





MANUAL PROPERTY AND ADDRESS OF THE PARTY OF

The Indiana High School Athletic Association is now in its twelfth year. Organized under the able leadership of J. T. Giles and other school men interested in a higher standard of athletics between high schools, it has during all these years served its purpose well. Its ideal has not always been attained but it has worked faithfully for the betterment of high school athletic standards and has acomplished much.

Higher standards of scholarship for athletic competition have been set and maintained. The requirement that a student must have passed in fifteen hours the preceding semester and must be passing in fifteen hours the current semester is low enough and any attempt to lower this would be a step backward and an encouragement to boys to delay their school work in order to compete in athletics. Professionalism should not be tolerated under any guise. The present standards encourage boys to stay in school and pass in their work. A premium has been put on manliness. The true sportsman has been encouraged and the "sport" discouraged.

More competent officials are now demanded and another step forward would be more stringent rules regarding the recommending of officials. Fair and impartial officials should be secured for

all contests. The day of "our" referee is passing.

The Principals have been made more strictly responsible for the treatment of visiting teams in their towns. The "win at any cost" spirit has been discouraged in favor of the spirit of true sportsmanship.

Football has been properly discouraged and the number of teams playing it is now comparatively few. Smoking among high school boys has been discouraged and our State Tournaments have time and again proved that the boys who win are the ones who

train properly throughout the entire year.

The present year has undoubtedly been the greatest in the history of the Association. The membership has now reached the unprecedented number of three hundred. There has been less litigation this year than ever before. The spirit of wanting to do the square thing has been manifest in the main. Student management has caused some dissension and should not be tolerated by any school management. The regular form of contracts should always be used to avoid misunderstandings.

Basketball and Track have become the major sports of the high schools. Some of the schools are playing basketball from October to March inclusive. Baseball, while popular in some schools between league teams has not proved a financial success between schools. The season is also often unsuitable for this game.

Many high schools have developed athletic leagues which have proved very successful. Some schools of two hundred and fifty have as many as one hundred students actively participating on league teams. This movement should be encouraged in every possible way. It is proper to have the school teams as the crowning part of the system but the league teams should receive a large amount of attention and be regularly coached so that not five but one hundred boys may learn the athletic sport and receive physical training and have self control developed. The gymnasium is an essential part of every school plant and should be so considered.

The high standards applied to athletics in the high schools should

also be applied to debating and oratorical contests.

Both the Track Meet held under the auspices of Wabash College and the Basketball Tournament held under the auspices of Indiana University were very successful. Much credit is due both schools for the able way in which they managed the events. Washington High School won the State Track and Field Meet. The Basketball Tournament was the greatest in the history of the State. Seventy-seven teams competed; five hundred twenty-five players were entertained by Indiana University. The schedule was well arranged, eight teams playing at a time and the Tournament was in every way a success. Wingate was the winner for the second consecutive year.

All the High Schools of the State should stand together for clean athletics and the highest possible standard. The best way to do

this is to join the Association and live up to its rules.

THIRD ANNUAL BASKET BALL BALL TOURNAMENT ANNOUNCEMENT

In accordance with the vote of the Association at its annual meeting, December 22 the Board of Control has made provision for a Championship Basket Ball Tournament, and announces the plan.

Invitation—An invitation from the University of Indiana to hold the tournament at Bloomington under the auspices of the University, Friday and Saturday, March 13 and 14, was accepted. If found necessary, on account of the number of entries, to play some games on Thursday, March 12, the teams desired to appear will be notified by telegram by Monday, March 9. Entries for the tournament will close Wednesday, March 4, and all schools desiring to participate in the contests must hold membership in the Association before that date.

Open Contest—The tournament is open to all schools of the Association, irrespective of their season's record.

Entertainment—Teams are limited to seven men, and no more men should be certified to. The societies of the University agree to entertain eight men—which must include the faculty manager—from each competing school. Entertainment is offered from 6 p. m. March 12 to 8 a. m. March 15. In case it is found necessary to play some games on Thursday, entertainment for the teams notified will begin at 10 a. m. Thursday, March 12.

Expenses—Traveling is at the expense of the competing schools. An entrance fee of \$3.50 for each team must accompany the entry lists, the full amount returnable to the principal whose team actually participates in the meet.

Protests—All protests against members of the Association or against individuals in the teams must be made in writing and filed with the permanent secretary on or before March 7, at 11 a. m.

Privileges—All competing teams and faculty managers are admitted to all games free of charge.

Eligibility—The eligibility of each player must be certified to by the principal of the school sending the team. Certificates must be on the regular blanks provided by the permanent secretary, and all data must be given as indicated.

Prizes—Indiana University will award the winning school a shield or similar trophy, and each member of its team an individual

trophy.

Management—The management of the tournament rests solely with the Board of Control, which may delegate local arrangements to the University managers. The officials will be selected by the Board, and none but disinterested men will be chosen.

A schedule indicating teams, hours, floors and officials, will be arranged by the Board Saturday, March 7, and all competing schols will be furnished with detailed instructions early in the tournament week.



THIRD ANNUAL BASKET BALL TOURNAMENT

Of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, Indiana University, Bloomington, March 13-14, 1914.

Teams must be on designated floors as scheduled, under penalty of forfeiture of game.

Eight complimentary tickets will be issued to each faculty manager, admitting to all games. Managers should call for these at the Bursar's office in Maxwell Hall from 8 to 10 p. m. Thursday.

The Bursar's office in Maxwell Hall will be the Information

Bureau. Phone number 564.

All managers must wire R. S. Peyton, of Bloomington, the time of arrival in Bloomington upon receipt of this notice.

Season tickets will be 50 cents. Single admission to each session

will be 25 cents.

Entertainment is offered from 6 p. m. Thursday, March 12 to 8 a. m. Sunday, March 15. These hours must be observed.

Traveling expenses are to be paid by the competing schools.

Teams are limited to seven men and must be in charge of a Faculty manager, who is responsible for the men and their conduct.

No changes will be made in the schedule, and no substitution of

players will be permitted.

The official entry list will be in the hands of the Board of Control at all times.

Friday games and the final game shall consist of two halves of 15 minutes each, with a rest of ten minutes between the halves.

All other games 10 minute halves.

Special train service has been arranged by the Pennsylvania and Monon Railroads both ways between Indianapolis and Bloomington. Train will leave Indianapolis at 5:30 p. m. Thursday, March 12 over the Pennsylvania and will leave Bloomington at 8 a. m. Sunday, March 15 over the Monon. At time of purchasing ticket have routing from Indianapolis read via Pennsylvania to Gosport and Monon to Bloomington. Same routing in reverse order for return trip. Teams going on the Special from Indianapolis Thursday should lunch in Indianapolis. The Special will arrive at 7:30 p. m. Wire A. L. Trester now if you are going on the Special.

Dr. A. E. Guedel will be head referee, assisted by Merle Abbett, Bert Westover, James Kase and Maurice Judd. Their decisions will be final. Where two officials are assigned, the first one is the ref-

eree, second the umpire.

Players will be subject to identification at any time. The official entry blanks contain the names of the eligible players.

WINGATE DEFEATS ANDERSON WINNING STATE CHAMPIONSHIP; SCORE 36 TO 8

1913 Champs Take Fast Game—Final Game Very Fast and Well Played Throughout—Winner Hailed as Champion of Biggest Tournament in History.

President Stump Presents the Handsome Trophies to the Victorious State Champions.

WINGATE, 36; ANDERSON, 8.

Playing in true championship form Wingate, 1913 champions, defeated Anderson last night in the final game of the tournament by a score of 36 to 8. The boys from Wingate took the title again for 1914 in one of the most lop-sided games of the tourney. They started as fresh as if it were their first game and never slowed down.

At the end of the first half the score stood 23 to 3 in favor of Wingate. The stellar work of the champion guards kept the ball in Wingate's teritory most of the time. Anderson was badly corked at the end of the first period while the champions were getting stronger.

