

INTRODUCTION

The coming meeting of the Association marks the close of the first four years' period in its existence. It also brings the Association to the important question of handing over control of its affairs to an entirely new Board of Control.

The original Board retires, Mr. Coffman by removal from the State, Mr. Giles last year and Mr. Benton this year, by constitutional limitation. Mr. Knouff is new to the work, having come on the Board last year.

It has probably been wise to continue the Board through the formative period of the Association. As a result, there has arisen a body of precedent which, if lived up to, will have a strong tendency toward unifying sentiment and fostering the most desirable relations between the schools. In the interest of this harmony, the plan of placing the affairs of the Association in the hands of a permanent secretary was projected and has already demonstrated its value. The new Board may rely upon the knowledge and judgment of the secretary, and will have no reason to complain of a lack of historical material.


In retiring, the members of the Board wish to thank the members of the Association for their evidences of confidence and for the invariable courtesy and loyalty shown them. Whatever has been done, has been carefully considered, and has been executed without fear or favor. We believe the affairs of the Association were never in better condition, and that the disposition to sportsmanlike behavior, on the part of boys and of school authorities, has continually improved since the organization of the Association. The membership has constantly increased and is now larger than at any previous date, while the friction incident to contests between the schools, has constantly decreased as school authorities have become familiar with the working of the Association.

The most important development in the athletic situation of the year is contained in the action of the Indianapolis school authorities, given elsewhere in this report in full, on athletic relations of the two high schools of that city. The Indianpolis schools remain in the Association and may take part in the State Meet, but cannot play with each other or with outside teams in other phases of athletics. The

effect of this action upon the Association will undoubtedly be a question of importance before the annual meeting. Already unauthorized boys of the two schools have made overtures to schools outside of Indianapolis for games. The Board calls attention to the fact that games played with boys of these schools without the sanction and certification of the principals of the schools are violations, both of the letter and spirit of the constitution, and should not be allowed. With this point carefully guarded there should be no alarm as to the effect of the action of the Indianapolis school board upon the future of the Association. The schools affected by this action contemplate the substitution of *intra* for *inter* school athletics on some group basis, the details of which are to be yet worked out.

We believe it is not indelicate for us to express the regret we feel at the removal of Mr. Coffman. He has been a decided and important influence in bringing about a higher standard of athletics in the schools of the State.

The article by Heze Clark on another page is offered as an expression of one who might be expected to have ideas. It is entirely an expression of opinion, and is not to be considered in any sense as official.



High School Athletics for 1907

Under the Indiana High School Athletic Association

Athletics in the high schools of the State for 1907 have been far above par. The Indiana High School Athletic Association has done much, not only to cleanse athletics, but also to promote them. The idea advanced by the Association is good, clean amateur athletic sports, played for the pleasure and for the benefit to be gained therefrom. It is the spirit in which athletics are conducted and played that makes them successful and beneficial. To be a good loser is often better than to be a winner. That is, if the loser has done his best and loses in the right spirit. Nothing is more admirable in a team than the spirit shown by them when after losing a game they gather in a bunch on a field and give nine rahs for their conquerer. The Indiana High School Athletic Association has done much to advance this spirit.

Good, clean athletics mean much, and this is what the Indiana High School Athletic Association stands for. Athletics can be clean in many ways. First, in having no professionals on teams with amateur players. Second, good, sportsmanlike conduct on the field of play by both players and rooters. Third, by the sportsmanlike spirit shown by the coaches and instructors. The very life of high school athletics is clean, amateur sport conducted in good spirit. This has been shown in many athletic contests held under the auspices of the Indiana High School Athletic Association.

This association has made rules which go not only to clean athletics but to keep them clean. One of the rules adopted last year through the influence of the Association was the following: "No student leaving high school before graduation shall be eligible for college athletics during the first year in college unless he presents a certificate from the high school principal showing that he was eligible to engage in athletics under the I. H. S. A. A. rules at the time of leaving high school."

This rule has done much to prevent colleges from drafting men who were ineligible to contest on high school teams. The rule was adopted by the colleges and universities of the State December 8, 1906.

A new rule will probably be adopted by the Indiana High School

Athletic Association this year. This rule will be that no player who has left high school and contested on a college team will be eligible to play on a high school team if he should reenter high school. There was a great amount of comment both in the daily papers and among football fans in general as to the case of King of the Manual Training High School. King entered the academy of Earlham College and played on the football team of the college during the Fall of 1906. He then reentered M. T. H. S. and played there during the season of 1907. There was no rule under the Indiana High School Athletic Association by which King could be barred out. Just the same, it was undoubtedly unfair for him to play in a high school contest. I certainly hope that a rule will be made which will prevent a similar occurrence in the future.

In some branches of athletics, namely, football and baseball, it is impossible to pick the state championship team. In the case of basketball and track athletics it is different. Crawfordsville H. S. has undoubtedly the state championship in basketball. M. T. H. S. probably stands second. The names, basketball and Crawfordsville, mean the same thing. The boys from the Hoosier Athens know how to play that game. They have the team work that wins. There was during the past year no team (high school) in the State that could defeat them, and probably very few colleges.

