





Address by Retiring President

GEO. H. REITZEL

TO THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

Traveling over the State of Indiana from East to West and North to South it would be difficult to find a High School of any importance that does not have membership with the Indiana High School Association. This organization is remarkable in that it represents a period of but sixteen years in which to have developed such a membership. The Association now has a membership of over five hundred (500) schools and it is still growing. This Association has the reputation of being the best and strongest organization of its kind in the United States and our handbook is now going into many other states for their guidance, but sometimes when we eare living in the vigor of full health we forget that evils are liable to creep in and then we may fail.

As a member of the Board of Control for the past three years I have observed and noted many conditions which members of the Board, only, experience and from these I beg to draw a few conclusions.

Any organization is just as strong as the individuals that compose the organization. In our organization we have a set of laws and interpretations by which we are to be guided and any Principal desiring to do the will of the Association can find all the information he desires in our Hand Book. If then not certain as to his action a two-cent stamp will secure the desired information from our Permanent Secretary. Furthermore, each Principal is aware that we have from time to time certain Athletic events that have a definite place on our calendar. These events require some special information from each Principal before his team can be allowed to compete, and we, as Principals, are prone to forget to furnish this data when in the rush of our school duty. This failure on our part is sure to bring down a torrent of criticism from our school and community and if we are not men of real sterling worth, we are liable to look for a loophole for escape. This particular Principal does not have to look long, for he immediately says he did not get necessary blanks for filling out information, and he blames the Permanent Secretary. This cry is

then taken up by the whole community and hundreds of telegrams are sent yearly to members of the Board to know why the Permanent Secretary will not allow their school to enter. Principals, if we wave half as anxious for the welfare of our school as we are for our own safety at this particular time, the school would never be short these reports. They can easily be filled from blank forms. What we need to do as Principals is to be big enough to shoulder the blame and charge it up to our neglect. Study the Hand Book and have a definite place for all material and blanks coming from the Permanent Secretary and these mistakes cannot occur.

Washington once said in discussing governmental affairs that we should be careful of any entangling alliances; and as that was true in regard to our government so might it be true in regard to our Indiana High School Athletic Association. We are a well organized, well governed body, some five hundred strong, directing and controlling the action of over forty thousand boys and girls and as such we should stand together. Twice, since I have been a member of the Board, deliberate attempts have been made by outside forces to take over our organization; and if we Principals are not careful, some morning we shall rub our eyes and sit up in amazement finding that we no longer control High School Athletics, but that some outside force has full sweep. We do not need to ally our force with any outside organization so that our boys and girls may have a broader field for competition, but we do need to stand shoulder to shoulder for those principles which we have in our organization.

Another need of our Association, as I see it, is to place our Permanent Secretary upon yearly salary, and in turn ask his undivided attention to the work of our organization. As we are now organized, the Permanent Secruetary must be a school man and as such he can give but a small portion of his time to the Association, and this must be at a sacrifice to his school work. The volume of work is increasing each year and has now reached the place where our old system will hardly suffice. If the present system is changed we should be careful to select a real man for the place, a man without fear or prejudice and as such he should be well paid. The salary could easily be met by increased dues, and by requiring more money from our state and sectional tourneys. This office should be made similar to the office of our State High School Inspector, and as such I believe some of our schools will be asked to clean house or else lose their commission in the High School Athletic Association.

Announcement of I. H. S. A. A. Sectional and Final Basketball Tourneys, 1919

THE EIGHTH ANNUAL

In accordance with the vote of the High School Principals, the Board of Control has completed the details for the State Championship Basket Ball Tourneys and announces the scheme in full.

SECTIONAL TOURNEYS MARCH 7 AND 8

The following basis were used in selecting centers:

(1) Location—geographical and with reference to schools desiring to participate. (2) Railways and interurban facilities. (3) General conditions—attitude of local authorities, floors, entertaining facilities, etc.

Schools have been assigned by counties with the intention of having about the same number in each Tourney. The following scheme gives the Centers and also the counties assigned to each center. The Board reserves the right to readjust the scheme if unforseen conditions make it advisable and necessary. The numbers indicate the schools from each county that have expressed their desire to enter at the present time.

Management—The management of these Tourneys rests solely with the Board of Control. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. Two officials for each Tourney will be selected by the Board and none but fair, disinterested and competent men will be chosen. All schedules of Hours, Floors, Teams and Officials will be made out and printed by the Board. These schedules will be made by lot and no changes will be made in them.

Open Contest—The Tourneys are open to all members of the Association, are spective of their season's record.

Protest—All protests against teams or individuals must be made in writing and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before February 28, at 11 a. m. Protests must be accompanied by evidence. Entertainment—Teams are limited to eight men, but ten men can be certified to. The Center Principals have contracted with the Board to entertain nine men (which must include the faculty manager) from each competing school. Entertainment will begin, if necessary, at 7 a. m. Friday, March 7, and continue, if necessary, to 8 a. m. Sunday, March 9. Printed schedules will be sent to each competing school in plenty of time to arrange for making the trip, etc. All competing schools are requested to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary.

Expenses—An entrance fee of one (1) dollar for each team must accompany the entry blank, which money will go into the treasury of the I. H. S. A. A. to defray expenses of the Tourneys incurred by the Board of Control. The Center Principals have contracted to pay transportation expenses of the competing schools according to the following conditions:

After all expenses, save those of transportation, have been paid a balance shall be ascertained. The first one hundred (100) dollars or part thereof in this balance shall belong to the Center Principal. If there is more than one hundred (100) dollars in the balance, the transportation expenses of the competing school shall be paid, or such part thereof as the balance prorated will give each school, the Tourney Center not sharing. Any balance after \$50 is paid to the l. H. S. A. A. yet remaining shall belong to the Center High School.

Privileges—All competing teams, one rubber, and one faculty manager from each team, are to be admitted free to all games.

Eligibility—The eligibility of each player must be certified to by the Principal of the school sending the team. Certificates must be be made on the regular blanks furnished by the Permanent Secretary, and all data must be given as indicated. Entries will close Thursday, February 27. This means that they must be in the hands of the Permanent Secretary complete in every detail on that date.

Admission Fee—The admission fee to all Tourney games shall be twenty-five (25) cents for single session tickets and one (1) dollar for season tickets and no more shall be received for said tickets. No more tickets shall be sold than the capacity of the house will justify.

Prize-No prizes of any kind are to be awarded to any school or individual.

Distribution of Tickets—An equitable distribution of tickets shall be made among the competing schools based on distance, enrollment in High School, and probable attendance from the competing schools. Any unfair methods or prices higher than those mentioned in this announcement should be reported to the Board of Control with evidence.

Warnings—Entries close Thursday, February 27, and cannot be changed afterwards. An entrance fee of \$1.00 must accompany each entry blank. Special privileges will not be granted to anyone. Send all entry blanks and money to A. L. Trester, LaPorte, Ind. All data must be given on entry blank.

Final Tourney, LaFayette, March 13, 14 and 15.

Entrants—The winning teams of the Sectional Tourneys shall constitute the participants in the final Tourney.