Stonebreaker, Olin, and Graves did the most of the work for Wingate. Stonebreaker threw goals from all angles. The work of the Anderson guards was the only redeeming feature of the run-

Albert Stump, President-elect of the Indiana Union, made the

presentation speech to the winning team. It follows:

"The Basket Ball Tournament, which closed but a few minutes ago, was highly successful. The team that won was not the only one that benefitted by the tournament. Every team entered realized a great deal of good from the contest; the fact that they witnessed the other contests was worth while to them. It gives every man a fine example of the staying qualities that proper training

gives. You members of the winning leam, the team that overcame all your opponents, realize now the value of good habits, clean

lives and staying within the rules of the game.

People have to pay for everything that comes to them. The self restraint exercised by keeping in training, the sacrifice necessary if real effort is to come when needed, every detail must be cared for; you won because you paid. In Indiana High Schools you stand supreme, as far as basket ball and proper training are concerned. Your winning was but a small part of the victory. You won because you were big enough to control yourselves, and that is worth for more than the State Championship. Yet without it the championship would never have been yours.

WHAT IT MEANS.

To the majority of our readers the State Basket Ball Tournament justifies its existence and repays all the expenses of time and trained effort through the game itself. This is reason enough to the students and to part at least of the faculty men. But to those who are at least partly opposed to interscholastic contests of this nature, we wish to point out the following things of value which we see in the holding of a state tournament, exclusive of the play itself.

First—It increases local pride and loyalty. One who visited the telegraph office yesterday can testify to the number of messages

sent telling how the "home town" was coming.

Second—It creates a closer relationship between the university and the high schools, a relationship between the vitals of both—the students. We believe that a close relationship between the students of the high schools and their "big brothers" in the University means more to both, and so to the University itself, than any extension program yet devised.

Third—That it affords an opportunity for the high school students to meet their "rivals" of today—their fellow citizens tomor-

row; that it helps to break down the curse of provincialism.

HISTORY OF STATE INTERSCHOLASTIC BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

With the final contest tonight the fourth high school Basket Ball Tournament under the auspices of the Boosters' Club came to an end. This year's tournament with 77 high schools participating was by far the largest and most successful of all. Last year 37

teams took part and in 1911 and 1912 the number was limited to teams which had won in elimination contests in districts in the state.

Both last year and this year the tournament was open to any high school in the state which is a member of the Indiana High School Athletic Association and the popularity of the tournament is readily seen when the number of schools participating is noticed.

First Tournament 1911.

The first tournament, which was held in March, 1911, was solely under the auspices of the Booster's Club of Indiana University. The I. H. S. A. A. would not take the tournament under its charge but gave its consent to the Indiana organization to invite the schools here. The Booster's Club had elimination contests in the thirteen congressional districts of the state and the winners came to Bloomington for the final tournament to decide the state championship. After teams from New Albany, Rochester, Walton, Anderson, Blufton and several other places had been eliminated, the final contest was fought out between the quintets from Crawfordsville and Lebanon. The boys from the former city were victorious by the score of 24 to 17.

The All-State team for 1911 follows: Forwards, Porter, Lebanon; Stevenson, Crawfordsville; Center, Myers, Crawfordsville; guards, Berry, Lebanon, Shaw, Crawfordsville. Members of this team have made good in basket ball after completing their high school careers. Berry is a star at Purdue and Shaw has been starring at Bradley Polytechnic in Peoria, Illinois. Myers made good at Wabash and Dick Porter at forward starred on the local freshman team this season. Other players that year who did not make the All-State team are Bishop of Walton, who was a member of Purdue's varsity this year, and Hill of Crawfordsville, who played at Wabash.

High School Association in Charge.


In 1912 the Indiana High School Athletic Association took charge of the tournament but was assisted by the Booster's Club. The state was divided into four large sections each of which was subdivided into a number of smaller districts. The high schools arranged their schedule so that they would play most of their games in their district. A week before the tournament at Bloomington the four large district tournaments were held. At Indianapolis Franklin won out over Clinton, Richmond and Oaklandon. Orleans won from Bicknell and Evansville at Vincennes, while Lebanon and Whiting won the contests in the middle north and north districts.

In the final tournament at Bloomington Lebanon won from Or-

leans 28 to 13, Franklin defeated Whiting 29 to 21, and Lebanon romped away with the final game from Franklin by a score of 5 to 11. Lebanon easily had the best balanced team this year and four men were given places on the All-State team. Following is the Student's All-State team for 1912: Forwards, Porter, Lebanon; Pruitt, Franklin; center, Dale, Lebanon; guards, Sicks and Goodwin, Lebanon. The work of Porter and Dale of Lebanon, was far superior to that of any men on the floor. In the game against Franklin each made 11 field goals. From the All-State team of 1912 two players entered Indiana University, one went to Purdue and one to Wabash. Porter was mentioned in the team of 1911. Sicks, the other player to come to I. U. was making good in freshman basket ball here until compelled to quit on account of illness. Goodwin was captain of the Purdue yearling team this year, while Dale starred on the Wabash five.

Open Tournament-1913.

In 1913 the tournament was thrown open to all high schools of the state and 37 teams responded. Wingate, the state champions, went unnoticed until almost the last of the tournament. They defeated Whiting 24 to 12 in the first game, defeated Rochester next in an exciting overtime game which resulted in a 19 to 17 score and capped the climax by winning from the aggregation from South Bend in another extra-time game by a score of 15 to 14. The Wingate quintet was one of the huskiest teams entered and the height, aggressiveness, and pluck of its members alone won the tournament. South Bend's team had more finish and smoothness than the other teams.

A wealth of All-State material was found in the large number of teams competing in the 1913 tournament and a first and second team as picked from a list of players suggested by officials, managers and coaches by the Student follows: Forwards, Dale Lebanon; Fagin, Lafayette; center, Hake, Gary; guards, Bacon, South Bend, Shaw, Crawfordsville. The second team was: Forwards, Kirby, South Bend; Clements, Crawfordsville; center, Stonebreaker, Win-

gate; guards, Townsley, Gary, and Vaughn, Lafayette.

Individual Watch Fobs.

As a reward for winning the championship of the state the Booster's Club at its first tournament presented each member of the winning team with a small silver loving cup. The second year a custom was started which has been carried out since that time. It is that of presenting the team with a large banner and the members with handsome watch fobs.

The Booster's Club has had hard tasks to perform in making its tournaments successful and cannot be given too much credit. The cooperation of the students and citizens of Bloomington was necessary and nearly every student did what he could to make the affair go. In giving rooms for the housing of visitors the townspec-

ple did their part.

From a tournament of thirteen schools competing and another with only four teams engaging in the games at Bloomington, to a tournament with 37 and then one of 77 teams, the magnitude of the affair has greatly increased. The teams for the first two tournaments were cared for without much trouble, last year's required much work, and this year—look at some of the members of the Booster's Club and judge for yourself.

ARTICLES OF CONTRACT

The following articles of agreement are subscribed to by the Indiana High School Athletic Association Board of Control through A. L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, and Mr. U. H. Smith, representing the University of Indiana:

SECTION I.

The date of the Indiana High School Basket Ball Tournament shall be Friday and Saturday, March 13 and 14, 1914, at Bloomington, Indiana, on University of Indiana floors. If found necessary on March 7, some games will be played on Thursday, March 12.

SECTION II.

The High School Board of Control through A. L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, shall furnish the University representative with lists of qualified teams and the names of the men on the respective teams on or before Saturday, March 7, 1914.

SECTION III.

The University representative shall provide free entertainment for the respective teams of eight men, which shall include one Faculty manager for each team, between the hours of 6 p. m. Thursday, March 12, and Sunday, 9 a. m., March 15. If found necessary to play some games on Thursday, March 12, entertainment will be provided for the teams participating, from 10 a. m., Thursday, March 12, to 9 a. m. Sunday, March 15.

