ADDRESS TO INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(G. L. Russell)

The Indiana High School Athletic Association, since its inception in 1903, has made every effort to be of service to high schools of the state

by giving the right kind of leadership in all possible ways.

From the beginning the Association has had an educational vision in recognizing the values in games, sports, and activities in which the play element predominates. In the earlier years this point of view was not accepted as fully as it is now. Artificial activities such as gymnastics, calisthenics and other types of formal teaching were the accepted forms of physical education, but, the I. H. S. A. A., through its bulletins and the speeches of its members, stressed natural activities when it was not so popular to do so.

The I. H. S. A. A. has always placed emphasis on good school procedure in the conduct of athletic activities, held to a high standard of scholarship, and insisted that coaches should be teachers thereby guarding against professionalism, held rigidly to enrollment rules, and protected schools against the use of undue influence in securing and

keeping athletes.

The I. H. S. A. A. has taken the lead in insisting that all financial matters concerning athletic activities be handled with honesty and integrity. No financial scandal has ever found room in the association.

The high morale of the organization is due largely to the fact that the association is democratic in organization. It belongs to the schools and its rules are made by those who are governed by them. In other words, the governors are the governed.

There are many questions which we must face in the near future.

Major among these are:

1. Shall the I. H. S. A. A. manage all contests between schools—such as music, declamation, oratory, debate, commercial, etc.? There have been requests for the I. H. S. A. A. to take over these meets.

2. How many and in what departments shall high schools have state meets? Undoubtedly, the nation-wide tendency is toward

discontinuance of all state tourneys and meets.

3. Shall the high schools of Indiana continue to control their own affairs as they have done so successfully for the last thirty-five years as a voluntary organization or shall the control be placed in other hands?

4. What shall be the relationships relative to physical education, athletics, recreation, and other activities? Which shall

predominate or shall they be placed on an equal basis?

5. What provisions shall high schools make to care for their summer programs in athletics and recreation? Shall they be under the supervision and management of the coaches, directors, and teachers?

Let us hope that we, the school administrators, directors, and coaches of the high schools of the state of Indiana meet these questions fairly and fearlessly, and that we answer them to the best

interests of all.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF SECTIONAL, REGIONAL, SEMI-FINAL AND FINAL BASKETBALL TOURNEYS, 1938

THE TWENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL

The Board of Control has completed the details for the State Championship Basketball Tourneys and announces the scheme in full.

SECTIONAL TOURNEYS

March 3, 4 and 5

The following bases were used in selecting sectional, regional and semi-final centers:

(1) Location,—geographical and with reference to schools desiring to participate. (2) Transportation facilities. (3) General conditions,—attitude of local authorities, floors, seating capacities and entertaining facilities. (4) Rotation. (5) Success and satisfactory management of previous tourneys. (6) Invitations.

Schools have been assigned by counties with a few exceptions and these exceptions are clearly indicated. The name of your county locates your center unless assigned otherwise. The scheme is arranged to have no less than 8 teams and no more than 16 teams in each tourney and the assignment of all schools is given below. The Board of Control reserves the right to readjust the scheme if conditions arise making changes necessary or advisable. The numbers indicate the number of schools that probably will enter the tourneys. No doubt these numbers will be very nearly correct for this year. Correct information will not be available until the entry blanks have been received and accepted by the Board of Control. The numbers herein are tentative only. The winners will constitute the teams in the Regional Tourneys according to assignment. Entry blanks are necessary. An entry blank is enclosed.

MANAGEMENT—The exclusive control of these tourneys rests solely with the Board of Control according to the I. H. S. A. A. Constitution. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. Officials for each tourney will be selected and assigned by the Board and every attempt will be made to choose none but fair, disinterested and competent men. Two officials will be assigned to tourneys having 8, 9, 10, 11 or 12 teams, and three officials will be assigned to tourneys having 13, 14, 15 or 16 teams. Two officials will work each game alternating as referee and umpire. Each official is obligated to be ready for work throughout the tourney. All schedules of hours, floors, teams and officials will be made out and printed by the Board. All schedules will be drawn by lot by the Board of Control in the presence of representatives of the Indianapolis Star, Times and News; Associated Press, United Press, and International News Service, and no changes will be made in them.

DECISIONS—The assignment of officials and the decisions of the officials will be considered final. Schools entering the tourneys enter with this understanding. Give this information to your students and fans as often as necessary.

TOURNEY REQUIREMENT—A High School shall not be considered eligible for entering a sectional basketball tourney in the I. H. S. A. A. in any year unless the team representing the High School has played eight (8) inter-scholastic games during that season.

ENTERTAINMENT—Teams are limited to ten men and these ten men may play. Twelve men may be certified but two of these men must be scratched prior to the opening game of the tourney. The Center Principals have contracted with the Board of Control to entertain twelve men (which must include the faculty manager) from each competing school according to the following scheme:

- Entertainment for all teams in all tourneys will end not later than 10:00 P. M., Saturday, March 5.
- 2. Entertainment for all teams will begin as follows:
 - a. In 8 and 9 team tourneys,-5:00 P. M., Friday, March 4.
 - b. In 10, 11 and 12 team tourneys,—12:00 Noon, Friday, March 4.
 - c. In 13, 14, 15 and 16 team tourneys,—5:00 P. M., Thursday, March 3, for teams playing on this evening and 8:00 A. M., Friday, March 4, for other teams.
- In 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12 team tourneys, one extra round-trip transportation and one extra meal will be given to the teams playing Thursday evening, March 3.
- 4. All tourneys will begin at 7:00 P. M., Thursday evening, March 3. There will be no games Saturday morning in any tourney. There will be no games Friday morning or Friday afternoon in 8 and 9 team tourneys; and there will be no games Friday morning in 10, 11 and 12 team tourneys. Principals may arrange their school work accordingly.

Printed schedules will be sent to each competing school by the Center Principal in plenty of time to arrange for making the trip. Fairness by all parties must prevail in this matter of entertainment. Money spent for entertainment decreases the amount to be divided among the schools. All competing schools are requested to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary.

The Center Principal may pay the participating schools for meals and lodging taken at home in lieu of such as would be necessary at the tourney center with the following understandings: (1) the Principals of the participating schools shall make definite arrangements with the Center Principal to this effect on or before Tuesday, March 1, (2) transportation only, one round trip, shall be paid in lieu of each night's lodging. The transportation here considered shall in no case exceed the amount for lodging should the Center Principal provide lodging, (3) no more than the regular tourney allowance shall be paid for meals taken at home, (4) rest rooms for the day, when lodging is taken at home by a school, shall be an expense of the school securing such and not an expense of the tourney, (5) teams arriving late or leaving a tourney early should not expect full tourney entertainment.

EXPENSES—An entrance fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each team must accompany the entry blank, which money will go into the treasury of the I. H. S. A. A. to defray expenses of the tourneys incurred by the Board of Control. The Center Principals have contracted to make settlement out of the receipts of the tourneys according to the following scheme and in the following order:

(Economy will be exacted regarding all expenses)

- 1. All legitimate expenses, such as meals, officials, etc., except for transportation and lodging, shall be paid from the gross receipts if sufficient. If gross receipts are not sufficient, legitimate expenses shall be considered an obligation of the Center Principal.
- 2. The Center High School shall receive one hundred dollars (\$100).
- 3. The transportation shall be paid. (The Board of Control has decided on three (3) cents per mile per man for the round trip. Mileage should be considered as the most direct distance between the school building of the participating school and the gymnasium in which the tourney is held.)
 - 4. The lodging shall be paid.
- 5. The Center High School shall receive one hundred dollars (\$100).
- 6. The I. H. S. A. A. shall receive one percent (1%) of the fifth balance.
- 7. One-half of the sixth balance shall be divided pro-rata among the participating schools, the Center School sharing.

- 8. One-half of the sixth balance shall be divided on the basis of season ticket sales in the local communities on or before 4:00 p.m. Thursday, March 3. Season tickets sold after this hour and date can not be counted in finding the share of any one school. Keep the two lists separate at all times.
- 9. The Board of Control shall pass on all reports by the Center School and all reports by the participating schools.
- 10. The Center School shall furnish a complete financial report to the I. H. S. A. A. and to each participating school soon after the tourney.

Note—The amounts provided for the Center School shall not be divided among the participating schools as a bid for a tourney or in payment for the support of these schools.

PRIVILEGES—All competing players, one Coach and one faculty manager for each team (twelve in all) shall be admitted free to all games.

ELIGIBILITY—The eligibility of each player must be certified by the Principal of the School sending the team. Certificates must be made on the regular blanks furnished by the Commissioner and all data must be given as indicated. Entries will close Friday, February 18. These blanks should be sent between February 11 and 17. Do not mail entry blanks later than February 17, 1938. Blanks mailed according to these instructions should reach the I. H. S. A. A. office in time to be accepted. All students must be eligible when they participate as well as when they are certified, so entry blanks should not be sent too early. Late entry blanks will not be accepted. The Board of Control has so ruled.

ADMISSION FEE—The admission fees to all tourney games shall be as follows:

Four-session tourneys—season ticket \$1.00, session ticket 35 cents; Five-session tourneys—season ticket \$1.25, session ticket 35 cents; Six-session tourneys—season ticket \$1.50, session ticket 35 cents.

Tickets shall not be sold for more or less than the prices here given. No more tickets shall be sold than the seating capacity of the house will justify. Standing room shall not be sold or used. All requirements of the State Fire Marshall and the City Fire Marshall shall be met in all tourneys.

PRIZES—No prizes of any kind are to be awarded to any school or individual from any source.

DISTRIBUTION OF TICKETS—An equitable distribution of season tickets shall be made among the competing schools based on distance, enrollment in High School and probable attendance from the competing schools. Season tickets should be ready for distribution on Monday, February 28. Much ticket information can be secured prior

to this date. Center Principals and participating Principals should communicate with each other on Monday morning, February 28. This responsibility is mutual. All Principals have duties in this matter. Any unfair methods or prices higher than those mentioned in this announcement should be reported to the Board of Control with evidence. The division on season ticket sales shall be made on the basis of such tickets being sold and paid for on or before 4:00 p. m. Thursday, March 3. All schools must observe this provision. Season tickets sold after this hour and date should not be credited to any one school in the sharing and should be reported separately.

EXTRA PERIODS—The following method of procedure has been adopted for extra period games in all tourneys:

- (1) No more than two three-minute extra periods may be played in any game.
- (2) In case of a tie score at the end of the second extra period, or in case one team is leading by one point at the end of the second extra period, each player actually participating in the game at the end of this period shall be given one free throw at his own basket, the team having the most points, including the point just mentioned, being declared the winner of the game. The order of throwing by the teams shall be determined by lot by the Referee and Captains, and each Captain shall determine the order of throwing by the boys on his team. The general order of throwing shall be as follows:
 - a. Team drawing first-two boys.
 - b. Team drawing second-two boys.
 - c. Team drawing first-three boys.
 - d. Team drawing second-three boys.
 - (3) The procedure outlined in scheme No. 2 shall be repeated in case of a tie until a winner is determined.

RADIO SERVICE—Stations in Indiana may broadcast I. H. S. A. A. tourneys provided the requirements in Bulletin Number III of last year are observed.

SOUVENIR PROGRAMS—Souvenir programs other than those provided by the I. H. S. A. A. shall not be distributed or sold at any tourney, and no solicitation of advertisements shall be made.

PICTURES—Flashlight pictures shall not be taken during the progress of the games.

SUGGESTIONS—Center Principals and participating Principals should work with each other prior to the tourney, during the tourney and after the tourney. A conference several days prior to the tourney of all Principals would result in an agreement on all points such as meals, lodging, transportation, rest rooms, seating, tickets, reports, etc., etc. Agreements reached prior to tourneys prevent difficulties during and after tourneys. Make and keep copies of all agreements.

WARNINGS—Entries close Friday, February 18, and can not be changed or received afterwards. An entrance fee of one dollar (\$1.00) must accompany each entry blank. If the capacity of the house is not sold in season tickets, session tickets at 75 cents each will be sold on the day of the tourney.
- 2. Tickets will be sold only through the Principals of High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. and having teams entered in the sectional tourneys, obligating them to distribute these tickets properly to persons in their own school districts before distributing any tickets elsewhere. Each Principal will be required to keep on file the full names and addresses of all ticket purchasers for the information of the Board of Control, should such be desired for checking purposes. Orders placed otherwise will not be honored. Tickets distributed by Principals in an improper way or at prices higher than one dollar and twenty-five cents per season ticket will jeopardize the standing of their school.
- 3. Tickets will be sold by mail order only. Telephone, telegraph and personal call orders will not be honored. A ticket order blank is enclosed with this bulletin. It is official and you should use it according to instructions. The I. H. S. A. A. does not agree to honor second orders. Principals should order their quota the first time.
- 4. Ticket orders must be specific as to number of tickets and a check for the correct amount of money made to Arthur L. Trester must accompany each order. Tickets purchased can not be returned. Please do not send money. The limitations below must be observed as given:
 - a. Orders for tickets having official Post Office stamp marks on the envelopes including and from Monday, March 7, to and including Wednesday, March 16, will be accepted if received not later than Thursday, March 17, 1938. The I. H. S. A. A. reserves

the right to check the mailing of all ticket orders and to act on their findings.

- 5. Each High School Principal, having a team entered in an I. H. S. A. A. Sectional Basketball Tourney for 1938, may order tickets to six (6) per cent of his High School enrollment as of September 13, 1937, and as submitted to the Inspection Office of the State Department of Public Instruction last September for the school years 9, 10, 11 and 12. Post graduates should not be counted. You were requested to preserve a duplicate copy of this report. Principals should carefully observe the limitation here placed. If there are questions, ask them now. All enrollments will be checked with the report herein mentioned. Be sure you are right.
- 6. All tickets remaining unsold after the High School Principals have ordered, according to the privilege of their enrollment quota, will be distributed pro rata among the Principals of the 64 sectional tourney winning schools if ordered by them. These Principals should state on their letter, ordering their quota of tickets according to enrollment, whether or not they will accept and pay for any tickets that may be distributed to them as sectional tourney winners. The check for these tickets should be sent upon receipt of the tickets only. No tickets, other than the tickets remaining after the enrollment quota orders are honored, are offered in this paragraph. There may be no tickets or only a few tickets so remaining. None are guaranteed. Tickets purchased can not be returned.
- 7. In order that all may know how ticket orders are filled, the following statements are made:
 - a. Ticket orders from Principals are due any time from March 7, to March 16, inclusive. Post office stamp marks will determine.
 - b. Upon receipt of ticket orders in the I. H. S. A. A. office, they are checked. All correct orders are arranged alphabetically according to the name of the school, numbered and filled in the order here given.
 - c. Incorrect orders are returned with instructions.
 - d. Orders will be filled by drawing the tickets as follows and in the order given: (1) Beginning with Section 9 and proceeding to the right around the 1st balcony in blocks with about 10% of each block in the front rows of the block; (2) Beginning with Section 1 and proceeding to the right around the bleachers, if there are available tickets, and (3) Beginning with Section 11 and proceeding to the right around the second balcony.
 - e. The method of filling ticket orders is a method entirely by lot and the scheme automatically assigns the seats. The location of seats of any particular school depends upon a number of things,—date of receipt of order, number of orders received in same mail, number of tickets covered by the orders received in the same mail, alphabetical order of the school name among the orders received, accuracy of ticket order, station reached in the drawings determined by the orders received, etc.

