# Indiana High School Athletic Association Constitution 

Revised Jecember 28, 1908.

## ADMINISTRATION.

Sec. 1. A Board of Control, composed of three members (principals. members of the faculty, or superintendents), shall be elected by the Associaizon Dec. 29, 1903, as follows: One for one year, one for two years and one tor three years; the chairman each year to be the one whose term expires at the end of that year. Thereafter each member of the Board shall be elected for three years. This election is to take place at the annual meeting of the Indiana State Teachers' Association. In case of vacancy, the remaining members of the Board may appoint a person to fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting of the Association.
-Sec. 2. The Bcard of Control shall have the following powers and duties. (a) It shall have general control over ail athletic contests between secondary schools in this Association; (b) It shall have exclusive coutrol of the annual Interschclastic Meet; (c) It shall give intergretations of the rules of the Association; (d) It shall determine forfeitures linder Sec. 11; (e) The Board of Control at the end of any athletic season may, at its discretion, issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standing of the teams. No schooi which has violated the rules of the Association in regard to the qualifications of players shail be awarded special honors in that particular branch of athletics.

Sec. 8. (a) When charges are made in writing by a member of the Association against another member for violation of the rules of the Association, the Board of Control after giving due notice of place and time for the school so charged to be heard, shail consider such charges, and may suspend the offending school for a period of not exceeding one year. (b) The Board of Control shall decide on all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants in the Interscholastic Meet. (c) When any matter comes before the Board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.

Sec. 4. Membership in this Association shall be limited to public high schools of the State, and each school shall have one vote. The annual dues shall be $\$ 2.00$, payable when the school becomes a member, and thereafter by December 1 of each year in advance.

Acadamies with commissioned high school standing shall be eligible to membership in the Association and wherever the word "high school" appears in this constitution, it shall be understood to apply equally to these acadamies.

Sec. 5. The principal of the school, or high school teachers
authorized by him, shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.

Sec. 6. No games shall be played without the sanction of the principal.

Sec. 7. No game shall be played with public high schools of this State not belonging to this Association.

This rule does not prevent a member of the Association from playing high school teams outside the state nor from playing non-high school teams within the state except as follows:

It is a violation of the constitution for schools in the Association to play non-high schocl teams including high school boys, unless the latter are certified as eligible by the principal of the school to which they belong.

Sec. 8. Non-playing student officials or assistants shall conform to the same rules as the players.

Sec. 9. The principal or his authorized representative shall accompany his team to all contests.

Sec. 10. In football contests held under these rules, the length of each half shall be twenty-five minutes, unless changed by mutual consent.

Sec. 11. It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, provide a forfeit of $\$ 10$, to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeitures be stipulated and not be paid during the same season, the Board of Control, after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the Association. Notification of such expulsion shall be published in the papers, with the cause therefor.

Sec. 12. No retiring member of the Board of Control, having served three years, shall be eligible for re-election for a poriod of one year after date of retirement.

Sec. 13. Each school in the Association shall report to the Permanent Secretary a list of the pupils representing that school in athletic contests during the year. Each school is asked to report also the kind of treatment accorded them to, from and on the field, while the guest of another school.

## RULES

Rule 1. To represent a school in any interscholastic contest a person must be under twenty-one years of age; must have entered some public high school within the first twenty school days of the semester in which the contest occurs, and must be an amateur as defined by the A. A. U. Eighth grade pupils are not eligible. A semester is one-half of a school year.

Rule 2. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current semester a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen regular high school recitations per week, exclusive of rhetoricals, physical culture, military drill, and deportment; in inis last preceding semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire term.

Pupils enrolled for the first time must comply with all the requirements of the ruies, the average standing required for the preceding semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

Back work may be made up, providing that it be done in
accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes $\&$ matter of final record before the opening of the next semester.

Interpretation. In each of the studies representing the minimum requirement of work specified above: (a) for the current semester, the average of the monthly grades up to the time of certification must be passing. (b) for the current school month, the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing: (d) if the average of the monthly grades at the beginning of any month is below passing in any study, the pupil is inelegible so far as that study is concerned for the entire month.

Rule 3. The eligibility of all the contestants shall be certified to by the principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby udopted. Such statements shall be presented in writing within ten days before any contest. In case of disputes the principal must furnish to the Board of Control the following diata in regard to each contestant: The date of last enrollment; the number of years he has beed a member of a secondary school athletic team; date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the preceding term or semester; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term or semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be denied championship honors, and may be excluded from the annual Interscholastic Meet.

Rule 4. No pupil shall be allowed the opportunity of taking part in high school athletics for more than four school years or eight semesters, nor shall he have the opportunity of taking part in any form of athletics for more than four seasons. Post graduates are not eligible, but pupils graduating from regular three year courses. shall not be deemed post graduates.

Time spent in athletic sport by pupils while in grades below the high school shall not be counted as part of the four years.

Rule 5. No person shall enter a contest under an assumed name.

Rule 6. The principal shall have power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner.

Rule 7. Any member of a high school athletic team, who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that school year.

An exception is hereby made for basketball and basketbali players in those towns and citles whose schools have no symnasium and whose students are forced by necessity to use a $\bar{Y}$. M. C. A. or some other gymnasium for their practice and games. It is a well-known fact that the use of such gymnasiums by high schcol students under such circumstances will likely require that such students play on the team or teams of the organizations maintaining such gymnasiums. No student, however, will be permitted to play on any other team than that representing the organization controlling the gymmasium, and no student will be allowed to play in the teams of the latter without the knowledge and consent of his principal.

Rule 8. The number of interscholastic foot ball games played by any team in one season is limited to six.

Rule 9. Paid coaches, other than those regularly employed as teachers by the trustees of the school are prohibited. By paid coach is meant, any person who receives directly or indirectly, remuneration of any kind, monev, traveling expenses. gifts, etc.. in return for service rendered in instructing or coaching any high school athletic team.

