and four more for the second attempt; in races over 1,000 yards and including one mile, five yards for the first and five more for the second attempt; in all races over one mile, ten yards for the first and ten more for the second attempt.

In all cases, the third false start must prevent his competing in that event.

The starter must rule out of that event any competitor who attempts to advance himself from his mark, as prescribed in the official program, after he has given the warning to "get ready."

RULE IX.
The Clerk of the Course.
Must be provided with the names and the numbers of all entered competitors, and he must notify them to appear at the starting line before the start in each event in which they are entered.

## RULE X.

The scorer.
Must record the order in which each competitor finishes his event together with the time furnished by the referee.
He must keep a tally of the laps made by each competitor in races covering more than one lap, and must announce, by means of a bell or otherwise, when the leading man enters the last lap.

He must draw up a list of the actual competitors in each event, which shall be filed with the papers of the Association and shall be the official record of competing entrants, and shall be final evidence in the enforcement of Rule III, of the rules of eligibility.

He must control his assistants and assign to them such of his duties as he may deem proper.

> Rule XI.
> The Marshal.

Must have full police charge of the enclosure and must prevent any but officials and actual competitors from entering or remaining therein

He must control his assistants and assign to them their duties.

## RULE XII.

The Official Announcer.
Must receive from the scorer and field judges the result of each event, and announce the same by voice or by means of a bulletin board.

Must report to the clerk of the course immediately upon their arrival at the place of meeting, and must be provided by that official with their proper numbers, which must be worn conspicuously by the competitors when competing, and without which they must not be allowed to start.

Each competitor must inform himself of the time of starting, and must be promptly at the starting point of each competition in which he is entered, and there report to the clerk of the course.

Under no conditions shall attendants be allowed to accompany competitors at the start or during any competition.

## RULE XIV.

## Track Measurement.

All distances run or walked must be measured upon a line eighteen inches outward from the inner edge of the track, except that in races on straightaway tracks the distance must be measured in a direct line from the starting mark to the finishing line.

## RULE XV.

## The Course.

Each competitor must keep in his respective position from start to finish in all races on straightaway tracks, and in all races on tracks with one or more turns he must not cross to the inner edge of the track, except when he is at least six feet in advance of his nearest competitor. After turning the last corner into the straight in any race, each competitor must run a straight course to the finish line, and must not cross to either the outside or inside from such straight course.

In all races of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have a separate course marked out and meas ${ }^{\circ}$ ured, whether races are run straightaway or with turns.

The referee must disqualify from that event any competitor who willfully pushes against, impedes, crosses the course of, or in any way intèrferes with another competitor.

The referee must disqualify from further participation in the Meet any contestant competing to lose, to coach, or to in any way impede the chances of another competitor, either in a trial or final contest.

## RULE XVI.

The Finish.
Of the course must be represented by a line between two finishing posts, draw across and at right angles to the sides of the track, and
three feet above which line must be placed a tape attached at either end to the finishing posts. A finish must be counted when any part of the winner's body, except his hands or arms, touches the tape at the finish line. The tape must be considered the finishing line for the winner, but their order of finishing across the track line must determine the positions of the other competitors.

## RULE XVII.

Hurdles.
In the 120 yards hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle to be three feet six inches high. They must be placed ten yards apart, with the first hurdle fifteen yards distant from the starting point, and the last hurdle fifteen yards before the finishing line.

In the 220 yards hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle to be two feet six inches high. They must be placed twenty yards apart, with the first hurdle twenty yards distant from the starting mark, and the last hurdle twenty yards before the finishing line.

In making a record, it must be necessary for the competitor to jump every hurdle in its proper position.

In all hurdle races of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have a separate course and hurdles marked out and measured, whether races are run straightaway or with turns.

## RULE XVIII.

## Jumping.

Section 1. A fair jump must be one that is made without the assistance of weights, diving, somersaults, or handsprings of any kind.

In scratch events competitors must jump in order as placed on the progràm.

Sec. 2. The running high jump. The field judges must decide the height at which the jump shall commence and must regulate the succeeding elevations.

Each competitor must be allowed three trial jumps at each height, and if on the third trial he shall fail, he must be declared out of the competition.

Competitors must jump in order, as provided in Sec. 1; then, those failing, if any, must have their second trial jump in a like order, after which those having failed twice must make their third trial jump.

The jump must be made over a bar resting on pins projecting not more than three inches from the uprights, and when this bar is removed from its place by the competitor when trying, it must be counted as a trial jump.


## RALIEGH SHADE

Montpelier High School, Broke the State Record at Crawfordsville,1006, in Discus and Pole Vault.

Running under the bar in making an attempt to jump must be counted as a "balk," and three successive "balks" must be counted as a trial jump.