WARNINGS—Entries are due Monday, March 21, and can not be changed afterwards. Special privileges will not be granted to anyone. Send all entry blanks to Arthur L. Trester, 812 Circle Tower, Indianapolis, Indiana. All data must be given. The management, protests and privileges will be governed according to the regulations pertaining to the Sectional Tourneys.

MISCELLANEOUS

- 1. All seats will be reserved and tickets sold to Principals will be drawn by lot.
- 2. Blocks of seats, when sold, will be arranged from front to back rather than around the playing floor, about ten percent of the number in each block being assigned to the front of the block.
- 3. No pass-out tickets will be issued. Holders of tickets may leave the Field House when they choose in any session, but they can not re-enter until the next session. The seats will be cleared between sessions.
- 4. All tickets will be printed in coupon form, carrying the statement that coupons will not be good if detached. The I. H. S. A. A. tickets will be printed in a way that will make duplication very difficult, but a warning is given against bogus tickets.
- 5. Ticket holders will be seated prior to the opening game in each session, between halves and between games only. All persons must remain seated in their own seats during the games. All games will be started on scheduled time and will be played in quarters of 8 minutes each.
- 6. Comfort accommodations will be found on each floor at each end of the Field House.
- 7. Tickets will indicate the Gate, Ramp, Section, Row and Number. As you approach the Field House look for the Gate Number above the door corresponding to the one on your ticket.
- 8. Two blocks of seats in the middle on the west side of the playing floor and two blocks in the middle on the east side of the playing floor having 500 seats to the block, will be reserved for the four schools whose teams are in the tourney until Monday, March 21. Twelve blocks of seats, immediately around the playing floor and with 200 seats to the block, will be reserved for the other twelve schools participating in the semi-final tourneys. The High School Principals whose teams are represented should get in connection with the I. H. S. A. A. Office on Monday, March 21, and make definite arrangements about these tickets or they will be sold to other parties. These blocks will be assigned by lot by the Board of Control.
- 9. First Aid Rooms will be located in the east end of the Field House. Look for sign. A physician and a nurse will be available.



GIMBEL PRIZE FOR MENTAL ATTITUDE


In 1917 Jake Gimbel of Vincennes presented to the I. H. S. A. A Board of Control a proposal to give a prize each year at the State Basketball tourney to the boy among the teams represented that showed the best mental attitude throughout the tourney. Mr. Gimbel did not have in mind the quality of the playing of any boy on any team, but did have in mind the qualities that belong to a real gentleman. He clearly recognized the mental and moral strain under which the players play during the tourney and he also recognized the numerous opportunities for the players to lose control of themselves and to do something not conducive to true sportsmanship.

The Board of Control accepted the proposal of Mr. Gimbel and the awarding of this prize known as the "Gimbel Prize for Mental Attitude" has been an annual affair, calling for much favorable comment. The prize and the things it represents are cherished by the players and schools of Indiana. The prize has meant much to real sportsmanship and self-control in the High Schools of the State and it is a prize sought for by all schools. The school to which the winner of this prize belongs claims the winner as their own and accordingly the whole school and the whole community are proud. In a number of cities similar prizes are being given to the players who show the best mental attitude within their own schools. The Gimbel prize and these other similar prizes have exalted in a very real sense the qualities belonging to a gentleman in the minds of our boys and girls.

NEW GYMNASIUMS AND STADIA

A number of high school gymnasiums and stadia have been completed during the past year. Information about some of these structures follows:

WASHINGTON (Indianapolis) GYMNASIUM

The gymnasium unit was completed except installation of lockers

July 15, 1938. The gymnasium floor outside dimensions are 91' 3" x 122'. There are two cross courts 50' by 74' and one large court for inter school games 50' x 80'. There are 9' 3" from the end line to bleachers on the West and 9' 6" on the East. There are 40" from the side line to

the bleachers on the North and South sides. There are 1470 bleacher seats on the main floor and 231 balcony

seats. The balcony is on the West end of the floor.

The bleacher seats used are Medart Telescopic seats. They were purchased by the Board of School Commissioners and financed by direct taxation. The floor is 13/16" matched hard maple layed on 2 x 4 screeds set in concrete; construction materials are steel frame with brick exterior.

This gymnasium is part of a unit containing, in addition to the gymnasium and its contingent facilities, thirteen class rooms, shops and laboratories, a dean's office and four teacher work rooms, some storage space and two rest rooms. The entire unit cost \$325,000.00. It was all let as one contract and the various items can not be priced separately.

The floor was finished with Seal-O-San. It is to be used for Physical Education classes, intramural volleyball and basketball, practice of teams for inter school basketball games, and for inter school basketball contests.

It is also to be used for convocation of the student body.

It is well lighted with ten 750-watt lights over the main court and twenty 250-watt lights over the bleachers.

It has a space of 22' from floor to beams, and is equipped with

Medart all-metal bank boards at the end of each playing floor.

There is a store room beneath the balcony for chairs, roll-away bleachers and physical education apparatus, such as mats, horses, chairs, etc.

The office of the athletic director is located at the Northwest corner with an entrance to the gymnasium and the foyer opening into the

gymnasium. The basement floor has a large room assigned to the Military Training Department, and it is equipped with two sets of folding doors which makes its possible to hold three classes in this room during the same period, or to drill one company in the room in inclement weather.

There are, also, a dressing room with thirty lockers, two showers and toilet facilities; a health and safety class-room, which can be used as a game room when not assigned; a drying room; four large locker and dressing rooms with two shower rooms, one located between the

first and second dressing rooms, the other between the third and fourth dressing rooms; a physical education office; a coaches and officials' room with lockers, shower and toilet facilities; a room from which athletic equipment is to be issued; the Military Training office; and four store-rooms.

The foyer has been planned so that tickets to outside events can be sold from the inside of the building through a window opening on to the outside walk; and a booth is also located inside for events in the

gymnasium.

The gymnasium unit has been separated from the class-room so that

it can be used without opening the other unit.

Exits have been provided from the basement floor so that the boys in Military Training can get to their drill ground very easily, and so that athletic teams and physical education classes are only about 50 feet from the track and football field.

This gymnasium is under the management of the School City and is assigned to the George Washington High School. It will be used

for the regular activities of the high school.

MORRISTOWN GYMNASIUM

Date of completion-August 31. Outside dimensions-91' by 115'.

Playing floor—50' x 75'.

Seating capacity in permanent bleachers-1200. (Ample space for 500 more.)

Permanent bleacher seats on concrete.

Cost of entire new structure-\$52,000.00. (This cost includes two new rooms besides the gym.)

P. W. A. Contract.

Hardwood floor on concrete base.

Shale brick outside to match old structure.

May be used for basketball court; for physical education classes; equipped with stage for auditorium; dressing room, home economics rooms, agriculture rooms, shop and storage rooms under bleachers.

Outside windows and ample electric lighting.

Ample outside lighting, parking space, cement walks (yet to be extended), entrances and exits easily accessible, 20 ft. clearance (ceiling), self-supporting roof, etc.


School property, under the direct control of school.

SOUTH BEND STADIUM

The stadium was completed in September, 1938. The new section will accommodate about 6,000 people which will bring the total seating capacity to 11,500. The type of seats used is redwood. The construction is reinforced concrete and steel, and the method of financing is W. P. A. and Board of Education.

As far as the accommodations are concerned, it has locker rooms, shower rooms, rest rooms, and ticket offices. There is a press box and also a broadcasting booth as well as a press box in the old stands. There is a public address system installed, but there is no office, class

room or storage room at the present time.

Varsity locker room, 144 lockers. Freshmen and visiting team room, 56 lockers. Ladies' and Mens' rest rooms, bleachers, hurdle and general storage room, equipment room, training room, Coaches' and Officials' dressing room and showers, boiler room and coal bin.

Press box to accommodate 12 reporters; inclosed and steam heated.

Portable address system. Storage room as above.

TECHNICAL (Indianapolis) STADIUM

Date of Completion-Full seating capacity for the new set of bleachers on the south side of the field will be ready for the first home football game September 30. Construction will continue throughout the winter on the under-construction consisting of shower rooms, toilets, etc.

Seating capacity, allowing 18 inches to a person-3,500.

Type of seat used-2" x 8" wood supported on iron brackets above cement risers.

Method of financing-Athletic Department furnishing all material

with labor being furnished by W. P. A.

Facilities and Accommodations-Five 9 ft. ramps for loading and unloading to the rear. Dressing rooms, drying rooms, showers and toilets for home teams, visiting teams, officials and public.

Press Box—A press box located in the center of these bleachers at

the rear approximately 7 ft. by 20 ft. will give adequate press box

accommodations with clear vision in three directions.

Public Address System-Adequate facilities will be provided for

Office, Storage or Class Rooms-An abundance of storage space will be provided but no offices or class rooms will be included in this construction.

Other information—It is proposed to build additional bleachers of the same type on the opposite side of the field of same design and construction, but without team room facilities. It is expected that these bleachers will accommodate 2,000 people. Furthermore, an additional fill at the west side of the field will permit a running track which will permit the running of the 440-yard dash with but one turn



(1) Location—geographical with reference to schools desiring to participate; (2) Transportation accommodations; (3) General conditions—attitude of local authorities, tracks, fields, entertaining facilities, etc.; (4) Rotation.

Schools have been assigned by counties, and the accompanying scheme gives the Centers and the counties assigned to each Center. The name of your county locates your Center. The Board reserves the right to readjust the scheme if necessary. Entry blanks are necessary.

Management—The management of these meets rests solely with the Board of Control. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. All meet officials will be selected by the Center Principal.

The Center Principal shall arrange a program for his meet from the list of entries sent to him by the Commissioner. All meets shall begin at 1:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon May 14 unless the Center Principal secures the consent of the participating schools in his meet to hold the meet Friday afternoon or Friday evening May 13. If such consent is secured the Center Principal will inform the I. H. S. A. A. and each Principal in his meet of the hour of starting the meet. Places on the track must be assigned by lot. National Collegiate Athletic Association Track and Field Rules for 1938 shall govern except as modified in this announcement regarding scoring, eligibility, events and order of events.

Open Contest—These meets are open to all members of the Association, except to schools offering ninth year high school work only.

Entertainment—Two men, if actual contestants, for each event, four men, if actual contestants, for each relay team and a faculty manager from each competing school will be entertained by the Center Principal. Entertainment shall consist of one meal at noon, dressing rooms, lockers and shower facilities. The meal provided by the Center Principal shall constitute the only meal allowed.

Expenses—There will be no entry fee. Traveling expenses must be paid by the competing schools.

Privileges—All actual contestants and one faculty manager for each team are admitted free to the meet.

Eligibility—The eligibility of each player must be certified to by the Principal of the school sending the team. The regular blank of the I. H. S. A. A. must be used and all data must be given. Entries positively will close Friday, May 6. This means that they must be in the hands of the Commissioner, complete in every detail, on that date.

Admission Fee—The admission fee to all meets shall be not more than twenty-five cents, but may be any amount less than twenty-five cents.

Prizes—Suitable ribbons shall be given to the winners of first, second and third places in each event, and to each member of the winning relay teams. No other prizes shall be given.

Warnings—Entries close Friday, May 6, and can not be changed afterwards. Special privileges will be granted to no one. Send all entry blanks to the Commissioner.

FINAL MEET, SATURDAY, MAY 21

Butler University Field, Indianapolis

Entrants—The winning relay teams and all men winning first and second places in each event in the Sectional Meets shall constitute the participants in the Final Meet. In case of a tie in first or second place in a Sectional Meet, the right to enter the Final Meet goes to the winner of the badge who will be determined by lot by the Referee of the Sectional Meet.

Entertainment—Entertainment for all teams in the Final Meet located within a radius of 50 miles of the Butler Field shall consist of no more than the noon meal on Saturday. Entertainment for other

teams shall consist of no more than the dinner meal on Friday, lodging for Friday night and three meals on Saturday. The I.H.S.A.A. will serve the noon meal on Saturday and will not be obligated for meals taken elsewhere at this time. No more than 50 cents for a meal and one dollar for a lodging will be allowed. All competing schools are requested and expected to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary. Traveling will be at the expense of the competing schools. Since track and field meets usually produce little revenue, all schools are requested to be exceedingly careful in expenditures. Only actual contestants and one faculty manager from each school will be entertained. Fred R. Gorman, Technical High School (Phone Cherry 2949), and K. V. Ammerman, Broad Ripple High School (Phone Broadway 2408) are Assistant Managers of the State Meet.

Time of Events—Trials will be held beginning at 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning in the following events: 100-yard dash, 220-yard dash, 120-yard hurdle, 200-yard hurdle, pole vault, shot put, broad jump and high jump. The afternoon events will begin at 1:30 o'clock.

Races—The following events will be run in two races in the afternoon: 440-yard run, 880-yard run and one mile run. Points will be given for first, second, third, fourth and fifth place winners in each of the two races for each event.

Privileges—All actual contestants and one faculty manager for each team are to be admitted free to the meet.

Admission Fee—The admission fee to the meet shall be fifty cents (50c).

Management—The management, protests and privileges will be governed according to the regulations pertaining to the Sectional Meets.

Prizes—The I. H. S. A. A. will award the winning school a shield or cup; medals of gold, silver and bronze to the winners of first, second, third, fourth and fifth places in each event, except in the 440-yard run, 880-yard run and mile run, in which medals will be given for first, second and third place winners in each of the two races in each event; and medals to the members of the first, second and third winning relay teams. No other prizes shall be given.

Registration—All teams must be checked in at the Butler Field House by the Coach or Principal. The check-in gate, No. 4, will be open at 7:00 a. m. on Saturday. Principals are responsible for the proper registration of their teams on time. Late registrations will not be accepted. Correct expense statements must be filed at the time of registration. Principals are responsible for these statements.




Medal Play—The tournament will be conducted as Medal Play and 18 holes will be played.





BASEBALL PLAYING

(Hard Baseball and Soft Baseball)

The following statements have been authorized by the Board of Control:

- a. High school students may play on independent baseball teams during the summer when school is not in session without jeopardizing their standing or the standing of their school in the I.H.S.A.A. provided they do not play under assumed names and also provided they do not accept remuneration, directly or indirectly, for their playing.
- b. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted by the students if such are accepted in service rather than in money or in some other material form. The I.H.S.A.A. expects all High School students to so conduct themselves at all times that they, their High School and the State Association will be honored.
- c. All such playing should be checked carefully and frequently. The requirements should be extended to all students. Managers of independent teams should be warned of the dangers of using High School boys on baseball teams. A professional in one sport is a professional in all sports as far as eligibility in the I.H.S.A.A. is concerned.
- d. High School students, who play on baseball teams other than their High School teams during the school year, make themselves ineligible for baseball in High School in that school year.
- e. High School students, who play on baseball teams other than their High School teams during the school year, must have written permission of their High School Principal on file in the I.H.S.A.A. office prior to the participation. The responsibility of securing and filing this written permission rests with the student, the manager of the non-High School team and finally with the High School Principal. See Note.
- f. The I.H.S.A.A. considers that a High School is entitled to the High School students in baseball during the school year and that participation in baseball elsewhere should not take place except by the written permission of the High School Principal in each case. See Note.

