

High School Athletics during 1909

The sixth year of athletics under the direction of the Indiana High School Athletic Association has been a most satisfactory one. The membership of the association has been larger by thirty or forty schools than it has been during any previous year. It is gratifying to see this extension of the clean athletics idea. Few, indeed, are the schools in the State that any longer tolerate the conditions that prevailed generally a few years ago.

The interscholastic sports engaged in during the year have been the usual ones: baseball, football, basketball, track and field athletics. However, there were fewer interscholastic games of baseball and football than in former years. Professional and semi-professional baseball has so entirely eclipsed the high school game that it is difficult to secure enough interest to make the sport, as played in high schools, sustain itself financially. Consequently, high school baseball has been on the wane for several years, and during the present year few teams have been maintained.

On the other hand football has, in the main, proved not unprofitable financially. Certain other condsierations, however, have been responsible for bringing this game into disfavor in many quarters of the State, with a resultant curtailment of the number of games played and the popularity of the sport as it is played by secondary school boys.

Just as the number of games of baseball and football has been decreasing, interscholastic contests in basketball and track events have been growing more frequent and popular. This may be accounted for not only by the fact that the financial problem in connection with these forms of athletics is not great, but also because of the greater number of students to whom such games appeal as contests in which they may participate.

Official records of the various teams in the interscholastic contests will be found elsewhere in this booklet. Since it is impossible to arrange a championship schedule for all the schools, it is impossible to determine the best team in the State, except in the case of track and field teams. Manual Training High School, of Indianapolis, won the

Annual State Meet which was held on Stuart Field at Purdue University.

In the other lines of sports so many factors must be considered that anything whatever that might be said here concerning the relative standing of teams or the merits of individual players would be purely a matter of personal opinion. A tendency that has noticeably developed during the year has been to pay less attention to the championship idea in athletics, and this can not be regarded as other than a healthy condition for secondary school athletics.

Other tendencies of the year not less significant have developed. The value of the public school play ground has come to be realized as never before. Many school boards have during the year provided these grounds or have taken steps to do so. With the requirement of such facilities intra-school athletics have tended to supplant the inter-school contests. To contrast the possibilities of intra-school with those of inter-school athletics we need only cite the case of Shortridge High School where under the old system fifty-one boys were the sole participants in all the lines of athletics as opposed to several hundred under the new system.

We have mentioned above that football has come into disfavor in certain sections of the State. On this point some very definite data has been procured through a questionaire sent to the leading high schools of the association. Of the one hundred and seven schools replying, sixty-six played football last year, fifty-two had teams this year, while next year only twenty-nine of this number indicated their intention of playing the game. And most of these twenty-nine expressed their dissatisfaction with the game on the ground that it is too strenuous for boys of high school age, that it has become so specialized that it has lost all its spontaniety as a form of recreation, and that it requires more than a justifiable amount of skilled coaching. This same questionaire brought out that of the one hundred and seven replying to the question, "What substitute would you offer for football?" a majority suggested a modified form of football, mentioning Soccer and Rugby. It is believed that many of those who named Soccer as a substitute have this game confused with Rugby. The Rugby game, which is football with the objectionable features of interference and mass plays removed, has already been introduced at the Marion, the Hartford City and the Richmond High Schools, where it has been received with marked favor by the students. Much credit for the introduction of the game into these schools is due G. E. Hamilton, of the Richmond High School, who, while a Rhodes Scholar played the game at Oxford, England, for three years.

We cannot but conclude that the tendencies of the year which we have noted and which we believe are clearly discernible, are indicative of even better things in high school athletics and may, indeed, be epoch making in their significance.

Sixth Annual Track and Field Meet Announcement

The Sixth Annual Track and Field Meet of the Indiana High School Athletic Association will be held on Stuart Field of Purdue University, May 22, 1909, in the afternoon. Entries for the Meet will close May 12, and all schools desiring to participate in the Meet must become members of the Association before that time.

Eligibility.

Every contestant in this Meet must have previously made in a fair test a record equal to the following in every event in which he is entered:

100 Yards Dash11 s
220 Yards Dash
440 Yards Dash58 s
Half Mile Run
Mile Run 5 m. 15 s.
120 Yard High Hurdles
220 Yard Low Hurdles
Running High Jump 5 ft.
Running Broad Jump
Pole Vault8ft. 9 in.
Putting Shot (12 lb.)
Throwing Hammer (12 lb.)110 ft.
Throwing Discus 90 ft.

The above, together with a mile relay, will constitute the events of the Meet. Winning first place in any event counts five points; second place, three points; and third place, one point. Points in the relay will not be counted in determining the winning team.

Entries.

The entries in each event are limited to three, and the contestants in each to two, from any school; except in the relay race, where entries will be limited to six and the number placed in competition to four, each running one-fourth mile.

All schools, in order to enter the contests of the State Meet, will be required to certify that all athletic contests in which they have taken part since becoming members of the Association have been conducted in accordance with the rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association and that all their contestants in such contests have been qualified according to the rules.