Rule 10. The Basket Ball rules as published in Spaulding's official basket ball rule book, shall be the official rules governing all contests between members of the I. H. S. A. A. However, the rule governing the selection of officials in the above rules shall be void, and unless otherwise agreed by mutual consent, each school shall furnish one official and these officials shall alternate their duties, each acting as referee and each acting as umpire one-half.

## INTERPRETATIONS.

1. A game in any athletic contest where an admission fee is charged or where any collection or contribution is received from the spectators.
2. The football season is defined as beginning with the opening of school and closing with November 30 .
3. No student who violates the rules of the Association will be reinstated by the Board.
4. When a member or members of any team are protested, the game should be played as scheduled and the protest filed with the Board for settlement later.
5. By mutual agreement of both teams, pupils over the age limit may be allowed to enter the contests played under I. H. S. A. A. rules.
6. Pupils under twenty-one at the time of registration in school shall be so regarded until the time of their next registrdtion.
7. A student is post-graduate of a school after he has completed the work required for graduation by that school irrespective of the time of granting the diploma.

## NOTES.

1. Five year-books have been issued by the Board of Control. Copies of any of these handbooks may be had of the Permanent Secretary. Price, ten cents each, post paid.
2. Copies of the Constitution may be had of the Permanent Secretary at the rate of fifty cents per hundred, post paid.
3. Printed blanks for reporting the data of all games will be sent by the Permanent Secretary on application. Reports on basketball, baseball and track athletics should be in the hands of the Secretary by June 1 ; football reports are due December 1 .
4. The annual dies are payable to the Permanent Secretary on or before December 1 of each year.
5. Any high school in Indiana may become a member of the Association by the payment of two dollars to the Permanent Secretary. (Sce Sec. 4).
6. All correspondence and remittances from members of the Association to the Board of Control or to the Permanent Secretary must be endorsed by the Principal or a member of the faculty.
7. The team "amateur" is defined and fully explained on pages 80 and 160 of Spaulding's "Official Athletic Rules of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States, aud on page 80 of Spaulding's "Official Y. M. C. A. Athletic League Hand-
8. At the annual meeting of the Association in Indianapolis, Dec. 28, 1908, Principal E. E. Ramsey, of Bloomington, was elected to succeed himself as a member of the Board of Control for a term of three years. The other two members of the Board are Principal C. W, Knouff, of Richmond, Chairman and Supt L. N. Haines, of Crawfordsville.

## INTRODUCTION

The Board of Control present herewith the Fifth Annual Hand Book of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, marking the close of the fifth year in the history of the organization. This book is designed merely as a reference book for the use of the schools belonging to the Association. Its value depends largely on the care with which the various schools report the records of their games. The - reports of games for the present year are not as complete as the Board could have wished. Otherwise, this Hand Book is very similar to its predecessors.

The condition of the Association at the present time, as shown by the reports of its officers, is very satisfactory. The membership on November 30th was 152 schools, the largest in the history of the Association. The Treasurer has on hand sufficient money to carry on the affairs of the Association without any embarrassing surplus. Comparatively few protests have been filed with the Board during the year and few complaints of unsportsmanlike treatment of visiting teams. It is to be hoped that there will be a good attendance of the membership at the Christmas meeting of the Association for a full discussion of the proposed amendments to the Constitution and a more definite interpretation of some of the rules.
With the hope that this Hand Book will contribute to the advancement of the interests of the Association and will be of service to the individual members it is respectfully presented to the Association.

## High School Athletics During 1908

Early in December, 1903, a small band of representative high school teachers and principals met. in the office of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction at Indianapolis, to make preliminary plans looking toward the organization of a.State High School Athletic Association. Some of these men would gladly have avoided the hard work and responsibility necessarily connected with athletics in the high schools of the State had not there been a demand that something be done to better conditions. Previous to this time there had been no real and effective State-wide organization and control. The Southern Indiana Association and The Eastern Indiana Conference had paved the way, to be sure, but affairs were as yet very chaotic. There were no uniform rules of eligibility and no State Board of Control, and the contests were anything but satisfactory.
Some present at this meeting rather dreaded the task and wondered if it would not be better not to have any athletics in the high schools. This was answered by one member by saying that we would have athletics engaged in by high school boys, even if they had to play independently, and herein lay the objections. We were facing a condition, not a theory. It will suffice to say that preliminary plans for an organization were made and the organization was completed at the Conference of the State Teachers' Association during the Christmas holidays of that year.
For five years, therefore, the Association has been in existence and it has grown in numbers, in enthusiasm and in its effectiveness from year to year. As yet the writer sees no signs of material retrogression. Square-deal methods have in a large measure supplanted the old-time conditions, business methods have prevailed, and the once dreaded "ringer" has almost, if not wholly, disappeared.
The year 1908 has not been a disappointment in any particular so far as can be observed. There has been no disposition to slacken the reins of control and little or no tendency of the boys engaged in sports to break away from the regulations imposed by the State organization. On the contrary, the boys believe in the organization because it insures
them a square deal, and few boys really want anything more than this.
In considering the different kinds of sports engaged in during the year only brief mention may be made in this article. Official records and comment will be found elsewhere in this booklet. However, a few words might be said. In the first place, baseball has not been a very great success, where it has been played, and comparatively few schools maintain teams. Professional or semi-professional baseball completely eclipses the high school games, as a rule, and it is difficult to secure very much interest.

Many basketball teams were organized, and some good ones were developed. The greatest drawback to successful basketball in the high schools in general is the fact that few are equipped with gymnasiums or can secure satisfactory halls for practice and for games. The great diversity in the courts in which the games are played makes it remarkably difficult for any visiting team to do first-class work. This sport has its distinct advantages, however, and there will be little abatement in interest the coming year.

Track and field work was above par during the spring of 1908. A few indoor meets were held before the good spring weather came, though there were comparatively few of these contests. The Annual Meet under the auspices of the State Association is the big attraction, of course, yet there are several other associations more limited in their scope, and governed in their contests strictly by the State Association rules, which make some remarkably good records. Notably among these is the Eastern Indiana High School Athletic Association which has been holding annual contests for several years and which this year broke several State records. The State Meet at Bloomington this year was very successful and is discussed elsewhere in this Hand Book. It seems, however, that it is getting to be too large an affair and there should be more limitations to the number of entries.