SECTION IV.

The University representative shall provide tickets, gate men, ushers, announcers, scorers, timekeepers, basket balls, and all necessary equipment for the games. He shall further provide a suitable trophy for the school winning the tournament, and individual trophies for the men on the winning team.

SECTION V.

The matter of complimentary tickets shall be in the hands of the University representative, who shall issue them to the representatives of the Press, the University officials, and to the helping students. All men of the competing teams, one rubber and one Faculty manager for each team, are to be admitted free to the Tournament. The members of the Board of Control and the Permanent Secretary shall be furnished with official badges.

SECTION VI.

The High School Board of Control shall provide officials for all games, not included under Section IV.

SECTION VII.

The admission fee to all tourney games shall be twenty-five (25) cents for single game tickets, and fifty (50) cents for season tickets.

SECTION VIII.

The University representative shall turn over the proceeds of the tournament to Treasurer E. W. Montgomery of the High School Board of Control at the close of the Tourney. After all expenses incurred on account of the Tourney have been paid and one hundred (100) Dollars is set aside for the I. H. S. A. A., the remainder shall be divided on a basis of 75% to the University and 25% to the I. H. S. A. A. In case one hundred (100) dollars does not remain after all expenses have been paid, the I. H. S. A. A. shall keep all of the remainder.

ELEVENTH ANNUAL TRACK AND FIELD MEET.

ANNOUNCEMENT

The Eleventh Annual Track and Field Meet of the Indiana High School Athletic Association will be held at Wabash College, Crawfordsville, May 16, 1914, in the afternoon. Entries for the Meet will close May 6, and all schools desiring to participate in the Meet must become members of the Association before that time.

ELIGIBILITY

Every contestant in this Meet must have previously made in a fair test a record equal to the following in every event in which he is entered:

100 Yard Dash	11 s.
220 Yard Dash	
440 Yard Dash	58 s.
Half Mile Run	
Mile Run	5 min. 15 s.
120 Yard High Hurdles	19 s.
220 Yard Low Hurdles	29 s.
Running High Jump	5 ft.
Running Broad Jump	19 ft.
Pole Vault	8 ft. 9 in
Putting Shot (12 lb.)	
Throwing Discus	90 ft.

The above, together with a mile relay, will constitute the events of the Meet. Winning first place in any event counts five points; second place, three points; and third place, 1 point. Points in the relay will not be counted in determining the winning team. In case of a tie in any event the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

The order of events is as follows:

Track Events—100-yard dash trial; 120-yard hurdle trial; 100-yard dash final; one mile run; 440-yard run; 120-yard hurdle final; 220-yard dash trial; 220-yard hurdle trial; 880-yard run; 220-yard dash final; 220-yard hurdle final; relay.

Field Events-Discus; running high jump; shot put; pole vault; running broad jump.

ENTRIES

The entries in each event are limited to three, and the contestants in each to two from any school; except in the relay race, in which entries will be limited to six, and the number placed in competition to four, each running one-fourth mile.

All schools, in order to enter the contests of the State Meet, will be required to certify that all athletic contests in which they have taken part since becoming members of the Association have been conducted in accordance with the rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, and that all their contestants in such contests

have been qualified according to the rules.

Principals will be required to certify in writing that the contestants from their respective schools have all qualified in every event in which they are entered in the State Meet. Each Principal must fill out entry blanks with the names of the contestants from his school, and all required data, and send to A. L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, on or before May 6, 1914. These requirements must be strictly complied with. Special blanks for this purpose will be furnished to all members of the Association.

PROTESTS

All protests and complaints against members of the Association for violation of the rules must be made in writing and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before May 6. Protests as to the eligibility of individual contestants under the constitution are to be decided by the Board of Control, and may be filed with the Sectary at any time.

MANAGEMENT

The management of this Meet rests solely with the Board of Control. The selection of officials to be appointed by the Board, has been delegated to the athletic management of Wabash College. The referee and starter are to be chosen from A. A. U., in order that records made at the Meet may be recognized by that body. The board will arrange a program, assigning places on the track by lot, and the printed programs will indicate the order in which the men will be called to the track. The rules governing the Meet correspond to those of the Western Inter-Collegiate Amateur Athletic Association, except where these have been modified by the Board of Control. These rules, as adopted by the Board, are printed in the I. H. S. A. A. Hand Book of Athletics and Annual Report of the Board of Control. Copies may be had of the Permanent Secretary for 10c each, postpaid.

PRIZES

No prizes will be awarded except a cup to the winning team, a pennant to the winning relay team, and badges for point winners. Admission, 50 cents. Contestants, one rubber, and the faculty manager from each school will be admitted free.

ENTERTAINMENT

Wabash College will furnish free board and rooms to all of the

contestants, one rubber and one faculty manager of each team, from 6:00 p. m., Friday, May 15, to 8:00 a. m., Sunday, May 17. All teams must be accompanied by a Faculty Manager.

FEES

A fee of fifty cents for each contestant must accompany the entries. This fee will be returned to the Principal of the school for all entries who actually participate in the Meet. Traveling is at the expense of the competing schools.

NOTE—Do not forget that all entries close May 6, and must be made on Special Blanks for this purpose, accompanied by the entry

fee.





REPORT OF THE MEET.

The Eleventh Annual Track and Field Meet held by the State Board of Control under the auspices of Wabash College, Crawfordsville, was a success in every way. There were 42 schools represented and the points were divided among 22 of these schools thus showing that the competition was close and the meet exciting. The representatives of Wabash College and the City of Crawfordsville deserve congratulations for the treatment of the visitors. The Press gave the following reports of the Meet:

(The Crawfordsville Review.)

WASHINGTON WINNER OF BIG MEET

Three Thousand People in Attendance—Crawfordsville Is Close Second.

Before three thousand people the Eleventh Annual Track Meet of the High Schools of Indiana was held at Ingalls Field Saturday, Washington High School nosing out the local High by one-half of of a point. The points were well distributed among the competing schools, 22 of the entrants scoring markers. The rooting of the schools from Manual, Shortridge, and the local school was one of the features of the afternoon. Each of the three schools had bands, which furnished music for the crowd.

The Meet was held under the auspices of Wabash College and Manager Eller and his corps of assistants had charge of the event. The ideal weather that prevailed caused the field to be crowded to its limited capacity.

Old Star Referee.

The job of referee and starter was well taken care of by J. D. Lightbody, now of Chicago, but formerly an old DePauw star. He was unbeatable in the quarter mile run, and after leaving DePauw he went to the University of Chicago where he starred on the cinder path. He was a winner in the Olympic games.

By entertaining the athletes Saturday Wabash College will get many of the star men to enter the local institution next year. It is known that several of the star men have signed up for the entrance next fall. This will boost the Scarlet's chances in all branches of athletics.

It was a great crowd of mighty fine young people that attended

the state track meeting of Indiana High Schools in this city Saturday. They swarmed in upon us from all quarters of the state. It was an orderly crowd of youngsters. Aside from the school spirit shown by several of the larger organizations in the way of rooting there was little to confuse even the older inhabitants and the day passed pleasantly and profitably to all concerned. While there was a larger crowd than was expected, it conclusively proved that Crawfordsville is an ideal place for just such an event, and it is hoped that all will come again.

Notes of the Meet.

The rooting rivalry of the Manual, Shortridge and Crawfords-

ville schools was one of the features of the afternoon.

After the two Indianapolis schools had made a great impression on the citizens of this community in the morning the Crawfordsville high school proceeded to "show up" the visitors in the afternoon. The "peerade" started from the high school building, three hundred strong at twelve-thirty, and marched to Main street, then down Washington to Wabash then to the campus. The newly uniformed high school band made quite a "hit" with the visitors.