Principals will be required to certify in writing that the contestants from their respective schools have all qualified in every event in which they are entered in the State Meet. Each principal must fill out entry blanks with the names of the contestants from his school and all the required data, and send to J. T. Giles, Permanent Secretary, Marion, Indiana, on or before May 12, 1909. This requirement must be strictly complied with. Special blanks for this purpose will be furnished to all members of the Association.

Protests.

All protests and complaints against members of the Association for violation of the rules must be made in writing and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before May 12. Protests as to the eligibility of individual contestants under the constitution are to be decided by the Board of Control and may be filed with the Secretary at any time.

Management.

The management of this Meet rests solely with the Board of Control. The selection of officials to be approved by the Board, has been delegated to the athletic management of Purdue University. The referee and starter are to be chosen from the A. A. U., in order that records made at the Meet may be recognized by that body. The Board will arrange a program, assigning place on the track by lot, and the printed program will indicate the order in which the men will be called upon the track. The rules governing the Meet correspond to those of the Western Inter-Collegiate Amateur Athletic Association except where these have been modified by the Board of Control. These rules, as adopted by the Board, are printed in the I. H. S.A. A. Hand Book of Athletics and Annual Report of the Board of Control. Copies may be had of the Permanent Secretary for 10 cents each, post paid.

Prizes.

No prizes will be awarded except a cup to the winning team, a pennant to the winning relay team, and badges for point winners. Admission to all high school pupils, 25 cents. Contestants and one rubber from each school admitted free

Entertainment.

Purdue University will furnish free board and rooms to all contestants during the Meet.

Fees.

Previous to the Crawfordsville Meet no entry fee was charged and as a result many were entered who did not take part in the Meet and who had little expectation of doing so when they entered. This worked an injustice on the town entertaining the Meet since it gave no basis for estimating the number to be entertained and many received entertainment who were not entitled to it. For this reason a fee of fifty cents will hereafter be required from each individual entered; this fee to be returned when the individual appears on the field.

Report of the Meet

Heze Clark in the Indiana Sportsman describes the Meet as follows: Manual Training High School boys are celebrating and they have good cause, for the athletes of the South Side school won the sixth annual State high school track and field meet. The Shortridge High School boys are happy and proud over the showing made by their team, but they are not satisfied. They are all figuring on what might have been if Ellis had won the half mile. If this had come true the blue and white would have won the meet by 1/4 of a point. Ellis was picked to win the half mile, but he drew a bad place on the track, being on the second row of runners and far to the outside. The half mile was the turning point in the meet. Ellis had to sprint to get a position on the track and he got the lead at the end of the first lap. The Shortridge boy opened up a wide gap of 15 yards between him and the other runners and held this until within 200 yards of the tape. Then Marshall of Gas City and Crossland of Culver H. S. sprinted and came up even with Ellis as the runners reached the stretch. The finish was close. Ellis had lost all his sprint in the early stages of the race and was about three yards behind the winner at the finish.

Manual Training had the meet won at this time. Three stars, King, Newlin and Hamilton winning all of the South Siders 23 points. King was the all round star of the meet, winning 13 points. He took easy firsts in both the sprints and second in the broad jump. Morrison of Shortridge was the second best all round man, winning 10½ points. Morrison took the high jump in easy style, defeating Scott, his teammate. Morrison's most remarkable performance was in the broad jump, when he jumped 21 feet 3¼ inches. This is within less than an inch of the State records.

Winslow of Fairmount Academy lived up to expectations and won the pole vault and set a new record of 10 feet 8 3-16 inches. Allison of Richmond won both hurdle races and set new State records in each. The only man that was anywhere close to him in either race was Williams of Sheridan in the heat of the low hurdles, and the two ran what looked as if it would be a dead heat until the next to the last hurdle, when Williams fell.

Newlin, the wonderful mile runner of Manual Trining, made a new mark in that race and won by 30 yards. The quarter mile was a hard fought event. Davis of Sheridan took the pace and led for the first 300 yards, when Hamilton of Manual, Applegate of Kokomo, and Crossland of Culver passed him and finished in that order.

The only thing that marred the meet was the accident that happene in the hammer throw. Conwell of Van Buren, the present State record holder for the event, made a great throw that was probably more than 140 feet. The missle flew through the air and as it came down struck B. M. Hoak, one of the field judges, in the stomach and on the arm. Hoak fell and was taken from the field in an auto. His hand was broken and it is feared that he is injurd internally. Conwell was so shocked by the accident that he could not make another throw and was forced to take second place in the event on one of his earlier throws.

Manual Training School won the relay race in easy style. The first two Hammond runners pressed the South Siders hard, but the last two Manual boys ran away with the race. This is the sixth straight high school relay championship won by Manual.