The State High School Track and Field Meet was pulled off at Richmond, Indiana, May 18. M. T. H. S. won first with 36 points, Monticello was second with 28, while Crown Point scored 11. The remaining 46 points were divided among nine high schools. The meet took place on a heavy track. The only running event in which the record was broken was the relay. The team that represented M. T. H. S. won the event and lowered the mark to two-fifths of a second. Kearn of Salem broke the shot put record, and Conrad of Darlington broke the broad jump record. Stockton of Monticello won the all

round championship, getting 12 points.

The football season of 1907 has been full of surprises. The two that upset the dope bucket, maybe, more than any of the others, were the defeat of M. T. H. S. by Shortridge, and the victory of Anderson over Muncie. In Northern Indiana, Hammond High School is probably the undisputed champion. In Northern Central Indiana there are many good teams. Sheridan and Warsaw have many good claims for being the best. Anderson High School played many games in which they lost by one lone touchdown. In Western Indiana Brazil has the best team, although Crawfordsville played them a close game. Linton High School is undoubtedly champion of Southwestern Indiana. In

the far Southern part of the State, New Albany is undoubtedly champion. In Southeasetrn Indiana there seeds to have been no team that would class with those in other sections of the State. Shortridge High School won the championship of Marion county by defeating M. T. H. S. 10 to 4.

As it would be impossible for a schedule to be arranged and played yet this year between the champions of the different sect ons of the State, it would not be fair to call any one team the champion of the State

Although a championship team cannot be picked it is possible to choose an all high school team which would probably be able to defeat any other eleven high school players in the State should they be brought together and coached. Of course, I acknowledge that in picking this team I may have missed some of the very best players in the State. Nevertheless, I think I have chosen eleven representative high school players.

Fourth Annual Track and Field Meet Announcement

The Fourth Annual Track and Field Meet of the Indiana High School Athletic Association will be held on the Athletic Field of Earlham College, May 18, 1907, in the afternoon. Entries for the Meet will close May 8, and all sc ools desiring to participate in the Meet must become members of the Association before that date.

Eligibility.

Every contestant in this Meet must have previously made in a fair test a record equal to the following in every event in which he is entered:

100 Yard Dash11 s
220 Yard Dash
440 Yard Dash
Half Mile Run
Mile Run 5 m. 15 s
120 Yard High Hurdle
220 Yard Low Hurdle
Running High Jump 5 ft.
Runring Broad Jump
Pole Vault8 ft. 9 in.
Putting Shot (12 lb.)
Throwing Hammer (12 lb.)
Throwing Discus90 ft.

The above, together with a mile relay, will constitute the events of the Meet. Winning first place in any event counts five points; second place, three points; and third place, one point. Points in the relay will not be counted in determining the winning team.

Entries.

The entries in each event are limited to three, and the contestants in each two, from any school; except in the relay race, where entries will be limited to six and the number placed in competition to four, each running one-fourth mile.

All schools, in order to enter the contests of the State Meet, will be required to certify that all athletic contests in which they have taken part since becoming members of the Association have been conducted in accordance with the rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association and that all their contestants in such contests have been qualified according to the rules.

Principals will be required to certify in writing that the contestants from their respective schools have all qualified in every event for which they are entered in the State Meet. Each principal must fill out entry blanks with the names of the contestants from his school and all the required data, and send to J. T. Giles, Secretary, Marion, Indiana, on or before May 8, 1907. This requirement must be strictly complied with. Special blanks for this purpose will be furnished to all members of the Association.

Protests.

All protests and complaints against members of the Association for violation of the rules must be made in writing and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before May 8. Protests as to the eligibility of individual contestants under the constitution are to be decided by the Board of Control and may be filed with the Secretary at any time.

Management.

The management of this Meet rests solely with the Board of Control. The selection of officials to be approved by the Board, has been delegated to the athletic management of Earlham College. The referee and starter are to be chosen from the A. A. U., in order that records made at the Meet may be recognized by that body. The Board will arrange a program, assigning place on the track by lot, and the printed program will indicate the order in which men will be called upon the track. The rules governing the Meet correspond to those of the Western Inter-Collegiate Amateur Athletic Association except where these have been modified by the Board of Control. These rules, as adopted by the Board, are printed in the I. H. S. A. A. Hand Book of Athletics and Annual Report of the Board of Control. Copies may be had of the Permanent Secretary for 10 cents each, post paid.

Prizes.

No prizes will be awarded except a cup to the winning team, a pennant to the winning relay team, and badges for point winners. Admission to all high school pupils, 25 cents. Contestants and one rubber from each school admitted free.

Entertainment.

Earlham College will furnish free board and rooms to all contestants during the Meet.

Fees.

Previous to the Crawfordsville Meet no entry fee was charged and as a result many were entered who did not take part in the Meet and who had little expectation of doing so when they entered. This worked an injustice on the town entertaining the Meet since it gave no basis for estimating the number to be entertained and many received entertainment who were not entitled to it. For this reason a fee of twenty-five cents will hereafter be required from each individual entered; this fee to be returned when the individual appears on the field.

A low railroad rate, probably a single fare, is assured.

Further information regarding rates and entertainment will be sent to entering schools previous to the Meet.