Entries—Teams are limited to eight men but ten men can be certified to. These teams may or may not be made up of the same men that participated in the Sectional Tourneys. Certificates must be made on the regular blanks furnished by the Permanent Secretary, and all data must be given as indicated. These are due in the hands of the Permanent Secretary on Tuesday, March 11, complete in every detail. One entry fee covers both Sectional and Final Tourneys.

Entertainment—Purdue University has contracted with the Board to entertain nine men (which MUST include the faculty manager) from each school. Entertainment will begin, if necessary, at 6 p. m. Thursday, March 13, and continue, if necessary, to 8 a. m. Sunday, March 16. All competing schools are requested to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary. Traveling will be partly or entirely at the expense of Purdue University according to the net receipts of the Tourney.

Admission Fee—The admission fee to all Tourney games shall be twenty-five (25) cents for single session tickets and one (1) dollar for season tickets.

Warnings—Entries are due Tuesday, March 11, and cannot be changed afterwards. Special privileges will not be granted to anyone. Send all entry blanks to A. L. Trester, LaPorte, Indiana. All data must be given. The management, protests and privileges will be governed according to the regulations pertaining to the Sectional Tourneys.

Prizes—Purdue University will award the winning school a shield or similar trophy, and each member of its team an individual trophy. A medal, known as the J. Gimbel Prize for mental attitude, will be given to the boy showing the best mental and moral qualities at the Tourney. No other prizes shall be awarded.

I. H. S. A. A. Basket Ball Tournament Contract

ARTICLES OF CONTRACT

SECTION I

The dates of the Indiana Sectional High School Basket Ball Tourneys shall be Friday and Saturday, March 7 and 8, 1919.

SECTION II

The State High School Board of Control, through A. L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, shall furnish the High School representative with lists of qualified teams and the names of the men on the respective teams, on or before Tuesday, March 4.

SECTION III

The High School representative shall provide free entertainment for the respective teams of nine men, which shall include one Faculty Manager for each team, between the hours of 7 a.m. Friday, March 7, and 8 a.m. Sunday, March 9. If possible this period of entertainment will be shortened by the Board of Control. All teams are entitled to entertainment throughout the tourney.

SECTION IV

The High School representative shall provide tickets, door-men, ushers, announcers, scorers, timekeepers, basket balls, and all necessary equipment for the games. No prizes whatever are to be given.

SECTION V

The matter of complimentary tickets shall be in the hands of the High School representative, who shall issue them to the Press, the officials, and to the helping students. All men of the competing teams, one rubber and one Faculty Manager for each team, are to be admitted free to the Tourney.

SECTION VI

The I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control shall select the officials for the games not included in Section IV.

SECTION VII

The admission fee to all Tourney games shall be twenty-five (25) cents for single admission tickets and one (1) dollar for season tickets.

SECTION VIII

The High School representative shall pay to each Referee at the close of his work the sum of thirty (30) dollars only. There will be two referees assigned to each Tourney.

SECTION IX

After all expenses, save those for travel of the competing teams, have been paid a balance shall be ascertained, and if such proves to be more than one hundred (100) dollars the transportation expenses of the competing schools shall be paid by the High School Representative. If the amount of the balance above one hundred (100) dollars is not sufficient to pay all of the transportation expenses, this amount shall be distributed pro rata among the competing schools, the Center school not sharing in this distribution. If the amount above one hundred (100) dollars is more than sufficient to pay all of transportation expenses, this amount shall be divided as follows: The first \$50.00 or part thereof shall go to the I. H. S. A. A. and the remainder shall belong to the High School representative. The one hundred (100) dollars referred to above shall belong to the High School holding the Tourney. The Board reserves the right to judge what expenses are legitimate.

SECTION X

The High School under whose auspices the Tourney is held promises hearty co-operation with the State Board of Control and the State Board of Control promises as much to the High School conducting the Tourney.

SECTION XI

The details of all Tourneys, such as protests, eligibility lists, schedules, etc., are to be cared for by the State Board of Control.

SECTION XII

The State Board of Control shall manage all Tourneys, and the High Schools are to work under this direction.

SECTION XIII

The High School representatives shall send by telegram the name of the winning school to A. L. Trester, LaPorte, Indiana, as soon as the Tournament is completed. The High School representative shall also send to A. L. Trester on or before Tuesday, March 11, the complete scores of all games. A complete and itemized statement of receipts and disbursements shall be sent on or before this date. Also a check calling for six (6) dollars to cover the printing of the schedules and fifty (50) dollars as called for in Section IX shall be sent upon this date.

SECTION II

agrees to officiate in such games as designated by the I. H. S. A. A. on the above dates. The I. H. S. A. A., through A. L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, agrees to pay_______for his services thirty (30) dollars and no more. The High School Principal holding the Tourney shall pay this amount to the official at the close of the Tourney.

SECTION III

of Control and the competing teams to make the Tourney fair in every way. The I. H. S. A. A. agrees to arrange a schedule of hours, teams, floors, officials, etc., and this schedule must not be changed by anyone save the I. H. S. A. A. Instructions for everyone will be on these schedules.

SECTION IV

The I. H. S. A. A. will designate the place to work, with the assurance now that it will be as near to the official's home as thought best for all concerned.

SECTION V

The I. H. S. A. A. will furnish two officials for each Tourney, who shall work in alternate games.

SECTION VI

The I. H. S. A. A. agrees to furnish the official full details on March 5 or sooner.

SECTION VII

Spaulding's official Basket Ball Rules for 1918-1919 shall govern all games. The rules are to be enforced rigidly and fairly, thus eliminating roughness and unclean playing at all times. Principals will be asked to report on the work of the officials.

SECTION VIII

This proposition must be signed by both parties and returned on or before______to be binding.

The official entry list will be in the hands of the Central Principal at all times and shall constitute final evidence in all cases. Players will be subject to identification at any time.


Teams are limited to eight men and must be in charge of Faculty Manager, who will be held responsible for the students and their conduct.

Spalding's Official Guide for 1918-19 shall govern. The halves shall be 15 minutes in all games.


The officials have been assigned by the Board and no changes will be made. Their decisions will be final.

ARTICLES OF CONTRACT

LaPorte, Indiana, January 3, 1918.

The following articles of Agreement are subscribed to by the Indiana High School Athletic Association, through A. L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, and O. F. Cutts, representing Purdue University.

SECTION I

The dates of the Indiana Basket Ball Tourney shall be March 13, 14 and 15, at Lafayette, Indiana, on the University floor.

SECTION II

The High School Board of Control, through A. L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, shall furnish O. F. Cutts with lists of qualified teams and the names of the men on the respective teams, on or before Wednesday, March 12.

SECTION III

O. F. Cutts shall provide free entertainment for the respective teams of eight men each, together with one rubber and one Faculty Manager for each team between the hours of 6 p. m. Thursday, March 13, and 6 a. m. Sunday, March 16. Purdue University, through O. F. Cutts, shall pay the traveling expenses of the competing teams or such part thereof as one-half of the net receipts will permit. By traveling expenses is meant reasonable mileage only. It may be necessary for two games to be played Thursday evening, March 13, and if so the entertainment of these teams will begin at 1 p. m. on that day.

SECTION IV

The Purdue University representative shall provide tickets, gate men, announcers, scorers, timekeepers and all necessary equipment for the Tourney. He shall further provide a suitable shield for the school winning the Tourney and badges for the individual members of the winning team. The standard design of the I. H. S. A. A. shall be used.