Note: Permission granted by a Principal to a boy to play baseball on a team other than his High School team during the school year makes the boy ireligible for the High School team in baseball. No permit can be issued to violate any of the rules of the I.H.S.A.A. The purpose of the permit is to keep the Principal informed about his students.

BRIEF HISTORY OF I. H. S. A. A.

The first attempt to organize the High Schools of Indiana in a single organization for the purpose of handling athletic activities was made in a meeting of the Northern Indiana Teachers' Association held at Richmond, in April, 1903. At this time there was a conference of High School Principals, and the conference ended with a body of suggested rules and regulations, called the Richmond Agreement. Due to the fact that there was no central organization having executive power, the Richmond Agreement did little more than point the way toward something better.

Principal J. B. Pearcy, of Anderson, issued a call for a meeting of High School Principals interested in a State Athletic organization for December 5, 1903. At this meeting a provisional constitution was adopted. At a similar meeting on December 29, 1903, a final constitution was adopted and a Board of Control of three members was chosen to administer the affairs of the I. H. S. A. A.

The first Board of Control was made up of Principal George W. Benton, Shortridge High School, Indianapolis; Superintendent Lotus D. Coffman, Salem, and Principal J. T. Giles, Marion. These men thought and planned well, and we are enjoying the fruits of their vision.

There were fifteen (15) High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A., March 1, 1904, and now there are eight hundred and five (805) High Schools belonging. The membership has had a gradual growth through the years, and now the limit is recognized as the limit in the number of High Schools in the State.

A study of the men who have served on the Board of Control through the years will show clearly that the activities of the I. H. S. A. A. have been in good hands. The titles and addresses are given as they were when the men were board of control members. A complete list of the several Board members of the I. H. S. A. A. follows:

In the beginning, one member of the Board of Control served as Secretary, but it soon became very evident that this office furnished enough work for a special man. It was also seen that the future of the organization demanded that the office of Secretary be made more permanent than the office of Board Member. Accordingly, at the annual meeting in 1906 the office of Permanent Secretary was established, and Principal J. T. Giles was chosen by the Principals to be the first Permanent Secretary. Principal Giles resigned on December 26, 1912, and Principal Isaac E. Neff was chosen by the Principals to succeed him. Principal Neff resigned March 15, 1913, and the Board of Control appointed Principal Arthur L. Trester to serve as Perma-

nant Secretary until the next annual meeting in December, 1913. At this meeting, Principal Trester was chosen by the Principals as Permanent Secretary.

The Board of Control consisted of three members, chosen by the Principals in their annual meetings, until the annual meeting of October 27, 1916. At this meeting it was decided to divide the State into five districts for administrative and representative purposes, and that each district should have one representative on the Board of Control, chosen by mail ballot from his own district by the Principals of his district.

In September, 1925, by a referendum vote the Principals passed a legislative body proposal calling for four members from each of the five (5) I. H. S. A. A. districts. The five members of the Board of Control and the fifteen other members elected by the Principals in a mail vote constituted this legislative body. Prior to this scheme all legislation was done at the annual meeting or by referendum voting by mail. This Legislative Body of twenty members passed on all proposals submitted by the High School Principals. It was the law making body of the Association. The scheme was considered a step in advance in state administration and legislation in athletic activities.

On December 13, 1930, the Legislative Body considered and passed without a dissenting vote the provisions for an Athletic Council. The scheme in full continued the five I. H. S. A. A. districts in the state and arranged for five representatives on the Athletic Council from each district by classes determined by enrollments in the High Schools, thus making the Athletic Council a body of twenty-five members representing all sizes of High Schools and all districts of the state at all times and elected by the High School Principals in the membership. A provision was included for the selection of a Board of Control from the membership of the Athletic Council took over the duties of the former Legislative Body and is considered the law making body of the Association.

The primary purpose of the organizers of the I. H. S. A. A. to manage and to foster High School athletics on a high plane has been held up as an ideal by the Association through the thirty-four years of the life of the I. H. S. A. A. New and advanced steps have been taken whenever conditions made them necessary. It became increasingly evident as time went on that the I. H. S. A. A. should assume a larger and larger initiative in real physical education for all boys and all girls, and that physical education should be interpreted in the light of other educational aims and ideals. Accordingly, the I. H. S. A. A. now has a program, not only for the managing and fostering of High School athletics, but for the stimulation of communities and schools to the end that real physical education be given all boys and all girls throughout the grades and the High School.

The title "Permanent Secretary," established in 1906, was changed to "Commissioner of High School Athletics" in October, 1929, by the Legislative Body, and the Commissioner was granted the powers and duties belonging to a Commissioner of Athletics.

BASKETBALL TOURNEY CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

The rules, regulations and provisions in the Announcement Bulletin on January 11, 1937 were studied and sanctioned for the 1938 championship series with the following additions and understandings:

- 1. Damage to lavatories, goals, seats, nets, etc., at tourneys shall be considered an expense of the Center School and shall not be listed under legitimate expenses of the tourney.
- 2. The amounts provided by the Board of Control for the Center School holding a tourney shall not be used by a school as a bid for the tourney or in payment for the support of Principals to secure a tourney for a school.
- 3. Souvenir programs, other than those provided by the I. H. S. A. A., shall not be distributed or sold at any tourney and no solicitation of advertisements for such shall be permitted.
- 4. The determination and supervision of the concessions and the handling of the selling of newspapers at the Final Tourney were placed in the hands of the Commissioner, Mr. Gorman and Mr. Ammerman.
- 5. Reserved seats shall be provided by the Center Principal in all Regional and Semi-final Tourneys and no standing room shall be sold at any tourney.
- 6. Extra Periods. The regulations in Spalding's Official Rules for 1937-1938 shall govern in single games and in tourney games up to the end, if necessary, of the second overtime period. The foul throw method of last year shall govern beginning with the end of the second overtime period in all tourneys with the regulation that, in case of a tie score at the end of the second overtime period or in case one team is leading by one point at the end of the second overtime period, each player actually participating in the game at the end of this period shall be given one free throw at his own basket, the team having the most points including the point just mentioned, being declared the winner of the game.

SAINT BERNICE

Paul Sindlinger and his older brother, Oscar, lived in Patricksburg with their grandmother for the last 3 or 4 years. The father and mother of these boys have lived together at Patricksburg for a number of years and still live together there. The older brother says that he supports the younger brother.

These two brothers went to Saint Bernice some time in August last and are boarding with a man and his wife who moved from Patricksburg to Saint Bernice last August. Paul entered the Saint Bernice High School September 13, one week late. He said that the late enrollment was due to his work at Patricksburg. The older brother, Oscar, says that he adopted the younger brother, Paul, during the week beginning November 8, 1937.

Decision—Paul Sindlinger ineligible for any athletics in the Saint Bernice High School until he has been enrolled therein one calendar year according to the "change of high school" rule in the I. H. S. A. A.

Principal Thompson requested to send at once explanatory letters to the Principals of the opponent schools in games in which Paul Sindlinger participated this school year, forfeiting the games and asking the opponent Principals to notify the Commissioner as soon as they have heard from him. Principal Thompson also requested to send copies of his letters to the opponent Principals to the I. H. S. A. A. office.

BOONE COUNTY

Colfax, Michigantown, Jackson Township (Frankfort), Scircleville, Rossville and Sugar Creek Township (Kirklin) used non-approved officials in softball games this school year in violation of a rule in the I. H. S. A. A. reading,—"The major officials in all inter-contests shall be on the approved list of officials in the I. H. S. A. A."

Decision—All of the schools mentioned placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1938.

CULVER MILITARY ACADEMY

Hammond High School and Kokomo High School participated in a cross-country meet at the Academy November 6. This meet was not sanctioned by the National Federation although Lindbloom High School of Chicago participated. In fact, no application for sanction was made. This meet was not held under the auspices of the member schools concerned and no permission was given to Culver to sponsor the meet. The rule in the I. H. S. A. A. regarding participation in a meet with a non-member school was also violated.

Decision—Hammond High School and Kokomo High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1938.

JAMESTOWN

The parents of Karl Fleming and Lloyd Carter lived in Jamestown last school year until they moved out of this school district last spring. The boys finished the school year at Jamestown and re-entered the Jamestown High School for the present year without transfers or the payment of tuition.

Temporary Decision—Karl Fleming and Lloyd Carter considered ineligible for athletics in the Jamestown High School and the Commissioner instructed to invite Principal Jackson, Coach Lucas and the Township Trustee to appear before the Board of Control in the I. H. S. A. A. office at 11:00 o'clock Friday morning, November 26, 1937.

INSURANCE

The Commissioner was authorized to secure Burglary and Robbery insurance in the amount of \$112,000.00 each on the vault box of the I. H. S. A. A. for a period of three years.

BASKETBALL RULES

The Commissioner reported the differences in the printing of the Official Rules by the National Federation and the Official Editor, Mr. Tower, and submitted the correspondence in an attempt to discover the reason for these differences. It was decided that in case of an existing difference the Official Rules as published by the American Sports Publishing Company for Spalding's shall be considered official in the I. H. S. A. A.

The Board adjourned to meet at 10:00 A. M., Friday, November 26, 1937.

I. H. S. A. A. BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Indianapolis, Indiana, November 26, 1937.

Present: President Lee L. Eve, G. L. Russell, K. V. Ammerman, G. Warren Phillips, Arthur Campbell and Commissioner Arthur L. Trester.

JAMESTOWN

This case was considered by the Board of Control November 20, 1937 and a temporary decision reading as follows was made:

"Karl Fleming and Lloyd Carter considered ineligible for athletics in the Jamestown High School and the Commissioner instructed to invite Principal Jackson, Coach Lucas and the Township Trustee to appear before the Board of Control in the I. H. S. A. A. office at 11:00 o'clock Friday morning, November 26, 1937."

Principal Jackson and Coach Lucas appeared before the Board of Control but the Township Trustee did not appear.

Decision—Karl Fleming and Lloyd Carter considered ineligible for athletics in the Jamestown High School until June 1, 1938. Principal Jackson requested to send explanatory letters at once to the opponent Principals in all games in which these boys have participated this school year, forfeiting the games and asking these opponent Principals to notify the I. H. S. A. A. office as soon as they have received such letters. Principal Jackson furthermore requested to send copies of his letters to these opponent Principals to the I. H. S. A. A. office.

SAINT BERNICE

This case was considered and decided by the Board of Control November 20, 1937. Principal Thompson felt that the Board of Control did not understand the case and he was granted the privilege of

appearing before the Board of Control. Principal Thompson, Coach Wright, Oscar Sindlinger and Attorney Claude Hoskins appeared and gave evidence.

Decision—The decision of the Board of Control of November 20, 1937 unanimously affirmed by the Board of Control.

SWIMMING MEET

The Board decided to hold a State Championship Meet on February 26, 1938, under I. H. S. A. A. auspices. The Hammond and South Bend invitations to hold the meet were considered and it was decided to accept the Hammond invitation provided their pool is 75 feet long and satisfactory otherwise. In case the Hammond pool does not qualify, it was decided to accept the invitation of South Bend if the pool is satisfactory.

WRESTLING MEET

This meet, which has been held at Indiana University under I. H. S. A. A. auspices for several years, was sanctioned for 1937-1938.

INDOOR TRACK MEET

It was decided to hold no such meet in 1937-1938.

TOURNEYS

The invitations, data, correspondence, petitions and suggestions on file for 1937-1938 were carefully considered with a view to the final selection of centers to be made later.

It was decided that the assignment of officials to tourneys would be considered final.

It was also decided that the taking of flash-light pictures should not be permitted at any sectional, regional, semi-final or final tourney during actual play. A suggestion was made that schools supply photographers with the pictures of their teams in tourney rather than have such taken at tourneys.

The Board of Control adjourned to meet immediately after the meeting of the Athletic Council December 18, 1937, and at ten o'clock Wednesday morning, December 29, 1937.

OFFICE LEASE

It was decided to renew the lease for the present office for two years from January 1, 1938, at a rental of \$150.00 per month.

CLAYTON

The parents of Wendell Iddings moved from Plainfield to Clayton, October 15, 1937, but the boy remained in the Plainfield High School until November 1, 1937. The football season in Plainfield closed Friday night, October 29, 1937, and the evidence indicates that the boy remained to finish this season at Plainfield and probably to remain there permanently. The reason given for the change of high schools was that the car fare to and from Plainfield was too burdensome.

Decision—The I. H. S. A. A. expects students to change high schools at the time the parents change their place of residence unless satisfactory reasons for not doing so are presented to the Board of Control. If satisfactory reasons are presented, a student may remain in a school to complete the semester in which his parents change their place of residence.

Wendell Iddings considered ineligible for any athletics in the Clayton High School until he has been enrolled one calendar year. According to the evidence, he could have changed high schools at the time his parents changed their place of residence.

WEST LAFAYETTE

Principal Dean requested permission to hold an invitational track or relay meet in the Purdue University Field House, April 9, 1938. Final consideration was postponed but it was the consensus of opinion that only boys properly conditioned should enter such meets and that the date, April 9, should be used for outdoor meets.

MEMBERSHIPS

The acceptance of applications for membership in the I. H. S. A. A. of schools offering work in the ninth grade only was considered at length and it was decided that the Board of Control had no authority under the Constitution to refuse membership to such schools.

DRAWINGS

The seat locations of the 16 regional basket ball winners were drawn by lot and the results follow:

Four Semi-final Winners—School number 1 drew location 4; school number 2 drew location 1; school number 3 drew location 2; and school number 4 drew location 3.

Twelve Regional Winners—School number 1 drew location 11; school number 2 drew location 4; school number 3 drew location 8; school number 4 drew location 12; school number 5 drew location 3; school number 6 drew location 10; school number 7 drew location 9; school number 8 drew location 7; school number 9 drew location 1; school number 10 drew location 2; school number 11 drew location 5; and school number 12 drew location 6.

STATE OUTDOOR TRACK MEET

It was decided to hold this meet at Butler University. The facilities and accommodations at Butler University are covered in the I, H. S. A. A. lease.

BROADCASTING

It was decided to follow for the present year the rules and regulations adopted last year.

WABASH VALLEY ASSOCIATION

The basket ball tourney for January 28 and 29, 1938, and the Track Meet for May 7, 1938, were sanctioned.

The annual audit by Ernst & Ernst was reviewed, together with the expenditures of the I. H. S. A. A. in past years, and it was decided to use the data in these audit reports as a budget guide for the ensuing year.