Report of Meet

The Richmond Palladium of May 19, has the following report of the Meet:

Athletes from Manual Training High School at Indianapolis, took nicely to the mud and rain on Reid Field, Earlham, Saturday afternoon and cleaned up the platter in the fourth annual field and track meet of the Indiana High School Athletic Association. When the Manualites left for the capital city last night they not only carried the silver trophy, but the relay banner as well. The only other school that can derive much satisfaction out of the meet is Monticello, which had a good chance of winning until near the close. Richmond High School's athletes did nothing more than reflect discredit on themselves. Aside from Marine and Chapman, the Quaker lads sat in the grand-stand busying themselves with excuses of why they did not enter.

Three Records Broken.

Despite the unsatisfactory weather, three State High School records were broken. In the broad jump Conrad, of Darlington, set a mark that is likely to stand for a time. He jumped 21 feet, 4 1-5 inches, which is nearly a foot better than the former record. Kern, of Salem, put the shot over two feet further, than it had ever been done before, his mark being 43 feet, 11 2-5 inches. The time of Manual Training's relay team, 3:47 3-5, clipped just two-fifths of a second off the record in that event.

The very heavy track prevented good time being made in the running events. It is surprising that the relay record was lowered and, when the bad track is taken into consideration, the feat becomes quite a remarkable one.

Credit Due Earlham.

Great credit is due Earlham College for the manner in which the meet was conducted. Never was an event of the kind handled so well at the college. Full preparations had been made for it and had it not have been for the heavy rain, some records would no doubt have been smashed as the track early yesterday morning was unusually fast. The meet was free from dirty work and the decisions of Referee Herbert, who is an expert in his line, were impartial. The weather considered, the crowd was large.

The Indianapolis Star reported as follows:
On a heavy track the thin-clad athletes from twenty high schools

struggled to win the championship of the fourth annual track and field meet of the Indiana High School Athletic Association. Manual Training High School won. Three records were broken. Kern of Salem broke the shot-put; Conrad of Darlington broke the broad jump, while the relay team that represented M. T. H. S. lowered the mark by two-fifths of a second in that event.

The mile run was the hardest fought race of the afternoon. Wright of M. T. H. S. took the pace, and held it until the runners reached the back stretch in the fourth lap, when Rinier of Monticello drew up even with him. Allen of Fairmount was close behind. The three came into the finish stretch neck and neck. Then Wright showed his sprinting ability, and won over Allen by two yards.

The 440-yard run developed into a dual race between Deming of M. T. H. S. and Hendrickson of Shortridge. The former took the lead and although hard pressed won the race. The surprise came in the shot put, when Kern of Salem beat Stockton of Monticello, who was picked to win. Kern broke the former record held by Lawrence of Michigan City.

Summers of Hammond won the half mile run easily. The real contest in the race was between Wright of M. T. H. S. and Richard Bosson of Shortridge. The red and white boy got second by inches by a dive for the tape finish. Kissel of M. T. H. S. won the 220-yard dash in a close race. Rawlins of Monticello was the star in the hurdle races, although Pickett of M. T. H. S. ran him a close race in the 220 low hurdle race. Martin of Salem, winner of third place in the high hurdle race, was protested because of failure to make proper entry before the meet. Carp Stockton of Monticello won the all-round championship, getting 12 points.

Interscholastic Contests Abolished by Indianapolis High Schools

Full Text of the Report of the Committee Adopted by the School Board

To the Honorable Board of School Commissioners:

Your committee to whom was referred the question of athletics between the two high schools and also between our high schools and those outside of the city, respectfully begs to present the following report:

It seems to us that no one would question the value of well-regulated physical training, and it also seems that no thoughtful person would fail to see the evils inherent in the prevailing type of school athletics.

The defects of the present system may be roughly classified under three heads:

- (a) From the pedagogical point of view.
- (b) From the physical side.
- (c) From the ethical standpoint.

Under (a) may be presented:

- 1. The value of athletics as at present in vogue is disproportioned to the cost in time of players and of teachers who supervise them.
 - 2. The burden of managing the finances of the game is too great.
- 3. There is too much tension developed among pupils in general before a decisive game, which results in inefficiency in studies.

Under (b) the physical side, may be included:

- 1. Too few of the boys are actively engaged in athletics. General interest is centered in developing a team which will win.
- 2. Those boys who do take an active part in athletics are the ones who least need physical culture.
- 3. At present there is danger of serious injury to players, particularly in football, through the efforts of a rival team to cripple a good player in order to weaken his team that they may win.
- 4. High school boys will not train properly and are frequently injured permanently by overstrain.
- 5. When trained at his best the boy of high school age is too immature physically for some of the games as played at present.

Under (c)-From the ethical standpoint:

1. Athletics should develop games not contests.

2. At present, our teams compete with other teams over whose physical and ethical status we have no control.

3. Games as now played tend to create bad feeling between schools. Sport for sport's sake is replaced by the spirit of contest, and where large numbers are concerned the mob spirit may arise.

4. There is at present a tendency to estimate the quality of a school by athletic contests won.

5. The character of a portion of the following of athletic contests is of so low a type that it tends to demoralize the game. While this sort of following is small in numbers its influence is unduly great and is practically outside the control of school authorities.

6. The public generally looks upon a winning team as a successful team; hence, the coach is tempted to introduce questionable practices to develop a team which will win at any cost.

7. The hero worship accorded the prominent athlete by pupils, press and public tends to give him an altogether false notion of his own real importance.

8. The earnings of the games constitute a temptation toward commercialism in sport.

In view of these facts, your committee therefore recommends that after December 1 of the present year no more competitive games be played under the auspices of the schools between pupils of the two high schools.