SECTION V

The matter of complimentary tickets shall be in the hands of the University representative, who shall issue them to the representatives of the Press, the University officials, and to the helping students. The men of the competing teams with one rubber and one Faculty Manager for each team, are to be admitted free to the Tourney. The members of the Board of Control and the Permanent Secretary shall be furnished with official badges and reserved seats.

SECTION VI

The High School Board of Control shall choose the officials other than those mentioned in Section IV.

SECTION VII

The admission fee shall be twenty-five (25) cents for single session tickets and one (\$1) dollar for season tickets.

SECTION VIII

The University representative, O. F. Cutts, shall pay to the Treasurer of the High School Board of Control, Ray Johnson, one-half of the net receipts at the close of the Tourney.


SECTION IX

THE THIRD ANNUAL

In accordance with the vote of the State Association at the last annual meeting, the Board of Control has completed the details for the State Sectional and Final Track and Field Meets. The scheme in full follows:

Eligibility—Each contestant in these Meets must have previously made, in a fair test, a record equal to the following in every event in which he is entered:

The above, together with a mile relay, will constitute the events of the Meets. Winning first place in any event counts five points; second place, three points; and third place, one point. Points in the relay wil not be counted in determining the winning team. In case of a tie in any event the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

The order of events is as follows:

Track events—100-yard dash trial; 120-yard hurdle trial; 100-yard dash final; one-mile run; 440-yard run; 120-yard hurdle final; 220-yard dash trial; 220-yard hurdle trial; 880-yard run; 220-yard dash final; 220-yard hurdle final; relay.

Field events—Running high jump; shot put; pole vault; running broad jump.

SECTIONAL TRACK AND FIELD MEETS, MAY 17

The following bases were used in selecting centers:

(1) Location—geographical with reference to schools desiring to participate. (2) Transportation accommodations. (3) General conditions—attitude of local authorities, tracks, fields, entertaining facilities, etc. (4) Existing organizations.

Schools have been assigned by counties, and the following scheme gives the Centers and the counties assigned to each Center. The name of your county locates your Center. The Board reserves the right to readjust the scheme, if necessary. The numbers indicate the schools from each county that have expressed a desire to enter. Entry blanks are necessary, however.

Management—The management of these meets rests solely with the Board of Control. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. All officials will be selected by the Center Principal.

The Center Principal shall arrange a program for his Meet from the list of entries sent to him by the Permanent Secretary. All Meets shall begin at 1:00 o'clock, and follow the order of events here given. Places on the track must be assigned by lot. The rules of the Western Inter-Collegiate Amateur Athletic Association, published by Spaulding, shall govern except in cases of modification by the Board of Control. These rules, as adopted by the Board, may be found in the I. H. S. A. A. Hand Book.

Open Contest—These Meets are open to all members of the Association irrespective of their season's record.

Protests—All protests against teams or individuals must be made in writing and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before May 7, at 11 a. m. Protests must be accompanied by evidence.

Entertainment—Two men for each event, four men for the relay team and a faculty manager from each competing school will be entertained by the Center Principal. Entertainment will begin, if necessary, at 10 a. m. Saturday, May 17, and continue, if necessary, to 8 p. m. Saturday, May 17. All competing schools are requested and expected to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary. Only actual contestants and faculty manager from each school will be entertained.

Expenses—An entrance fee of One (\$1) Dollar for each team must accompany the entry blank to be retained by the I. H. S. A. A. Traveling expenses must be paid by the competing schools.

Privileges—All competing teams, one rubber and one faculty manager from each team, are to be admitted free to the Meets.

Eligibility—The eligibility of each player must be certified to by the Principal of the school sending the team. The regular blank of the I. H. S. A. A. must be used, and all data must be given. Entries positively will close Wednesday, May 7. This means that they must be in the hands of the Permanent Secretary, complete in every detail, on that date.

Prizes—Suitable ribbons shall be given to the winners of first, second and third places in each event, and to each member of the winning relay team.

Warnings—Entries close Wednesday, May 7, and cannot be changed afterwards. An entry fee of One (\$1) Dollar for each team must accompany the entry blank. Special privileges will be granted to no one. Send all entry blanks and money to the Permanent Secretary.

FINAL MEET, EARLHAM COLLEGE, SATURDAY, MAY 24

Entrants—The winning relay team and all men in the first and second places in each event in the Sectional Meets shall constitute the participants in the final Meet. One entry fee and one entry blank covers both the sectional and final Meets.

Entertainment—Earlham College has contracted with the Board to entertain all contestants according to the plan just given above. Entertainment will begin, if necessary, at 8 a. m. Saturday, May 24, and continue, if necessary, to 8 a. m. Sunday, May 25. All competing schools are requested and expected to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary. Traveling will be at the expense of the competing schools.


Admission Fee—The admission fee to the Meet shall be fifty (50) cents.

Prizes—Earlham College will award the winning school a shield; the winning relay team, a placque; and the point winners, badges.



I. H. S. A. A. TRACK AND FIELD MEET CONTRACT

ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT

LaPorte, Indiana _________1919

The following articles of agreement are subscribed to by the Board of Control of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, through A. L. Trester, Permanent Secretary and Principal ______ High School.

SECTION I

The date of the Indiana Sectional High School Track and Field Meets shall be Saturday, May 17, 1919.

SECTION II

The State High School Board of Control, through A. L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, shall furnish the High School representative with lists of qualified teams and the names of the men on the respective teams on or before Monday, May 12th.

SECTION III

The High Scsool representative shall provide free entertainment for the respective teams of four men for the relay team, two men for each event, and a faculty manager for each competing school between the hours of 9:00 a. m. Saturday, May 17th, and 8:00 p. m. Saturday, May 17. If possible this period of entertainment will be shortened by the Board of Control.

SECTION IV

The High School representative shall provide tickets, announcers, scorers, time-keepers, judges, a referee, a starter, and all necessary equipment and officials for the Meet.

SECTION V

The matter of complimentary tickets shall be in the hands of the High School representative, who shall issue them to the Press, the officials, and to the helping students. All men of the competing teams, one rubber, and one Faculty Manager for each team, are to be admitted free to the Meet.

SECTION VI

The High School Representative shall provide suitable ribbons for first, second and third winners in each event and for each member of the winning relay team.

SECTION VII

The admission fee to all Meets shall be twenty-five (25) cents.

SECTION VIII

The proceeds of the Meet, after meeting the items mentioned in the several sections of this contract, shall belong to the High School entertaining the Meet.

SECTION IX

The High School under whose auspices the Meet is held promises hearty co-operation with the State Board of Control and the State Board promises as much to the High School conducting the Meet.

SECTION X

The details of Meets, such as protests, eligibility lists, schedules, etc., are to be cared for by the State Board of Control.

SECTION XI

The State Board of Control shall manage all Meets and the High Schools are to work under their direction.

SECTION XII

The High School representative shall send a complete program of the Meet containing all winners, records, distances, etc., by special delivery immediately after the close of the Meet, Saturday, May 17. This is very necessary for final Meet purposes. A complete and itemized statement of the receipts and disbursements shall be sent on Monday, May 17.