The football season, like that in the colleges, has brought forth many surprises and has proven again that the "dope" sheet is not to be relied upon. Since it is impossible to arrange a championship schedule for all the schools it is impossible to pick the best team in the State. So many factors enter into the consideration that anything that might be said here concerning the relative standing of teams or the merit of individual players would be purely a matter of personal opinion.

Indeed, the question of what school had the championship team in any line of athletics other than track work can not well be determined and would not be of large value if it could be. Far more important
is the noticeable fact that during the past year more schoois have developed good teams than ever before, especially in football. Scores of small schoo's throughout the State have turned out teams well able to cope with the teams of the larger schools. This may be accounted for in several ways.
First, there is less public prejudice against athletics than formerly, since they are better controlled, and there is a constant proportionate decrease in danger to the contestants. Second, there is more interest on the part of both public and students themselves, largely because of better conditions. Third, the withdrawal of the Indianapolis schools from interscholastic sports has probably given some impetus to smaller schools to seek championship honors among themselves since the handicap of the large Indianapolis schools has been removed, al hough several smaller schoo's had already taken their measure befoe their withdrawal.


## Fifth Annual Track and Field Meet Announcement

The Fifth Annual Track and Field Meet of the Indiana High School Athletic Association will be held on Jordan Field of Indiana University, May ${ }_{2}^{\prime} 23,1908$, in the afternoon. Entries for the Meet will close May $13^{*}$ and all schools desiring to participate in the Meet must become members of the Association before that time.

## Eligibility.

Every contestant in this Meet must have previously made in $a \cdot$ fair test-a record equal to the following in every event in which he is entered:
100 Yards Dash ..... 11 s.
220 Yards Dash ..... 26 s.
440 Yards Dash ..... 58 s
Half Mile Run ..... 2 m .20 s .
Mile Run ..... 5 m .15 s .
120 Yards High Hurdle ..... 19 s.
220 Yards Low Hurdles. ..... 29 s.
Running High Jump ..... 5 ft .
Running Broad Jump ..... 19 ft .
Pole Vault. ..... 8 ft .9 in.
Putting Shot ( 12 lb .) ..... 36 ft .
Throwing Hammer ( 12 lb .) ..... 110 ft .
Throwing Discus. ..... 90 ft .

The above, together with a mile relay, will constitute the events of the Meet. Winning first place in any event counts five points; second place, three points; and third place, one point. Points in the relay will not be counted in determining the winning team.

## Entries.

The entries in each event are limited to three, and the contestants in each two, from any school; except in the relay race, where entries will bibe limted to six and the number placed in competition to four, each running one-fourth mile.

All schools, in order to enter the contests of the State Meet, will be required to certify that all athletic contests in which they have taken part since becoming members of the Association have been conducted in accordance with the rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association and that all their contestants in such contests have been qualified according to the rules.

Principals will be required to certify in writing that the contestants from their respective schools have all qualified in every event in which they are entered in the State Meet. Each principal must fill out entry blanks with the names of the contestants from his school and all the required data, and send to J. T. Giles, Permanent Secretary, Marion, Indiana, on or before May 13, 1908. This requirement must be strictly complied with. Special blanks for this purpose will be furnished to all members of the Association.

## Protests.

All protests and complaints against members of the Association for violation of the rules must be made in writing and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before May 13. Protests as to the eligibility of individual contestants under the constitution are to be decided by the Board of Control and may be filed with the Secretary at any time.

## Management.

The management of this Meet rests solely with the Board of Control. The selection of officials to be approved by the Board, has been delegated to the athletic management of Indiana University. The referee and starter are to be chosen from the A. A. U., in order that records made at the Meet may be recognized by that body. The Board will arrance a program, assigning place on the track by lot, and the printed program will indicate the order in which the men will be called upon the track. The rules governing the Meet correspond to those of the Western Inter-Collegiate Amateur Athletic Association except where these have been modified by the Board of Control. These rules, as adopted by the Board, are printed in the I. H. S. A. A. Hand Book of Athletics and Annual Report of the Board of Control. Copies may be had of the Permanent Secretary for ten cents each, post paid.

## Prizes.

No* prizes will be awarded except a cup to the winning team, a pennant to the winning relay team, and badges for point winners. Admission to all high school pupils, 25 cents. Contestants and one rubber from each school admitted free.

## Entertainment.

Indiana University will furnish free board and rooms to all contestants during the Meet.

## Fees.

Previous to the Crawfordsville Meet no entry fee was charged and as a result many were entered who did not take part in the Meet and who had little expectation of doing so when they entered. This worked an injustice on the town entertaining the Meet since it gave no basis for estimating the number to be entertained and many received entertainment who were not entitled to it. For this reason a fee of fifty cents will hereafter be required from each individual entered; this fee to be returned when the individual appears on the field.

## Report of Meet

The daily papers of Bloomington and Indianapolis gave the following account of the Meet:

The Bloomington World, May 25th-One of the most satisfactory track and field meets ever pulled off on Jordan Field took place Saturday afternoon. The Fifth Indiana High School Athletic Association Meet will go down on record as one of the best conducted and best in point of records made, meets for several years. Monticello High School boys were too strong for the big Indianapolis schools, and the White County lads made 30 points to Shortridge's 24. Stockton was individual star, making 16 points. Several State high school records were smashed. The discus, the high jump and the mile run were the ones to go. Stockton raised the discus record over 10 feet, while Haseman of Linton, pushed Morrison of Shortridge in the high jump. Haseman will no doubt break this record next year, as the Linton lad is but a sophomore in school and showed better form than Morrison. The following is a record of points made by the different schools:

Monticello, 30; Shortridge, 24; Manual Training, 17; Walton, 11; Vincennes, 8; Montpelier, 6; Van Buren, 5; Brazil, 5; Linton, 3; Kewanna, 3 ; Anderson, 3 ; Marion, 1 ; Salem, 1.