The Indianapolis Star, May 23, gave the following account of the meet:

Before a gala throng that taxed the capacity of Stuart Field, Manual Training High School of Indianapolis won the annual track and field meet of the Indiana High School Association this afternoon with a total of twenty-three points. The weather was ideal, the track and field in perfect condition and at the end five State records had been broken and one tied. The nearest competitor to Manual was Shortridge with a total of nineteen points.

Monticello failed to make the showing of former years, dropping to third place with eleven points. Manual took the lead at the outset winning the 100-yard dash, mile and quarter mile. Shortridge was strong in the field events and pulled up rapidly toward the end of the meet. State records were broken for the mile, high hurdles, half mile, low hurdles and pole vault. King of Manual tied the State record in the 220-yard dash in 23 flat.

The 100-yard dash was the first event run off and so many men were entered that four heats were necessary before the finals.

In the 120-yard high hurdles Magaw, Richmond; Lods, Monticello; Fauber, Monticello; Williams, Sheridan; Allison, Richmond; and Bushman, Manual placed in the preliminaries. Allison won out in the finals with Fauber second and Williams third, the time 16 1-5 seconds, breaking the State record by 4-5 of a second.

Newlin Easy Winner.

The mile was a one man affair, Newlin of Manual taking the lead on the second lap and winning out by 75 yards. Hinshaw of Monticello took second and Oliphant of Linton third. The time in this event was 4:45 1-5, which clipped 6 4-5 seconds off the State record.

The quarter mile was a walk-away for Manual, Hamilton setting a terrific pace which soon killed off all opponents. Applegate of Kokomo won second and Crossland of Culver third. In the 220-yard dash, Jarvis of Shortridge, Havenstein of Elkhart, Bedemkop of Elkhart, Machal of Gas City, Moss of Linton, Staggs of Walton, King of Manual and Schomberg of Shortridge qualified. The final heat was taken by King, with Staggs second and Jarvis third in the fast time of 23 seconds flat, which tied the State record.

The 220-yard hurdles was won by Allison of Richmond, with Summers of Hammond second and Kennedy of Hammond third. The time for this event was 26 4-5 seconds, which smashed the State record by one second.

Marschal of Gas City won the half mile after a pretty race with Crossland of Culver and Ellis of Shortridge, who won second and third respectively. Another record was broken in this event, one and one fifth seconds being clipped off. The relay race went to Manual, who won every lap.

No startling records were made in the weights, all falling short of practice distances. In the discus Dobbins of Monticello won first with a mark of 105 feet 10 inches. Shortridge showed up strongly in the jumps, Morrison winning out easily over all competitors. Winslow of Fairmount Academy sprung a surprise by pole vaulting ten feet eight and one-fourth inches, breaking the State record by one and one-fourth inches. Afterward he vaulted two inches higher for a record,

Constitution of the Indiana High School Athletic Association

Revised December 28, 1908.

ADMINISTRATION.

Section 1. A Board of Control, composed of three members (principals, members of the faculty, or superintendents) shall be elected by the Association December 29, 1903, as follows: One for one year, one for two years and one for three years; the chairman each year to be the one whose term expires at the end of that year. Thereafter each member of the Board shall be elected for three years. This election to take place at the annual meeting of the Indiana State Teachers' Association. In case of vacancy, the remaining members of the Board may appoint a person to fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting of the Association.

Sec. 2. The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties: (a) It shall have general control over all athletic contests between secondary schools in this Association; (b) It shall have exclusive control of the annual Interscholastic Meet; (c) It shall give interpretations of the rules of the Association; (d) It shall determine forfeitures under Sec. 11; (e) The Board of Control at the end of any athletic season may, at its discretion, issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standing of the teams. No school which has violated the rules of the Association in regard to the qualifications of players shall be awarded special honors in that particular branch of athletics.

Sec. 3. (a) When charges are made in writing by a member of the Association against another member for violation of the rules of the Association, the Board of Control, after giving due notice of place and time for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges, and may suspend the offending school for a period of not exceeding one year. (b) The Board of Control shall decide on all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants in the Interscholastic Meet. (c) When any matter comes before the Board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.

Sec. 4. Membership in this Association shall be limited to public

high schools of the State, and each school shall have one vote. The Annual dues shall be \$2.00, payable when the school becomes a member and thereafter by December 1 of each year in advance.

Academies with commissioned high school standing shall be eligible to membership in the Association and wherever the word "high school" appears in this constitution, it shall be understood to apply equally to these acadamies.

- Sec. 5. The principal of the school, or high school teachers authorized by him, shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.
- Sec. 6. No games shall be played without the sanction of the principal.

Sec. 7. No game shall be played with public high schools of this State not belonging to this Association.

This rule does not prevent a member of the Association from playing high school teams outside of the State nor from playing non-high school teams within the State except as follows:

It is a violation of the constitution for schools in the Association to play non-high school teams including high school boys, unless the latter are certified as eligible by the principal of the school to which they belong.