Your committee also considers it inadvisable that games be played between pupils of our high schools with pupils of high schools outside of the city.

The committee believes that it is advisable that pupils take part in the State athletic meet.

While your committee is opposed to contests between different schools, it is just as strongly in favor of all well-regulated classes of teams within each individual school. Boys in a large city need special outlet for their surplus physical energy; this fact school authorities should recognize. There is nowadays very little home labor. If neither the home nor the school provides physical recreation, boys are likely to find in the streets the physical activity denied them at home or in school. This inevitably leads to questionable practices and uncertain morals.

Athletics within each school should be encouraged. The situation really demands, when we can afford it, that there should be a man in each high school whose whole time should be devoted to the physical welfare of the boys of the school. He should be something more

than a teacher of gymnastics; he should be in sympathy with boys and be able to bring out the best in them; he should supervise their gymnastic training and conduct their sports on the athletic field.

Experience has shown that games within a school will increase active participation from 500 per cent. to 1,000 per cent. By proper classification, on the basis of age, size and experience, every boy can be brought into active participation in healthy games in which the spirit is one of emulation instead of strife.

In the meantime each school should endeavor to meet the situation by its teachers giving such time out of school as they are able to spare for such purposes.

The public generally must come to a realization of the fact that the city conditions have brought upon us new problems peculiar to those conditions which demand effective physical training not only of a few but of all pupils.

Constitution of the Indiana High School Athletic Association

Revised December 27, 1906

Administration

Sec. 1. A Board of Control, composed of three members (principals, vice-principals or superintendents), shall be elected by the Association December 29, 1903, as follows: One for one year, one for two years, and one for three years; the chairman each year to be the one whose term expires at the end of that year. Thereafter each member of the Board shall be elected for three years. This election is to take place at the annual meeting of the Indiana State Teachers' Association. In case of vacancy, the remaining members of the Board may appoint a person to fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting of the Association.

Sec. 2. The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties: (a) It shall have general control over all athletic contests between secondary schools in this Association; (b) It shall have excusive control of the annual Interscholastic Meet; (c) It shall give interpretations of the rules of the Association; (d) It shall determine forfeitures under Section 11; (e) The Board of Control at the end of any athletic season may, at its discretion, issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standing of the teams. No school which has violated the rules of the Association in regard to the qualifications of players shall be awarded special honors in that particular branch of athletics.

Sec. 3. (a) When charges are made in writing by a member of the Association against another member for violation of the rules of the Association, the Board of Control after giving due notice of place and time for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges, and may suspend the offending school for a period not exceeding one year. (b) The Board of Control shall decide on all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants in the Interscholastic Meet. (c) When any matter comes before the Board for

decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.

Sec. 4. Membership in this Association shall be limited to public high schools of the State, and each school shall have one vote. The annual dues shall be \$2.00, payable when the school becomes a member, and thereafter by December 1 of each year in advance.

Sec. 5. The principal of the school or high school teachers authorized by him shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.

Sec. 6. No games shall be played without the sanction of the principal.

Sec. 7. No game shall be played with public high schools of this State not belonging to this Association.

Sec. 8. Non-playing student officials or assistants shall conform to the same rules as the players.

Sec. 9. The principal or his authorized representative shall accompany his team to all contests.

Sec. 10. In football contests held under these rules, the length of each half shall be twenty-five minutes, unless changed by mutual consent.

Sec. 11. It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, pr vide a forfeiture of \$10, to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeiture be stipulated and not be paid during the same season, the Board of Control, after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the Association. Notification of such expulsion shall be published in the papers, with the cause therefor.

Sec. 12. No retiring member of the Board of Control, having served three years, shall be eligible for re-election for a period of one year after date of retirement.

Rules

Rule 1. To represent a school in any interscholastic contest a person must be under twenty-one years of age; must have entered some public high school within the first twenty school days of the term or semester in which the contest occurs, and must be an amateur as defined by the A. A. U. Eighth grade pupils are not eligible.

Rule 2. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current term or semester a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen regular high school recitations

per week, exclusive of rhetoricals, physical culture, military drill, and deportment; in his last preceding term or semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire term.

Pupils enrolled for the first time must comply with all the requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding term or semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

Back work may be made up, providing that it be done in accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes a matter of final

record before the opening of the next term or semester.

Rule 3. The eligibility of all the contestants shall be certified to by the principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be presented in writing within ten days before any contest. In case of disputes the principal must furnish to the Board of Control the following data in regard to each contestant: The date of last enrollment; the number of years he has been a member of a secondary school athletic team; date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the preceding term or semester; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term or semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be denied championship honors, and may be excluded from the annual Interscholastic Meet.

Rule 4. No person shall take part in athletic contests between secondary schools for more than four years, and no post-graduate pupil shall take part in such contests. Persons graduating from regular three-year courses shall not be deemed post-graduates.

Ru'e 5. No person shall enter a contest under an assumed name. Time spent in athletic sport by pupils while in grades below the high

school shall not be counted as part of the four years.

Rule 6. The principal shall have power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner.

Rule 7. Any member of a high school athletic team, who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that season.