Minutes of Meetings of Board of Control

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

The Board of Control met in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis, Thursday evening, November 28. Mr. Reitzel, Johnson, King, Elabarger and the Permanent Secretary were present. The matter of Sectional Basketball Tourney centers was gone over and discussed. The invitations on hand were read and considered but no places were chosen as centers at this meeting.

It was decided to hold the Sectional Basket Ball Tourneys, March 7 and 8, and the State Tourney March 13, 14 and 15, at places to be selected later. It was also decided to hold the Sectional Track Meets May 17 and the Final Track Meet May 24 at places to be selected later.

Invitations were read from Purdue University and Indiana University to hold the State Basket Ball Tourney and an invitation from Earlham College was read to hold the State Track Meet there next Spring.

The Permanent Secretary was authorized to ask the Principals of the Association if they desire the Board of Control to make all arrangements concerning Sectional and Final Basket Ball Tourneys for this year since there can be no Annual Meeting.

It was decided to follow Spalding's Basket Ball Guide for 1918-19 regarding the end zones mentioned in Section 1, Rule 1, with this exception: in case there are Basket Ball courts at present where there is not room for the end zones such will not be required.

BOARD MEETING

The Board met at 8:00 p. m. Thursday, December 26, in the Clay-pool Hotel, Indianapolis. All members, the permanent secretary, and the two members-elect, Mr. Abbett and Mr. Leffell, were present.

The Board organization for 1919 was completed as follows: Mr. Reitzel, President, and Mr. Johnson, Treasurer.

It was decided to accept the "Gimbel prize" for Mental Attitude again this year and the Secretary was authorized to inform Mr. Gimbel of the action.

After careful consideration it was decided by the Board to hold the Final Basket Ball Tourney for 1919 under the auspices of Purdue University at Lafayette.

Officials for the sectional and final tourneys were discussed and the Secretary was authorized to hire such, paying the former \$30.00 each and the latter \$35.00 each.

General discussion was given to points of betterment in the I. H. S. A. A. and it was decided to meet in Kokomo at 8:00 p. m. January 18.

BOARD MEETING

The Board of Control met in the Cortland Hotel, Kokomo, at 8:00 o'clock Saturday evening, January 18, all members and the Permanent Secretary being present.

The Fortville-Arcadia controversy was considered and Arcadia was suspended from the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1919, for failure to control the crowd and game at Arcadia on Friday evening, January 3.

A request from Supt. Benezet of Evansville that the Evansville High School be readmitted into the Association prior to the limit of their penalty of suspension was denied.

Track invitations were considered from Earlham College, Wabash College and Indiana University. The Board decided to accept the invitation of Indiana University to hold the State Track Meet on Saturday, May 24.

The request of Prin. Courson of Greencastle to hire an athletic man by popular subscription, together with athletic funds, was denied.

Director Cutts of Purdue University was present and the details of the State Basket Ball Tourney were gone over very carefully.

Prin. J. R. Clark of Parker, Indiana, was denied the privilege of combining the Farmland and Monroe Hige Schools as one High School.

J. Hubert King of Knightstown resigned his position on the Board to take effect February 1, on account of his leaving the school business. The Board appointed Supt. W. A. Denny of Anderson to serve until the next election in that district.

It was decided by the Board to have all games in the Sectional and final Tourneys 30 minutes in length divided into halves of 15 minutes each.

The following interpretations were passed by the Board:

High School students, who were called into the service of their country during the world war, shall, upon their return to High School, enjoy the same standing as to eligibility requirements as they held when they entered the service. A student who was eligible when he entered the service is eligible for the second semester of this year and likewise one who was ineligible then is ineligible for the second semester of this year. All eligibility requirements must be met in the future by such students. This ruling holds for the present school year only.

Contests called "curtain raisers" are considered games and the eligibility requirements must be observed as strictly as for any game between any teams.

All students of either sex on any team in a school belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. must comply with the rules of the Association. All contests must be played by eligible students. There are no exceptions and no special privileges or permits will be granted to any High School.

Members of the I. H. S. A. A. may play against Non-High School teams (independent teams, alumni teams, Y. M. C. A. teams, etc.) providing all players on the High School teams are eligible in every way and also providing there are no High School students on the Non-High School teams. Under no circumstances are I. H. S. A. A. members allowed to play games with any Public High School in the state who are not members of the I. H. S. A. A.

Invitations for holding Sectional Basket Ball Tourneys were considered and the following centers were chosen: Anderson, Bedford, Brazil, Columbus, Crawfordsville, Frankfort, Franklin, Gary, Huntington, Kendallville, Kokomo, Lafayette, Martinsville, Indianapolis, New Castle, Richmond, Rochester, South Bend, Vincennes, Washington.

The assignment of schools was made by counties with the understanding that changes would be made, if necessary, when the entries were in-

The Board adjourned to meet at the Claypool Hotel in Indianapolis at 9 a.m. Saturday, March 1.

BOARD MEETING

The Board of Control met in the Claypool Hotel at Indianapolis

at 10:00 a.m. Saturday, March 1, all members and the Permanent Secretary being present.

Prin. Brubaker of the Pennville High School gave evidence before the Board regarding the playing of a boy in his High School who was 22 years old and who was also ineligible in scholarship. The Board suspended the Pennville High School until January 1, 1920.

By vote of the Board the State Final Track Meet was arranged to be held at Earlham College Saturday, March 24, and the Sectional Track Meets were arranged to be held in Centers to be selected, on Saturday, May 17.

The complete list of entries for the Sectional and Final Basket Ball Tourneys were examined by the Board of Control and after the schools were distributed to centers so that no center could have more than 16 schools, the drawing of the schedules were made by lot. The schedules were typewritten and copies were sent to the Center Principals by Special Delivery Saturday night.

BOARD MEETING

The Board of Control met in the Fowler Hotel, Lafayette, Friday night, March 14, all members being present except Mr. Leffell.

The contracts for the sectional and final Track Meets were gone over and agreed upon.

The matter of a Base Ball Tourney was considered and decided in the negative, owing to the small number of schools playing Base Ball

It was voted to commend the Amo authorities for the manner in which they handled some "rough necks" there.

It was decided that contracts canceled on account of the Flu would be considered legal as canceled.

BOARD MEETING

The Board of Control met at eleven o'clock Saturday morning, May 10, in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis, Mr. Reitzel, Mr. Leffel, Mr. Abbett and the Permanent Secretary being present.

The entries of the Sectional Track Meets, to be held on Saturday, May 17, were gone over, and all arrangements for these Meets were made.

Affairs concerning the State High School Athletic Association in general were discussed and plans for improving the workings of the Association were formulated. It was thought by the Board that the State Athletic Association should have a man who could devote his entire time to the work of the I. H. S. A. A. as the work of the Association had increased to such an extent that no one could care for it satisfactorily unless he devoted his whole time to it.

BOARD MEETING

The I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control met in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis, at 11:00 a. m. Saturday, June 14. All Board members and the Permanent Secretary were present.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the doings of the I. H. S. A. A. and to plan ways of improving the Association. The following points were discussed thoroughly:

- 1. Joining the A. A. U. The Board was unanimously in favor of preserving the identity of the I. H. S. A. A. and to refrain from any entangling alliances.
- 2. Inter-State Tourneys among State winners in any sport. The Board voted to recommend that Indiana not participate in such tourneys.
- 3. Track Rules. The Board thought that it might be advisable to adopt the A. A. U. rules here.
- 4. State Basket Ball Tourneys. The Board considered ways and means of lessening the strenuosity of the tourneys.

ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the I. H. S. A. A. was held in the Murat Theatre at Indianapolis, Thursday afternoon, October 30. There were 228 voting representatives, 150 visitors, and all members of the Board of Control present.

The spirit of the meeting was very good. The regular order of business was followed and badges of identification were given to the representatives.

The following resolutions were voted down:

- 1. That basket ball games be divided into four quarters.
- 2. That non-resident students be ineligible until they have been enrolled six months.
- 3. That no gifts of monetary value be given students by the local High School Athletic Association.
- 4. That school tourney center teams be required to play away from home.

5. That the State Basket Ball Tournament and the State Track Meet alternate between Purdue University and Indiana University.

By unanimous vote of the Principals the Board of Control was authorized to pay the Permanent Secretary more money for his services. A vote of appreciation and confidence was also tendered the Permanent Secretary for his work in the past.

Indiana University and Purdue University invited the I. H. S. A. A. to hold the State Basket Ball Tournament at their schools. The invitation of Indiana University was accepted by vote of 144 to 77.

By vote of the Principals it was decided to have Sectional Track Meets and the final meet next spring.

The following amendment was passed to take effect immediately:

No student, who has been enrolled as a High School student in any High School, shall be permitted to participate in any inter-High School contest as a member of another High School until he has been enrolled in such High School for one full semester, unless the parents of the student actually change their residence to the second school district. In the latter case the student will be as eligible as he was in the school from which he withdrew.

BOARD MEETING

The Board of Control held three meetings during the State Teachers' Association. All members of the Board and Permanent Secretary were present.

The following calendar for the year was adopted:

Sectional Basket Ball Tournaments, March 5, 6.

State Basket Ball Tournament, March 11, 12, 13, at Indiana University.

Sectional Track Meets, May 15.

State Track Meet, May 22.

By unanimous vote of the Board the Permanent Secretary was given a salary of \$500 per year to begin with the current year. The Permanent Secretary was also authorized to secure and pay any clerical help that was needed.

The amendment regarding enrollment in two or more High Schools, passed by the Principals in the annual meeting, was interpreted as follows:

1. It goes into effect at once, but is not retroactive as to penalty.

2. Students completing the course in High Schools having one, two or three year courses only are not bound by this amendment.

The following cases were considered and decisions given:

Greenfield versus New Castle: All athletic relations cancelled until June 1, 1921. The evidence showed that both schools should use more care in handling their crowds at all games. The Board urges both schools to take immediate steps to handle the crowds at all athletic games and failure to do so will be considered sufficient cause for penalty by the Board.

Mishawaka versus Michigan City:

- Michigan City required to pay the expenses of Mishawaka according to the signed contracts.
 - 2. All athletic relations cancelled until June 1, 1920.

The partly played contest of foot ball is declared no game.

The Board feels that adequate preparations were not made for handling this game satisfactorily at Michigan City and they also feel that Mishawaka used undue haste in terminating the contest.

Crawfordsville versus Wingate: Wingate versus Crawfordsville:

- 1. Fletcher Kerr of the Wingate High School is declared ineligible for his entire High School course. The evidence showed that he played base ball on the Melott team while he was a member of the Newton High School.
 - 2. The case of Alonzo Goldsberry is continued.
- 3. Marion Blacker, now enrolled in the Crawfordsville High School but who was enrolled in the Wingate High School last semester, was ineligible last semester and is ineligible this semester.
- 4. The Wingate High School is suspended from the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1920, for having played Marion Blacker on their basket ball team last semester.
- 5. The Crawfordsville High School is suspended from the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1920, for having used undue influence in trying to induce Alonzo Goldsberry to enter the Crawfordsville High School and also for having played Marion Blacker on their team this semester.
- The case of Melott High School for having played Fletcher Kerr while he was a member of the Newton High School is continued.

Rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association Regarding Track and Field Meets

Based on the Rules of the Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association.

RULE I.

Officials.

Section 1. All meetings must be under the direction of The Board of Control.
One referee.
Two or more inspectors.
Three or more field judges.
Three judges at finish.
Three or more timekeepers.
One starter.
One scorer.
One marshal.

Sec. 2. If deemed necessary, assistants may be provided for the clerk of the course, the scorer and the marshal, and an official announcer may be appointed.

RULE II.

The Board of Control.

The Board of Control shall have jurisdiction of all matters not assigned by these rules to the referee or other game officials.

RULE III.

The Referee.

The referee must decide all questions relating to the actual conduct of the Meet, whose final settlement is not otherwise covered by these rules, and shall have the power to add to or alter the announced arrangements of heats in any event. A referee has no authority, after heats have been drawn and published in a program, to transfer a contestant from one heat to another.

When in any but the final heat of a race a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to culpable carelessness, and shall also have power to allow the hindered competitor to start in the next round of heats, just as if he had been placed in his trial.

When in a final heat a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to his carelessness or conduct, and he shall also have the power to order a new race between such of the competitors as he thinks entitled to such a privilege.

If during the athletic contest under the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. a competitor shall conduct himself in a manner unbecoming a gentleman or offensive to the officials, spectators or competitors, the referee shall have the power to disqualify him from further competition at the Meet; and if he thinks the offense worthy of additional punishment, must promptly make a detailed statement of the facts to the Board of Control.

Power to change the order of events, as laid down in the official program, is reserved to the Board of Control, which shall, through its chairman, exercise this authority, unless it sees fit to expressly delegate this power to the referee.

The referee shall not have authority to disqualify any competitor for violation of the eligibility rule of the I. H. S. A. A. All protests as to eligibility made on the field must be referred to the Board of Control, and the protested competitor must be allowed to compete until disqualified by the arbitrator of the I. H. S. A. A.

RULE IV.

The Inspectors.

It shall be the duty of the inspector to stand at such point as the referee may designate, to watch the competition closely, and, in case of claim of foul, to report to the referee what he saw of the incident. Such inspectors are merely assistants to the referee, to whom they must report, and have no power to make any decision.

RULE V.

The Judges of the Finish.

The judges of the finish must determine the order of finishing of contestants, and must arrange among themselves as to noting the

winner, second, third and fourth, etc., as the case may require, and there must always be two judges, whose duty must be to choose the winner.

Their decision in this respect must be without appeal, and in case of a disagreement a majority must govern.

RULE VI. The Field Judges.

The field judges must make an accurate measurement and keep a tally of all trials of competitors in the high and broad jumps, the pole vaults, the weight competitions and the discus throws.

They must act as judges in these events, and their decisions must likewise be without appeal. In case of disagreement, a majority must govern. There must be at least three judges for every event.

RULE VII.

The Starter

The starter must have sole jurisdiction over the competitors after the clerk of the course has properly placed them in their position for the start.

The method of starting must be by pistol report, except that in time handicap races the word "go" must be used.

An actual start is not effected until the pistol has been purposely discharged after the competitors have been warned to get ready.

In case the pistol was not purposely discharged, the competitors shall be called back by the starter by pistol fire.

Note—The starter must have at least two good cartridges in his pistol before starting a heat.