- Sec. 8. Non-playing student officials or assistants shall conform to the same rules as the players.
- Sec. 9. The principal or his authorized representative shall accompany his team to all contests.
- Sec. 10. In football contests held under these rules, the length of each half shall be twenty-five minutes, unless changed by mutual consent.
- Sec. 11. It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, provide a forfeit of \$10, to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeitures be stipulated and not be paid during the same season the Board of Control, after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the Association. Notification of such expulsion shall be published in the papers, with the cause therefor.
- Sec. 12. No retiring member of the Board of Control, having served three years ,shall be eligible for re-election for a period of one year after date of retirement.
- Sec. 13. Each school in the Association shall report to the Permanent Secretary a list of the pupils representing that school in athletic contests during the year. Each school is asked to report also the kind

of treatment accorded them to, from and on the field, while the guests of another school.

RULES.

Rule 1. To represent a school in any interscholastic contest a person must be under twenty-one years of age; must have entered some public high school within the first twenty school days of the semester in which the contest occurs, and must be an amateur as defined by the A. A. U. Eighth grade pupils are not eligible. A semester is one-half of a school year.


Rule 2. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current semester a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen regular high school recitations per week, exclusive of rhetoricals, physical culture, military drill, and deportment; in his last preceding semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire term.

Pupils enrolled for the first time must comply with all the requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

Back work may be made up, providing that it be done in accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes a matter of final record before the opening of the next semester.

Interpretation. In each of the studies representing the minimum requirement of work specified above: (a) for the current semester, the average of the monthly grades up to the time of certification must be passing; (b) for the current school month, the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing; (c) if the average of the monthly grades at the beginning of any month is below passing in any study, the pupil is ineligible so far as that study is concerned for the entire month.

Rule 3. The eligibility of all the contestants shall be certified to by the principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be presented in writing within ten days before any contest. In case of disputes the principal must furnish to the Board of Control the following data in regard to each contestant: The date of last enrollment; the number of years he has been a member of a secondary school athletic team; date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the preceding term of the current semester; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term or semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be denied

championship honors, and may be excluded from the annual Interscholastic Meet.

Rule 4. No pupil shall be allowed the opportunity of taking part in high school athletics for more than four school years or eight semesters, nor shall he have the opportunity of taking part in any form of athletics for more than four seasons. Post graduates are not eligible, but pupils graduating from regular three year courses shall not be deemed post graduates.

Time spent in ahtletic sport by pupils while in grades below the high school shall not be counted as part of the four years.

Rule 5. No person shall enter a contest under an assumed name.

Rule 6. The principal shall have power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner.

Rule 7. Any member of a high school athletic team, who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that school year.

An exception is hereby made for basketball and basketball players in those towns and cities whose schools have no gymnasiums and whose students are forced by necessity to use a Y. M. C. A. or some other gymnasium for their practice and games. It is a well-known fact that the use of such gymnasiums by high school students under such circumstances will likely require that such students play on the team or teams of the organizations maintaining such gymnasiums. No student, however, will be permitted to play on any other team than that representing the organization controlling the gymnasium, and no student will be allowed to play in the teams of the latter without the knowledge and consent of his principal.

Rule 8. The number of interscholastic football games games played by any team in one season is limited to six.

Rule 9. Paid coaches, other than those regularly employed as teachers by the trustees of the school are prohibited. By paid coach is meant any person who receives directly or indirectly, remuneration of any kind, money traveling expenses, gifts, etc., in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any high school athletic team.

Rule 10. The basketball rules as published in Spaulding's official basketball rule book, shall be the official rules governing all contests between members of the I. H. S. A. A. However, the rule governing the selection of officials in the above rules shall be void, and unless otherwise agreed by mutual consent, each school shall furnish one

official and these officials shall alternate their duties, each acting as referee and each acting as umpire one half.

INTERPRETATIONS.

- A game is any athletic contest where an admission fee is charged or where any collection or contribution is received from spectators.
- 2. The football season is defined as beginning with the opening of school and closing with November 30.
- No student who violates the rules of the Association will be reinstated by the Board.
- 4. When a member or members of any team are protested, the game should be played as scheduled and the protest filed with the Board for settlement later.
- 5. By mutual consent of both teams ,pupils over the age limit may be allowed to enter the contests played under I. H. S. A. A. rules.
- 6. Pupils under twenty-one at the time of registration in school shall be so regarded until the time of their next registration.
- 7. A student is post graduate of a school after he has completed the work required for graduation by that school irrespective of the time of granting the diploma.

NOTES

- 1. Five year books have been issued by the Board of Control. Copies of any of these handbooks may be had of the Permanent Secretary. Price ten cents each, post paid.
- 2. Copies of the constitution may be had of the Permanent Secretary at the rate of fifty cents per hundred, post paid.
- 3. Printed blanks for reporting the data of all games will be sent by the Permanent Secretary on application. Reports on basket ball, baseball and track athletics should be in the hands of the Secretary by June 1.; football reports are due December 1.
- 4. The annual dues are payable to the Permanent Secretary on or or before December 1 of each year.
- 5. Any high school in Indiana may become a member of the Association by the payment of two dollars to the Permanent Secretary. (See Section 4.)
- 6. All correspondence and remittances from members of the Association to the Board of Control or to the Permanent Secretary must be endorsed by the principal or a member of the faculty.