Duckwall, of Vincennes, ran a great half mile and took second in the quarter. The light-haired boy is a runner who will give an account of himself in college circles. He will probably go to Michigan or Purdue. Rawlins, of Monticello, showed fine form in the high hurdles. Too many heats in the 100 yards dash told on him in the finals. He tried to break the State record, but only succeeded in tieing it.

Coaches Sheldon and Barclay deserve a great deal of credit for the manner in which the meet was conducted.

The Bloomington Telephone, May 25th-The State High School Meet, Saturday, went to Monticello High School with 26 points; Shortridge, second with $23 \frac{1}{2}$, and Manual Training, 18. The little town of Walton, in northern Indiana, took 10 points when their sprinter won the 100 and 220 yards dash. Monticello had a two-man team which proved invincible, Stockton winning the weights and Rawlins the track events. Stockton broke the State record in the discus by throwing it 117 feet; H. Morrison, of Shortridge, broke the high jump record at 5 feet, $83 / 4$ inches; Guy Conwell broke the hammer throw at 143 feet $5 \frac{1}{2}$ inches.

The Indianapolis Star, May 23rd-Monticello High School won the annual State interscholastic track and field games on Jordan Field today when Stockton took second in the broad jump and Gardner tied for first in the pole vault.
Shortridge and Monticello were tied when there remained two events and a jump-off in the high jump for third to decide the meet. It was late when the last two events were completed, and the northern Indiana high school winning them, took the championship for the first time. Monticello scored 30 points.
Records were made in many events. Summerville, of Brazil, broke the State record in the mile run in the closest finish of the meet. A blanket would have covered the leaders-Summerville and Stanton, of M. T. H. S.; Hansberry, of Anderson, and Stewart, of M. T. H. S. Hansberry took the pace and held it until the last stretch, when Summerville came to the front and won by inches.

## F. Quarter Mile to Hendrickson.

Duckwall, of Vincennes, ran a great race in the half mile, while Ellis, of Shortridge, took a good second. The 440 was the prettiest race of the meet. Hendrickson, of Shortridge, took the lead, and was never headed. Duckwall beat Hansberry, of Anderson, out in a close finish.

A dark horse won the sprints. Staggs, of Walton, took two firsts in the dashes. He won the 100 yards easily, but was given a fairly hard run in the 220 yards by Schomberg, of Shortridge. Rawlins tied the State record in the 120 yards hurdle race. He also won a pretty race from Stackhouse, of M. T. H. S., in the low hurdles. Hawkins took third, but was not close to the first two runners.
Two records were broken that will likely stand for years to come in the high jump and the discus throw. Morrison, of Shortridge, took the high jump at 5 feet $81 / 4$ inches. He was forced to go his limit by Haseman, of Linton. There was a tie for third place, which when the men were called to jump it off, only Scott, of Shortridge, appeared. The blue and white athlete made one jump and was declared the winner of third place.

## Discus Record Goes.

Stockton's throw of 117 feet 6 inches in the discus broke the former record by more than 10 feet. The Monticello athlete won first honors, getting two firsts and two seconds and scoring 16 points. Staggs, of Walton, was second, with 11 points.
Guy Conwell, of Van Buren, sprung a surprise in the hammer throw and not only defeated Stockton, of Monticello, but broke the State
record by more than 6 feet. Four teams lined up at the start of the relay race. Shortridge, Monticello, Anderson and M. T. H. S. were all confident that they would carry home the silver relay cup. The Manual team won a pretty race.

An exhibition half-mile race was run between Bonsib and Easch, of the Indiana University track team. Bonsib won in $2 \mathrm{~m} .21-5 \mathrm{sec}$. Johnson of the varsity track team gave an exhibition broad jump. He jumped 22 feet $11 / 2$ inches. A reception and presentation of cups was held at the Student Building tonight.

# Constitution of the Indiana High School Athletic Association 

Revised December 26, 1907

## Administration

Section 1. A Board of Control, composed of three members, (principals, members of the faculty, or superintendents), shall be elected by the Association December 29, 1903, as follows: One for one year, one for two years, and one for three years; the chairman each year to be the one whose term expires at the end of that year. Thereafter each member of the Board shall be elected for three years. This election is to take place at the annual meeting of the Indiana State Teachers' Association. In case of vacancy, the remaining members of the Board may appoint a person to fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting of the Association,
Sec. 2. The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties: (a) It shall have general control over all athletic contests between secondary schools in this Association; (b) It shall have exclusive control of the annual Interscholastic Meet; (c) It shall give interpretations of the rules of the Association; (d) It shall determine forfeitures under Sec. 11 ; (e) The Board of Control at the end of any athletic season may, at its discretion, issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standing of the teams. No school which has violated the rules of the Association in regard to the qualifications of players shall be awarded special honors in that particular branch of athletics.

Sec. 3. (a) When charges are made in writing by a member of the Association against another member for violation of the rules of the Association, the Board of Control after giving due notice of place and time for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges, and may suspend the offending school for a period of not exceeding one year. (b) The Board of Control shall decide on all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants in the Interscholastic Meet. (c) When any matter comes before the Board for
decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.

Sec. 4. Membership in this Association shall be limited to public high schools of the State, and each school shall have one vote. The annual dues shall be $\$ 2.00$, payable when the school becomes a member, and thereafter by December 1st of each year in advance.

Sec. 5. The principal of the school, or high school teachers authorized by him, shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.

Sec. 6. No games shall be played without the sanction of the principal.

Sec. 7. No game shall be played with public high schools of this State not belonging to this Association.

Sec. 8. Non-playing student officials or assistants shall conform to the same rules as the players.

Sec. 9. The principal, or his authorized representative, shall accompany his team to all contests.

Sec. 10. In football contests held under these rules, the length of each half shall be twenty-five (25) minutes, unless changed by mutual consent.

Sec. 11. It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, provide a forfeit of ten dollars $(\$ 10.00)$, to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeiture be stipulated and not be paid during the same season, the Board of Control, after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the Association. Notification of such expulsion shall be published in the papers, with the cause therefor.