HILLSDALE

This school used Dale Purcell as an umpire in a baseball game at Hillsdale between Newport and Hillsdale on September 10, 1937. The evidence shows that Newport had reason to believe that Hillsdale had secured an approved official for the game. The facts are, however, that Mr. Purcell and Principal Kiger knew at the time of the game that Mr. Purcell was not an approved official in the I. H. S. A. A. Mr. Purcell was approved October 2, 1937, upon the written recommendations of Principal Kiger and Coach Todd of Hillsdale, although no mention was made by either of them about the use of Mr. Purcell when he was not approved. In explanation, Mr. Purcell indicated that he received a letter from the Commissioner that the personnel in the I. H. S. A. A. office was completely covered up with work and that the matter of his card would be taken care of immediately. The Commissioner wrote no letter containing such information. In fact, the Commissioner wrote to Mr. Purcell under date of September 21, 1937: "I cannot approve you as an official in the I. H. S. A. A. on the basis of the information on file here at the present time."

Decision—Hillsdale High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1938.

Mr. Dale Purcell disbarred as an official for any sport in the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1938, with the understanding that reinstatement will be granted at that time only upon proper application and fee, together with satisfactory recommendations. The Commissioner was instructed to return the fee of \$1.00 paid by Mr. Purcell.

TOURNEY CENTERS

Additional consideration was given to the selection of centers and the assignment of schools, but final decisions were postponed until next meeting.

The meeting adjourned to meet at 9:30 o'clock Wednesday morning, December 29, 1937.

Present: President Lee L. Eve, G. L. Russell, K. V. Ammerman, G. Warren Phillips, Arthur Campbell and Commissioner Arthur L. Trester. H. E. Sanford and Robert S. Hinshaw, newly elected members, were present in the afternoon.

BASKET BALL TOURNEYS

The available data and information regarding tourney centers and school assignments were carefully considered. The centers were selected, together with the assignment of schools to these centers, for the sectional, regional and semi-final tourneys for 1938 with the understanding that no information would be given out until the tourney bulletin is printed and mailed to the Principals.

It was decided that the molded type of basket ball would not be approved for any of these tourneys for 1938 with the understanding that additional consideration be given to this type of ball next year after the results of its use in single games for the present year are known.

PUTNAMVILLE

Principal Mayle submitted data regarding the enrollments and participations in athletics of Donald Carrington, a former student in his high school, and asked about his eligibility in case he should enter high school next semester.

The Board of Control postponed this case with the understanding that the eligibility status of the boy would be determined at a Board meeting if and after he had actually enrolled and attended the Putnamville High School.

CYNTHIANA

The correspondence regarding the eligibility status and participation in athletics of Franklin Rothwell was considered and the Commissioner was instructed to invite Principal A. L. Meadows to appear before the Board of Control at their next meeting which will be held in the I. H. S. A. A. office at one o'clock Saturday afternoon, January 22, 1938.

It was the unanimous opinion of the Board that the Indoor Track or Relay Meet proposed by Principal Dean of West Lafayette for April 9, 1938, should not be held.

EMPLOYMENT OF COMMISSIONER

The Board of Control voted to continue the present contract of Arthur L. Trester as Commissioner of the I. H. S. A. A. until August 1, 1938, and employed him by unanimous vote for two calendar years beginning August 1, 1938, at the same salary and under the same considerations.

The Board reorganized for 1938 by electing Mr. G. L. Russell President.

I. H. S. A. A. BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Indianapolis, Indiana, January 22 and 23, 1938.

Present: President G. L. Russell, G. Warren Phillips, Robert S. Hinshaw, H. E. Sanford, Mark Wakefield and Commissioner Arthur L. Trester.

CYNTHIANA

Franklin Rothwell changed high schools from Rockport to Cynthiana last September. He lived in the Rockport Orphanage and moved to the home of Welker Rust. Principal Meadows requested that the eligibility status of the boy be determined early in the school year and during this process, and before an opinion could be given, he used the boy in some basket ball games. The residence of Mr. Rust is in the Poseyville school district and not in the Cynthiana school district.

Decision-(1) Cynthiana High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1938. (2) Franklin Rothwell considered ineligible for any athletics for one calendar year following the date of his last participation in athletics at Cynthiana, Principal Meadows to furnish the Commissioner with this date soon. (3) Principal Meadows requested to send soon explanatory letters to the Principals in the games in which Franklin Rothwell played, forfeiting the games and requesting these Principals to notify the I. H. S. A. A. office as soon as they have received their letters. (4) Principal Meadows requested to send copies of his letters to these Principals to the Commissioner.

CROSS PLAINS

Preston Voris lived near Cross Plains and attended the Cross Plains High School, completing the two years of work given there at that time. He then entered the Versailles High School, attended one whole year and semester one of last year. Cross Plains is offering four years of work this year and the boy has re-entered there.

Decision-Preston Voris may now be considered eligible in the Cross Plains High School, as far as the change of high schools from Versailles to Cross Plains is concerned.

PUTNAMVILLE

Donald Carrington was enrolled in Putnamville, a three-year high school, 1934-1935, 1935-1936 and 1936-1937. He failed in all ninth grade subjects in 1934-1935, but took tenth grade work in 1935-1936 and eleventh grade work in 1936-1937. The evidence shows that he did not participate in athletics in 1934-1935 or in semester one 1935-1936. He played basket ball the second semester 1935-1936 and the year 1936-1937. He re-enrolled for semester two 1937-1938.

Donald Craddick was enrolled semester one 1934-1935, semester two 1935-1936, and semester two 1936-1937. The evidence shows that he did not participate in athletics in 1934-1935. He played basket ball the second semester of the years 1935-1936 and 1936-1937. He reenrolled for semester two 1937-1938.

CLEARSPRING (Ewing)

Eloyd Tabor lived with W. M. Allen in the Center Grove school district and attended this high school the school year 1936-1937. In the latter part of April, 1937, the boy went to live with Don Dresslar in the Center Grove school district and continued to live with him until November 9, 10 or 11, 1937, with attendance in the Center Grove High School.

Mr. W. M. Allen moved from the Center Grove school district to the Clearspring school district November 9, 10 or 11, 1937, and Eloyd Tabor went to live with him, changing high schools from Center Grove to Clearspring at that time.

Decision—(1) Eloyd Tabor considered ineligible for any athletics for one calendar year following the date of his last participation in athletics at Clearspring, Principal Scott to furnish the Commissioner with this date soon. (2) Principal Scott requested to send soon explanatory letters to the Principals in the games in which Eloyd Tabor played, forfeiting the games and requesting these Principals to notify the I. H. S. A. A. office as soon as they have received their letters. (3) Principal Scott requested to send to the Commissioner copies of his letters to these Principals.

TOURNEY CENTERS

The correspondence and information regarding the selection of tourney centers and the assignment of schools to these centers were submitted and discussed but no changes were made.

NATIONAL FEDERATION MEETING

The Board decided to leave the matter of attendance at the annual meeting with the individual members of the Board of Control.

RIDGEVILLE

Permission was given to Walter Thompson, Publisher of the Randolph County News, to broadcast by telephone and a public address system at the News Office Building, the tourney games in which Ridgeville plays, provided satisfactory arrangements are made with the Tourney Principal and also provided the broadcasting has no objectionable features and is not a commercial proposition.

ENDORSEMENTS

The whole question of specifically endorsing particular play and recreation programs by clubs, organizations, lodges, churches, cities, towns, etc., in which high school students participate during the summer months when school is not in session, was carefully considered and it was unanimously decided to affirm the policy of long standing in the I. H. S. A. A. According to this policy high school students may participate on non-high school teams during the summer months when school is not in session and may claim eligibility in high school athletics thereafter provided the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. are not violated in any way. This policy is a general policy applying to all schools, students and organizations in like manner.

SIX-MAN FOOTBALL

This game was discussed and it was decided that the game should be considered on the same basis as any other game. All of the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. apply to the schools and students participating in any inter-school athletic game or contest. For the present, at least, it was decided that officials approved in elevenman football would be considered eligible to officiate in six-man football. It was also decided that the season for six-man football would be the same as for eleven-man football.

The Board adjourned to meet at one o'clock (1:00) Friday afternoon, February 25, 1938.

Present: President G. L. Russell, G. Warren Phillips, Robert S. Hinshaw, H. E. Sanford, Mark Wakefield and Commissioner Arthur L. Trester.

MOORESVILLE

Superintendent Caldwell, Principal Long and Coach Harvey submitted a petition for a transfer of the Mooresville High School from the Bloomington Sectional Tourney to some other sectional tourney for 1938. Consideration was given to the petition and it was decided to make no change in the original assignment of the Mooresville High School to the Bloomington Sectional Tourney.

ELKHART-NAPPANEE

Principal Holdeman and Coach Longfellow of Elkhart, and Superintendent Abell, Principal Roose and Coach Schuler of Nappanee appeared before the Board and gave evidence regarding the difficulties in connection with the Elkhart-Nappanee game at Nappanee on January 26, 1938. The Commissioner had written to both Principals on February 10, stating that the Board of Control would desire to know the definite steps taken by either or both schools to penalize the guilty parties and the steps taken by either or both schools to prevent such difficulties in the future. He had also suggested that the officials of the two schools meet, discuss the situation, take some definite actions and report to the I. H. S. A. A.

The I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control sanctions the suggestions of the Commissioner, as outlined in his letter of February 10, and requests that the authorities of the two schools file with the I. H. S. A. A. soon written reports and statements covering the suggestions offered in the letter and in the hearing. Final disposition of this case was postponed, pending receipt of these reports.

TABLE TENNIS

Mr. Chester Schleff, Vice-President, Indiana Table Tennis Association, submitted a letter to the Board about table tennis games and tournaments between and among the high schools of the state. The Board gave this letter careful consideration and decided that the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. are binding on member schools and their students in such games and tournaments, that the Principals are informed about these rules and that this whole matter should be left in their control and under their supervision.

PLAY DAYS

The Board affirmed former decisions regarding students and schools participating in Play Days. These former decisions were to the effect that the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. are binding on all students, boys and girls, in high schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. and that Principals have supervision of all inter-school athletic activities connected with their high schools.

MORRISTOWN-EDEN (Greenfield)

Principal Clements of Eden and Principal Lamb, Coach Genth, Captain Lowe and player Scott of Morristown, appeared before the Board and gave evidence regarding some difficulties connected with a game between these two schools at Eden, February 4, 1938. Captain Lowe and player John Scott admitted their errors in conduct during the game. Principal Lamb and Coach Genth expressed their regrets about the incidents and also stated that some remedial steps had been taken in the matter.

The Board decided that Captain Lowe and player John Scott should be declared ineligible for any basket ball games prior to the sectional tourney but that they could be certified and participate in the sectional tourney, provided their conduct is entirely satisfactory at all times.

CANNELTON

Principal Garrison submitted a suggestion about the use of surplus I. H. S. A. A. money to purchase insurance for all of the athletes in schools of the state. Consideration was given to the suggestion, but no action was taken.

VINCENNES

Coach John Adams submitted a proposal that the f. H. S. A. A. purchase at a reduced price a sufficient number of the Adams Score Books for each of the high schools of the state. Consideration was given to the proposal, but no action was taken.

SOUVENIR PROGRAMS

It was decided that the regulations regarding souvenir programs in connection with I. H. S. A. A. basket ball tourneys should govern such programs in connection with other I. H. S. A. A. sports.

RESERVED SEATS

The Commissioner was given authority to make adjustments in this requirement at regional and semi-final tourneys if, after a careful investigation, adjustments seem necessary for the 1938 tourneys.

MUNCIE (Burris High School)

A hearing of three hours in duration was held regarding the athletic eligibility status in the I. H. S. A. A. and the circumstances connected therewith of Robert Hilderbrand, Dick Hilderbrand and Dick Aubrey, students in the Burris High School. The Hilderbrand brothers formerly attended the Union City High School, Randolph County, and the Aubrey boy formerly attended the Selma High School, Delaware County.

The names of those persons who were present and who gave evidence are: Principal Johnson, Burris; President Pittenger, Ball State Teachers College and Burris; Coach Scott Fisher, Burris; Herbert Hamilton, Burris; Elmer Hilderbrand and son Robert; Aaron Aubrey and son Dick; Superintendent Baird, Delaware County; Principal Keever, Selma; Superintendent Allman, Muncie Schools; Coach Jolly, Central; Coach Walter Fisher, Central; Principal Shaffer, Central; Superintendent Garver, Union City; Principal Cole, Union City; Coach McCullough, Union City; Manager Fred Skusa, Chevrolet-Muncie; Personnel Director E. E. Blakeslee, Chevrolet-Muncie; Arthur Beckner, Director of Recreation, Chevrolet-Muncie; Charles Budd, Muncie. Charles Hampton, Emerson School, Muncie, was present.

The case of the Hilderbrand brothers was introduced to the Commissioner by Arthur Beckner, Director of Recreation, Chevrolet-Muncie, in the early part of April, 1937. He stated that he desired to learn about the eligibility status of the boys, should they enroll in the Burris High School. He was directed to the Principals concerned. The case of the Aubrey boy was introduced by Principal Johnson of the Burris High School at a later date. The question of undue influence was discussed at both of these presentations.

Principal Johnson made investigations, declared the boys eligible and has used them in inter-school athletic games during the present school year. He also filed with the I. H. S. A. A. correspondence and information regarding these investigations.

Mr. Hilderbrand and his family moved to Muncie last spring and he has been working at the Chevrolet-Muncie Plant. Robert Hilderbrand and Dick Hilderbrand worked at the Chevrolet-Muncie Recreation Field last summer. Mr. Aubrey and his son, Dick, moved to Muncie late in last summer. The father secured employment at the Chevrolet-Muncie Plant and the son, Dick, worked at the Chevrolet-Muncie Recreation Field last summer. Coach Fisher of the Burris

High School worked at the Chevrolet-Muncie Recreation Field for four or five weeks toward the end of last summer and served as Supervisor there.

All parties were given an opportunity to present their facts, opinions, rumors, refutations and reactions at the hearing and these opportunities were accepted.

The Board of Control, after sifting and weighing all of the evidence and circumstances concerning these cases in the light of the wording and spirit of the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A., reaches the following decision:

Decision

- 1. Robert Hilderbrand, Dick Hilderbrand and Dick Aubrey declared ineligible for any inter-school athletics until January 1, 1939.
- 2. Burris High School (Muncie) placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until January 1, 1939.
- 3. Principal Johnson requested to take the following steps at an early date:
- a. Send explanatory letters to the opponent Principals in all athletic games in which Robert Hilderbrand, Dick Hilderbrand or Dick Aubrey have participated this school year (1937-1938), forfeiting the games won by Burris High School to these schools and requesting these Principals to notify the I. H. S. A. A. office that they have received such letters.
- b. Mail copies of the letters sent to the opponent Principals to the I. H. S. A. A. office.

The Board adjourned to meet promptly at one o'clock Friday afternoon, February 25, 1938.

TENNIS

Consideration of a state tourney for 1938 was postponed.

WOMENS' DIVISION N. A. A. F.