An exception is hereby made for basket ball and basket ball players in those towns and cities whose schools have no gymnasium and whose students are forced by necessity to use a Y. M. C. A. or some other gymnasium for their practice and games. It is a well known fact that the use of such gymnasiums by high school students under such circumstances will likely require that such students play on the team or teams of the organizations maintaining such gymnasiums. No stu-

dent, however, will be permitted to play on any other team than that representing his high school or the teams representing the organization controlling the gymnasium, and no student will be allowed to play in the teams of the latter without the knowledge and consent of his principal.

Rule 8. These rules may be amended by a majority vote of the

members present at the annual meeting.

Interpretation of the Board of Control

1. Inasmuch as questions have arisen concerning practice games with high schools not in the Association, the Board of Control feel warranted in calling attention to Sec. 7, which says that "No game shall be played with public high schools of the State not belonging to the Association."

2. The football season is defined as beginning with the opening of

school and closing with November 30.

3. No student who violates the rules of the Association will be reinstated by the Board.

4. When a member or members of any team are protested, the game should be played as schedule and the protest filed with the Board for settlement later.

5. By mutual agreement of both teams, pupils over the age limit may be allowed to enter the contests played under I. H. S. A. A. rules.

6. Pupils under twenty-one at the time of registration in school shall be so regarded until the time of their next registration.

7. Adopted by the annual meeting, December 27, 1905.

Rule 2 shall be interpreted as follows:

(a) The contestant must have an average equal to a passing grade in the amount of work specified for the school months of the current term or semester up to the month in which the contest occurs; (b) during the current school month he must be maintaining said passing grade up to the date of certification by the principal; (c) If his average monthly grade in any study at the beginning of the current month is below passing, the contestant is ineligible so far as that study is concerned during the entire current month.

8. Rule 7 shall apply only to games and contests where an admission fee is charged.

9. A student is a post-graduate of a school after he has completed the work required for graduation by that school irrespective of the time of granting the diploma.

Notes

1. Four year books have been issued by the Board of Control. Copies of any of these handbooks may be had of the Permanent Secretary. Price ten cents each, post paid.

2. Copies of the Constitution may be had of the Permanent Secre-

tary at the rate of fifty cents per hundred, postpaid.

3. Printed blanks for reporting the data of all games will be sent by the Permanent Secretary on application. Reports on basketball, baseball and track athletics should be in the hands of the Secretary by June 1; football reports are due December 1.

4. The annual dues for 1908 are payable to the Permanent Secre-

tary on or before December 1, 1907.

5. Any high school in Indiana may become a member of the Association by the payment of two dollars to the Permanent Secretary. (See Sec. 4.)

Athletic Rules of Indiana High School Athletic Association

Based on Rules of Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association

RULE I.

Officials.

Sec. 1. All meetings must be under the direction of

The Board of Control.

One referee.

Two or more inspectors.

Three or more field judges.

Three judges at finish.

Three or more timekeepers.

One starter.

One clerk of the course.

One scorer.

One marshal.

Sec. 2. If deemed necessary, assistants may be provided for the clerk of the course, the scorer, and the marshal, and an official announcer may be appointed.

RULE II.

The Board of Control.

Shall have jurisdiction of all matters not assigned by these rules to the referee or other game officials.

RULE III.

The Referee.

Must decide all questions relating to the actual conduct of the Meet, whose final settlement is not otherwise covered by these rules; have the power to add to or alter the announced arrangements of heats in any event. A referee has no authority, after heats have been drawn and published in a program, to transfer a contestant from one heat to another.

When in any but the final heat of a race a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to culpable carelessness and shall also have the power to allow the hindered competitor to start in the next round of heats, just as if he had been placed in his trial.

When in a final heat a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to his carelessness or conduct, and he shall also have the power to order a new race between such of the competitors as he thinks entitled to such a privilege.

If, during an athletic contest under the rules of the I. H. S. A. A., a competitor shall conduct himself in a manner unbecoming a gentleman or offensive to the officials, spectators, or competitors, the referee shall have the power to disqualify him from further competition at the Meet; and, if he thinks the offense worthy of additional punishment, must promptly make a detailed statement of the facts to the Board of Control.

Power to change the order of events as laid down in the official program is reserved to the Board of Control, which shall, through its chairman, exercise this authority, unless it sees fit to expressly delegate this power to the referee.

The referee shall not have authority to disqualify any competitor for violation of the eligibility rule of the I. H. S. A. A. All protests as to eligibility made on the field must be referred to the Board of Control, and the protested competitor must be allowed to compete until disqualified by the arbitrator of the I. H. S. A. A.

RULE IV.

The Inspectors.

It shall be the duty of an inspector to stand at such point as the referee may designate, to watch the competition closely, and, in case of a claim of foul, to report to the referee what he saw of the incident. Such inspectors are merely assistants to the referee, to whom they must report, and have no power to make any decision.

RULE V.

The Judges at the Finish.

Must determine the order of finishing of contestants and must arrange among themselves as to noting the winner, second, third, fourth, etc. as the case may require, and there must always be two judges whose duty it must be to choose the winner.

Their decision in this respect must be without appeal, and, in case of a disagreement, a majority must govern.

RULE VI.

The Field Judges.

Must make an accurate measurement and keep a tally of all trials of competitors in the high and broad jumps, the pole vaults and the weight competitions.

They must act as judges in these events, and their decisions must likewise be without appeal. In cases of disagreement, a majority must govern. There must be at least three judges for every event.