OUTSIDER WINS STATE TRACK

MEET BY CLOSE MARGIN

Half Point Is Washington's Margin of Victory Over Local High School.

THE LOCAL ATHLETES WIN EIGHTEEN POINTS

Three Firsts and a Second Go to Crawfordsville—Cottingham Is Star—Meet Successful.

Through the efforts of their distance runners and hurdlers, the track team of Washington High School, a "dark horse" in the dope sheet, nosed out Crawfordsville's team in the state high school track meet which was held on Ingalls field Saturday afternoon, and got away with the first honors with but half a point to spare. For the local school, which was a strong favorite, McAlevy won the low hurdles, Wisehart captured first in the discus throw and Eagleson took the broad jump. These victories, with Nicholson's second in the half mile event, netted eighteen points for the Athenians and gave them second place by a good margin.

Prominent in the victory of Washington were Umbles and Ballau, two negro athletes. Ballau took the half mile, and Umbles was returned winner in the mile. Other points for the winning team were made in the high hurdles, the low hurdles, and the high jump. Umbles' third in the mile gave the down-staters one point, Ingraham and Allen took second and third in the high hurdles, Lett was second in low hurdles and Kiefer and Allen got one-fourth of a point for their team by being two of the eight men who tied for third in the high jump.

Cottingham Is Individual Star.

Through the efforts of Cottingham, who was the Indvidual star of the meet, Noblesville tied with Bloomfield for third place. Entering in many events and showing up well in all of them, Cottingham once more demonstrated the fact that he is one of the most promising young athletes in the state. In the pole vault he tied with Mittank of Fairmount for first and second, he took second in both 100-yard dash and the broad jump, and in the 440-yard dash was tied with Newlin of Shortridge for second and third place.

Two Records Are Broken.

Saturday's contests were featured by the breaking of two state high school records. In the 440, Sims of Bloomfield negotiated the distance in 53 3-5 seconds, cutting four-fifths of a second from the record previously held by Zimmer of Bloomington. Newlin of Shortridge and Cottingham of Noblesville also finished under the old record, as they were but a step behind the winner. Jeffries of North Salem set a record in the shot put that will stand for some time, when he hurled the weight 45 feet, 9 inches. Feltzer of Bluffton also exceeded the former record in taking second place. He made a put of 44 feet, 8½ inches, while the old record, hung up by Morrison of Fairmont Academy, was 44 feet, 2 inches.

Foul Defeated Crawfordsville.

Washington's victory over Crawfordsville may be accounted for by an unintentional foul made by Slaughter of Shortridge in the half mile event. The Indianapolis runner finished third in the race, but in doing so crossed in front of a runner as he was coming into the stretch. For this he was disqualified and Umbles of Washington was awarded third place. Nicholson ran a great race in the half, finishing close behind Ballau, who concluded his effort with a fairly strong sprint.

McAlevy Good in Hurdles.

After winning his trial heat with ease and taking the semi-final in the event without trouble, McAlevy showed speed in the final of the low hurdles that brought a riot of cheering from the Crawfordsville stands. Displaying almost perfect form, he took the lead

from the start and finished with a sprint that landed him the first

place by a safe margin.

While he did not equal his practice records, Wisehart had little trouble winning the discus throw for the local school by hurling the weight 105 feet, 4 inches. That performance did not show his true ability, but was sufficient to land five points for the blue and gold.

Broad Jump Last Event.

The last points scored for Crawfordsville were landed by Eagleson in the running broad jump, which was the final event. The local athlete made a leap of 20 feet, 1½ inches, bringing the Crawfordsville score from thirteen to within half a point of Washington's count.

Much Interest in the Relay.

Although the relay did not count in the scoring there was much interest in the event, and when Manual, whose track athletes had not figured much in the scoring, took the distance event, the many rooters who accompanied the Indianapolis runners to the meet went wild with enthusiasm. The mile was run in the time of 3:47, which is considerably slower than the record, but the race was a pretty one at all stages. Behind Manual came the Evansville runner, and the negroes from Washington again got into the limelight when their team finished a good third. Shortridge's team, second until the last lap, failed to place at the finish.

Town Filled With Visitors.

Cloudless skies and warm weather were big factors in the success of the meet, both from the standpoints of athletes and spectators. Under perfect conditions the high school runners and jumpers were able to put forth their best efforts, and the record breaking crowd that witnessed the day could not have asked for better weather.

All day Saturday the town was thronged with visitors. Every regular train deposited its share of people, and specials helped in the work of bringing the crowd to the big meet. Manual and Short-ridge had the biggest delegations and before the meet they put on parades that were riots of color and of noise.

Much Rooting at the Meet.

One of the features of the meet was the rooting of the Indianapolis students and those from the local high school. Occupying special sections near the center of the stands, they kept up a constant uproar of songs and yells. Each school had a band that kept things going when the vocal chords of the rooters tired. Despite the riv-

alry excellent spirit was displayed and throughout the afternoon there was generous exchanging of yells.

Everyone Was Cared For.

Manager Eller and the other men who had the meet under their direction left nothing undone. Hundreds of athletes and other visitors had to be cared for, but the Wabash students and citizens of Crawfordsville responded to the demands made upon them, and everyone was entertained royally. Members of the entertainment committee met trains all day Friday and Saturday, and from their headquarters at the Y. M. C. A. sent the visitors to the homes of the fraternities and other organizations to which they were assigned. Mr. Eller, Professor Haines of the faculty athletic committee, and members of the student committees in charge of the meet received numerous congratulations on the manner in which they handled the event.

Lightbody Was Starter.

J. D. Lightbody, the famous Olympic runner, proved to be an efficient official in the capacity of referee and starter.





Alexandria, Indiana, March 30, 1914.

ARTICLES OF CONTRACT

The following Articles of Agreement are subscribed to by the Indiana High School Athletic Association Board of Control through A. L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, and D. D. Hains, representing Wabash College.

Section I.

The date of the Indiana High School Track and Field Meet shall be Saturday P. M., May 16, 1914, at Crawfordsville, Indiana, on the Wabash College track and field.

Section II.

The High School Board of Control through A. L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, shall furnish D. D. Hains with a list of qualified leams, and the names of the men on the respective teams, on or before Monday, May 11, 1914.

Section III.

Wabash College shall provide free entertainment for the respective teams, including one rubber and one Faculty Manager for each team, between the hours of 6 p. m. Friday, May 15, and 8 a. m. Sunday, May 17.

Section IV.

The Wabash College representative shall provide tickets, gatemen, announcers, scorers, timekeepers, judges, officials, and all necessary equipment for the Meet. He shall further provide a suitable cup for the school winning the Meet, and a pennant for the winning relay team, and badges for point winners.

Section V.

The matter of complimentary tickets shall be in the hands of the College representative, who shall issue them to the representatives of the Press, the College officials, and to the helping students. All men of the competing teams, one rubber and one Faculty Manager for each team are to be admitted free to the Meet. The members of the Board of Control and the Permanent Secretary shall be furnished with official badges.

Section VI.

The High School Board of Control shall sanction the choice of Referee and Starter.

Section VII.

The admission fee shall be fifty (50) cents to all.

Section VIII.

The Wabash College representative, D. D. Hains, shall pay one hundred (100) dollars to Treasurer C. V. Haworth of the High School Board of Control at the close of the Meet.

Minutes of the Meetings of the Board of Control-December

1, 1913 to January 1, 1915.

ELEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING

Minutes

The eleventh annual meeting of the Indiana High School Athletic Association was called to order by President C. V. Haworth at 4 p. m., December 22, 1913, in the House of Representatives, State House, Indianapolis.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting and reports of the Permanent Secretary and Treasurer was dispensed with, due to the fact that the minutes and reports are printed in the 1913

Hand Book, copies of which all members had received.

The representative of each school was furnished with a badge, bearing the letters I. H. S. A. A., and only those wearing badges were permitted to vote.