A request by this organization that the I. H. S. A. A. endorse the standards and further the work of this organization was considered.

It was decided that, since the I. H. S. A. A. has been and still is in sympathy with the platform of the Womens' Division and that, since the I. H. S. A. A. has advocated in its own work from the time of its organization in 1903 the points in the platform of the Womens' Division, no mutual endorsements seem to be necessary.

BURRIS (Muncie)

A letter from Principal Johnson and the answer by the Commissioner were considered and it was decided that no additional statements were necessary from the Board of Control.

MILROY-WALDRON

The Commissioner reported the steps already taken in this case and informed the Board that the Milroy High School had been placed on probation for an indefinite period. The Board sanctioned the probation penalty and postponed final settlement of the case to a later meeting.

NAPPANEE-ELKHART

Consideration was given to the additional correspondence in this case and final settlement of the case was postponed to a later meeting.

TOURNEYS

The officials for the sectional tourneys were assigned and the officials for the Final Tourney were selected. The schedules for the sectional, regional, semi-final and final tourneys were drawn by lot according to the scheme mentioned in the announcement Bulletin No. 4.

The Board adjourned to meet immediately after the afternoon game in the Final Tourney and at 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning, April 9, 1938.

The Commissioner was instructed to negotiate with Principal Phillips of Vincennes in an effort to adjust some items in his report, then make a report to the Board of Control at their next meeting.

The meetings of the basket ball coaches and rules committees scheduled for Chicago, April 6 and 7, 1938, were discussed and it was decided that the Board members could attend these meetings if they thought the several meetings would be of value to the I. H. S. A. A.

After careful consideration by the members of the Board of Control, Robert Mygrants of the Hammond High School was selected as the winner of the Gimbel Prize for mental attitude in the 1938 Final Basket Ball Tourney.

The Board adjourned to meet at 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning, April 9, 1938.

ELKHART-NAPPANEE

This case had been postponed pending receipt of additional information. It concerns some difficulties among the fans following a basket ball game at Nappanee during the season. The case was closed and the correspondence filed after consideration was given to the steps taken and promises made regarding the future by the officials of both schools.

MILROY

Mr. Charles Marsh struck Referee Dean Smith following a basket ball game during the season. Trustee Paul Daubenspeck filed an affidavit charging Charles Marsh with assault and battery. Mr. Marsh plead guilty and paid a fine of \$1.00 and costs in the Court of Justice of the Peace Walter W. Peters. The total cost was \$11.50. Principal Reynolds paid Referee Smith a total of \$31.00 for clothing torn and physician's fees. Principal Reynolds and Referee Smith filed a jointly signed statement that a settlement had been reached. The case was closed and the correspondence filed. The temporary probation of the Milroy High School was lifted.

THORNTOWN

Lloyd Carter was declared ineligible by the Board of Control in the Jamestown High School on November 26, 1937, until June 1, 1938. About the middle of February, 1938, the parents of this boy moved to Thorntown and the boy entered the Thorntown High School. The Board decided that the boy's ineligibility in the Jamestown High School until June 1, 1938, moved with him to Thorntown when he changed high schools.

BEDFORD

Principal Mourer extended a request by some of the business men of Bedford to give Coach Lostutter a watch and Assistant Coach Holmes a chair as tokens of appreciation. It was decided that such could be given if given by and with the consent of the Principal and other school officials.

WRESTLING

It was decided to use in wrestling the inter-collegiate rules as they are modified for high schools.

BATESVILLE

Principal Cassidy reported on March 1 that Referee F. M. Klayer, formerly of Holton, failed to appear according to contract for a game February 19, 1938, although a letter had been sent to him earlier in the week reminding him of the engagement. Principal Cassidy and the Commissioner wrote letters to Referee Klayer requesting an explanation. The letters were not returned and no replies were received.

Decision—Mr. F. M. Klayer disbarred as an official in the I. H. S. A. A. and the Commissioner was instructed to send him a disbarment card at an early date.

GIRLS' ATHLETICS

The topic of Girls' Athletics was discussed at length and the long standing policy of the I. H. S. A. A. that the High School Principals, whose schools belong to the I. H. S. A. A., should administer interschool athletics for girls as well as for boys according to the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. was unanimously affirmed. Play Day activities, in which boys and/or girls from different schools participate, are considered inter-school athletic activities.

STATE FINAL TOURNEY FINANCIAL REPORT

The Commissioner submitted for the action of the Board of Control complete information concerning the finances, tickets, ticket orders and concessions for the State Final Basket Ball Tourney. A check was made by the Board of Control and the complete report was approved as proper and correct.

TRACK AND GOLF

Arrangements, Meet Centers and the assignment of schools for Track and Field Meets and the Golf Tournament were discussed at length. The following things were decided:

- 1. That member schools having ninth grade students only be barred from the State Golf Tournament and from all State Track and Field Meets in 1938.
- 2. That the medals and trophies for 1938 be the same as last year in the State Track Meet except that medals be given to first, second and third place winners in both races in the 440-Yard Run, 880-Yard Run and Mile Run, and that medals be given to the four boys on each of the first, second and third winning teams in each of the Relay Races.
- 3. That the Commissioner be given authority to complete the arrangements for the Golf Tournament and for the Track and Field Meets for 1938.

TENNIS

It was decided that the I. H. S. A. A. would not hold a State Tennis Meet this year.

FRANKLIN

Principal Porter presented the eligibility case of Don Cravens, who returned to Franklin High School recently after spending the winter in West Palm Beach, Florida, where he participated in several non-high school golf tournaments. The boy won some cups in these tournaments. Additional information was requested and the Commissioner was authorized to determine the eligibility status of the boy upon receipt of complete information.

CONVENTIONS

A request by the President of the Convention Bureau in Indianapolis that a block of tickets for the State Final Tourney be set aside for the members of an association, which was considering Indianapolis as a convention meeting place next March, was presented by the Commissioner. After careful consideration, it was unanimously decided that the Board of Control had no authority or desire to guarantee tickets to any parties other than the schools in the membership.

The Board of Control adjourned to meet at 11:30 o'clock Saturday morning, May 21, 1938, in the office at Gate 4 in the Butler Field House.

The Commissioner was instructed to inform Principal Johnson that this arrangement for the coaching of his baseball team would comply with the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A.

PRIZES AND AWARDS

Consideration was given to this matter as it concerns players, coaches and the wording of the present rules in the I. H. S. A. A. Final action was not taken but each member of the Board and the Commissioner were charged with the responsibility of studying the problems connected with the execution of the rules and regulations as they now stand and of submitting suggestions at the next meeting so that something definite could be presented to the Athletic Council in October.

FRANKLIN

Principal Porter requested permission to give inexpensive medals to each of the four members of his Golf Team that finished in a tie for the State Golf Championship in 1938.

Permission was granted for the giving of such medals provided such is done by and with the consent of Principal Porter as High School Principal and provided the medals have symbolic value only.

FRANKLIN-EDINBURG

The difficulties connected with a game in the sectional basket ball tourney at Franklin were discussed at length after the Commissioner had reported his attempts to secure a settlement by the Principals and others concerned. The Commissioner was instructed to continue his efforts to secure a settlement with the understanding that a hearing would be scheduled for the Board of Control in case a settlement could not be reached.

DISTRIBUTION OF SURPLUS MONEY

The finances of the I. H. S. A. A. and the sections in the Constitution regarding the distribution of surplus money were carefully considered and the Commissioner was instructed and authorized to sell sufficient Government Securities and to pay on October 1, 1938, each school in the membership out of I. H. S. A. A. funds ten dollars for each year of membership in the I. H. S. A. A. and ten dollars for each

year of participation in an I. H. S. A. A. Sectional Basket Ball Tourney for the calendar years 1936, 1937 and 1938 with the following regulations:

1. Maximum amount apportioned to a school for membership and for participation in the years 1936, 1937 and 1938 shall be \$60.00 on the basis of \$10.00 for each year of membership and \$10.00 for each year of participation in a sectional tourney.

2. Memberships resulting in suspension for a part of a year shall count as non-membership for that year.

3. Limited membership shall count as membership.

4. A combination of two or more schools shall count as one school.

5. The check shall be made to the High School and the endorsement shall be required for the High School by the Principal.

6. A school must have been a member of the I. H. S. A. A. on or before June 1, 1938, to count this year as a member school in this distribution.

BASKET BALL

A synopsis of the Official Rules for 1938-1939 was discussed, but it was decided to delay final action until the Official Rules by Editor Tower have been definitely worded and published.

Types of basket balls were considered, but no action was taken. It was thought that schools should use in an experimental way for a portion of next season both types of ball—the leather ball and the molded ball, with the understanding that the Board would make a ruling later about the type of ball to be used in I. H. S. A. A. tour-

Some discussion was given to tourneys and contracts, but no action was taken.

JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOLS

The membership and the activities of schools in the I. H. S. A. A. offering less than four years of high school work were discussed at length. Final action was not taken but each member of the Board and the Commissioner were charged with the responsibility of studying the problems connected with such schools in athletics and of submitting suggestions at the next meeting so that something definite could be presented to the Athletic Council next October.

NEW HIGH SCHOOLS

The long-standing policy of the Board of Control of considering students, who enter entirely new high schools from other high schools within the same city or school corporation at the time the new schools are opened and who enter according to the regulations of the school authorities, just as eligible in the new school as they would have been in their old schools, was reaffirmed with the understanding that all doubtful cases be submitted for consideration to the Commissioner.

SIX-MAN FOOTBALL

The Official Rules for eleven-man football by the National Intercollegiate Association plus the Official Rules for six-man football by Mr. Stephen Epler's Committee were ruled the Official Rules in sixman football in the I. H. S. A. A. for 1938-1939.

PLAINVILLE

Principal L. Lowe asked the Board of Control if the I. H. S. A. A. would finance a study being made by him of athletic honors and awards, the results to be turned over to the I. H. S. A. A.

This question was carefully considered, but the Board of Control decided that the I. H. S. A. A. should continue to follow its long-standing policy of non-participation, as far as finances are concerned, in studies made by individuals.

INDIANA COUNCIL OF EDUCATION

Membership in this Council was considered. The consensus of opinion was that the I. H. S. A. A. should take membership, but that the Commissioner should secure additional information to present at the next meeting.

DEMOLAY TRACK PARTICIPATION

Mr. Ross Smith of Indianapolis asked about participation on a Demolay track team by high school boys in Indianapolis in an intersectional track meet later this summer. The question was referred to the High School Principals with the opinion of the Board of Control that such participation should not take place.

FORT WAYNE SECTIONAL TRACK MEET

The Commissioner made a report on this meet, but no action was taken.

GIRLS' ATHLETICS

This whole question was discussed and it was thought that no action was necessary at the present time other than to affirm the sanction of Play Days conducted according to I. H. S. A. A. rules and regulations with the understanding that participation in Play Days by students would not jeopardize the standing of the schools and with the further understanding that participation in basket ball as a minor part of a Play Day program could take place until March 1 of each year.

Some miscellaneous matters regarding I. H. S. A. A. Bulletins, ticket distributions by Principals, finances, annual meeting, policies, etc., were discussed and the Commissioner requested the Board Members to feel free to review any information, correspondence, contracts and financial holdings on file in the I. H. S. A. A. at any time.

The Board of Control adjourned to meet at ten o'clock Saturday morning, August 20, 1938.

BASKET BALL RULES-1938-1939

The following regulations were adopted:

1. Rule 2, Section 2, Note—"On courts where it is feasible, the backboards may be four feet from the end lines."

Regulation—This provision may be used in single games by mutual consent prior to the game, but will not be used in I. H. S. A. A. tourneys.

2. Rule 3, Note—"This section does not preclude the use of other types of baskets which have been submitted to and been approved by the National Committee."

Regulation—This provision may be used in single games by mutual consent prior to the game, but will not be used in I. H. S. A. A. tourneys.

3. Rule 8, Section 1, Paragraph 3—This paragraph provides for an Official's time-out by mutual agreement.

Regulation—The "mutual agreement" should be reached prior to the game.

4. The old type of leather covered ball and the new molded ball meet the specifications in the rules and may be used in single games. The Board of Control will decide on or before January 1, 1939, regarding the type of ball to be used in I. H. S. A. A. tourneys.

PRIZES, AWARDS AND GIFTS

1. Article XI, Sections 1, 2 and 3 in the Constitution were carefully considered and it was decided to recommend no changes in the wording of these sections.

- 2. Article V in the Constitution was carefully considered and it was decided to recommend to the Athletic Council the following sections and wording:
 - Section 1. Paid coaches, other than those regularly employed as teachers by the trustees of the school, are prohibited. The expression "paid coach" refers to any person who receives, directly or indirectly, remuneration of any kind, money, traveling expenses, etc., in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any high school athletic team.
 - Section 2. No high school shall be permitted to employ a coach, manager, or athletic director who receives any remuneration, extra pay, salary, etc., from any outside sources in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any high school athletic team.
 - Section 3. The giving and receiving of prizes, awards and gifts shall be kept within reasonable bounds and such as are given shall have symbolic value only.
 - Section 4. The giving and receiving of prizes and awards shall be done by and with the consent and under the supervision of the high school principals concerned.

I. H. S. A. A. MEMBERSHIP

The whole question of the membership of schools offering less than four years of high school work was carefully considered and it was decided to recommend the following to the Athletic Council:

- 1. Full membership be granted to all public high schools offering three or four years of work.
- 2. Limited membership be granted to other public high schools with the understanding that limited membership shall extend the privilege of participating in single athletic games and contests with other high schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A., but not in meets and tourneys in which more than two teams participate except in meets and tourneys in which only the teams from the high schools of the same city participate.

CHANGE OF HIGH SCHOOL RULE

The whole question of securing or retaining an athlete as a student was carefully considered and the following regulations were either affirmed or adopted:

- 1. Interpretation 15 following the Constitution affirmed.
- 2. The note following Interpretation 15 affirmed.
- 3. Students attending high schools outside the school district of their parents will be expected to pay the regular tuition or present an official transfer in a bona fide way.
 - 4. The undue influence rule is applicable at all times.
- 5. The rules and regulations of the State Board of Education will be considered carefully in determining the eligibility of high school students.

FRANKLIN-EDINBURG

The Commissioner reported the results of the efforts that had been made to secure a settlement in this case. The Board of Control instructed the Commissioner to invite the Superintendent, Principal and Coach of each school and the two officials of the game in which the difficulty arose to appear before the Board of Control at one o'clock Saturday afternoon, September 24, 1938.

LEBANON

Principal Christian stated that the Park Board desired to sponsor a soft-ball tourney in which high school boys would participate and to give a cash prize to the winning team for a banquet. The Commissioner extended the information that the Board of Control would, in all probability, not look with favor on the cash prize, and suggested that the Park Board give the banquet instead. The Board of Control sanctioned this information and suggestion.

STATE TRACK MEET

The Commissioner read a report of the unsatisfactory conditions surrounding this meet held at the Butler Field which he had sent to Secretary Atherton of the Butler Board of Trustees. The report was sanctioned and the consensus of opinion of the Board of Control was that the meet should be held elsewhere in the future unless conditions at Butler University are made satisfactory.