RULE VII.

The Timekeepers.

Must be three in number and must individually time all events where time record is called for. At the conclusion of each heat, each time-keeper must present his watch to the referee for inspection, and he must decide the official time. Should two or three watches mark the same time and the third disagree, the time marked by said two watches must be accepted. Should all three disagree, the time marked by the intermediate watch must be accepted.

The flash of the pistol must denote the actual time of starting.

If, for any reason, only two watches are held on an event, and they fail to agree, the longer time of the two must be accepted.

Note-For record, however, three watches must be held on an event.

RULE VIII.

The Starter.

Must have sole jurisdiction over the competitor after the clerk of the course has properly placed them in their positions for the start. The method of starting must be by pistol report, except that in time handicap races the word "go" must be used.

An actual start is not effected until the pistol has been purposely discharged after the competitors have been warned to get ready.

In case the pistol was not purposely discharged, the competitors shall be called back by the starter by pistol fire. (*Note*—The starter must have at least two good cartridges in his pistol before starting a heat.)

When any part of the person of a competitor touches the ground in front of his mark before the signal is given, it must be considered a false start.

Penalties for false starting must be inflicted by the starter, as follows: In all races to and including 125 yards, the competitor must be put back one yard for the first and another yard for the second attempt; in races over 215 yards and including 300 yards, two yards for the first and two more for the second attempt; in races over 300 yards and including 600 yards, three yards for the first and three more for the second attempt; in races over 600 yards and including 1,000 yards, four yards for the first and four more for the second attempt; in races over 1,000 yards and including one mile, five yards for the first and five more for the second attempt; in all races over one mile, ten yards for the first and ten more for the second attempt.

In all cases, the third false start must prevent his competing in that

event.

The starter must rule out of that event any competitor who attempts to advance himself from his mark, as prescribed in the official program, after he has given the warning to "get ready."

RULE IX.

The Clerk of the Course.

Must be provided with the names and the numbers of all entered competitors, and he must notify them to appear at the starting line before the start in each event in which they are entered.

RULE X.

The Scorer.

Must record the order in which each competitor finishes his event together with the time furnished by the referee.

He must keep a tally of the laps made by each competitor in races covering more than one lap, and must announce, by means of a bell or otherwise, when the leading man enters the last lap.

He must draw up a list of the actual competitors in each event, which shall be filed with the papers of the Association and shall be the official record of competing entrants, and shall be final evidence in the enforcement of Rule III, of the rules of eligibility.

He must control his assistants and assign to them such of his duties

as he may deem proper.

RULE XI.

The Marshal.

Must have full police charge of the enclosure and must prevent any but officials and actual competitors from entering or remaining therein He must control his assistants and assign to them their duties.

RULE XII.

The Official Announcer.

Must receive from the scorer and field judges the result of each event, and announce the same by voice or by means of a bulletin board.

RULE XIII.

Competitors.

Must report to the clerk of the course immediately upon their arrival at the place of meeting, and must be provided by that official with their proper numbers, which must be worn conspicuously by the competitors when competing, and without which they must not be allowed to start.

Each competitor must inform himself of the time of starting, and must be promptly at the starting point of each competition in which he is entered, and there report to the clerk of the course.

Under no conditions shall attendants be allowed to accompany competitors at the start or during any competition.

RULE XIV.

Track Measurement.

All distances run or walked must be measured upon a line eighteen inches outward from the inner edge of the track, except that in races on straightaway tracks the distance must be measured in a direct line from the starting mark to the finishing line.

RULE XV.

The Course.

Each competitor must keep in his respective position from start to finish in all races on straightaway tracks, and in all races on tracks with one or more turns he must not cross to the inner edge of the track, except when he is at least six feet in advance of his nearest competitor. After turning the last corner into the straight in any race, each competitor must run a straight course to the finish line, and must not cross to either the outside or inside from such straight course.

In all races of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have a separate course marked out and measured, whether races are run straightaway or with turns.

The referee must disqualify from that event any competitor who willfully pushes against, impedes, crosses the course of, or in any way interferes with another competitor.

The referee must disqualify from further participation in the Meet

any contestant competing to lose, to coach, or to in any way impede the chances of another competitor, either in a trial or final contest.

RULE XVI. The Finish

of the course must be represented by a line between two finishing posts, drawn across and at right angles to the sides of the track, and three feet above which line must be placed a tape attached at either end to the finishing posts. A finish must be counted when any part of the winner's body, except his hands or arms, touches the tape at the finish line. The tape must be considered the finishing line for the winner, but their order of finishing across the track line must determine the positions of the other competitors.

RULE XVII.

Hurdles.

In the 120 yards hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle to be three feet six inches high. They must be placed ten yards apart, with the first hurdle fifteen yards distant from the starting point, and the last hurdle fifteen yards before the finishing line.

In the 220 yards hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle to be two feet six inches high. They must be placed twenty yards apart, with the first hurdle twenty yards distant from the starting mark, and the last hurdle twenty yards before the finishing line.

In making a record, it must be necessary for the competitor to jump every hurdle in its proper position.

In all hurdle races of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have a separate course and hurdles marked out and measured, whether races are run straightaway or with turns.

RULE XVIII.

Jumping.

Sec. 1. A fair jump must be one that is made without the assistance of weights, diving, somersaults, or handsprings of any kind. In scratch events competitors must jump in order as placed on the program.