A resolution to have all officers of the I. H. S. A. A. chosen from

Principals of High Schools, was tabled by a vote of 54 to 33.

A. L. Trester of Alexandria and Principal Rittenger of Laporte were the only nominations for the position of Permanent Secretary. The vote stood 71 for Mr. Trester and 34 for Mr. Rittenger.

J. H. Shock of Lafayette was unanimously chosen a member of the Board of Control to succeed himself, he having completed the term of A. L. Trester, who had filled the position of Permanent Secretary since March 15, due to the resignation of I. E. Neff.

An amendment was proposed to permit High School students to play on Sunday School teams. This was lost by a vote of 38 to 50.

Amendments proposing the following things were tabled:

1. To bar from the State Tourney all schools who do not participate in inter-scholastic games.

2. To prohibit the giving of awards to members of High School

teams, the value of which is more than \$1.00.

3. To change the word "written" to "verbal" in Rule 13 of the Constitution.

The following amendment was passed by a vote of 66 to 11.

"Pupils meeting requirements for graduation in three and onehalf years in High Schools with regular four year course, shall be eligible to participate in school athletics the last half of the fourth year, provided they meet all other eligibility rules of the I. H. S. A. A."

The following amendments were passed almost unanimously:
(a) Beginning with the year 1914, and every year thereafter, the fiscal year of the Indiana High School Athletic Association shall

close on December 31.

(b) Beginning with the year 1915, and every year thereafter, the annual membership fee will be due on January 1. Provided: That all membership dues paid for the year 1913-14 shall hold good until December 31, 1914.

It shall be the duty of the Permanent Secretary to publish the I. H. S. A. A. Year Book immediately following the annual meeting of the Association.

The Association voted to have an open Basket Ball Tournament, the Board of Control to have full charge of all details concerning

place, time, officials, etc.

It was the concensus of opinion of the members present that the smoking of High School players should be controlled by the local authorities.

There being no further business before the Association, the meet-

ing then adjourned.

Superintendent Holton, Principal Edwards and Robert Markley of Shelbyville, Principal Williams and Mr. Wegener of Franklin were present and gave evidence in the case. After due considera-tion Robert Markley of Shelbyville was suspended from participation in athletics during the present Basket Ball season on account of his attitude and conduct during a game of Basket Ball at Franklin on January 23.

MILROY VS. ARLINGTON

It was claimed by Milroy that an Arlington boy had made himself ineligible by having gone to a game of basket ball with an independent team and having donned a suit in order to evade paying the admission fee. No proof was submitted that the boy had played independent ball, so the incident was dropped.

The selection and hiring of the following officials for the State Basket Ball Tourney by the Permanent Secretary was sanctioned: Head Referee, Dr. A. E. Guedel, \$50 and expenses; Bert Westover,

Merle Abbett and Professor Kase, \$3.00 per game.

The Albion-Cromwell and the Decker-Winslow controversies were postponed at the reuest of all parties concerned.

The Board adjourned to meet at the Severin Hotel, Indianapolis, at 11:00 a. m., March 7.

Pine Village was denied entry to the Tourney because they had not paid their membership dues and had not been members of the I. H.

Principal Buck appeared before the Board in behalf of George Jarvis and Allan Boyd of Shortridge High School. Allan Boyd was declared ineligible being a nine semester man. George Jarvis was declared eligible having been enrolled but four Basket Ball seasons.

ton both ways.

The matter of the State Track and Field Meet was considered but

final arrangements were deferred until later.


DECKER VS. WINSLOW

The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was not done because all the doings of the Association for the year are included in the Hand Book, copies of which are distributed to all members of the Association.

Principal Denny of Anderson was unanimously elected a mem-

ber of the Board of Control for three years beginning January 1, 1915, to fill the vacancy caused by the retirement of Principal E. W. Montgomery of Bedford.

The following amendment to the Constitution was adopted after

considerable discussion:

"Any pupil who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days from September 1 to December 1 of the same year for each of four se-

mesters, will be ineligible to play a fifth semester.

"Any pupil who has been enrolled for a period of twenty (20) or more days from December 1 to March 1 of the next year for each of four semesters shall be eligible to play a fifth semester, provided, he meets the requirements of the other eligibility rules; provided, further, that no pupil shall represent his school longer than four years.

"Any pupil who has been enrolled for a period of twenty (20) or more days from March 1 to June 1 of the same year for each of four semesters shall be ineligible to play baseball a fifth semester. "All other rules in conflict with this amendment are hereby re-

pealed."

The members present voted to hold sectional Basket Ball Tournaments on March 5 and 6, and a final Tournament at Bloomington on March 13 and 14. The Board of Control was given the responsibility and authority to conduct all of these tourneys.

The subject of importation of players by High Schools was discussed and the meeting was very much opposed to such standards in athletics. Full power to punish schools found guilty along this

line was given to the Board of Control.

The question of holding a Base Ball Tourney next spring was

discussed briefly and voted down almost unanimously.

Announcement was made of the acceptance by the Board of Control of the invitation of the Indianapolis High Schools to hold the next State Track and Field Meet under their auspices at Indianapolis. The announcement was received favorably by the members present.

The meeting adjourned.

The Board decided to secure two officials for each Tourney and after several names were recommended authority was given the Permanent Secretary to secure these men at once, paying them twenty-five (25) dollars each for their work.

Culver Military Academy was denied admission into the I. H. S. A. A. because the scholastic standing and gradation of its students is hard to determine for eligibility purposes in the I. H. S. A. A.

Decatur Township, Marion County, was denied membership as one school because there are two High Schools in the Township. The printing of the Annual Hand Book was secured by the Koko-

mo Printing Co., the lowest bidder.

DECISIONS

CLAYTON VS. FILLMORE AND MONROVIA

Filmore and Monrovia High Schools were suspended until April 1, 1915, for playing an Independent team from Clayton on which were High School boys not certified to by their Principal. All members of the Clayton High School who played on this Independent team without certification were decleared ineligible until April 1, 1915.

BREMEN VS. PLYMOUTH

The case was one concerning the awarding of a point in a Basket Ball game. The score was a tie as the game was played and scored. The Board decided to let it remain a tie game.

Mentone High School was suspended until April 1, 1915, for playing on its team boys not belonging to this High School.

PORTLAND VS. DECATUR

The case was one concerning the keeping of time in Basket Ball game. Decatur won the game and the Board declares Decatur the winner.

The Board adjourned to meet in the Severin Hotel, Indianapolis, at 2:30 p. m., Monday, December 28.

Matters relative to the Basket Ball Tourneys were considered and the Permanent Secretary was instructed to send out return post cards asking concerning the desires of those schools who did not answer a former request.

The Terre Haute-Linton controversy was deferred to a later

meeting because of conflicting data.

The rule governing the eligibility of Basket Balt players was interpreted to apply only to students entering during the second semester of the school year, and enrollment in school rather than participation in athletics shall determine the eligibility of all students.

RULES OF THE I. H. S. A. A. REGARDING TRACK AND FIELD MEETS.

BASED ON THE RULES OF THE INTERCOLLEGIATE CONFERENCE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

RULE I.

Officials

Section 1. All meetings must be under the direction of The Board of Control.

One referee.

Two or more inspectors. Three or more field judges. Three judges at finish.

Three or more timekeepers.

One starter.

One clerk of the course,

One scorer. One marshal

Sec. 2. If deemed necessary, assistants may be provided for the clerk of the course, the scorer and the marshal, and an official announcer may be appointed.

RULE II.

The Board of Control

Shall have jurisdiction of all matters not assigned by these rules to the referee or other game officials.

RULE III. The Referee

Must decide all questions relating to the actual conduct of the Meet, whose final settlement is not otherwise covered by these rules, and shall have the power to add to or alter the announced arrangements of heats in any event. A referee has no authority, after heats have been drawn and published in a program, to transfer a contestant from one heat to another.