- 7. The term "amateur" is defined and fully explained on pages 80 and 160 of Spaulding's "Official Athletic Rules of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States," and on page 80 of Spaulding's Official Y. M. C. A. Athletic League Handbook."
- 8. At the annual meeting of the Association in Indianapolis, December 28, 1908, Principal E. E. Ramsey, of Bloomington, was elected to succeed himself as a member of the Board of Control for a term of three years. The other two members of the Board are Principal C. W, Knouff, of Richmond, chairman, and Supt. L. N. Haines, of Crawfordsville.

Athletic Rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association

Based on Rules of the Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association

RULE 1.

Officials.

Section 1. All meetings must be under the direction of

The Board of Control.

One referee.

Two or more inspectors.

Three or more field judges.

Three judges at finish.

Three or more timekeepers.

One starter.

One Clerk of the Course.

One scorer.

One marshal.

Sec. 2. If deemed necessary, assistants may be provided for the clerk of the course, the scorer, and the marshal, and an official announcer may be appointed.

RULE II.

The Board of Control.

Shall have jurisdiction of all matters not assigned by these rules to the referee or other game officials.

RULE III.

The Referee.

Must decide all questions relating to the actual conduct of the Meet, whose final settlement is not otherwise covered by these rules; have the power to add to or alter the announced arrangements of heats in any event. A referee has no authority, after heats have been drawn and published in a program, to transfer a contestant from one heat to another.

When in any but the final heat of a race a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to culpable carelessness and shall also have the power to allow the hindered competitor to start in the next round of heats, just as if he had been placed in his trial.

When in a final heat a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to his carelessness or conduct, and he shall also have the power to order a new race between such of the competitors as he thinks entitled to such a privilege.

If, during an athletic contest under the rules of the I. H. S. A. A., a competitor shall conduct himself in a manner unbecoming a gentleman or offensive to the officials, spectators, or competitors, the referee shall have the power to disqualify him from futher competition at the Meet; and, if he thinks the offence worthy of additional punishment, must promptly make a detailed statement of the facts to the Board of Control.

Power to change the order of events as laid down in the official program is reserved to the Board of Control, which shall, through its chairman, exercise this authority, unless it sees fit to expressly delegate this power to the referee.

The referee shall not have authority to disqualify any competitor for violation of the eligibility rule of the I. H. S. A. A. All protests as to eligibility made on the field must be referred to the Board of Control, and the protested competitor must be allowed to compete until disqualified by the arbitrator of the I. H. S. A. A.

RULE IV.

The Inspectors.

It shall be the duty of an inspector to stand at such point as the referee may designate, to watch the competition closely, and, in case of a claim of foul, to report to the referee what he saw of the incident. Such inspectors are merely assistants to the referee, to whom they must report, and have no power to make any decision.

RULEV

The Judges at the Finish.

Must determine the order of finishing of contestants and must arrange among themselves as to noting the winner, second, third fourth, etc., as the case may require, and there must always be two judges whose duty it must be to choose the winner. Their decision in this respect must be without appeal, and, in case of a disagreement, a majority must govern.

RULE VI.

The Field Judges.

Must make an accurate measurement and keep a tally of all trials of competitors in the high and broad jumps, the pole vaults and the weight competitions.

They must act as judges in these events, and their decisions must likewise be without appeal. In case of disagreement, a majority must govern. There must be at least three judges for every event.

RULE VII.

The Timekeepers

Must be three in number and must individually time all events where time record is called for. At the conclusion of each heat, each time-keeper must present his watch to the referee for inspection, and he must decide the official time. Should two of the three watches mark the same time and the third disagree, the time marked by said two watches must be accepted. Should all three disagree, the time marked by the intermediate watch must be accepted.

The flash of the pistol must denote the actual time of starting.

If, for any reason, only two watches are held on an event, and they fail to agree, the longer time of the two must be accepted.

RULE VIII.

The Starter

Must have sole jurisdiction over the competitor after the clerk of the course has properly placed them in their positions for the start.

The method of starting must be by pistol report, except that in time handicap races the word "go" must be used.

An actual start is not effected until the pistol has been purposely discharged after the competitors have been warned to get ready.

In case the pistol was not purposely discharged, the competitors shall be called back by the starter by pistol fire.

Note.—The starter must have at least two good cartridges in his pistol before starting a heat.

When any part of the person of a competitor touches the ground in front of his mark before the signal is given, it must be considered a false start. Penalties for false starting must be inflicted by the starter, as follows: In all races to and including 125 yards, the competitor must be put back one yard for the first and another yard for the second attempt; in races over 125 yards and including 300 yards, two yards for the first and two more for the second attempt; in races over 300 yards and including 600 yards, three yards for the first and three more for the second attempt; in races over 600 yards and including 1,000 yards four yards for the first and four more for the second attempt; in races over 1,000 yards and including one mile, five yards for the first and five more for the second attempt; in all races over one mile, ten yards for the first and ten more for the second attempt.