Sec. 12. No retiring member of the Board of Control, having served three (3) years, shall be eligible for re-election for a period of one (1) year after date of retirement.
'Sec. 13. At the annual meeting of 1906, a Permanent Secretary shall be elected, who shall have charge of the property and records of the Association; shall receive all money for dues and the sale of publications of the Association; shall issue all circulars authorized by the Board of Control; shall attend meetings of the Board when requested to do so by the Board; shall turn over to the treasurer of the Board all moneys in his possession when called upon to do so; shall perform such other duties as the growth and needs of the Association as determined by the Board may require; and shall receive as
compensation the sum of twenty-h,e dollars ( $\$ 25.00$ ) annually, and such allowance for expenses as the Board may approve. Vacancies in the office may be declared by the Board for cause, and a successor appointed by the Board to act until the next annual meeting.

## Rules

Rule 1. To represent a sehool in any interscholastic contest a person must be under twenty-one (21) years of age; must have entered some public high school with the first twenty (20) school days of the term or semester in which the contest occurs, and must be an amateur as defined by the A. A. U. Eighth grade pupils are not eligible.

Rule 2. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current term or semester a passing grade in each of three (3) or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen (15) regular high school recitations per week, exclusive of rhetoricals, physical culture, military drill, and deportment; in his last preceding term or semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire term.

Pupils enrolled for the first time must comply with all the requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding term or semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

Back work may be made up, providing that it be done in accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes a matter of final record before the opening of the next term or semester.

Rule 3. The eligibility of all the contestants shall be certified to by the principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be presented in writing within ten (10) days before any contest. In case of disputes the principal must furnish to the Board of Control the following data in regard to each contestant: The date of last enrollment; the number of years he has been a member of a secondary school athletic team; date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the preceding term or semester; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term or semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be denied championship honors, and may be excluded from the annual Interscholastic Meet.
Rule 4. No person shall take part in athletic contests between secondary schools for more than four years, and no post-graduate
pupil shall take part in such contests. Persons graduating from regular three year courses shall not be deemed post-graduates.

Rule 5. No person shall enter a contest under an assumed name.
Time spent in athletic sport by pupils while in grades below the high school shall not be counted as part of the four years.

Rule 6. The principal shall have power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner.

Rule 7. Any member of a high school athletic team, who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that season.

An exception is hereby made for basketball and basketball players in those towns and cities whose schools have no gymnasium and whose students are forced by necessity to use a Y. M. C. A. or some other gymnasium, for their practice and games. It is a well known fact that the use of such gymnasiums by high school students under such circumstances will likely require that such students play on the team or teams of the organizations maintaining such gymnasiums No student, however, will be permitted to play on any other team than that representing the organization controlling the gymnasium, and no student will be allowed to play in the teams of the latter without the knowledge and consent of his principal.

Rule 8. These rules may be amended by a majority vote of the members present at the annual meeting.

## Interpretations of the Board of Control

1. Inasmuch as questions have arisen concerning practice games with high schools.not in the Association, the Board of Control feel warranted in calling attention to Sec. 7, which says that "No game shall be played with public high schools of the State not belonging to the Association." This Section, however, has been interpreted by the Board as applying only to games and contests where an admission fee is charged.
2. The football season is defined as beginning with the opening of school and closing with November 30th.
3. No student who violates the rules of the Association will be reinstated by the Board.
4. When a member or members of any team are protested, the game should be played as scheduled and the protest filed with the Board for settlement later.
5. By mutual agreement of both teams, pupils over the age limit may be allowed to enter the contests played under I. H. S. A. A. rules.
6. Pupils under twenty-one (21) at the time of registration in school shall be so regarded until the time of their next registration.
7. A student is a post-graduate of a school after he has completed the work required for graduation by that school irrespective of the time of granting the diploma.
8. Adopted by the annual meeting, December 27, 1905.

Rule 2 shall be interpreted as follows: (a) The contestant must have an average equal to a passing grade in the amount of work specified for the school months of the current term or semester up to the month in which the contest occurs; (b) during the current school month he must be maintaining said passing grade up to the date of certification by the principal; (c) if his average monthly grade in any study at the beginning of the current month is below passing, the contestant is ineligible so far as that study is concerned during the entire current month.
9. The following resolution was adopted by the annual meeting, December 26, 1907:

It is a violation of the spirit of the constitution for schools in the Association to play non-high school teams including high school boys, unless the latter are certified by the principal of the school to which they belong.

## Notes

1. Five Year-Books have been issued by the Board of Control. Copies of any of these hand-books may be had of the Permanent Secretary. Price ten cents each, post paid.
2. Copies of the Constitution may be had of the Permanent Secretary at the rate of fifty cents per hundred, post paid.
3. Printed blanks for reporting the data of all games will be sent by the Permanent Secretary on application. Reports on basketball, baseball and track athletics should be in the hands of the Secretary by June 1st; football reports are due December 1st.
4. The annual dues are payable to the Permanent Secretary on or before December 1 st of each year.
5. Any high school in Indiana may become a member of the Association by the payment of two dollars $(\$ 2.00)$ to the Permanent Secretary. (See Sec. 4.)
6. All correspondence and remittances from members of the

Association to the Board of Control or to the Permanent Secretary must be endorsed by the principal or a member of the iaculty.
7. At the annual meeting, December 26, 1907, Árincipal E. E. Ramsey, of Bloomington, was elected to fill the unexpired term of L. D. Coffman, resigned, on the Board of Control. By Sec. 1 of the Constitution Mr. Ramsey becomes chairman of the Board. Also Superintendent L. N. Hines, of Hartford City, was elected to serve a term of three years on the Board, succeeding Principal Geo. W. Benton, who by Sec. 12 was ineligible for re-election. J. # Athletic Rules of Indiana High School Athletic Association 

Based on Rules of Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association RULE I.
Officials.
Section 1. All meetings must be under the direction of
The Board of Control.
One referee.
Two or more inspectors.
Three or more field judges.
Three judges at finish.
Three or more timekeepers.
One starter.
One clerk of the course.
One scorer.
One marshal.
Sec. 2. If deemed necessary, assistants may be provided for the clerk of the course, the scorer, and the marshal, and an official announcer may be appointed.