When in any but the final heat of a race a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to culpable carelessness, and shall also have power to allow the hindered competitor to start in the next round of heats, just as if he

had been placed in his trial.

When in a final heat a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to his carelessness or conduct, and he shall also have the power to order a new race between such of the competitors as he thinks entitled to such a privilege.

If during an athletic contest under the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. a competitor shall conduct himself in a manner unbecoming a gentleman or offensive to the officials, spectators or competitors, the referee shall have the power to disqualify him from further competition at the Meet; and if he thinks the offense worthy of additional punishment, must promptly make a detailed statement of the facts to the Board of Control.

Power to change the order of events as laid down in the official program is reserved to the Board of Control, which shall, through its chairman, exercise this authority, unless it sees fit to expressly

delegate this power to the referee.

The referee shall not have authority to disqualify any competitor for violation of the eligibility rule of the I. H. S. A. A. All protests as to eligibility made on the field must be referred to the Board of Control, and the protested competitor must be allowed to compete until disqualified by the arbitrator of the I. H. S. A. A.

RULE IV.

The Inspectors

It shall be the duty of the inspector to stand at such point as the referee may designate, to watch the competition closely, and, in case of claim of foul,, to report to the referee what he saw of the incident. Such inspectors are merely assistants to the referee, to whom they must report, and have no power to make any decision.

RULE V.

The Judges of the Finish

Must determine the order of finishing of contestants, and must arrange among themselves as to noting the winner, second, third and fourth, etc., as the case may require, and there must always be two judges, whose duty must be to choose the winner.

Their decision in this respect must be without appeal, and in

case of a disagreement a majority must govern.

RULE VI.

The Field Judges


Must make an accurate measurement and keep a tally of all trials of competitors in the high and broad jumps, the pole vaults, the weight competitions and the discus throws.

They must act as judges in these events, and their decisions must likewise be without appeal. In case of disagreement, a majority must govern. There must be at least three judges for every event.


RULE VII.

The Timekeepers

Must be three in number, and must individually time all events where time record is called for. At the conclusion of each heal, each timekeeper must present his watch to the referee for inspection, and he must decide the official time. Should two of the three watches mark the same time and the third disagree, the time marked

by said two watches must be accepted. Should all three disagree, the time marked by the intermediate watch must be accepted.

The flash of the pistol must denote the actual time of starting. If, for any reason, only two watches are held on any event, and they fail to agree, the longer time of the two must be accepted.

RULE VIII.

The Starter

Must have sole jurisdiction over the competitors after the clerk of the course has properly placed them in their position for the start. The method of starting must be by pistol report, except that in

time handicap races the word "go" must be used.

An actual start is not effected until the pistol has been purposely discharged after the competitors have been warned to get ready. In case the pistol was not purposely discharged, the competitors shall be called back by the starter by pistol fire.

Note-The starter must have at least two good cartridges in his

pistol before starting a heat.

When any part of the person of a competitor touches the ground in front of his mark before the signal is given, it must be consid-

ered a false start.

Penalties for false starting must be inflicted by the starter, as follows: In all races to and including 125 yards, the competitor must be put back one yard for the first and another yard for the second attempt; in races over 125 yards and including 300 yards, two yards for the first and two more for the second attempt; in races over 300 yards and including 600 yards, three yards for the first and three more for the second attempt; in races over 600 yards and including 1,000 yards, four yards for the first and four more for the second attempt; in races over 1,000 yards and including one mile, five yards for the first and five more for the second attempt; in all races over one mile, ten yards for the first attempt and ten more for the second attempt.

In all cases, the third false start must prevent his competing in

that event.

The starter must rule out of that event any competitor who attempts to advance himself from his mark, as prescribed in the official program, after he has been given the warning to "get ready."

RULE IX.

Clerk of the Course

Must be provided with the names and the numbers of all entered competitors, and he must notify them to appear at the starting line before the start in each event in which they are entered.

RULE X.

The Scorer

Must record the order in which each competitor finishes his event, together with the time furnished by the referee.

He must keep a tally of the laps made by each competitor in races covering more than one lap, and must announce, by means of a bell or otherwise, when the leading man enters the last lap.

He must draw up a list of the actual competitors in each event, which shall be filed with the papers of the Association, and shall be the official record of competing entrants, and shall be final evidence in the enforcement of Rule III, of the rules of eligibility.

He must control his assistants and assign to them such of his

duties as he may deem proper.

RULE XI

The Marshal

Must have police charge of the enclosure, and must prevent any but officers and actual competitors from entering or remaining therein. He must control his assistants and assign to them their duties.

RULE XII.

The Official Announcer

Must receive from the scorer and field judges the result of each event, and announce the same by voice or by means of a bulletin board.

RULE XIII.

Competitors

Must report to the Clerk of the Course immediately upon their arrival at the place of meeting, and must be provided by that official with their proper numbers, which must be worn conspicuously by the competitors when competing, and without which they must not be allowed to start.

Each competitor must inform himself of the time of starting, and must be promptly at the starting point of each competition in which he is entered, and there report to the Clerk of the Course.

Under no condition shall attendants be allowed to accompany

competitors at the start or during any competition.

RULE XIV.

Track Measurement

All distances run or walked must be measured upon a line eighteen inches outward from the inner edge of the track, except that in races on straightaway tracks the distance must be measured in a direct line from the starting mark to the finishing line.

RULE XV.

Each competitor must keep in his respective position from start to finish in all races on straightaway tracks, and in all races on tracks with one or more turns he must not cross to the inner edge of the track, except when he is at least six feet in advance of his nearest competitor. After turning the last corner into the straight in any race, each competitor must run a straight course to the

finish line, and must not cross to either the outside or inside from such straight course in front of his opponents.

In all races of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have a separate course marked out and measured, whether races are run straightaway or with turns.

The referee must disqualify from that event any competitor who willfully pushes against, impedes, crosses the course of, or in any

way interferes with another competitor.

The referee must disqualify from further participation in the Meet any contestant competing to lose, to coach, or in any way impede the chances of another competitor, either in a trial or a final contest.

RULE XVI. The Finish

Of the course must be represented by a line between two finishing posts, drawn across and at right angles to the sides of the track, and four feet above which line must be stretched a tape, attached at either end to the finishing posts. A finish must be counted when any part of the winner's body, except his hands or arms, touches the tape at the finishing line. The tape must be considered the finishing line for the winners, but their order of finishing across the track line must determine the position of the other competitors.

RULE XVII.

Hurdles

In the 120 yards hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle to be three feet six inches high. They must be placed ten yards apart, with the first hurdle fifteen yards distant from the starting point, and the last hurdle fifteen yards before the finishing line.

In the 220 yard hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle to be two feet six inches high. They must be placed twenty yards apart, with the first hurdle twenty yards distant from the starting mark, and the last hurdle twenty yards before the finishing line.

In making a record it must be necessary for the competitor to

jump every hurdle in its proper position.

In all hurdle races of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have separate hurdles and a separate course marked out and measured, whether races are run straight away or with turns.

A competitor knocking down three or more hurdles, or any portion of three or more hurdles, in any race shall be disqualified.

RULE XVIII.

Jumping

Section 1. A fair jump must be one that is made without the assistance of weights, diving, somersaults, or handsprings of any kind.

In scratch events competitors must jump in order as placed on

program.

Sec. 2. The running high jump.—The field judges must decide the height at which the jump shall commence, and must regulate the succeeding elevations.

Each competitor must be allowed three trial jumps at each height, and if on the third trial he shall fail, he must be declared out of the

competition.

Competitors must jump in order, as provided in Section 1; then those failing, if any, must have their second trial jump in a like order, after which those who have failed twice must make their third trial jump.

The jump must be made over a bar resting on pins projecting not more than three inches from the uprights, and when this bar is removed from its place by the competitor when trying, it must

be counted as a trial jump.