When any part of the person of a competitor touches the ground in front of his mark before the signal is given, it must be considered a false start.

Penalties for false starting must be inflicted by the starter as follows: In all races to and including 125 yards, the competitor must be put back one yard for the first and another yard for the second attempt; in races over 125 yards and including 300 yards, two yards for the first and two more for the second attempt; in races over 300 yards and including 600 yards, three yards for the first and three more for the second attempt; in races over 600 yards and including 1,000 yards, four yards for the first and four more for the second attempt; in races

over 1,000 yards and including one mile, five yards for the first and five more for the second attempt.

In all cases, the third false start must prevent his competing in that event.

The starter must rule out of that event any competitor who attempts to advance himself from his mark, as prescribed in the official program, after he has been given the warning to "get ready."

RULE IX. Clerk of the Course.

The Clerk of the course must be provided with the names and the numbers of all entered competitors, and must notify them to appear at the starting line before the start in each event in which they are entered.

RULE X.

The scorer must record in the order in which each competitor finishes his event, together with the time furnished by the referee.

He must keep a tally of the laps made by each competitor in races covering more than one lap, and must announce, by means of a bell or otherwise, when the leading man enters the last lap.

He must draw up a list of the actual competitors in each event which shall be filed with the papers of the Association, and shall be the official record of competing entrants, and shall be final evidence in the enforcement of Rule III, of the rules of eligibility.

He must control his assistants and assign to them such of his duties as he may deem proper.

RULE XI. The Marshal.

The marshal must have police charge of the enclosure, and must prevent any but officers and actual competitors from entering or remaining therein.

He must control his assistants and assign to them their duties.

RULE XII.

The Official Announcer.

The official announcer must receive from the scorer and field judges the result of each event, and announce the same by voice or by means of a bulletin board.

RULE XIII. Competitors.

Competitors must report to the Clerk of the Course immediately upon their arrival at the place of meeting, and must be provided by that official with their proper numbers, which must be worn conspicuously by the competitors when competing, and without which they must not be allowed to start.

Each competitor must inform himself of the time of starting, and must be promptly at the starting point of each competition in which he is entered, and there report to the Clerk of the Course.

Under no circumstances shall attendants be allowed to accompany competitors at the start or during any competition.

RULE XIV.

Track Measurement.

All distances run or walked must be measured upon a line eighteen inches outward from the inner edge of the track, except that in races on straightaway tracks the distance must be measured in a direct line from the starting mark to the finishing line.

RULE XV.

The Course.

Each competitor must keep in his respective position from start to finish in all races on straightaway tracks, and in all races on tracks with one or more turns, he must not cross to the inner edge of the track, except when he is at least six feet in advance of his nearest competitor. After turning the last corner into the straight in any race, each competitor must run a straight course to the finish line, and must not cross to either the outside or inside from such straight course in front of his opponents.

In all races of the I- H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have a separate course marked out and measured, whether races are run straightaway or with turns.

The referee must disqualify from that event any competitor who willfully pushes against, impedes, crosses the course of, or in any way interferes with another competitor.

The referee must disqualify from further participation in the Meet any contestant competing to lose, to coach, or in any way impede the chances of another competitor, either in a trial or a final contest.

RULE XVI.

The finish of the course must be represented by a line between two finishing posts, drawn across and at right angles to the sides of the track, and four feet above which line must be stretched a tape, attached at either end to the finishing posts. A finish must be counted when any part of the winner's body, except his hands or arms, touches the tape at the finishing line. The tape must be considered the finishing line for the winners, but their order of finishing across the track line must determine the position of the other competitors.

RULE XVII.

Hurdles.

In the 120 yards hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle to be three feet six inches high. They must be placed ten yards apart, with the first hurdle fifteen yards distant from the starting point, and the last hurdle fifteen yards before the finishing line.

In making a record it must be necessary for the competitor to jump every hurdle in its proper position.

In all hurdle races of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have separate hurdles and a separate course marked out and measured, whether races are run straightway or with turns.

A competitor knocking down three or more hurdles, or any portion of three or more hurdles, in any race shall be disqualified.

RULE XVIII.

Jumping.

Section 1. A fair jump must be one that is made without the assistance of weights, diving, somersaults, or handsprings of any kind.

In scratch events competitors must jump in order as placed on program.

Sec. 2. The running high jump.—The field judges must decide the height at which the jump shall commence, and must regulate the succeeding elevations.

Each competitor must be allowed three trial jumps at each height, and if on the third trial he shall fail, he must be declared out of the competition.

Competitors must jump in order, as provided in Section 1; then those failing, if any, must have had their second trial jump in a like order, after which those who have failed twice must make their third trial jump.

The jump must be made over a bar resting on pins projecting not more than three inches from the uprights, and when this bar is removed from its place by the competitor when trying, it must be counted as a trial jump.

Running under the bar in making an attempt to jump must be counted as a "balk," and three successive "balks" must be counted as a trial jump.

The distance of the run before the jump must be unlimited. A competitor may decline to jump at any height in his turn, and by so doing forfeits his rights to again jump at the height declined.

Sec. 4. The running broad jump—When jumped on earth, a joist five inches wide must be sunk flush with it. The outer edges of this joist must be called the scratch line, and the measurement of all jumps must be made from it, at right angles, to the nearest break in the ground made by any part of the person of the competitor.

In front of the scratch line the ground must be removed to the depth of three and the width of twelve inches outward.

A foul jump must be one where the competitor, in jumping off the scratch line, makes a mark on the ground immediately in front of it, or runs over the line without jumping, and must count as a trial jump without results.

Each competitor must have three trial jumps, and the best three must have three more trial jumps.

The competition must be decided by the best of all the jumps of the competitors.

The distance of the run before the scratch line must be unlimited. Section 5. The pole vault—A pole must be furnished by the managing committee, but contestants may use their own private poles if they so desire, and no contestant shall be allowed to use any of these private poles except by the consent of their owners. The poles must be unlimited as to size and weight, but must have no assisting devices, except that they may be wrapped or covered with any substance (to obtain a firmer grip,) and may have one prong at the end.

No competitor shall, during the vault, raise the hand which was uppermost when he left the ground to a higher point of the pole, nor shall he raise the hand which was undermost when he left the ground to any point on the pole above the other hand.

The rules governing the running high jump must also govern the pole vault for height, except when the man leaves the ground in an attempt it shall be counted a trial.

RULE XIX. Putting the Shot.

The shot must be a solid sphere, made of metal, and must weigh twelve pounds.

It must be put with one hand, and in making the attempt it must be above, and not behind, the shoulder.

The competitor must stand in a circle seven feet in diameter. The circumference of the circle must be divided into halves by a line drawn through the center of the circle. On four feet of the front half of the circumference a board four inches high must be placed, the edge of which must be equally distant from the intersection of the line with the circumference, and at which the competitor must stand when the shot leaves his hand.

A fair put shall be one where no part of the person of the competitor touches in front of the circle, or on the board, in making the attempt.

A put must be counted as a foul if the competitor steps outside the circle on the board. A competitor must leave the circle by the rear half. Leaving by the front half must be declared a foul.

The measurement of all puts must be made from the nearest mark by the shot to a point on the circumference of the circle on a line with the object mark and the center of the circle.