The Board adjourned to meet at 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning, September 24, 1938.

ATHLETIC COUNCIL

It was decided to present to the Council for consideration and discussion at its next meeting the topic of prizes, awards and gifts to coaches and the topic of membership in the I. H. S. A. A. of schools offering less than three years of high school work.

ELKHART

At the time of the death of the father of Richard Gage an older brother, John, was made the executor of their father's estate. Richard continued to attend school at LaGrange, Illinois, after the father died until February, 1935, when John and he moved to Danville, Illinois. In February, 1936, John moved to Chicago and Richard went to his uncle at East Aurora, Illinois to attend school. During the summer of 1937 Richard went to the home of John at 7631 Eastlake Terrace, Chicago. Richard attended Lake Forest Academy, Lake Forest, Illinois, last school year. In June, 1938, John moved

to Elkhart. Richard came to Elkhart during the summer and is now enrolled in the Elkhart High School.

Decision—The change of high school rule in the I. H. S. A. A. Constitution is binding in this case and Richard Gage can not be considered eligible for any athletics at Elkhart until he has been enrolled there one calendar year. The change of high schools by Richard does not correspond to the change of residence of John.

BURNEY

Vernon Hooper's parents moved from Paris Crossing to Burney last February. The boy remained at Paris Crossing until about two weeks prior to the end of the school year, then entered the Burney High School.

Decision—Vernon Hooper may be considered just as eligible for athletics at Burney as he would have been had he remained at Paris Crossing provided no undue influence is attached to the case in any way.

ROMNEY

Fred Baldwin's mother lives in Rushville but the boy was placed in a home at Lebanon several years ago. Later he was placed in the home of Mr. Hummer at West Point and attended school there last year. Last summer he went to the home of his sister and is attending school at Romney. The Rush County Director of Public Welfare says that Fred is no longer a ward of the Court. A letter from the Home at Lebanon says that Fred is not under the juristion of the Home.

Decision—The change of high school rule in the I. H. S. A. A. Constitution is binding in this case and Fred Baldwin can not be considered eligible for athletics at Romney until he has been enrolled there one calendar year. There has been no change of residence of anyone with whom the boy made his home last year.

CAYUGA

Warren Meeker has attended the Cayuga Schools all of his school life. His mother is dead and the whereabouts of his father is not known. The boy lived with Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Pierson until last November when they moved to Fort Branch. The boy has continued to attend the Cayuga High School.

Decision—Warren Meeker considered eligible for athletics at Cayuga provided no undue influence is attached to the case in any way.

WATERLOO

Case postponed on account of insufficient information.

MADISON TWP. (Wakarusa)

Cases continued with instructions to Commissioner that he request Principal Newman to write to the State Department of Public Instruction about the legal school residences of the three students mentioned and that copies of the letter of inquiry and answer be filed in the I. H. S. A. A. office for consideration at an early date.

BEDFORD

The parents of Don McLoed moved to Knoxville, Tennessee last spring. The boy desires to attend school at Bedford.

Decision—Don McLeod considered ineligible at Bedford unless he pays the regular tuition or presents a transfer in a bona fide way.

HORACE MANN (Gary)

Case of Chris Eleopolus considered and Commissioner instructed to secure additional information. The boy considered ineligible pending an investigation of all conditions.

NASHVILLE

Principal Meade says that the Trustee of Johnson Township, Brown County, has been sending his high school students to the Houston High School in Jackson County. This year the Trustee is holding his high school students in Brown County and is sending some of them to Nashville in Washington Township, Brown County.

Decision—The change of high school rule in the I. H. S. A. A. Constitution is binding in these cases and the students can not be considered eligible for athletics in the Nashville High School until they have enrolled therein one calendar year. There has been no change of residence of the parents in these cases.

NEW CASTLE

Five or six years ago the parents of Harry Woolf separated and the mother re-married in 1932, according to a letter by Principal Valentine. Harry was placed in the Indiana Soldiers and Sailors' Children's Home at Knightstown on November 13, 1933, upon the request of the mother. The boy has now returned to his mother in New Castle, although he was not required to do so by the rules and regulations of the Home.

Decision—Harry Woolf considered ineligible for athletics in the New Castle High School until he has been enrolled one calendar year. The change of high school rule in the I. H. S. A. A. Constitution is binding in this case.

WINGATE

Garnet Williams applied for approval to officiate baseball in the I. H. S. A. A. and upon inquiry it was found that he had officiated in high school games last year when he was not approved. He states, "I umpired for the Newtown High School for games played with Attica, Mellott, Kingman and Williamsport High Schools."

Principal Conlin says that Mr. Williams umpired a game in 1936 in which the Mellott School played; Principal Mann says that Mr. Williams officiated in baseball when the Newtown School played; Superintendent Cunningham says that Mr. Williams officiated in

baseball when the Attica School played; Principal Von Scoyoc says that Mr. Williams did not officiate when the Williamsport School played; Principal Barker says he does not recall any baseball game in which Kingman played that was officiated by Mr. Williams.

Decision—All schools that participated in baseball games in which Mr. Garnet Williams officiated are placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1939, and consideration of the application for approval as an official by Mr. Garnet Williams deferred to a date not earlier than January 1, 1939.

INDIANAPOLIS

The Commissioner reported the case of Percy Merrell of Indianapolis, who officiated some football games last year when he was a non-approved official due to failure to re-register, although he stated that he received the proper notice from the I. H. S. A. A. Mr. Merrell applied for re-registration this fall and the application was refused by the Commissioner because Mr. Merrell refused to give the names of the schools which had used him when he was not approved.

Decision—The handling of this case by the Commissioner was approved by the Board of Control.

N. I. H. S. CONFERENCE

The Commissioner read a letter from Secretary Cash of this Conference regarding the holding of tourneys and meets in swimming, wrestling, track and golf. Consideration was given to the suggestions offered and it was decided that probably it would be necessary for the Athletic Council to act on some of the things proposed, although additional consideration will be given by the Board of Control.

FRANKLIN-EDINBURG

This case concerns a situation in a basketball game between Franklin and Edinburg during the Sectional Tourney last spring in which player Russell Vandivier of Franklin and player James Breeding of Edinburg were concerned. The Vandivier boy received a blow on the forehead, fell to the floor unconscious and fractured a bone in his left shoulder. The Breeding boy was removed from the game and arrested but was later released and taken home by the Superintendent of the Edinburg Schools.

The following persons were present at the hearing and gave evidence: Principal Garrison, former Principal Porter, Coach Vandivier and Superintendent Sheek of Franklin; Principal Rinkard, Coach Pruitt and Superintendent Manuel of Edinburg; Referee Willis of West Lafayette, and Umpire Williams of Anderson.

All parties regretted the incident and all persons, whose names appear as being present at the hearing, testified that they did not see the happening.

Decision—Principal Rinkard of Edinburg and Principal Garrison of Franklin required to make settlement of the physician's state-

ment in the amount of \$73.50 for services to Russell Vandivier, the basis of the settlement to be that each school, through its Principal, pay one-half of the amount. This settlement is required to be made and a joint letter to the effect that proper settlement has been made, signed by Principal Rinkard and Principal Garrison, is required to be on file in the I. H. S. A. A. office on or before October 7, 1938.

The topic of tourneys and meets received some consideration but no actions were taken.

The Board adjourned to meet immediately after the Athletic Council meeting Wednesday evening, October 26, 1938.

Change of High School Rule—The regulations, either affirmed or adopted by the Board of Control in their meeting August 20, 1938, were re-considered in the light of the several situations in the state in which students attend school without the payment of tuition or the presentation of a transfer.

Regulation 3 reading, "Students attending high schools outside the school district of their parents will be expected to pay the regular tuition or present an official transfer in a bona fide way" was rescinded.

Regulation 5 reading, "The rules and regulations of the State Board of Education will be considered carefully in determining the eligibility of high school students" was rescinded.

These regulations were rescinded with the understanding that schools would be required to give in all questionable cases cause and satisfactory explanations for the enrollment of all students.

The Board of Control adjourned to meet at 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning, November 19, 1938, in the Memorial Union Building at Purdue University.

Class 5—Mr. Wakefield and Mr. Croninger were nominated and the nominations were closed. Mr. Wakefield received 20 votes and Mr. Croninger 4.

Council Elections-

- 1. The unanimous ballot of the Council was cast for Mr. Croninger as President.
- 2. The unanimous ballot of the Council was cast for Mr. Wilson to serve until January 1, 1939.

National Federation Meeting—It was voted that the President of the Board, the President of the Council and the Commissioner should be considered the official delegates to attend the annual meetings of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations.

Basketball Games—After careful consideration the action of the Council at the last meeting, requiring all second team basketball games to be played in six-minute quarters, was unanimously affirmed and instructions were given to execute the rule to apply also to all games by teams of lower ranking.

2. A communication was read suggesting a new scheme for the classification of schools on the basis of enrollment, and the election of Council members as well as Board members but no action was taken.

The Athletic Council adjourned to meet at ten o'clock (10:00) Saturday morning, December 17, 1938.

CONSTITUTION OF INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

PREFACE

This printing of the Constitution carries the rules, regulations, interpretations, standards, questions and answers of the I. H. S. A. A. These have been printed in official bulletins through the years and Principals are requested to read and observe the information contained in all I. H. S. A. A. bulletins as they are published. The Constitution as printed in the annual Handbook may not be up-to-date at all times.

The printed constitution together with the questions and answers immediately following the constitution, plus the information in current bulletins, will keep Principals completely and officially informed.

CONSTITUTION OF THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of this association shall be the "Indiana High School Athletic Association." (The abbreviation of this name is understood to be I. H. S. A. A.)

ARTICLE II

MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Membership in this association shall be limited to the public High Schools of the State and each school shall have one vote.

Section 2. Any public High School in Indiana, offering and maintaining three or four years of High School work, may become a member of this association by subscribing to these rules and regulations and by paying the annual dues of one dollar fifty cents (\$1.50) to the Commissioner on or before January 1 of each year. The Board of Control shall be Judge of all memberships.

Section 3. Limited membership may be extended to colored High Schools desiring to join the I. H. S. A. A. with the understanding that limited memberships shall extend to colored High Schools the privilege of participating in single athletic games and contests with other High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. but not in meets and tourneys in which more than two teams participate except in meets and tourneys in which only the teams from the High Schools of the same city participate.

Section 4. Modified membership may be extended to any public High School offering and maintaining less than three years of High School work with the understanding that modified membership shall extend the privilege of participating in single athletic games and contests with other schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. but not in meets and tourneys in which more than two teams participate except in meets and tourneys in which only the teams from the High Schools of the same city participate.

Section 5. All memberships lapse on January 1 of each year unless

the annual dues are paid.

ARTICLE III

ADMINISTRATION AND LEGISLATION

Section 1. I. H. S. A. A. Districts-

For the purpose of administration only, the State shall be divided

by counties into the following districts:

First District—Benton, Carroll, Cass, Fulton, Jasper, Lake, La-Porte, Marshall, Newton, Porter, Pulaski, Starke, St. Joseph, Tippecanoe and White.

Second District-Adams, Allen, Blackford, DeKalb, Elkhart, Grant, Howard, Huntington, Kosciusko, LaGrange, Miami, Noble, Steuben,

Wabash, Wells and Whitley.

Third District-Boone, Clay, Clinton, Fountain, Hamilton, Hendricks, Marion, Montgomery, Morgan, Owen, Parke, Putnam, Tipton,

Vigo, Vermillion and Warren.

Fourth District-Bartholomew, Dearborn, Decatur, Delaware, Fayette, Franklin, Hancock, Henry, Jay, Jefferson, Jennings, Johnson, Madison, Ohio, Randolph, Ripley, Rush, Shelby, Switzerland, Union and Wayne.

Fifth District-Brown, Clark, Crawford, Daviess, Dubois, Floyd, Gibson, Greene, Harrison, Jackson, Knox, Lawrence, Martin, Monroe, Orange, Perry, Pike, Posey, Scott, Spencer, Sullivan, Vanderburg, Warrick and Washington.

Section 2. Athletic Council-

a. For the purposes of election and administration there shall hereafter be five I. H. S. A. A. districts as at present provided, which may from time to time be modified by the authority of the Athletic Council of the I. H. S. A. A.

There shall be five classes of high schools in each I. H. S. A. A.

District as follows:

Class I—Schools having enrollments of 1-75. Class II—Schools having enrollments of 76-120.

Class III-Schools having enrollments of 121-250.

Class IV-Schools having enrollments of 251-600.

Class V-Schools having enrollments of 601 up.

(The determination of the Class of any high school shall be based upon the enrollment reported to the State Board of Education in the last official report requested by that body.)

b. The twenty-five district-class units shall at all times be entitled to representation in the Athletic Council of the I. H. S. A. A. except as hereinafter provided. During the inauguration of this plan there shall be for a few years what shall be known as an "Adjustment Period," during which duplicate memberships in the various classes shall in certain cases necessarily be allowed whenever hold-over memberships from any district or districts shall happen to fall in the same enrollment class or classes. (County Superintendents who are holdovers shall be considered "members-at-large" from their districts, and not be allocated to any class.)

c. As soon as practicable after the elections of December 10, 1930. the Legislative Body of the I. H. S. A. A. shall provide for special elections to be held as soon as convenient at which there shall be elected a new member of the Athletic Council from each unrepresented class in each I. H. S. A. A. District for terms of such length as will the soonest fit into the scheme on the accompanying table, which is to be considered an integral part of this amendment. These terms may be from one to five years, but they shall in no case exceed five years. When the scheme is in full operation all elective terms for Athletic Council members shall be for five years, or for the remainder of an unexpired term in cases of a vacancy.

d. Vacancies in the Athletic Council shall be filled by the Athletic Council, the appointees to serve until the successors chosen at the next annual election take office. Such persons must be from the same Class and District High School as the member originally chosen.

e. The Athletic Council shall choose a Board of Control of five members from the membership of the Athletic Council. All five classes of high schools shall be represented on the Board of Control, except as hereinafter stated for members who change their high school class after being elected. (During the Adjustment Period the Board of Control shall consist of the present hold-over members, together with such other members as may be necessary to provide representation for all five classes of high schools.) No member of the Board of Control shall serve more than three years, unless re-elected by the Athletic Council. Expiration of membership on the Athletic Council shall automatically terminate membership on the Board of Control. Temporary vacancies on the Board of Control may be filled by the Board of Control from the membership of the Athletic Council, but only until the next meeting of the Athletic Council, when the Athletic Council shall itself choose the successors.