Running under the bar in making an attempt to jump must be counted as a "balk," and three successive "balks" must be counted as a trial jump.

The distance of the run before the jump must be unlimited. A competitor may decline to jump at any height in his turn, and by so doing forfeits his rights to again jump at the height declined.

Sec. 4. The running broad jump.—When jumped on earth, a joist five inches wide must be sunk flush with it. The outer edges of this joist must be called the scratch line, and the measurement of all jumps must be made from it, at right angles, to the nearest break in the ground made by any part of the person of the competitor.

In front of the scratch line the ground must be removed to the

depth of three and the width of twelve inches outward.

A foul jump must be one where the competitor, in jumping off the scratch line, makes a mark on the ground immediately in front of it, or runs over the line without jumping, and must count as a trial jump without results.

Each competitor must have three trial jumps, and the best three

must have three more trial jumps.

The competition must be decided by the best of all the jumps of the competitors.

The distance of the run before the scratch line must be unlimited. Sec. 5. The pole vault.—A pole must be furnished by the managing committee, but contestants may use their own private poles if they so desire, and no contestant shall be allowed to use any of these private poles except by the consent of their owners. The poles must be unlimited as to size and weight, but must have no assisting devices, except that they may be wrapped or covered with any substance (to obtain a firmer grip), and may have one prong at the end.

No competitor shall, during his vault, raise the hand which was uppermost when he left the ground to a higher point of the pole,

nor shall he raise the hand which was undermost when he left the

ground to any point on the pole above the other hand.

The rules governing the running high jump must also govern the pole vault for height, except when the man leaves the ground in an attempt it shall be counted a trial.

RULE XIX.

Putting the Shot

The shot must be a solid sphere, made of metal, and must weigh twelve pounds.

It must be put with one hand, and in making the attempt it must

be above, and not behind, the shoulder.

The competitor must stand in a circle seven feet in diameter. The circumference of the circle must be divided into halves by a line drawn through the center of the circle. On four feet of the front half of the circumference a board four inches high must be placed, the edge of which must be equally distant from the intersection of the line with the circumference, and at which the competitor must stand when the shot leaves his hand.

A fair put shall be one where no part of the person of the competitor touches in front of the circle, or on the board, in making

the attempt.

A put must be counted as a foul if the competitor steps outside the circle or on the board. A competitor must leave the circle by the rear half. Leaving by the front half must be declared a foul.

The measurement of all puts must be made from the nearest mark by the shot to a point on the circumference of the circle on a line with the object mark and the center of the circle.

Foul puts and letting go to the shot in making an attempt must

be counted as trial puts without results.

A board similar to the one in front may be used at the back of

the circle.

The order of competing and the number of trials shall be the same as for the running broad jump. Shots must be furnished by the managing committee. Any contestant may use his own private shot, if correct in weight and shape; in which case the other contestants must be allowed to use it if they wish.

RULE XX.

Throwing the Discus

The discus shall be made of smooth hardwood body, without finger holes, weighted in the center with lead discs and capped with polished brass discs, with steel ring on the outside. The weight of the discus shall be four and one-half pounds; outside diameter,

eight inches; thickness in center, two inches.

All throws must be made from a seven-foot circle, with fourfoot lapboards, and similar in all respects to the circle for putting the shot. In making his throws, a competitor may assume any position he chooses. Foul throws and letting go of the discus in attempts shall count as trials without result. A fair throw shall be one in which no part of the person of the competitor touches the ground outside the front half of the circle, and the competitor leaving the circle by its rear half. A throw shall be foul if any part of the person touches the ground outside of the front half of the circle before the throw is measured.

The order of competing and number of trials shall be the same

as for the running broad jump.

A discus shall be furnished by the managing committee.

RULE XXI.

Ties

In case of a tie in any event, the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

RULE XXII.

Relay Racing

1. A line must be drawn twenty feet in front of each starting line. Between these two lines each runner must touch the succeeding runner. Failure to do this disqualifies the team in that event. The judges must see that all touches are properly made.

2. The same rule with reference to fouls, coaching or impeding a runner in any way, apply to relay racing as to other events.

3. No member of a relay team can run back of the line, nor can one man run two relays in any team.

4. The positions of the team must be drawn for.

CONSTITUTION OF THE I. H. S. A. A.

(Revised January 1, 1915)

ADMINISTRATION

Officers:

Section 1. A Board of Control, composed of three members (principals, members of the faculty or superintendents) shall be elected by the Association December 29, 1903, as follows: One for one year, one for two years and one for three years, the chairman each year to be the one whose term expires at the end of that year. Thereafter each member of the Board shall be elected for three years. This election is to take place at the annual meeting of the Indiana State Teachers' Association. In case of vacancy, the remaining members of the Board may appoint a person to fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting of the Association.

Sec. 2. On and after the adoption of this amendment every newly elected member of the Board of Control shall assume the duties of his office on the first day of January, next following.

Sec. 3. No retiring member of the Board of Control, having served three years shall be eligible for re-election for a period of one year after date of retirement.

Sec. 4. The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties: (a) It shall have general control over all athletic con-

tests between secondary schools in this Association; (b) It shall have exclusive control of the annual Inter-scholarastic Meet; (c) It shall give interpretations of the rules of the Association; (d) It shall determine forfeitures under Sec. 11; (e) The Board of Control, at the end of any athletic season may, at its discretion, issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standing of teams. No school which has violated the rules of the Association in regard to the qualifications of players shall be awarded special honors in

that particular branch of athletics.

Sec. 5. (a) When charges are made in writing by a member of the Association against another member for violation of the rules of the Association, the Board of Control, after giving due notice of the place and time for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges, and may suspend the offending school for a period of not exceeding one year. (b) The Board of Control shall decide upon all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants in the Inter-scholastic Meet. (c) When any matter comes before the Board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representalive, the remaining members shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.

Sec. 6. At the annual meeting of 1906 a Permanent Secretary shall be elected, who shall have charge of the property and records of the Association; shall receive all money for dues and the sale of publications of the Association; shall issue all circulars authorized by the Board of Control; shall attend meetings of the Board when requested to do so by the Board; shall turn over to the Treasurer of the Board all moneys in his possession when called upon to do so; shall perform such other duties as the growth of the Association as determined by the Board may require; and shall receive as compensation the sum of \$50 annually, and such allowance for expenses as the Board may approve. Vacancies in the office may be declared by the Board for cause, and a successor appointed by the

Board to act until the next annual meeting.

It shall be the duty of the Permanent Secretary to publish the I. H. S. A. A. year book immediately following the annual meeting

of the Association. Local Management

Sec. 7. The Principal or his authorized representatives shall ac-

company his team to all contests.

Sec. 8. The principal of the school, or high school teachers authorized by him, shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.

Sec. 9. No games shall be played without the sanction of the principal.

Sec. 10. The eligibility of all the contestants shall be certified to by the principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be presented in writing within ten days before any contest. In case of disputes the principal must furnish the Board of Control the following data in regard to each contestant: The date of last enrollment; the number of years he has been a member of a secondary school athletic team; date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the last preceding term in school; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term or semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be denied championship honors, and may be excluded from the annual Interscholastic meet.

Sec. 11. The principal has power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would

not represent his school in a becoming manner.

Sec. 12. It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, provide a forfeit of \$10, to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeitures be stipulated and not be paid during the same season, the Board of Control, after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the Association. Notification of such expulsion shall be published in the papers, with cause therefor.

Sec. 13. Paid Coaches, other than those regularly employed as teachers by the trustees of the school, are prohibited. By paid coach is meant any person who receives, directly or indirectly, remuneration of any kind, money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any high

school athletic team.

Sec. 14. Each school in the Association shall report to the Permanent Secretary a list of pupils representing the school in athletic contests during the year. Each school is asked to report also the kind of treatment accorded them to, from and on the field, while guests of another school.