Foul puts and letting go the shot in making an attempt must be counted as trial puts without results.

A board similar to the one in front may be used at the back of the circle.

The order of competing and the number of trials shall be the same as for the running broad jump. Shots must be furnished by the managing committee. Any contestant may use his own private shot, if correct in weight and shape; in which case the other contestants must be allowed to use it if they wish.

RULE XXI.

Ties.

In case of a tie in any event, the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

RULE XXII. Relay Racing.

- 1. A line must be drawn twenty feet in front of each starting line. Between these two lines each runner must touch the succeeding runner. Failure to do this disqualifies the team in that event. The judges must see that all touches are properly made.
- 2. The same rule with reference to fouls, coaching or impeding a runner in any way, apply to relay racing as to other events.
- 3. No member of a relay team can run back of the line, nor can one man run two relays in any team.
 - 4. The positions of the team must be drawn.



Constitution of the Indiana High School Athletic Association

(Revised Nov. 15, 1916.)

ADMINISTRATION

Officers:

Section 1. Board of Control.

- a. The Board of Control shall consist of five members (principals, members of the faculty or superintendents) to represent the five districts into which the State is divided for administration purposes only.
- b. Elections shall take place each year between December 1 and December 10, all votes being mailed to the Permanent Secretary on ballots prepared by him.
- c. Each member of the I. H. S. A. A. in a district shall have one vote for a Board member from his district.
- d. Beginning with December, 1916, members shall be elected as follows: First District, to serve until January 1, 1918; Second District, to serve until January 1, 1919; Third District, to serve until January , 1920. The Fourth District will have an election in December, 1917, the member to serve three years and the Fifth District will have an election in December, 1918, the member to serve three years.
- e. After the initial elections each member shall be elected for three years.
- f. All newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their offices on the first day of January next following his election.
- g. The person receiving the highest number of votes in his district shall be elected.
- h. In case of a tie the vote shall be taken again, the votes being east for the men who are tied for first place.
- i. Three members of the Board shall constitute a quorum at any meeting.

j. Removal from the district or withdrawal from the teaching profession shall constitute a vacancy and in such cases the remaining members on the Board shall choose a person from the district wherein the vacancy exists to serve until the next election only.

k. No retiring member of the Board, having served three years, shall be eligible for re-election in any district for a period of one year after date of retirement.

Sec. 2. I. H. S. A. A. Districts.

For the purposes of administration only the State shall be divided by Counties into the following districts:

- First District—Benton, Carroll, Cass, Fulton, Jasper, Lake, La-Porte, Marshall, Newton, Porter, Pulaski, Starke, St. Joseph, Tippecanoe, White.
- Second District—Adams, Allen, Blackford, Dekalb, Elkhart, Grant, Howard, Huntington, Kosciusko, LaGrange, Miami, Noble, Steuben, Wabash, Wells, Whitley.
- Third District—Boone, Clay, Clinton, Fountain, Hamilton, Hendricks, Marion, Montgomery, Morgan, Owen, Parke, Putnam, Tipton, Vigo, Vermillion, White.
- Fourth District—Bartholomew, Dearborn, Decatur, Delaware, Fayette, Franklin, Hancock, Henry, Jay, Jefferson, Jennings, Johnson, Madison, Ohio, Randolph, Ripley, Rush, Shelby, Switzerland, Union, Wayne.
- Fifth District—Brown, Clarke, Crawford, Daviess, Dubois, Floyd, Gibson, Green, Harrison, Jackson, Knox, Lawrence, Martin, Monroe, Orange, Perry, Pike, Posey, Scott, Spencer, Sullivan, Vanderburg, Warrick, Washington.

Sec. 3. The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties: (a) It shall have general control over all athletic contests between secondary schools in this Association. (b) It shall have exclusive control of the annual Inter-scholastic Meet; (c) It shall give interpretations of the rules of the Association; (d) It shall determine forfeitures under Sec. 11; (e) The Board of Control, at the end of any athletic season may, at its discretion, issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standing of teams. No school which has violated the rules of the Association in regard to the qualifications of players shall be awarded special honors in that particular branch of athletics.

Sec. 4. (a) When charges are made in writing by a member of

the Association against another member for violation of the rules of the Association, the Board of Control, after giving due notice of the place and time for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges, and may suspend the offending school for a period not exceeding one year. (b) The Board of Control shall decide upon all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants in the Inter-scholastic Meet. (c) When any matter comes before the Board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.

Sec. 5. At the annual meeting of 1906 a Permanent Secretary shall be elected, who shall have charge of the property and records of the Association; shall receive all money for dues and the sale of publications of the Association; shall issue all circulars authorized by the Board of Control; shall attend meetings of the Board when requested to do so by the Board; shall turn over to the Treasurer of the Board all money in his possession when called upon to do so; shall perform such other duties as the growth of the Association as determined by the Board may require; and shall receive as compensation the sum of \$150 annually, and such allowances for expenses and clerical help as the Board may approve. Vacancies in the office may be declared by the Board for cause, and a successor appointed by the Board to act until the next annual meeting.

It shall be the duty of the Permanent Secretary to publish the I. H. S. A. A. Year Book immediately following the annual meeting of the Association.

Local Management:

- Sec. 6. The Principal or his authorized representative shall accompany his team to all contests.
- Sec. 7. The principal of the school, or High School teachers authorized by him, shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.
- Sec. 8. No games sall be played without the sanction of the principal.
- Sec. 9. The eligibility of all the contestants shall be certified to by the principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be presented in writing within ten days before any contest. In case of disputes the principal must furnish the Board of Control the following data in regard to each contestant: The date of last enrollment; the number of years he has

been a member of a secondary school athletic team; date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the last preceding term in school; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term or semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be denied championship honors, and may be excluded from the Annual Inter-scholastic Meet.

Sec. 10. The principal has power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner.

Sec. 11. It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, provide a forfeit of \$10, to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeitures be stipulated and not be paid during the same season, the Board of Control, after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the Association. Notification of such expulsion shall be published in the papers, with cause therefor.

Sec. 12. Paid Coaches, other than those regularly employed as teachers by the trustees of the school, are prohibited. By paid coach is meant any person who receives, directly or indirectly, remuneration of any kind, money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any high school athletic team.

Sec. 13. Each school in the Association shall report to the Permanent Secretary a list of pupils representing the school in athletic contests during the year. Each school is asked to report also the kind of treatment accorded them to, from and on the field, while guests of another school.

Officials:

Sec. 14. On and after July 1, 1910, all the Major Officials in all athletic contests participated in by teams connected with school in the I. H. S. A. A. shall be regularly licensed teachers in the public schools of Indiana or shall be persons whose names have been furnished and approved by the Board of Control. It is recommended that these officials shall be disinterested, and it is required that when a school demands disinterested officials at the time of scheduling the game, such officials shall be furnished. The Board shall drop from its list of approved officials any person who is palpably unfair and biased in his decision in games.

Sec. 15. Non-playing student officials or assistants shall conform to the same rules as the players.

Membership:

Sec. 16. Membership in this Association shall be limited to public High Schools of the state, and each school shall have one vote. The annual dues shall be \$1.50, payable when the school becomes a member, and thereafter by January 1 of each year, in advance.