The distance of the run before the jump must be unlimited. A competitor may decline to jump at any height in his turn, and by so doing forfeits his right to again jump at the height declined.

Sec 4. The running broad jump. When jumped on earth, joist five inches wide must be sunk flush with it. The outer edge of this joist must be called the scratch line, and the measurement of all jumps must be made from it, at right angles, to the nearest break in the ground made by any part of the person of the competitor.

In front of the scratch line the ground must be removed to the depth of three and the width of twelve inches outward.

A foul jump must be one where the competitor, in jumping off the scratch line, makes a mark on the ground immediately in front of it, or runs over the line without jumping, and must count as a trial jump without results.

Each competitor must have three trial jumps, and the best three must each have three more trial jumps.

The competition must be decided by the best of all the trial jumps of the competitors. .

The distance of the run before the scratch line must be unlimited.
Sec. 5. The pole vault. Pole must be furnished by the managing committee, but contestants may use their own private poles if they so desire, and no contestant shall be allowed to use any of these private poles, except by the consent of their owners. The poles must be unlimited as to size and weight, but must have no assisting devices, except that they may be wrapped or covered with any substances (to obtain a firmer grasp), and must have but one prong at the end.

No competitor shall, during his vault, raise the hand which was uppermost when he left the ground to a higher point of the pole, nor shall he raise the hand which was undermost when he left the ground to any point on the pole above the other hand.

The rules governing the running high jump must also govern the pole vault for height, except that when the man leaves the ground in an attempt, it shall be counted a trial.

## RULE XIX. <br> Putting the Shot.

The shot must be a solid sphere, made of metal and must weigh 12 pounds.
It must be put with one hand and, in making the attempt, it must be above, and not behind, the shoulder.

The competitor must stand in a circle seven feet in diameter. The circumference of the circle must be divided into two halves by a line drawn through it. On four feet of the front half of the circumference a board four inches high must be placed, the edge of which must be equally distant from the interection of the line with the circumference and at which the competitor must stand when the shot leaves his hand.

A fair put shall be one where no part of the person of the competitor touches in front of the circle, or on the board, in making the attempt.

A put must be counted as foul if the competitor steps over the front half of the circle or on the board. A competitor must leave the circle by the rear half. Leaving by the front half must be declared a foul.

The measurement of all puts must be made from the nearest mark by the shot to a point on the circumference of the circle, on a line with the object mark and the center of the circle.

Foul puts and letting go the shot in making an attempt must be counted as trial puts without result.

A board similar to the one in front may be used at the back of the circle.

The order of competing and number of trials shall be the same as for the running broad jump. Shots must be furnished by the managing committee. Any contestant may use his private shot, if correct in weight and shape; in which case the other contestants must also be allowed to use it, if they wish.

RULE XX.
Throwing the Hammer.
The head and handle may be of any size, shape, and material, provided that the length of the complete inplement must not be more than four feet and its weight not less than 12 pounds.

All throws shall be made from a circle seven feet in diameter, and this circle shall be considered as divided into halves by a line drawn through its center at right angles to the direction of the throw.

A fair throw must be one where no part of the person of the competitor shall touch outside or on the circle in making the attempt.

Foul throws and letting go of the hammer in an attempt must count as trial throws.

The measurement of all throws must be made from the nearest mark made by the head of the hammer to a point on the circumference of the circle, on a line with the object mark and the center of the circle.

The order of competing and number of trials must be the same as for the running broad jump. Hammers must be furnished by the managing committee. Any contestant may use his private hammer, if
correct in weight and length, and no contestant shall be allowed to use these private hammers except by consent of the owner.

RULE XXI.
Throwing the Discus.
The discus shall be made of smooth, hardwood body, without finger holes, weighted in center with lead discs and capped with polished brass discs, with steel ring on the outside. The weight of the discus shall be four and one-half ( $41 / 2$ ) pounds; outside diameter, eight (8) inches; thickness in center, two (2) inches.

All throws shall be made from a seven (7) foot circle, with four foot lapboard and similar in all respects to the circle for putting the shot. In making his throws, a competitor may assume any position he chooses. Foul throws and letting go of the discus in attempts shall count as trials without result. A fair throw shall be one in which no part of the person of the competitor touches the ground outside the front half of the circle, and the competitor leaves the circle by its rear half. A throw shall be foul if any part of the person touches the ground outside the front half of the circle before the throw is measured.

A discus shall be furnished by the managing committee. Any contestant may use his private discus, if correct in weight and shape; in which case the other contestants must also be allowed to use it, if they wish.
The measurement of each throw shall be made from the nearest mark made by the fall of the discus to the circumference of the circle, on a line from a mark made by the discus to the center of the circle.