Sec. 2. The running high jump. The field judges must decide the height at which the jump shall commence and must regulate the succeeding elevations.

Each competitor must be allowed three trial jumps at each height, and if on the third trial he shall fail, he must be declared out of the competition.

Competitors must jump in order, as provided in Sec. 1; then, those

failing, if any, must have their second trial jump in a like order, after which those having failed twice must make their third trial jump.

The jump must be made over a bar resting on pins projecting not more than three inches from the uprights, and when this bar is removed from its place by the competitor when trying, it must be counted as a trial jump.

Running under the bar in making an attempt to jump must be counted as a "balk," and three successive "balks" must be counted as a trial jump.

The distance of the run before the jump must be unlimited. A competitor may decline to jump at any height in his turn, and by so doing forfeits his rights to again jump at the height declined.

Sec. 4. The running broad jump. When jumped on earth, joist five inches wide must be sunk flush with it. The outer edge of this joist must be called the scratch line, and the measurement of all jumps must be made from it, at right angles, to the nearest break in the ground made by any part of the person of the competitor.

In front of the scratch line the ground must be removed to the depth of three and the width of twelve inches outward.

A foul jump must be one where the competitor, in jumping off the scratch line, makes a mark on the ground immediately in front of it, or runs over the line without jumping, and must count as a trial jump without results

Each competitor must have three trial jumps, and the best three must each have three more trial jumps.

The competition must be decided by the best of all the trial jumps of the competitors.

The distance of the run before the scratch line must be unlimited. Sec. 5. The pole vault. Pole must be furnished by the managing committee, but contestants may use their own private poles if they so desire, and no contestant shall be allowed to use any of these private poles, except by the consent of their owners. The poles must be unlimited as to size and weight, but must have no assisting devices, except that they may be wrapped or covered with any substance (to obtain a firmer grasp), and must have but one prong at the end.

No competitor shall, during his vault, raise the hand which was uppermost when he left the ground to a higher point of the pole, nor shall he raise the hand which was undermost when he left the ground to any point on the pole above the other hand.

The rules governing the running high jump must also govern the pole vault for height, except that when the man leaves the ground in an attempt, it shall be counted a trial.

RULE XIX.

Putting the Shot.

The shot must be a solid sphere, made of metal and must weigh 12 pounds.

It must be put with one hand, and in making the attempt, it must be above, and not behind, the shoulder.

The competitor must stand in a circle seven feet in diameter. The circumference of the circle must be divided into two halves by a line drawn through it. On four feet of the front half of the circumference a board four inches high must be placed, the edge of which must be equally distant from the intersection of the line with the circumference and at which the competitor must stand when the shot leaves his hand.

A fair put shall be one where no part of the person of the competitor touches in front of the circle, or on the board, in making the attempt.

A put must be counted as foul if the competitor steps over the front half of the circle or on the board. A competitor must leave the circle by the rear half. Leaving by the front half must be declared a foul.

The measurement of all puts must be made from the nearest mark by the shot to a point on the circumference of the circle, on a line with the object mark and the center of the circle..

Foul puts and letting go the shot in making an attempt must be counted as trial puts without result.

A board similar to the one in front may be used at the back of the circle.

The order of competing and number of trials shall be the same as for the running broad jump. Shots must be furnished by the managing committee. Any contestant may use his private shot, if correct in weight and shape; in which case the other contestants must also be allowed to use it, if they wish.

RULE XX.

Throwing the Hammer.

The head and handle may be of any size, shape, and material, provided that the length of the complete implement must not be more than four feet and its weight not less than 12 pounds.

All throws shall be made from a circle seven feet in diameter, and this circle shall be considered as divided into halves by a line drawn through its center at right angles to the direction of the throw.

A fair throw must be one where no part of the person of the competitor shall touch outside or on the circle in making the attempt.

Foul throws and letting go of the hammer in an attempt must count as trial throws.

The measurement of all throws must be made from the nearest mark made by the head of the hammer to a point on the circumference of the circle, on a line with the object mark and the center of the circle.

The order of competing and number of trials must be the same as for the running broad jump. Hammers must be furnished by the managing committee. Any contestant may use his private hammer, if correct in weight and length, and no contestant shall be allowed to use these private hammers except by consent of the owner.

RULE XXI.

Throwing the Discus.

The discus shall be made of smooth, hardwood body, without finger holes, weighted in center with lead discs and capped with polished brass discs, with steel ring on the outside. The weight of the discus shall be four and one-half $(4\frac{1}{2})$ pounds; outside diameter, eight (8) inches; thickness in center, two (2) inches.

All throws shall be made from a seven (7) foot circle, with four foot lapboards and similar in all respects to the circle for putting the shot. In making his throws, a competitor may assume any position he chooses. Foul throws and letting go of the discus in attempts shall count as trials without result. A fair throw shall be one in which no part of the person of the competitor touches the ground outside the front half of the circle, and the competitor leaves the circle by its rear half. A throw shall be foul if any part of the person touches the ground outside the front half of the circle before the throw is measured.

The order of competing and number of trials shall be the same as for the running broad jump.

A discus shall be furnished by the managing committee. Any contestant may use his private discus, if correct in weight and shape; in which case the other contestants must also be allowed to use it, if they wish.