Academies with commissioned high school standing shall be eligible to membership in the Association, and wherever the word "high school" appears in this Constitution it shall be understood to apply equally to these academies.

Beginning with the year 1914, and every year thereafter, the fiscal year of the Indiana High School Athletic Association shall close on December 31.

Games and Game Rules:

Sec. 17. No game shall be played with high schools in this state not belonging to the Association.

This rule does not prevent a member of the Association from playing high school teams outside of the state, nor from playing nonhigh school teams within the state, except as follows:

It is a violation of the Constitution for schools in the Association to play non-high school teams, including high school boys, unless the latter are certified as eligible by the Principal of the school to which they belong.

Sec. 18. The games recognized by the I. H. S. A. A. shall be: Football, Rugby Football, Soccer, Track Work and Baseball. Further, all forms of inter-school athletic games shall be subject to the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

Sec. 19. In all football contests held under these rules, the length of each half shall be twenty-five minutes, unless changed by mutual consent.

Sec. 20. The basketball rules as published in Spalding's Official Basketball rule book, shall be the official rules governing all contests between members of the I. H. S. A. A. However, the rule governing the selection of officials in the above rules shall be void, and unless otherwise agreed by mutual consent, each school shall furnish one official, and these officials shall alternate their duties, each acting as referee and each acting as umpire one half.

Eligibility:

Rule 1. To represent a school in any interscholastic contest, a person must be under twenty-one years of age; must have entered some public high school within the first twenty school days of the semester in which the contest occurs, and must be an amateur as defined by the A. A. U. Eighth grade pupils are not eligible. A semester is one-half a school year.

(The term "Amateur" is defined and explained in Spalding's Official Handbook of the Inter-Collegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America.)

Rule 2. Any pupil who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days from September 1 to December 1 of same year for each of four semesters will be eligible to play football a fifth semester.

"Any pupil who has been enrolled for a period of twenty (20) or more days from December 1 to March 1 of the next year for each of four semesters shall be eligible to play a fifth semester, provided he meets the requirements of the other eligibility rules; provided further that no pupil shall represent his school longer than four years."

INTERPRETATION—This rule applies only to students entering school for the first time during the second semester of the school year, and enrollment in school rather than participation in athletics shall determine the eligibility of all students.

Any pupil who has been enrolled for a period of twenty (20) or more days from March 1 to June 1 of the same year for each of four semesters shall be ineligible to play baseball a fifth semester.

INTERPRETATION—This section covers all branches of athletics. Rule 3. A pupil withdrawing permanently from school within the first twenty school days of the semester shall not be regarded as having an opportunity to engage in athletics that semester unless he has already played in one or more inter-scholastic games, in which case he shall be regarded as having engaged in Athletics for that season.

Rule 4. Post Graduates are not eligible, but pupils graduating from regular three year courses shall not be deemed post graduates.

Rule 5. A student is a post graduate of a school after he has completed the work required for graduation by that school, irrespective of the time of granting the diploma.

Rule 6. Pupils meeting requirements for graduation in three and

one-half years in high schools with regular four years course shall be eligible to participate in school athletics the last half of the fourth year, provided they meet all other eligibility rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

Rule 7. Time spent in athletic sport by pupils while in grades below the high school shall not be counted as part of the four years.

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Rule 8. No person shall enter a contest under an assumed name.

Rule 9. Any member of a high school athletic team who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that season.

An exception is hereby made for basketball and basketball players in those towns and cities whose schools have no gymnasium and whose students are forced by necessity to use a Y. M. C. A. or some other gymnasium for their practice games. It is a well known fact that the use of such gymnasium by high school students under such circumstances will likely require that such students play on the teams of the organizations maintaining such gymnasium. No student, however, will be permitted to play on any other team than that representing the organization controlling the gymnasium, and no student will be allowed to play in the teams of the latter without the knowledge and consent of the principal.

Rule 10. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current semester, a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen regular high school recitations per week, exclusive of rhetoricals, physical culture, military drill and deportment; in his last preceding semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire term.

Pupils enrolled for the first time must comply with the requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

Back work may be made up, providing that it is done in accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes a matter of final record before the next semester.

INTERPRETATION—In each of the studies representing the minimum requirement of work specified above: (a) For the current semester the average of the monthly grades up to the time of certification must be passing; (b) for the current or school month the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing (c) if the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing (c)

age of the monthly grades at the beginning of any month is below passing in any study, the pupil is ineligible as far as that study is concerned for the entire month.

Rule 11. No person who has been enrolled as a student in an institution of college standing, and has done work which may be counted toward a degree in that institution, shall be eligible as a member of any athletic team under I. H. S. A. A. rules in any game with any other team, either within or without the State of Indiana.

Rule 12. The eligibility rules of this Association shall apply to students taking part in all contests, whether with schools inside or outside the State of Indiana.

Rule 13. On and after January 1, 1911, no student shall be eligible to play football unless he has been examined by a regular physician and his physical condition has been pronounced satisfactory. Further, such student shall not be eligible until the physician's certificate has been filed with the Permanent Secretary of the Association. Said certificate shall be good from September 1 to December 1, only.

Rule 14. On and after January 1, 1919, no pupil shall be eligible to play football without the written consent of his father, mother or guardian. Said written consent shall be attested by the Principal or Faculty Manager and shall be filed with the Permanent Secretary of the Association. The copy of said written consent shall be attached to the physician's certificate when filed with the Permanent Secretary.


Rule 15. No student, who has been enrolled as a High School student in any High School, shall be permitted to participate in any interhigh school contest as a member of another high school until he has been enrolled in such high school for one full semester, unless the parents of such student actually change their residence to the second school district. In the latter case the student will be as eligible as he was in the school from which he withdrew.

The resolution is interpreted as follows:

- Students finishing the courses offered in schools maintaining less than four years of high school work are not bound by the resolution.
- 2. The fact that a transfer has or has not been issued, or that the student pays or does not pay his tuition has no bearing on the resolution.
- 3. The resolution is now in force for the present semester but is not retroactive as to penalty.

Interpretations

First. A game is an Inter-High School athletic contest.

Second. The football season is defined as beginning with the opening of school and closing with November 30.

Third. No student who violates the rules of the Association will be reinstated by the Board.

Fourth. A pupil who has played in one or more inter-scholastic games in any season shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

Fifth. When a member or members of any team are protested, the game should be played as scheduled and the protest filed with the Board for settlement later.

Sixth. The basketball season is defined as lasting the entire school year.

Seventh. Pupils under twenty-one at the time of registration in school shall be so regarded until the time of their next registration.

Eighth. Any student, who carries at least 15 hours of regular High School work, is a High School student.

Ninth. It is recommended that Principals take proper measures to control the crowd and the players in all contests. Failure to do so shall be considered sufficient grounds for expulsion from the Association.

- 1. Parents' and physician's certificates, contracts for all contests, eligibility certificates, blanks for certification of officials, and blanks for reporting contests will be furnished in quantities upon application to the Permanent Secretary. Please state definitely the kind and number of each wanted.
 - 2. The Annual Handbook will be sent upon receipt of ten cents.
- 3. All correspondence and remittances from members of the Association to the Board of Control or to the Permanent Secretary must be indorsed by the principal or a member of the faculty.