## TIES.

In case of a tie in a scratch contest at high jumping, the tieing competitors shall have three additional trials at the height last tried, and if still undecided, the bar shall be lowered to the height next below, and three trials taken at that height. If no one clears it, the bar shall be lowered again and again until one of the competitors clears it. In case of a second tie, the award shall be given to the competitor who cleared the bar with the least number of trials.

In case of a tie in the pole vault the officials shall raise or lower the bar at their discretion, and those competitors who have tied shall be allowed one trial at each height.

In case of a tie in a scratch contest at any game decided by distance each of the tieing competitors shall have three additional trials, and the award shall be made in accordance with the distances cleared in these additional trials. In case of a second tie three more trials shall be allowed, and so on, until a decision is reached. In case of a dead
heat in any track events, the competitors shall not be allowed to divide the prize or points, or to toss for them, but must compete again at a time and place appointed by the referee.

## MINUTES OF THE COLLEGE CONFERENCE. Session of March 10, 1906.

Chicago Beach Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, March 10, 1906.
The Conference was called to order by President Jones at 10:20 a. m. Those present were:

Professor J. E. Raycroft, University of Chicago.
Professor H. J. Barton, University of Illinois.
Professor M. W. Sampson, University of Indiana.
Professor A. G. Smith, University of Iowa.
*Professor A. H. Pattengill, University of Michigan.
Dean F. S. Jones, University of Minnesota.
Professor O. F. Long, Northwestern University.
Professor T. F. Moran, Purdue Univeristy.
Professor T. S. Adams, University of Wisconsin.
Professor Barton introduced the question of the propriety of the present amateur standard, and after general discussion Professor Sampson introduced the following to be added to rule four: "A student otherwise eligible shall not be debarred from intercollegiate baseball who has received remuneration for playing non-collegiate baseball, but such a student shall be ineligible for other intercollegiate sports." After discussion it was ordered that this proposed addition to the rule be referred without publicity to the various Boards of Control, and a committee was appointed consisting of Professors Sampson, Moran, and Smith to formulate the arguments both for and against the resolution, and to submit these to the various Boards.

It was moved that all the recommendations of the second Conference on football, held at the Chicago Beach Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, on March 9th, 1906, be recommended for adoption to the various Boards of Control. Adopted.

These recommendations are as follows:

1. "That no student shall participate in intercollegiate athletics until he shall have been in residence one year and shall have completed one full year of work in addition to meeting the entrance requirements of the College of Liberal Arts of his institution or its equivalent." To be effective at the beginning of the fall semester, 1906.
2. a. "That no student shall participate in intercollegiate athletics for more than three years in the aggregate."
*Professor Pattengill died at his home, Ann Arbor, Mich., March 16, 1906.

b. "And that participation be confined to students who have not graduated from any department of a college or university."
a to be effective September 1, 1906, except for students who participated in intercollegiate athletics in the academic year 1905-6; for these it shall be effective December 1, 1906. b to be effective September 1, 1906.
3. "That no football team consisting in whole or part of college students shall play with high schools, academies, or independent professional schools." To be effective September 1, 1906.
4. "That no more than five games of intercollegiate football shall be played by any team in any season." To be effective September 1, 1906.
5. "That the regular Conference rescind its present rule which does not count as participation the first three games of football in each season."
6. "That freshman football teams and second elevens play only with teams from their own institutions." To be effective September 1, 1906.
7. "That the price of admission to intercollegiate contests for members of the University be not more than fifty cents, including reserved seats." To be effective September 1, 1906.
8. "That there shall be no training table or training quarters for any athletic team." To be effective September 1, 1906.
9. "That the competent University officer state in his certificate of eligibility: 1. That the student has passed all entrance requirements. 2. That he has passed intervening work as regularly required in his University for the period involved. 3. That he is taking full work in the present semester." To be effective September 1, 1906.
10. "That no coach be appointed except by University governing bodies on the reco mendation of the Faculty or President in the regular way and at a moderate salary. This recommendation to become operative as soon as existing contracts in the several institutions permit."
11. "That there be no preliminary training prior to the beginning of instruction." To be effective September 1, 1906.
12. "That the football season end the Saturday before Thanksgiving." To be effective September 1, 1906.
13. "That steps be taken to reduce the receipts and expenses of athletic contests." To be effective not later than September 1, 1906.
14. "That the athletic surplus be devoted as far as possible to permanent University improvements and that the financial management of athletics be entirely within the control of the Faculty, which shall
publish a report of receipts and expenditures." Effective not later than September 1, 1906.
It was moved that the College Conference request the institutions represented in the Football Conference, to report action on the recommendations made by that body within two weeks after report of such recommendations has been received from the Secretary. Adopted.
In the event that any of the recommendations failed of adoption, the Secretary was directed to take a mail vote and it was ordered that such recommendation or recommendations upon which a mail vote be taken, should be considered in force if adopted by a two-thirds vote.
It was ordered that in the event that any of the recommendations were adopted, an engrossing committee consisting of Professors Sampson, Barton and Raycroft incorporate them with the existing body of rules.
Professor Adams introduced the following resolution and moved its passage: "Resolved that it is the sense of the Conference that all athletic contracts made in the several institutions represented in this Conference, contain clauses making such contracts binding only in so far as they are not in conflict with existing or future legislation by State Legislatures, or Boards of Regents of the several institutions, or by the Intercollegiate Athletic Conference." Adopted.
The Conference thereupon adjourned.