Officials:

Sec. 15. On and after January 1, 1910, all the Major Officials in all athletic contests participated in by teams connected with schools in the I. H. S. A. A. shall be regularly licensed teachers in the public schools of Indiana or shall be persons whose names have been furnished and approved by the Board of Control. It is recommended that these officials shall be disinterested, and it is required that when a school demands disinterested officials at the time of scheduling the game, such officials shall be furnished. The Board shall drop from its list of approved officials any person who is palpably unfair and biased in his decision in games.

Sec. 16. Non-playing student officials or assistants shall conform

to the same rules as the players.
Membership:

Sec. 17. Membership in this Association shall be limited to public High Schools of the state, and each school shall have one vote. The annual dues shall be \$1.50, payable when the school becomes a member, and thereafter by January 1 of each year, in advance.


Academies with commissioned high school standing shall be eligible to membership in the Association, and wherever the word

"high school" appears in this Constitution it shall be understood to

apply equally to these academies.

Beginning with the year 1914, and every year thereafter, the fiscal year of the Indiana High School Athletic Association shall close on December 31st.

Games and Game Rules:

Sec. 18. No games shall be played with high schools of this state not belonging to the Association.

This rule does not prevent a member of the Association from playing high school teams outside of the state, nor from playing

non-high school teams within the state, except as follows:

It is a violation of the Constitution for schools in the Association to play non-high school teams including high school boys, unless the latter are certified as eligible by the Principal of the school to which they belong.

Sec. 19. The games recognized by the I. H. S. A. A. shall be: Foot Ball, Rugby Foot Ball, Soccer, Basket Ball, Track Work and Base Ball. Further, all forms of inter-school athletic games shall be subject to the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

Sec. 20. The number of interscholastic foot ball games played

by any team in one season is limited to six.

Sec. 21. In all foot ball contests held under these rules, the length of each half shall be twenty-five minutes, unless changed by mutual consent.

Sec. 22. The basket ball rules as published in Spalding's Official Basket Ball rule book, shall be the official rules governing all contests between members of the I. H. S. A. A. However, the rule governing the selection of officials in the above rules shall be void, and unless otherwise agreed by mutual consent, each school shall furnish one official, and these officials shall alternate their duties, each acting as referee and each acting as umpire one half.

RULES

Eligibility

Rule 1. To represent a school in any interscholastic contest, a person must be under twenty-one years of age; must have entered some public high school within the first twenty school days of the semester in which the contest occurs, and must be an amateur as defined by the A. A. U. Eighth grade pupils are not eligible. A semester is one-half of a school year.

(The term "Amateur" is defined and explained in Spalding's "Official Handbook of the Inter-Collegiate Association of Amateur

Athletes of America for 1914.):

Rule 2. Any pupil who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days from September 1 to December 1 of same year for each of four semesters will be ineligible to play football a fifth semester.

"Any pupil who has been enrolled for a period of twenty (20) or more days from December 1 to March 1 of the next year for each of four semesters shall be eligible to play a fifth semester, provided he meets the requirements of the other eligibility rules; provided further that no pupil shall represent his school longer than four

years."

Interpretation—This rule applies only to students entering school during the second semester of the school year, and enrollment in school rather than participation in athletics shall determine the eligibility of all students.

Any pupil who has been enrolled for a period of twenty (20) or more days from March 1 to June 1 of the same year for each of four semesters shall be ineligible to play base ball a fifth semester.

Interpretation—This section covers all branches of athletics. Rule 3. A pupil withdrawing permanently from school within the first twenty school days of the semester shall not be regarded as having an opportunity to engage in athletics that semester unless he has already played in one or more Interscholastic games, in which case he shall be regarded as having engaged in Athletics for that season.

Rule 4. Post Graduates are not eligible, but pupils graduating from regular three year courses shall not be deemed post graduates. Rule 5. A student is a post graduate of a school after he has completed the work required for graduation by that school, irre-

spective of the time of granting the diploma.

Rule 6. Pupils meeting requirements for graduation in three and one-half years in high schools with regular four year course shall be eligible to participate in school athletics the last half of the fourth year, provided they meet all other eligibility rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

Rule 7. Time spent in athletic sport by pupils while in grades below the high school shall not be counted as part of the four years. Rule 8. No person shall enter a contest under an assumed name. Rule 9. Any member of a high school athletic team who partic-

Rule 9. Any member of a high school athletic team who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules

for the remainder of that season.

An exception is hereby made for basket ball and basket ball players in those towns and cities whose schools have no gymnasium and whose students are forced by necessity to use a Y. M. C. A. or some other gymnasium for their practice games. It is a well known fact that the use of such gymnasium by high school students under such circumstances will likely require that such students play on the teams of the organizations maintaining such gymnasiums. No student, however, will be permitted to play on any other team than that representing the organization controlling the gymnasium, and no student will be allowed to play in the teams of the latter without the knowledge and consent of his principal.

Rule 10. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current semester, a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen regular high school recitations per week, exclusive of rhetoricals, physical culture, military drill and deportment; in his last preceding semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire term.

Pupils enrolled for the first time must comply with the requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

Back work may be made up, providing that it be done in accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes a matter of

final record before the next semester.

Interpretation—In each of the studies representing the minimum requirement of work specified above: (a) For the current semester the average of the monthly grades up to the time of certification must be passing; (b) for the current or school month the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing; (c) if the average of the monthly grades at the beginning of any month is below passing in any study, the pupil is ineligible so far as that study is concerned for the entire month.

Rule 11. No person who has been enrolled as a student in an institution of college standing, and has done work which may be counted toward a degree in that institution, shall be eligible as a member of any athletic team under I. H. S. A. A. rules in any game with any other team, either within or without the State of Indiana.

Rule 12. The eligibility rules of this Association shall apply to students taking part in all contests, whether with schools inside

or outside the State of Indiana.

Rule 13. On and after January 1, 1911, no student shall be eligible to play foot ball unless he has been examined by a regular physician and his physical condition has been pronounced satisfactory. Further, such student shall not be eligible until the physician's certificate has been filed with the Permanent Secretary of the Association. Said certificate shall be good from September 1 to December 1, only.

Rule 14. On and after January 1, 1911, no pupil shall be eligible to play foot ball without the written consent of his father, mother or guardian. Said written consent shall be attested by the Principal of Faculty Manager, and shall be filed with the Permanent Secretary of the Association. The copy of said written consent shall be attached to the physician's certificate when filed with the

Permanent Secretary.

INTERPRETATIONS

First. A game is any athletic contest where an admission fee is charged, or where any collection or contribution is received from spectators.

Second. The foot ball season is defined as beginning with the opening of school and closing with November 30.

Third. No student who violates the rules of the Association

will be reinstated by the Board.

Fourth. A pupil who has played in one or more interscholastic games in any season shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

Fifth. When a member or members of any team are protested,

the game should be played as scheduled and the protest filed with the Board for settlement later.

Sixth. By mutual consent of both teams, pupils over the age limit may be allowed to enter the contests under I. H. S. A. A. rules. Seventh. Pupils under twenty-one at the time of registration in school shall be so regarded until the time of their next registration.

Eighth. Any student, who carries at least 15 hours of regular

High School work, is a High School student.

Ninth. It is recommended that Principals take proper measures to control the crowd and the players in all contests. Failure to do so shall be considered sufficient grounds for expulsion from the Association.

NOTES

1. Parents' and Physician's certificates, contracts for all contests, eligibility certificates, blanks for certification of officials, and blanks for reporting contests will be furnished in quantities upon application to the Permanent Secretary. Please state definitely the kind and number of each wanted.

The Annual Hand Book will be sent upon receipt of ten cents.
 Copies of the Constitution will be furnished at fifty cents per

hundred.

4. All correspondence and remittances from members of the Association to the Board of Control or to the Permanent Secretary must be endorsed by the principal or a member of the faculty.