Both the Athletic Council and the Board of Control shall choose its own presiding officer, who may or may not be the same individual. The duties of the Athletic Council shall be the same as provided in the present constitution for the Legislative Body, and the duties of the Board of Control shall remain the same as already provided, ex-

cept as herein altered.

f. Any eligible person from a high school in good standing in the I. H. S. A. A. may have his name submitted, not later than November 15 of each year, on a nominating petition signed by five high school principals in his district, at least two of whom shall be in his high school class, to the Commissioner of Athletics for election to the Athletic Council from the district in which his school is located. Such

person shall be from the class of high school from which the selection is to be made in that particular year. The Commissioner shall send printed ballots listing all such names to all principals of high schools in good standing in that district who constitute the electorate in the said district. The person receiving the largest number of votes shall be declared duly elected by the Board of Control, who shall constitute the canvassing board. In case of a tie, the vote shall be taken again, printed ballots listing only the names of those tied being sent out by the Commissioner, with a return date designated by the Board of Control.

- g. Removal from an I. H. S. A. A. district, withdrawal from the teaching profession, resignation, suspension or expulsion of his school, or a lapse in membership of his school in the I. H. S. A. A. shall constitute a vacancy to be filled in the manner hereinbefore provided. A person elected to represent a certain class high school, who changes to a school of a different class or whose school changes from class to class due to a decrease or increase in enrollment, shall continue to serve out his term as long as he remains in his original district.
- h. Each year on the third Saturday in December the Athletic Council shall meet to reorganize for the ensuing year. At this meeting there shall be elected members of the Board of Control to fill the places which will be vacated by retiring Board Members on the following January 1. The Athletic Council shall also meet on the evening prior to the Annual Meeting. At this meeting proposals by High School Principals will be acted upon and other business may be transacted.
- i. All sections or parts of sections of the present constitution which are in conflict with the present amendment are hereby repealed and declared of no effect.
- j. No member of the Athletic Council shall be eligible for a longer term on the Athletic Council than the one he is serving until the expiration of his term.
- k. This Athletic Council may amend the Constitution and shall make the rules governing the I. H. S. A. A. Upon written petition signed by twenty (20) High School Principals from each of the five (5) I. H. S. A. A. Districts, the amendments and rules of the Athletic Council shall be subject to a referendum vote of the Principals in the membership.
- 1. The Commissioner of High School Athletics shall serve as secretary of the Athletic Council.
- m. The annual meeting shall be a meeting for the explanation and interpretations of rules and regulations, for inspirational addresses by recognized leaders, for committee reports and for constructive work.
- n. All expenses of the Athletic Council shall be paid out of the I. H. S. A. A. funds.
- o. Minor details in connection with the workings of the Athletic Council shall be handled by the Athletic Council.
 - p. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum.

q. After the initial elections all elections shall take place each year between December 1 and December 10, all votes being mailed to the Commissioner on ballots prepared by him.

r. All newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their office on the first day of January next following their election.

Section 3. Board of Control-

The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties:

a. It shall have general control over all athletic contests between and among the members of this association.

b. It shall have exclusive control of the annual inter-scholastic tourneys and meets.

c. It shall determine forfeitures as provided for in these rules.

d. It shall give interpretations of the rules of this association.
e. It may at the end of the athletic season and at its discretion

issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standings of teams.

f. When charges are made in writing by a member of the association against another member for violation of these rules, the Board of Control, after giving due notice of the time and place for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges and may suspend the offending school for a period of not exceeding one year.

g. The Board of Control shall decide all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants to meets and tour-

h. When any matter comes before the Board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members of the Board shall appoint

another person to act in his place in that matter.

i. The Board of Control of the I. H. S. A. A. shall have the power to initiate investigations regarding inter-school athletic activities participated in by the members of this Association and to make and enforce, with such penalties as this board may consider proper, the regulations deemed necessary by this board to make effective the spirit, the purpose and the wording of the provisions of the Indiana High School Athletic Association Constitution and Rules; and further, the said Board of Control shall have power to make and enforce with such penalties as this Board may consider proper, temporary regulations deemed necessary by this board to handle emergencies and special conditions that may arise in the management of the inter-school athletic activities participated in by members of this Association.

j. The Board of Control shall execute the rules governing the I. H. S. A. A. in the spirit as well as the letter in which they are made and shall make temporary regulations.

k. The Board of Control shall elect a Commissioner of Athletics at the regular meeting in December, said Commissioner to serve for a period not to exceed two years beginning on the first day of August following, at a salary to be determined by the Board of Control. He shall receive as compensation such sum and such allowance for expenses and clerical help as the Board may approve.

and duties of the Commissioner with the idea of giving the office of Commissioner the powers and duties of a Commissioner of Athletics, whose opinions and actions will be subject to review by the Board of Control upon appeal.

m. Three members of the Board shall constitute a quorum at

any meeting.

Section 4. Commissioner of High School Athletics-

- a. The Commissioner shall file with the President of the Board of Control on or before December 1st of each year an estimate of the expense of I. H. S. A. A. for the ensuing year. Such budget to be approved by the Board of Control and become effective on January 1st following for the calendar year. The estimate shall include the following:
 - 1. Salaries of the Commissioner and Stenographer.

2. Extra office help.

- 3. Traveling expenses of the Commissioner.
- 4. Office equipment and supplies.
- 5. Insurance.
- 6. Printing.
- 7. Postage.
- 8. Telephone and Telegraphic expense.
- 9. Expenses of Board of Control and Athletic Council Members.
- b. Expenditures in excess of the budget shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Control.
- c. The Board of Control shall provide for the annual audit of the books of the I. H. S. A. A.
- d. It shall be his duty to:
- 1. Collect all receipts and funds and report same to the treasurer of the Board at the next regular meeting following their collection.
- 2. Approve officials as provided in Article VI of the Constitution.
- 3. Collect and compile materials for the Annual Hand Book. The same shall be submitted to the Board of Control for approval at the regular meeting in January.
 - 4. He shall issue bulletins as directed by the Board of Control.
- 5. He shall prepare all official forms approved by the Board of Control for the use of the I. H. S. A. A.
- 6. To recommend to the Board of Control new standards, regulations and policies for the good of the I. H. S. A. A.
- 7. He shall initiate investigations, conduct hearings, collect information, render decisions and fix penalties based on the evidence, and in accordance with the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. Such decisions shall be subject to review by the

Board of Control on appeal by the principal or principals of the member school or schools involved.

- a. In cases where the suspension of a member is involved the evidence shall be reviewed by the Board of Control before final decision.
- b. It shall be the duty of the Commissioner to keep on file a stenographic record of the evidence in all hearings conducted by the Commissioner. This is to be used by the Board in case of appeal.
- 8. He shall conduct correspondence for the I. H. S. A. A.
- 9. He shall furnish all proper information requested by the National Federation of H. S. A. A. and other State H. S. Athletic Associations.
- 10. Maintain contacts and relations between the I. H. S. A. A. and:
 - (a) State Department of Public Instruction.
 - (b) Colleges, Universities, Normal Schools.

(c) High Schools.(d) Service Clubs.

(e) Teachers' Associations.

f) Press.

(g) Physical Education Groups.

(h) Coaches Groups.

- (i) Junior High Schools.
- (j) City Superintendents.(k) County Superintendents.

(1) Fans.

(m) American Legion and similar organizations.

(n) Colored Schools.

(o) Parochial Schools.

- (p) Principals of member schools.
- 11. He shall assist I. H. S. A. A. committees in their work by furnishing data and information requested by them.
- 12. He shall make detailed arrangements for all inter-scholastic meets, tourneys and events as directed by the Board of Control.
- 13. It shall be his duty to check all tourney reports and other financial statements, to reconcile discrepancies, if possible, and report the same to the Board.
- 14. He shall prepare and present at each regular meeting of the Board of Control a complete report of the activities of his office since the last preceding meeting of the Board.
- 15. He shall arrange the program and details of the annual meeting of the I. H. S. A. A. He may secure speakers subject to the approval of the Board and he may delegate speakers for athletic meetings elsewhere when requested to do so by school officials.
- 16. To have charge of the property and records of the Association.

17. To attend meetings of the Board of Control and serve as secretary.

18. He shall include the rules, amendments and regulations of the Athletic Council, as they are passed, in the Constitution of the I. H. S. A. A., harmonizing the related sections in the Constitution with the inclusions.

Section 5. Local Management-

a. The Principal or his authorized representative shall accompany his team to all contests.

b. The Principal of the school, or high school teachers authorized by him, shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.

c. No games shall be played without the sanction of the Principal.

d. The eligibility of all contestants shall be certified to by the Principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be presented in writing within ten days before any contest. In case of disputes the principal must furnish the Board of Control the following data in regard to each contestant: The date of last enrollment; the number of years he has been a member of a secondary school athletic team; date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the last preceding semester in school; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term and semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be denied championship honors, and may be excluded from all games, tourneys and meets.

e. The Principal has power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not

represent his school in a becoming manner.

f. It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, provide a forfeit of \$10.00 to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeitures be stipulated and not be paid during the same season, the Board of Control, after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the association. Notification of such expulsion shall be published in the papers with cause therefor.

ARTICLE V

COACHES

Section 1. Paid Coaches, other than those regularly employed as teachers by the trustees of the school, are prohibited. The expression "Paid Coach" refers to any person who receives, directly or indirectly, remuneration of any kind—money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any High School athletic team.

Section 2. No High School shall be permitted to employ a coach or athletic director who receives any extra pay, salary, gifts, trophies, trips or presents from any outside sources.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICIALS

Section 1. The major officials in all inter-contests shall be on the approved list of officials in the I. H. S. A. A.

Section 2. Approval shall be secured by making application to the Board of Control through the Commissioner, and approved officials shall be given approval cards signed by the Commissioner.

Section 3. The Board of Control shall drop from the approved list of officials any persons who are palpably unfair and incompetent in their officiating or who do not serve the ideals and policies of the I. H. S. A. A. Disbarment cards shall be given to such officials and their names shall be published in the Bulletins of the Association.

ARTICLE VII

CONTESTS

Section 1. All inter-school athletic contests shall be subject to the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. and the Board of Control.

Section 2. All games, meets, tourneys and inter-scholastic athletic activities participated in by the High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. must be held under the direct supervision, management and auspices of the High Schools concerned or under the direct supervision, management and auspices of the I. H. S. A. A.

(Note—This rule applies to games, meets, tourneys and inter-school athletic contests within and without the state.)

ARTICLE VIII

RULES FOR CONTESTS

Section 1. Spalding's Official Football Rules shall govern in football.

Section 2. Spalding's Official Basketball Rules shall govern in basketball.

Note—Rule 1, Section 4 in the Official Basketball Rules for 1933-1934 was changed to read as follows by the Athletic Council on December 16, 1933, and it was voted that the change should go into effect upon information being extended to the Principals:

"The court shall be divided into two parts by extending the diameter of the center circle in both directions until it intersects the side lines; except, that, if the court is less than 80 feet long, it shall be divided by drawing two lines parallel to the end lines, each 40 feet from the farther line. If, however, this would cause these lines to be inside the free throw lines, the court shall be divided by extending the free throw lines until they intersect the side lines. These lines shall be painted

in the same color. The line (or lines) described in this section shall be termed the Division Line."

Section 3. Spalding's National Collegiate Athletic Association Track and Field Rules shall govern with the following exceptions:

(a) Rule 2, regarding a Games Committee shall be void.

(b) Scoring:

Three places shall be counted in all meets except the state final meet and the places shall count 5, 3 and 1. In the 1924 annual meeting it was voted to score as follows in the state final meet: First, 5 points; second, 4 points; third, 3 points; fourth, 2 points; and fifth, 1 point. Places in the relay races may count for points. In case of a tie in any event the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

(c) Events:

The events in all meets shall be 100 yard dash; 220 yard dash; 440 yard dash; half-mile run; mile run; 120 yard high hurdle; 200 yard low hurdle; running high jump; running broad jump; pole vault; putting 12-lb. shot; mile relay and half-mile relay.

(d) Order of Events:

Track: 100 yard dash trial; 120 yard hurdle trial; 100 yard dash final; one mile run; 440 yard run; 120 yard hurdle final; 220 yard dash trial; 200 yard hurdle trial; half-mile run; 220 yard dash final; 200 yard hurdle final; mile relay; half-mile relay.

Field: Running high jump; shot put; pole vault; running broad jump.

(e) Eligibility:

Each contestant in a meet must have previously made in a fair test a record equal to the following in the events in which he is entered:

Section 4. Spalding's Official Basketball Rules for Women shall govern girls' games with the following exceptions:

- (a) The three-court plan shall be used unless there is mutual agreement to use the two-court plan.
- (b) Under no conditions may girls play basketball according to boys' rules.

Section 5. Spalding's Official Rules in Baseball shall govern in baseball.

Section 6. No inter-school basketball games shall be played by players or schools prior to November 1 of each year nor after the last evening session of the State Final Tourney. Intra-mural practice and gymnasium work in basketball may be done prior to November 1 and after the final tourney. (The penalty is suspension.)

Section 7. The maximum number of games for the regular schedule of any team or any player in basketball shall be twenty. (The

penalty is suspension.)

Section 8. Teams and players may play in two basketball tourneys in addition to the tourneys of the State Basketball Championship series and in addition to the twenty games on the regular schedule, provided the games in one of these "two tourneys" shall be counted in the twenty games permitted for the regular schedule of a team or player. (The penalty is suspension.)

Section 9. The football season shall close November 30 of each year. The penalty to a school for playing football after November 30 of any year shall be suspension, and the penalty for a student so playing shall be ineligibility for all inter-school athletics until March

1 of the following year.

Section 10. No games shall be played with public High Schools of this State not belonging to this association. This rule does not prevent a member of the association from playing High Schools outside of the State nor from playing non-high school teams within the State, provided all players on the I. H. S. A. A. teams are eligible in every way and also provided there are no public High School students of Indiana on the opposing teams.

Section 11. All basketball tourneys other than the State Tour-

neys shall be held prior to February 1 of each year.

Section 12. The I. H. S. A. A. deplores the action of anyone withdrawing a team from an athletic contest. Such action will jeopardize the standing of the school taking such action in the I. H. S. A. A.

Section 13. A High School shall not be considered eligible to enter a sectional basketball tourney in the I. H. S. A. A. in any year unless the team representing the High School has played eight (8) inter-scholastic games during that season.

Section 14. No games may be played prior to the opening of the

school year in the fall.

(Note—This section refers to inter-school games and the opening of school as here used is defined as the first day of regular class room instruction.)

ARTICLE IX

ELIGIBILITY RULES

Scholarship

Section 1. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current semester, a passing grade in each of three or more studies

requiring a minimum of fifteen regular High School recitations per week, exclusive of rhetoricals, physical training, military drill and deportment; in his last preceding semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire semester.

Interpretation-

The part of Section 1, Article IX, under Scholarship in the I. H. S. A. A. Constitution reading, "—a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen regular high school recitations per week" is interpreted to mean—"a passing grade in each of three regular high school subjects having a full semester credit value and for which a full semester credit is given." The combination of two subjects, not excluded in this Section in the Constitution, whose total credit value is equal to one full semester credit, may be counted toward eligibility for one and only one of the three regular high school subjects of full semester credit value, provided the two combined subjects remain the same subjects throughout the semester in which they are counted."