> RULE II.
> The Board of Control.

Shall have jurisdiction of all matters not assigned by these rules to the referee or other game officials.

RULE III.
The Referee.
Must decide all questions relating to the actual conduct of the Meet, whose final settlement is not otherwise covered by these rules; have the power to add to or alter the announced arrangements of heats in any event. A referee has no authority, after heats have been drawn and published in a program, to transfer a contestant from one heat to another.
When in any but the final heat of a race a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor
who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to culpable carelessness and shall also have the power to allow the hindered competitor to start in the next round of heats, just as if he had been placed in his trial.

When in a final heat a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to his carelessness or conduct, and he shall also have the power to order a new race between such of the competitors as he thinks entitled to such a privilege.

If, during an athletic contest under the rules of the I. H. S. A. A., a competitor shall conduct himself in a manner unbecoming a gentleman or offensive to the officials, spectators, or competitors, the referee shall have the power to disqualify him from further competition at the Meet; and, if he thinks the offense worthy of additional punishment, must promptly make a detailed statement of the facts to the Board of Control.

Power to change the order of events as laid down in the official program is reserved to the Board of Control, which shall, through its chairman, exercise this authority, unless it sees fit to expressly delegate this power to the referee.

The referee shall not have authority to disqualify any competitor for violation of the eligibility rule of the I. H. S. A. A. All protests as to eligibility made on the field must be referred to the Board of Control, and the protested competitor must be allowed to compete until disqualified by the arbitrator of the I. H. S. A. A.

## RULE IV. <br> The Inspectors.

It shall be the duty of an inspector to stand at such point as the referee may designate, to watch the competition closely, and, in case of a claim of foul, to report to the referee what he saw of the incident. Such inspectors are merely assistants to the referee, to whom they must report, and have no power to make any decision.

## RULE V.

## The Judges at the Finish

Must determine the order of finishing of contestants and must arrange among themselves as to noting the winner, second, third. fourth, etc., as the case may require, and there must always be two judges whose duty it must be to choose the winner.

Their decision in this respect must be without appeal, and, in case of a disagreement, a majority must govern.

RULE VI.

## The Field Judges

Must make an accurate measurement and keep a tally of all trials of competitors in the high and broad jumps, the pole vaults and the weight competitions.

They must act as judges in these events, and their decisions must likewise be without appeal. In cases of disagreement, a majority must govern. There must be at least three judges for every event.

## RULE VII.

## The Timekeepers

Must be three in number and must individually time all events where time record is called for. At the conclusion of each heat, each timekeeper must present his watch to the referee for inspection, and he must decide the official time. Should two of three watches mark the same time and the third disagree, the time marked by said two watches must be accepted. Should all three disagree, the time marked by the intermediate watch must be accepted.

The flash of the pistol must denote the actual time of starting.
If, for any reason, only two watches are held on an event, and they fail to agree, the longer time of the two must be accepted.

Note-For record however, three watches must be held on an event.

## RULE VIII.

## The Starter

Must have sole jurisdiction over the competitor after the clerk of the course has properly placed them in their positions for the start.

The method of starting must be by pistol report, except that in time handicap races the word "go" must be used.

An actual start is not effected until the pistol has been purposely discharged after the competitors have been warned to get ready.

In case the pistol was not purposely discharged, the competitors shall be called back by the starter by pistol fire.

Note-The starter must have at least two good cartridges in his pistol before starting a heat.

When any part of the person of a competitor touches the ground in front of his mark before the signal is given, it must be considered a false start.

Penalties for false starting must be inflicted by the starter, as follows: In all races to and including 125 yards, the competitor must be put back one yard for the first and another yard for the second attempt; in races over 215 yards and including 300 yards, two yards for the first and two more for the second attempt; in races over 300 yards and including 600 yards, three yards for the first and three more for the second attempt; in races over 600 yards and including 1,000 yards, four yards for the first and four more for the second attempt; in races over 1,000 yards and including one mile, five yards for the first and five more for the second attempt; in all races over one mile, ten yards for the first and ten more for the second attempt.

In all cases, the third false start must prevent his competing in that event.

The starter must rule out of that event any competitor who attempts to advance himself from his mark, as prescribed in the official program, after he has given the warning to "get ready."

RULE IX.

## The Clerk of the Course

Must be provided with the names and the numbers of all entered competitors, and he must notify them to appear at the starting line before the start in each event in which they are entered.

RULE X.

## The Scorer

Must record the order in which each competitor finishes his event together with the time furnished by the referee.

He must keep a tally of the laps made by each competitor in races covering more than one lap, and must announce, by means of a bell or otherwise, when the leading man enters the last lap.

He must draw up a list of the actual competitors in each event, which shall be filed with the papers of the Association and shall be the official record of competing entrants, and shall be final evidence in the enforcement of Rule III, of the rules of eligibility.

He must control his assistants and assign to them such of his duties as he may deem proper.

## RULE XI.

## The Marshal

Must have full police charge of the enclosure and must prevent any but officials and actual competitors from entering or remaining therein.

He must control his assistants and assign to them their duties. RULE XII.

## The Official Announcer

Must receive from the scorer and field judges the result of each event, and announce the same by voice or by means of a bulletin board.

RULE XIII.
Competitors
Must report to the clerk of the course immediately upon their arrival at the place of meeting, and must be provided by that official with their proper numbers, which must be worn conspicuously by the competitors when competing, and without which they must not be allowed to start.

Each competitor must inform himself of the time of starting, and must be promptly at the starting point of each competition in which he is entered, and there report to the clerk of the course.

Under no conditions shall attendants be allowed to accompany competitors at the start or during any competition.

RULE XIV.

$$
\text { Track }{ }_{1}^{\top} \text { Measurement. }
$$

All distances run or walked nust be measured upon a line eighteen inches outward from the inner edge of the track, except that in races on straightaway tracks the distance must be measured in a direct line from the starting mark to the finishing line.