In all cases, the third false start must prevent his competing in that event.

The starter must rule out of that event any competitor who attempts to advance himself from his mark, as prescribed in the official program, after he has given the warning to "get ready."

RULE IX.

The Clerk of Course

Must be provided with the names and the numbers of all entered competitors, and he must notify them to appear at the starting line before the start in each event in which they are entered.

RULE X.

The Scorer

Must record the order in which each competitor finishes his event together with the time furnished by the referee.

He must keep a tally of the laps made by each competitor in races covering more than one lap, and must announce, by means of a bell or otherwise, when the leading man enters the last lap.

He must draw up a list of the actual competitors in each event, which shall be filed with the papers of the association and shall be the official record of competing entrants, and shall be final evidence in the enforcement of Rule III, of the rules of eligibility.

He must control his assistants and assign to them such of his duties as he may deem proper.

RULE XI.

The Marshal

Must have police charge of the enclosure and must prevent any but officials and actual competitors from entering or remaining therein. He must control his assistants and assign to them their duties.

RULE XII.

The Official Announcer

Must receive from the scorer and field judges the result of each event, and announce the same by voice or by means of a bulletin board.

RULE XIII.

Competitors

Must report to the clerk of the course immediately upon their arrival at the place of meeting, and must be provided by that official with their proper numbers, which must be worn conspicuously by the competitors when competing, and without which they must not be allowed to start.

Each competitor must inform himself of the time or starting, and must be promptly at the starting point of each competition in which he is entered, and there report to the clerk of the course.

Under no condition shall attendants be allowed to accompany competitors at the start or during any competition.

RULE XIV.

Track Measurement.

All distances run or walked must be measured upon a line eighteen inches outward from the inner edge of the track, except that in races on straightaway tracks the distance must be measured in a direct line from the starting mark to the finishing line.

RULE XV.

The Course.

Each competitor must keep in his respective position from start to finish in all races on straightaway tracks, and in all races on tracks with one or more turns he must not cross to the inner edge of the track, except when he is at least six feet in advance of his nearest competitor. After turning the last corner into the straight in any race, each competitor must run a straight course to the finish line, and must not cross to either the outside or inside from such straight course.

In all races of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have a separate course marked out and measured, whether races are run straightaway or with turns.

The referee must disqualify from that event any competitor who

wilfully pushes against, impedes, crosses the course of, or in any way interferes with another competitor.

The referee must disqualify from further participation in the Meet any contestant competing to lose, to coach, or in any way impede the chances of another competitor, either in a trial or final contest.

RULE XVI.

The Finish

Of the course must be represented by a line between two finishing posts, drawn across and at right angles to the sides of the track, and three feet above which line must be placed a tape attached at either end to the finishing posts. A finish must be counted when any part of the winner's body, except his hands or arms, touches the tape at the finishing line. The tape must be considered the finishing line for the winner, but their order of finishing across the track line must determine the position of the other competitors.

RULE XVII.

Hurdles.

In the 120 yards hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle to be three feet six inches high. They must be placed ten yards apart, with the first hurdle fifteen yards distant from the starting point, and the last hurdle fifteen yards before the finishing line.

In the 220 yards hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle to be two feet six inches high. They must be placed twenty yards apart, with the first hurdle twenty yards distant from the starting mark, and the last hurdle twenty yards before the finishing line.

In making a record, it must be necessary for the competitor to jump every hurdle in its proper position.

In all hurdles race of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have a separate course and hurdles marked out and measured, whether races are run straightaway or with turns.

RULE XVIII.

Jumping.

Section 1. A fair jump must be one that is made without the assistance of weights, diving, somersaults, or handsprings of any kind.

In scratch events competitors must jump in order as placed on the program.

Sec. 2. The running high jump. The field judges must decide the

height at which the jump shall commence and must regulate the succeeding elevations.

Each competitor must be allowed three trial jumps at each height, and if on the third trial he shall fail, he must be declared out of the competition.

Competitors must jump in order, as provided in Sec. 1; then, those failing, if any, must have their second trial jump in a like order, after which those having failed twice must make their third trial -jump.

The jump must be made over a bar resting on pins projecting not more then three inches from the uprights, and when this bar is removed from its place by the competitor when trying, it must be counted as a trial jump.

Running under the bar in making an attempt to jump must be counted as a "balk," and three successive "balks" must be counted as a trial jump.

The distance of the run before the jump must be unlimited. A competitor may decline to jump at any height in his turn, and by so doing forfeits his rights to again jump at the height declined.

Sec. 4. The running broad jump. When jumped on earth, a joist five inches wide must be sunk flush with it. The outer edges of this joist must be called the scratch line, and the measurement of all jumps must be made from it, at right angles, to the nearest break in the ground made by any part of the person of the competitor.