The measurement of each throw shall be made from the nearest mark made by the fall of the discus to the circumference of the circle, on a line from a mark made by the discus to the center of the circle.

TIES.

In case of a tie in a scratch contest at high jumping, the tieing competitors shall have three additional trials at the height last tried, and if still undecided, the bar shall be lowered to the height next below, and three trials taken at that height. If no one clears it, the

bar shall be lowered again and again until one of the competitors clears it. In case of a second tie, the award shall be given to the competitor who cleared the bar with the least number of trials.

In case of a tie in the pole vault the officials shall raise or lower the bar at their discretion, and those competitors who have tied shall be allowed one trial at each height.

In case of a tie in a scratch contest at any game decided by distance each of the tieing competitors shall have three additional trials, and the award shall be made in accordance with the distances cleared in these additional trials. In case of a second tie three more trials shall be allowed, and so on, until a decision is reached. In case of a dead heat in any track events, the competitors shall not be allowed to divide the prize or points, or to toss for them, but must compete again at a time and place appointed by the referee.

Minutes of Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Indiana High School Athletic Association was held in Caleb Mills Hall, Shortridge High School, Thursday noon, December 27, 1906. Reports were read by the secretary, treasurer, by the Committee on Football Rules, Committee on Relations between Colleges and High Schools as to the eligibility requirements. All these reports are given in full in the Annual of 1906. In addition to this report the secretary reported the decisions of the Board in the case of Noblesville vs. Tipton, final action on which was taken December 26, too late for insertion in the Proceedings in the Annual of 1906. At the request of the treasurer an auditing committee was appointed by the chair. Principal E. P. Wiles, of Muncie, and Principal J. G. Collicott, of Evansville, composed this committee.

New Business. Several amendments were proposed, as follows: Principal McCaughan, of Kokomo, moved that clause 1 of the Constitution which reads "principals, vice-principals, superintendents," be changed to read "principals, heads of departments, superintendents." Motion was seconded by Principal Organ of Vincennes. It was moved by Principal Wiles, of Muncie, and seconded by Mr. McComb of the Manual Training High School to amend by substituting for "heads of departments" the clause "members of the faculty," so that the clause should read "principals, members of the faculty and superintendents." The motion, as amended, was carried.

Superintendent Coffman moved to substitute for the last clause of Rule 7, as amended December 27, 1905, the following: "An exception is hereby made for basketball and basketball players in those towns and cities whose schools have no gymnasium and whose students are forced by recessity to use a Y. M. C. A. or some other gymnasium for their practice and games. It is a well known fact that the use of such gymnasiums by high school students under such circumstances will likely require that such students play on the team or teams of the organizations maintaining such gymnasiums. No student, however, will be permitted to play on any other team than that representing his high school or the teams representing the organization controlling the gymnasium, and no student will be allowed to play in the teams

of the latter without the knowledge and consent of his principal." The resolution was adopted.

A resolution that the Constitution be amended by addition of the following Section XIII to the Articles of Administration, was adopted.

Section XIII. At the annual meeting of 1906, a permanent secretary shall be elected, who shall have charge of the property and records of the Association; shall receive all money for dues and the sale of publications of the Association; shall issue all circulars authorized by the Board of Control; shall attend meetings of the Board when requested to do so by the Board; shall turn over to the treasurer of the Board all moneys in his possession when called upon to do so; shall perform such other duties as the growth and needs of the Association as determined by the Board may require; and shall receive as compensation the sum of \$25 annually, and such allowance for expenses as the Board may approve. Vacancies in the office may be declared by the Board for cause, and a successor appointed by the Board to act until the next annual meeting.

By the provision of Section XIII the meeting proceeded to the election of a permanent secretary. Principal J. T. Giles, of Marion, retiring member of the Board of Control, was unanimously elected

to the position.

Election of Board of Control. C. W. Knouff, of Wabash and Principal W. A. Hill, of Hammond, were put in nomination. Thirty-seven schools voted. Principal Knouff received 27 votes; Hill 10 votes. Knouff was declared elected member of the Board for three years beginning December 27, 1906.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

Tipton Suspended Until Dec. 1, 1907

The Board of Control met in Marion, Indiana, Saturday, March 9, at 2 p. m., for the rehearing of the Noblesville-Tipton controversy. All the members of the Board were present and Noblesville was represented by Principal Burton. Tipton was not represented. After a full discussion of the case the Board of Control unanimously adopted the following:

"On the basis of affidavits in rebuttal, filed by Principal Burton, of equal worth to those filed by Principal Highley through his attorney, C. N. Mount, on December 26, 1906, against Noblesville and upon which Principal Burton was censured, it is hereby declared the sense of the Board that these points of censure are hereby withdrawn.

"On the basis of additional charges filed by Principal Burton of Noblesville alleging that the Tipton High School played other ineligible men besides Homer Kirtley, in their football games with Noblesville last season, supported by the written evidence of former Principal Hostetler and the oral statement of former Superintendent Conner of the Tipton Schools stating that other players were ineligible, after Principal Highley had been duly notified to appear before the Board on March 9, 1907, to answer this charge and on his refusal either to appear and refute the charge or furnish the information called for in Rule 3 of the Constitution—in accordance with Sec. 3 (a) of the Constitution the Board of Control unanimously votes to suspend the Tipton High School from the Association until December 1, 1907."