> RULE XV.
> The Course.

Each competitor must keep in his respective position from start to finish in all races on straightaway tracks, and in all races on tracks with one or more turns he must not cross to the inner edge of the track, except when he is at least six feet in advance of his nearest competitor. After turning the last corner into the straight in any race, each competitor must run a straight course to the finish line, and must not cross to either the outside or inside from such straight course.

In all races of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have a separate course marked out and measured, whether races are run straightaway or with turns.
The referee must disqualify from that event any competitor who
willfully pushes against, impedes, crosses the course of, or in any way interferes with another competitor.

The referee must disqualify from further participation in the Meet any contestant competing to lose, to coach, or to in any way impede the chances of another competitor, either in a trial or final contest.

RULE XVI.

## The Finish

Of the course must be represented by a line between two finishing. posts, drawn across and at right angles to the sides of the track, and three feet above which line must be placed a tape attached at either end to the finishing posts. A finish must be counted when any part of the winner's body, except his hands or arms, touches the tape at the finish line. The tape must be considered the finishing line for the winner, but their order of finishing across the track line must determine the positions of the other competitors.

## RULE XVII. <br> Hurdles.

In the 120 yards hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle to be three feet six inches high. They must be placed ten yards apart, with the first hurdle fifteen yards distant from the starting point, and the last hurdle fifteen yards before the finishing line.

In the 220 yards hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle to be two feet six inches high. They must be placed twenty yards apart, with the first hurdle twenty yards distant from the starting mark, and the last hurdle twenty yards before the finishing line.

In making a record, it must be necessary for the competitor to jump every hurdle in its proper position.

In all hurdle races of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have a separate course and hurdles marked out and measured, whether races are run straightaw-y or with turns.

## RULE XVIII.

## Jumping.

Section 1. A fair jump must be one that is made without the assistance of weights, diving, somersaults, or handsprings of any kind.

In scratch events competitors must jump in order as placed on the program.

Sec. 2. The running high jump. The field judges must decide the
height at which the jump shall commence and must regulate the succeeding elevations.

Each competitor must be allowed three trial jumps at each height, and if on the third trial he shall fail, he must be declared out of the competition.

Competitors must jump in order, as provided in Sec. 1; then, those failing, if any, must have their second trial jump in a like order, after which those having failed twice must make their third trial jump.
The jump must be made over a bar resting on pins projecting not more than three inches from the uprights, and when this bar is removed from its place by the competitor when trying, it must be counted as a trial jump.
Running under the bar in making an attempt to jump must be counted as a "balk," and three successive "balks" must be counted as a trial jump.

The distance of the run before the jump must be unlimited. A competitor may decline to jump at any height in his turn, and by so doing forfeits his rights to again jump at the height declined.

Sec. 4. The running broad jump. When jumped on earth, joist five inches wide must be sunk flush with it. The outer edge of this joist must be called the scratch line, and the measurement of all jumps must be made from it, at right angles, to the nearest break in the ground made by any part of the person of the competitor.

In front of the scratch line the ground must be removed to the depth of three and the width of twelve inches outward.
A foul jump must be one where the competitor, in jumping off the scratch line, makes a mark on the ground immediately in front of it, or runs over the line without jumping, and must count as a trial jump without results.

Each competitor must have three trial jumps, and the best three must each have three more trial jumps.
The competition must be decided by the best of all the trial jumps of the competitors.
The distance of the run before the scratch line must be unlimited.
Sec. 5. The pole vault. Pole must be furnished by the managing committee, but contestants may use their own private poles if they so desire, and no contestant shall be allowed to use any of these private poles, except by the consent of their owners. The poles must be unlimited as to size and weight, but must have no assisting devices, except that they may be wrapped or covered with any substance (to obtain a firmer grasp), and must have but one prong at the end.

No competitor shall, during his vault, raise the hand which was uppermost when he left the ground to a higher point of the pole, nor shall he raise the hand which was undermost when' e left the ground to any point on the pole above the other hand.

The rules governing the running high jump must also govern the pole vault for height, except that when the man leaves the ground in an attempt, it shall be counted a trial.

RULE XIX.

## Putting the Shot.

The shot must be a solid sphere made of metal and must weigh twelve pounds.

It must be put with one hand, and in making the attempt it must be above, and not behind, the shoulder.

The competitor must stand in a circle seven feet in diameter. The circumference of the circle must be divided into two halves by a line drawn through it. On four feet of the front half of the circumference a board four inches high must be placed, the edge of which must be equally distant from the intersection of the line with the circumference and at which the competitor must stand when the shot leaves his hand.

A fair put shall be one where no part of the person of the competitor touches in front of the circle, or on the board, in making the attempt.

A put must be counted as foul if the competitor steps over the front half of the circle or on the board. A competitor must leave the circle by the rear half. Leaving by the front half must be declared a foul.

The measurement of all puts must be made from the nearest mark by the shot to a point on the circumference of the circle, on a line with the object mark and the center of the circle.

Foul puts and letting go the shot in making an attempt must be counted as trial puts without result.

A board similar to the one in front mav be used at the back of the circle

The order of competing and number of trials shall be the same as for the running broad jump. Shots must be furnished by the managing committee. Any contestant may use his private shot, if correct in weight and shape; in which case the ot her contestants must also be allowed to use it, if they wish.

## Throwing the Hammer.

The head and handle may be of any size, shape, and material, provided that the length of the complete implement must not be more than four feet and its weight not less than twelve pounds.

All throws shall be made from a circle seven feet in diameter, and this circle shall be considered as divided into halves by a line drawn through its center at right angles to the direction of the throw.

A fair throw must be one where no part of the person of the competitor shall touch outside or on the circle in making the attempt.

Foul throws and letting go of the hammer in an attempt must count as trial throws.
The measurement of all throws must be made from the nearest mark made by the head of the hammer to a point on the circumference of the circle, on a line with the object mark and the center of the circle.