Case of Anderson vs. Manual Training High School Indianapolis, Ind. Anderson, Ind., February 2, 1906.

## MR. GEORGE W. BENTON, Secretary State Board of Control, Indianapolis, Ind.

Dear Sir-We, the Anderson High School, today protested, in writing, to manager Bacon, the basketball game to be played here tonight between Anderson H. S. and M. T. H. S. of Indianapolis on account of the ineligibility of E. Cook, of that team. We declare the ineligibility because (1) the said E. Cook graduated from the Manual Training School, having completed all the work required, and is therefore, according to our way of promoting here, a post-graduate. Although we have mid-year promotions here, we consider them post-graduates as soon as they have finished the work, and feel that it is a great handicap to us over Manual if they are allowed the opposite; (2) the said E. Cook played here last fall, a game of professional baseball and is therefore not permitted to enter into the amateur athletic sports. He admits it himself and we have here men who will furnish affidavits to that effect.

[^0]received in today's mail from Mr. Benton. I rather think that it should be taken up in the regular way. The M. T. H. S. people should be notified, furnished a copy of the protest and be given the opportunity to answer it. When all the evidence is in we could then give a more just decision.

It looks to me, on the basis of the statement of the Anderson people, as if Cook would be clearly ineligible. It also seems to me that a student should not be allowed to participate in athletics after he has finished his work in high school, although he may not have received his diploma. In other words, if he finishes his work at mid-year, he has had the chance to participate in athletics four years. The receiving of the diploma at a later date cuts no figure in the case.

As Mr. Benton is now the Sec'y write him in view of what has been said, appending your thoughts, and let him instruct the parties to come forward with their information, after which we can give a final decision. On the other hand if you think the evidence is conclusive enough to warrant a decision let my vote be cast according to the sentiments above expressed.

## The Case of Wabash vs. Fairmount.

Prin. Knouff of Wabash H. S. brought formal written charge against Pairmount H. S. for playing George McCaskey in a football game at Wabash, Sept. 29, after Supt. Copeland had been advised that the boy was ineligible. There were present at the meeting the eritire Board, and Supt. Copeland of Fairmount. Wabash H. S. was not represented.
The facts brought out in the hearing follow:
George McCaskey was a student in the Marion H: S. during the last semester of 1905-6. He was carrying successfully up to the time of the destruction of the school building by fire, the requisite fifteen hours work. He did not return to the Marion H. S. to finish the semester. His records were burned along with others. He entered the Fairmount H. S. in Sept. last. Fairmount reasoned that as the boy had made his eligibility requirements during the two or more years of his H. S. experience, preceding the portion of a semester

spent in Marion before the fire, of which latter period there was no record, his eligibility should be based on his previous record.

The decisions of the Board in former cases were confirmed by the conclusion that the rule was not subject to liberal interpretation, and that McCaskey was in Marion H. S. a portion of the last semester ${ }^{\text {c }}$ that he did not make his required credits at the close of the semester, that he did not make them up before the opening of the present semester, and that he is therefore not eligible to represent his school in teams playing under I. H. S. A. A. rules.

As there was no attempt on the part of Fairmount to deceive any one as to eligibility of McCaskey, but merely an honest difference of opinion as to the interpretation of the condition of the records of Marion H. S., the Board decided to exonerate Firrmount from any blame. The decision has no effect upon the result of the game or the score.

## Peru Suspended Until December 1, 1906.

Several complaints have reached the Board from time to time of high schools in the Association playing high schools out of the Association. The complaint against Peru brought before the Board at this meeting was definite and demanded action. As a result of the inquiries set on foot, the facts were shown to be as follows:

Peru played a football game with Logansport on Sept. 29, the Peru manager, Mr. Teter, claiming that it was played with the understanding that Logansport was a candidate for membership in the Association. Peru cancelled a return game scheduled for Oct. 20, when it was found that Logansport had not become a member of the Association.

The Board claimed that there is now no excuse for ignorance of the rules of the Association, and suspended Peru from the privileges of the Association for the balance of the football season, or until Dec, 1, 1906.

All schools having games scheduled with Peru during this time are cautioned to cancel same. No forfeits may be claimed from Peru on account of the failure of these games.