In front of the scratch line the ground must be removed to the depth of three and the width of twelve inches outward.

A foul jump must be one where the competitor, in jumping off the scratch line, makes a mark on the ground immediately in front of it. or runs over the line without jumping, and must count as a trial jump without results.

Each competitor must have three trial jumps, and the best three must each have three more trial jumps.

The competition must be decided by the best of all the trial jumps of the competitors.

The distance of the run before the scratch line must be unlimited. Sec. 5.. The pole vault. Pole must be furnished by the managing committee, but contestants may use their own private poles if they so desire, and no contestant shall be allowed to use any of these private poles, except by the consent of their owners. The poles must be unlimited as to size and weight, but must have no assisting devices, except that they may be wrapped or covered with any substance (to obtain a firmer grasp), and must have but one prong at the end.

No competitor shall, during his vault, raise the hand which was uppermost when he left the ground to a higher point of the pole, nor shall he raise the hand which was undermost when he left the ground to any point on the pole above the other hand.

The rules governing the running high jump must also govern the pole vault for height, except that when the man leaves the ground in an attempt, it shall be counted a trial.

RULE XIX.

Putting the Shot.

The shot must be a solid sphere, made of metal and must weigh twelve pounds.

It must be put with one hand, and in making the attempt, it must be above, and not behind, the shoulder.

The competitor must stand in a circle seven feet in diameter. The circumference of the circle must be divided into halves by a line drawn through it. On four feet of the front half of the circumference a board four inches high must be placed, the edge of which must be equally distant from the intersection of the line with the circumference and at which the competitor must stand when the shot leaves his hand.

A fair put shall be one where no part of the person of the competitor touches in front of the circle, or on the board, in making the attempt.

A put must be counted as foul if the competitor steps over the front half of the circle or on the board. A competitor must leave the circle by the rear half. Leaving by the front half must be declared a foul.

The measurement of all puts must be made from the nearest mark by the shot to a point on the circumference of the circle, on a line with the object mark and the center of the circle.

Foul puts and letting go the shot in making an attempt must be counted as trial puts without results.

A board similar to the one in front may be used at the back of the circle.

The order of competing and number of trials shall be the same as for the running broad jump. Shots must be furnished by the managing committee. Any contestant may use his private shot, if correct in weight and shape; in which case the other contestants must also be allowed use it if they wish,

RULE XX.

Throwing the Hammer.

The head and handle may be of any size, shape, and material, provided that the length of the complete implement must not be more than four feet and its weight not less than twelve pounds.

All throws shall be made from a circle seven feet in diameter, and this circle shall be considered as divided into halves by a line drawn through its center at right angles to the direction of the throw.

A fair throw must be one where no part of the person of the competitor shall touch outside or on the circle in making the attempt.

Foul throws and letting go of the hammer in an attempt must count as trial throws.

The measurement of all throws must be made from the nearest mark made by the head of the hammer to a point on the circumference of the circle, on a line with the object mark and the center of the circle.

The order of competing and the number of trials must be the same as for the running broad jump. Hammers must be furnished by the managing committee. Any contestant may use his private hammer, if correct in weight and length, and no contestant shall be allowed to use private hammers except by consent of the owners.

RULE XXI.

Throwing the Discus.

The discus shall be made of smooth, hardwood body, without finger holes, weighted in center with lead discs and capped with polished brass discs, with steel ring on the outside. The weight of the discus shall be four and one-half pounds; outside diameter, eight inches; thickness in center, two inches.

All throws shall be made from a seven foot circle, with four foot lapboards and similar in all respects to the circle for putting the shot. In making his throws, a competitor may assume any position he chooses. Foul throws and letting go of the discus in attempts shall count as trials without result. A fair throw shall be one in which no part of the person of the competitor touches the ground outside the front half of the circle, and the competitor leaves the circle by its rear half. A throw shall be foul if any part of the person touches the ground outside the front half of the circle before the throw is measured.

The order of competing and number of trials shall be the same as for the running broad jump.

A discus shall be furnished by the managing committee. Any con-

testant may use his private discus, if correct in weight and shape; in which case the other contestants must also be allowed to use it, if they wish.

The Measurement of each throw shall be made from the nearest mark made by the fall of the discus to the circumference of the circle, on a line from a mark made by the discus to the center of the circle.

TIES.

In case of a tie in a scratch contest at high jumping, the tieing competitors shall have three additional trials at the height last tried, and if still undecided, the bar shall be lowered to the height next below, and three trials taken at that height. If no one clears it, the bar shall be lowered again and again until one of the competitors clears it. In case of a second tie, the award shall be given to the competitor who cleared the bar with the least number of trials.

In case of a tie in the pole vault the officials shall raise or lower the bar at their discretion, and those competitors who have tied shall be allowed one trial at each height.