The order of competing and number of trials must be the same as for the running broad jump. Hammers must be furnished by the managing committee. Any contestant may use his private hammer, if correct in weight and length, and no contestant shall be allowed to use these private hammers except by consent of the owner.

## RULE XXI.

## Throwing the Discus.

The discus shall be made of smooth, hardwood body, without finger holes, weighted in center with lead discs and capped with polished brass discs, with steel ring on the outside. The weight of the discus shall be four and one-half pounds; outside diameter, eight inches; thickness in center, two inches.
All throws shall be made from a seven foot circle, with four root lapboards and similar in all respects to the circle for putting the shot. In making his throws, a competitor may assume any position he chooses. Foul throws and letting go of the discus in attempts shall count as trials without result. A fair throw shall be one in which no part of the person of the competitor touches the ground outside the front half of the circle, and the competitor leaves the circle by its rear half. A throw shall be foul if any part of the person touches the ground outside the front half of the circle before the throw is measured.

The order of competing and number of trials shall be the same as for the running broad jump.

A discus shall be furnished by the managing committee. Any con-
testant may use his private discus, if correct in weight and shape; in which case the other contestants must also be allowed to use it, if they wish.

The measurement of each throw shall be made from the nearest mark made by the fall of the discus to the circumference of the circle, on a line from a mark made by the discus to the center of the circle.

## TIES.

In case of a tie in a scratch contest at high jumping, the tieing competitors shall have three additional trials at the height last tried, and if still undecided, the bar shall be lowered to the height next below, and three trials taken at that height. If no one clears it, the bar shall be lowered again and again until one of the competitors clears it. In case of a second tie, the award shall be given to the competitor who cleared the bar with the least number of trials.

In case of a tie in the pole vault the officials shall raise or lower the bar at their discretion, and those competitors who have tied shall be allowed one trial at each height.

In case of a tie in a scratch contest at any game decided by distance each of the tieing competitors shall have three additional trials, and the award shall be made in accordance with the distances cleared in these additional trials. In case of a second tie three more trials shall be allowed, and so on, until a decision is reached. In case of a dead heat in any track events, the competitors shall not be allowed to divide the prize or points, or to toss for them, but must compete again at a time and place appointed by the referee.

## Minutes of the Annual Meeting

Claypool Hotel Assembly Hall, December 26, 1907.
Meeting was called to order by Chairman Benton. The report of the Permanent Secretary, J. T. Giles, was read and approved. The Chairman appointed Principal I. E. Neff, of South Bend, and Superintendent O. M. Pittenger, of Alexandria, as a committee to audit the books of the Association. The Association proceeded to a discussion of Rule I of the Constitution, but on motion it remained unchanged. After discussion it appeared to be the sense of the Association that no effort should be made by the Association to determine championships. The Association then proceeded to the nomination and election of two members of the Board of Control, one to serve a term of three years as the successor of Principal Geo. W. Benton, whose membership on the Board expired by Constitutional limitation and another to serve one year, filling the unexpired term of L. D. Coffman, who resigned on account of removal from the State. A motion prevailed that the person receiving the highest number of votes serve the three year term and the one receiving the next highest serve the one year term, Superintendent L. N. Hines, of Hartford City, having received the largest number of votes was declared a member of the Board for three years and Principal E. E. Ramsey, of Bloomington, who received the next highest number was declared a member of the Board for one year.
The following amendment to the Constitution was then approved. "It is a violation of the spirit of the Constitution for schools in the Association to play non-high school teams including high school boys unless the latter are certified to by the principal of the school to which they belong."

A motion to amend the Constitution by limiting the number of interscholastic football games played by any school in one season to five was laid upon the table for one year.
There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

## Minutes March 14, 1908

Board of Control met in called session at the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis. All members present. On evidence presented against the Evansville High School and on their own confession, the Board
of Control voted to drop Evansville from the membership list for the remainder of the school year 1907-1908 for violation of Rule 7.

The Board then took up the considération of the following charge brought by the Hartford City High School against the Gaston High School:

Hartford City, Ind., Feb. 22, 1908.
To the Board of of Control, Indiana High School Athletic Association.
Gentlemen:- Charges are hereby brought against the Gaston High School for playing Garland Rathel in a basketball game with the Hartford City High School basketball team, in this city February 21, 1908, over the protest of the Hartford City High School through its principal. The protest was made to Supt. C. L. Clawson, who accompanied the Gaston team, on the ground that Rathel was ineligible according to Rule 7, said Rathel having played basketball with the Farmland (City) Team against the Hartford City Athletic team, on December 12, 1907. Protest was also made on the ground that said Rathel was not an amateur according to Rule 1 , he having played basketball with a professional team known as the Muncie Shamrocks.

All the members of the Hartford City High School basketball team in the above mentioned game were eligible to play under I. H. S. A. A. rules.

Respectfully submitted for your consideration and action thereon. W. A. Myers, Principal Hartford City High School.

Supt. Clawson agreed to submit the case to the Board substituting J. T. Giles for L. N. Hines, who was ineligible to serve by Sec. 3, (c) of the Constitution. All the papers presented were read and discussed. The Board finally decided to defer action on these charges until more data could be secured.

Complaint was brought against the Rockville High School on the ground that they had remained out of the Association until they had played with all the high schools not members of the I. H. S. A. A. on their schedule and then joined to complete their schedule with I. H. S. A. A. teams. On this matter the Board ruled that while this was technically all right, in spirit it was wrong and was to be condemned.

The meeting then adjourned.

Singe it appeared that the granting of these requests would result in benefit to the general athletic conditions in that part of the State, favorable action was taken by the Board. This action, however, is not to be taken as a precedent, and does not exonerate the Evansville High School from blame in the matter of violating the rules of the Association.

This interpretation applies to both Sec. 7 and Rule 7 of the Constitution. Principals are advised to study carefully the Association Rules and if these are not clear to write to the Permanent Secretary regarding their interpretation.

Arrangements were completed at this meeting to hold the next State Meet under the auspices of Purdue University at Lafayette, Indiana, May 22, 1909.