In case of a tie in a scratch contest at any game decided by distance each of the tying competitors shall have three additional trials, and the award shall be made in accordance with the distances cleared in these additional trials. In case of a second tie three more trials shall be allowed, and so on, until a decision is reached. In case of a dead heat in any track event, the competitors shall not be allowed to divide the prize or points, or to toss for them, but must compete again at a time and place appointed by the referee.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting

The meeting was called to order by Predident Ramsey.

The treasurer's report was read by Treasurer L. N. Hines from the Fifth Annual Handbook. The report of the Permanent Secretary, J. T. Giles, was also made from the handbook.

The Association then proceeded to the adoption of the following amendments to the constitution:

1. Academies with commissioned high school standing shall be eligible to membership in the Association and wherever the word "high school" appears in this constitution, it shall be understood to apply equally to these academies.

It is a violation of the constitution for the schools in the Association to play non-high school teams including high school boys, unless the latter are certified as eligible by the principal of the high school

to which they belong.

- 3. Each school of the Association shall report to the Permanent Secretary a list of pupils representing that school in athletic contests during the year. Each school is asked to report also the kind of treatment accorded them to, from and on the field, while the guest of another school.
- 4. No pupil shall be allowed the opportunity to taking part in high school athletics for more than four school years or eight semesters, nor shall he have the opportunity of taking part in any form of athletics for more than four seasons. Post graduates are not eligible, but pupils graduating from regular three-year courses shall not be deemed post graduates.

5. The number of interscholastic foot ball games played by any team in one season is limited to six.

6. Paid coaches, other than those regularly employed as teachers by the trustees of the school, are prohibited. By paid coach is meant any person who received directly or indirectly remuneration of any kind, money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any high school athletic team.

7. The Basket Ball rules as published in Spaulding's official basket ball rule book, shall be the official rules governing all contests between members of the I. H. S. A. A. However, the rule governing the selection of the officials in the above rules shall be void, and un-

less otherwise agreed by mutual consent, each school shall furnish one official and these officials shall alternate their duties, each acting as referee and each acting as umpire one-half.

The Association then took up the election of officers, as follows:

Principal E. E. Ramsey, of Bloomington, having served on the Board but one year, was re-elected to succeed himself as a member of the Board of Control for three years.

There being no further business, the Association adjourned.

DECISIONS OF THE BOARD.

December 29, 1908.

A dispute over a foot ball game between Galveston and Swayzee was referred to the board for settlement. After hearing the evidence in the case the Board rendered the following decision:

 Both schools are censured for failure to keep contract and allowing student management.

2. Officials censured for laxity in applying penalties.

3. Copeland, a Galveston player, declared ineligible under Rule 2 of the Constitution.

4. Galveston censured for failure to control crowd at the games.

5. Galveston suspended until September 1, 1909, for violation of Rule 2, p. 2, of the Constitution.

6. The Board recommended no contests between the two schools during 1909.

May 15, 1909.

In the case of an appeal from Crown Point in regard to a basket ball game between Crown Point and Hammond, in which Hammond withdrew from the game at the end of the first half, claiming that the hall was not suitable for basket ball, the Board decided that

1. The contest should be called a game and awarded t Crown Point by forfeit.

Whenever games are started by mutual consent on irregular floors, they will be counted as games by the Board in all protests. May 15, 1909.

On this date the Attica High School was suspended from the Association for the remainder of the school year on her own admission of having played a high school team not belonging to the Association.

May 15, 1909.

The Board ruled that unless further instructed, they would enforce the rule limiting the number of foot ball games to six between high schools in the Association and other high schools, no matter where located.

May 22, 1909.

In the case of Rockville vs. Brazil, the point at issue was in regard to the final score in a basket ball game between the two schools.

Owing to conflicting evidence, the Board was unable to give a definite decision, but arrived at the following conclusions:

 The referee was wrong in deciding that 40 ½ minutes of play should constitute a regular game.

2. That both time keepers were inefficient, in that they did not go out on the floor and notify the referee of the expiration of the time of play.

3. Both score keepers were inefficient in that their scores did not agree.

May 22, 1909.

Board decided to accept the invitation of Wabash College to hold the State Meet of 1910 under their auspices at Crawfordsville.

November 4, 1909.

In reply to a question from Principal Brady of Wabash, the Board ruled that a member of the Wabash football team who had played football on Sunday as a member of another team was ineligible to play on a high school team for the remainder of the football season.

November 6, 1909.

In the case of Lafayette vs. Attica the Board ruled that Baker of Attica had played football four seasons previous to the present season and was therefore ineligible to play this year. The game in which he participated was awarded to Lafayette.

The Board accepted the bid of the Teachers Journal Printing Co. Marion, Ind., to print the Handbook.

Interpretation of Rule 4.

A pupil withdrawing permanently from school within the first twenty school days of the semester shall not be regarded as having an opportunity to engage in athletics that semester unless he has already played in one or more interscholastic games, in which case he shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

The Board of Control decided to eliminate the hammer throw from the events of the Interscholastic Meet.