Section 2. Students enrolled for the first time must comply with the requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

Section 3. Back work may be made up, provided that it is done in accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes a matter of final record before the opening day of the next semester.

Interpretation-

In each of the studies representing the minimum requirement of work specified above, the following shall govern:
(a) For the current semester the average of the period grades up to the time of certification must be passing; (b) For the current or school grading period the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing; (c) If the average of the period grades at the beginning of any grading period is below passing in any study, the pupil is ineligible as far as that study is concerned for the entire grading period.

Enrollment

Section 1. No student, who has been enrolled as a High School student in any High School, shall be permitted to participate in any inter-high school contest as a member of another high school until he has been enrolled in such high school for one calendar year, unless the parents of such student actually change their residence to the second school district. In the latter case, the student will be as eligible as he was in the school from which he withdrew.

Interpretation-

(a) A student enrolled in one High School of a City or School corporation shall not be eligible in another High School of the same city or school corporation until he has been enrolled in the other High School for one calendar year, unless there are definitely marked school districts and his parents actually change their residence to the new school district.

(b) Students finishing the courses offered in high schools maintaining less than four years of High School work

are not bound by this section.

(c) The fact that a transfer has or has not been issued or that the student pays or does not pay his tuition, has no bearing on this section. (See undue influence rule.)

Section 2. No person, who has been enrolled as a student in an institution of college standing, and has done work which may be counted toward a degree in that institution, shall be eligible as a member of any athletic team under I. H. S. A. A. rules in any game with any other team, either within or without the State of Indiana.

Section 3

(a) Any student, who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days between September 1 and December 1 for four times, shall be in-

eligible for football.

(b) Any student, who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days between December 1 and March 1 for four times shall be ineligible for basketball, except a student who entered high school for the first time during the second semester of a school year and who did not participate in any game during this semester, shall not be ineligible for basketball until he has been enrolled thereafter twenty (20) or more days between December 1 and March 1 for four times.

(c) Any student, who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days between March 1 and June 1 for four times, shall be ineligible for baseball and track, except a student who entered high school for the first time during the second semester of a school year and who did not participate in any game or meet during this second semester shall not be ineligible for baseball and track until he has been enrolled thereafter twenty (20) or more days between March 1 and June 1 for four times

Section 4. A student withdrawing permanently from school within the first twenty days of a semester shall not be regarded as having an opportunity to engage in athletics that semester unless he has already played in one or more inter-scholastic games, in which case he shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

Section 5. The eligibility rules of this association shall apply to students taking part in all contests, whether with schools inside or

outside of the State of Indiana.

Section 6. In order to be eligible for athletic competition during any semester a student must have entered some public High School within the first twenty school days of the semester in which the contest occurs.

Participation

Section 1. Any student of a High School who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that season.

Section 2. A student, who has played in one or more inter-scholastic games in any season shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

Parents and Physicians' Certificates

Section 1. A student who practices for any inter-scholastic football, basketball, track, boxing, wrestling or swimming contest, shall have on file in the Principal's office a certificate of physical fitness and a certificate giving the written consent of the father, mother or guardian for such athletic participation as is specified therein. The physical examination shall be made prior to the first practice during the season of each of the six sports by a regularly licensed physician (M. D.).

Previous to the first practice, the Principal shall certify to the I. H. S. A. A. that the certificates required herein are on file in his office.

Remuneration

Section 1. No High School student shall be eligible to participate in any inter-school contest under the rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, if it shall be shown that he or any member of his family is receiving any remuneration, either directly or indirectly. to influence him or his family to reside in a given school district in order to establish eligibility on the team of said school, and any school permitting such participation shall, upon satisfactory evidence, submitted to the State High School Board of Control, be suspended by them from membership in the I. H. S. A. A. for a term of not less than one year. This rule shall not interfere with the right of High School pupils to work during vacation or during out of school hours in order to earn their way through High School. It shall apply to the use of any funds created by gift or by subscription with the intent of offering them or parts of them for the free use of the player or any member of his family as an inducement to get them to change their residence to the district of the said school and to maintain residence therein.

Undue Influence Rule

Section 1. The use of undue influence by any person or persons to secure or to retain a student or to secure or to retain one or both of the parents or guardians of a student as residents, may cause the student to be ineligible for High School athletics for a period subject to the determination of the Board of Control and shall jeopardize the standing of the High School in the I. H. S. A. A.

Post Graduates

Section 1. Post graduates are not eligible but students graduating from regular courses of less than four years in length shall not be deemed post graduates.

Section 2. A student is a post graduate of a High School when he has completed the work required for graduation by that school and has received his diploma provided the school offers four years of work. Section 3. Students meeting requirements for graduation in three and one-half years in a High School with a regular four-year course shall be eligible to participate in school athletics the last half of the fourth year, provided they meet all other eligibility rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

Age

Section 1. Students shall be ineligible for any athletic competition upon reaching twenty years of age.

Amateurism

Section 1. All contestants in the I. H. S. A. A. must be amateurs. Section 2. Professionalism is defined in the I. H. S. A. A. as accepting remuneration, directly or indirectly, for playing on athletic teams, for officiating in athletic games or for managing athletic teams; or playing, officiating or managing under assumed names. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted, if accepted in service and not in any other way.

Conduct

Section 1. Any student, whose conduct or character is such, in the judgment of the Board of Control, as to reflect discredit upon his High School or upon the I. H. S. A. A., is not eligible.

Married Students

Section 1. Married students shall not be eligible for participation in inter-school athletic competition.

(Note—Students who have been divorced or whose marriages have been annulled are bound by this rule.)

ARTICLE X Injunction Suits

The Athletic Council deplores the action of any individual or individuals in resorting to court action in seeking redress in High School athletic difficulties in the I. H. S. A. A. and unanimously decides that the Board of Control should secure legal advice and fight such cases through the Supreme Court of Indiana if deemed necessary.

ARTICLE XI

Prizes and Awards

Section 1. Only one sweater, jersey, jacket, blanket or similar article may be given in each sport to a high school student for participation in athletics in high school.

Section 2. The giving and receiving of prizes, awards, gifts and articles shall be kept within reasonable bounds and such as are given or received shall have symbolic value only.

Section 3. The giving and receiving of prizes, awards, gifts and articles shall be done by and with the consent and under the supervision of the high school principals concerned.

ARTICLE XII

Finances

- 1. There shall be the accumulation and establishment of a surplus in the I. H. S. A. A. treasury of \$100,000.00 as soon as reasonable financing will permit, this amount to be established and maintained as a guarantee that existing obligations will be met; that expansions in the program of service may be made if thought desirable; and that any emergencies in the future may be solved.
- 2. There shall be a distribution on an equitable basis among the High Schools in the I. H. S. A. A. membership of the amounts accumulated above a \$100,000.00 surplus and above the amount legitimately necessary for the running expenses of the I. H. S. A. A., these distributions to be made on October 1, 1932, and on October 1 of and for each three-year period thereafter.
- 3. There is granted power and authority to the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control to make the financial adjustments in contracts for inter-scholastic games, tourneys, meets and athletic contests that are deemed necessary through the years and to administer, execute and control all receipts, expenditures and holding of moneys in connection with the I. H. S. A. A.

Interpretations

- 1. When a contestant, official, game or decision is protested the game should be played as scheduled and the protest with evidence filed with the Board of Control for settlement later.
- 2. Any student who carries at least 15 hours of regular High School work is a High School student, provided such a student has been promoted to High School in the regular way and according to good school procedure.
- 3. It is recommended that Principals take the proper measures to control the crowd and the players at all contests. Failure to do so shall be considered sufficient reason for suspension from the association.
- 4. A game is an athletic contest entered into by a member of this association with players or teams not belonging to the member.
- 5. As the Principal is the responsible party in High School athletics, it is recommended that he carry on all correspondence with the Board of Control and the Commissioner.
- 6. By passing work is meant work of such character that credit should be entered on the school records were credit given at the time of certification.
- 7. Mutual agreements to violate the rules of this association shall result in suspension of all schools concerned.
- 8. Visiting schools shall be held responsible for the conduct of visitors from their home city regardless of the place of the contest.
- 9. For athletic purposes the record at the end of a semester shall be final. Deficiencies in one semester can not be made up in a subsequent semester for qualification purposes during that semester. An

incomplete or condition at the end of a grading period or semester counts as a failure. Back work may be made up and counted toward eligibility during the summer provided it is done and becomes a matter of final record prior to the opening day of the next semester.

- 10. The baseball season is defined as beginning and ending with the school year.
- 11. The Principal of each school or a teacher in his school delegated by him in writing shall represent such school at all meetings of the Association.
- 12. Schools may have as many teams in the same sport as they desire, and all rules apply to all teams and all individuals on all teams.
- 13. A temporary regulation of the I. H. S. A. A. shall be understood to be a regulation having effect until the next meeting of the Athletic Council at which time it will be subject to the disposal of this body.
- 14. A High School that is suspended or expelled from the I. H. S. A. A. shall be considered as not belonging to this Association and subsequent membership in the Association shall be secured, if desired at the termination of the suspension or expulsion, according to the Sections in the Constitution and the rules and regulations governing memberships.
- 15. Students, whose parents change their place of residence during a semester, may complete the semester in the school in which they have been enrolled, then enter the new school in the district in which their parents reside with eligibility in both schools.

Note: The undue influence rule is applicable to the retention of a student as well as to the securing of a student.

3.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS REGARDING THE RULES, REGULATIONS, INTERPRETATIONS AND STANDARDS OF I. H. S. A. A.

In order that the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. may be as clear as possible, it has been thought advisable to print for general distribution these questions and answers. The correspondence of the I. H. S. A. A. has been gone over carefully and has furnished these questions and answers almost entirely. The questions are real ones, as they have been asked by High School principals, coaches, superintendents, teachers and school board members, who are on the firing lines in their respective communities and schools. The answers have been given according to the rules of the association and the interpretations of the several Boards of Control. It is hoped that these statements will clarify our rules and regulations, as well as establish working ideals and policies for the I. H. S. A. A.

AGE.

1.

Q. When is a student ineligible on account of age?
A. A student becomes ineligible for any athletic competition upon reaching twenty years of age.

* * * *

2.

Q. Is a student eligible for a game if he reaches twenty years of age on the day of the game?

A. No. The day preceding is his last day of eligibility. See No. 1 above.

Q. What is considered evidence of age?

A. One or all of the following documents duly authenticated in the order named:

- (a) Birth certificate.
- (b) Baptismal certificate.
- (c) Documentary evidence such as family record of birth in Bible, certificate of arrival in the United States, a passport or a life insurance policy of at least a few years standing.
- (d) Written and signed statement by Superintendent of Schools, public health physician, attending physician, parent or guardian.

.

4.

Q. How may a birth certificate be secured from the Indiana State records?

A. By writing to Chief, Bureau of Vital Statistics, State House Annex, Indianapolis, giving complete information in your first letter.

. . .

Q. What should be done in cases of doubt as to age?

A. Submit all evidence to the Board of Control after a complete investigation as outlined in three above has been made. If a certificate or document can not be secured a signed statement to this effect should be submitted by the proper official.

c

Q. If doubt exists regarding the age of a student should the student be permitted to participate in games pending removal of doubt?

A. No. The doubt must be removed prior to participation.

* * *

Q. If, after all available data regarding the age of a student are submitted to the Board of Control, it can not be known definitely about the date of birth of a student, what step is taken?

A. The Board of Control will establish a date on the data submitted, subject to change should convincing evidence to the contrary

be found later.

APPROVED OFFICIALS AND RE-REGISTRATION OF OFFICIALS

All approval cards and all re-registration cards issued prior to June 30, 1937 are void. A re-registration began on this date and Principals should not use officials in games whose names do not ap-

pear in the printed lists or who can not show approval certificates issued later than June 30, 1937. Be sure to check all officials carefully and require identification in all doubtful cases. Read approval certificates carefully to know date issued, sports covered, etc.

Q. Who is an approved official in the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. A person who has made application to and received the approval of the Board of Control through its Commissioner.

Must all officials be approved?

A. Yes. The major officials in all sports must be approved.

* * * *

3. Q. Is it necessary for a licensed teacher to be approved?

Q. Are officials, who are certified in other states, eligible to officiate in Indiana?

A. No. Not until they have made application to the Commissioner and have been approved in Indiana.

Q. May a member of a High School team officiate in independent games without jeopardizing his standing?

A. Yes. Provided remuneration is not accepted, directly or indirectly, and provided he does not use an assumed name.

Q. What is the penalty for using a non-approved official?

A. Suspension of the school usually, but cases are considered individually.

Q. Are approved officials required for girls' games?

A. Yes. Girls are bound by the same rules as boys.

Q. May a member of a High School officiate in inter-High School

games? A. No. A High School student is not eligible for approval as an official.

Q. Must an official be approved each year?

A. No. Approval is permanent provided the work of the official remains satisfactory. A requirement for re-registration may be made in any year and, if so, will constitute a cancellation of the approval unless re-registration is made.

10.

Q. Does approval in one sport give the right to officiate in other sports?

A. No. Approval is necessary for each sport.

Q. What is the policy of the I. H. S. A. A. toward the decisions of officials?

A. The decisions of officials are considered final and binding.

* * * *

Q. Does the I. H. S. A. A. regulate the pay of officials? A. The pay of officials in tourneys and meets arranged by the Board of Control is regulated. In single games, the Principals and

officials are expected to have contracts agreed upon prior to the games. The Board will adjudicate difficulties according to contracts.

Q. When was the approval scheme established in the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. In 1922.

14.

When were approved officials last required to re-register?

A. June 30, 1937.

15.

Q. What is the difference between an approved and a re-registered official?

A. A re-registered official is an approved official who has re-regis-

tered with the Association.

1.

Q. May students practice basketball before November 1 and after the date of the State Final Basketball Tourney?

A. Practice within the school in basketball may take place at any time.

2.

Q. Does the twenty-game limitation apply to the first team only?
A. No. Any team—first, second, third, etc.—may play twenty (20) games and no more on its regular schedule.

3.

Q. May a student play in more than twenty games of basketball on the regular schedule on different school teams?

A. No. The twenty-game limitation applies to individuals as well as to teams.

4.

Q. In how many tourneys may a team play in addition to the

twenty games permitted on the regular schedule?

A. A team may play in the tourneys of the state basketball championship series, and in two other tourneys, provided the games in one of these "two other tourneys" are counted in the twenty games permitted for the regular schedule. This statement applies to individuals also.

5.

Q. Would a preliminary tourney and a final tourney count as one tourney or two tourneys?

A. Two tourneys.

6

Q. May a High School have a complete schedule for the second team in any sport?

A. Yes. Each school team can and should be considered a representative team of the High School and, as such, be governed by all of the I. H. S. A. A. rules and privileges.

7.

Q. Has the I. H. S. A. A. established the size of a regulation basketball floor?

A. No. But the I. H. S. A. A. strongly recommends 50'x74'. The state tourney floor has been 50'x74' for years.

Q. Is there a limit to the number of players a coach may use in a basketball game?

A. No. Except in games and tourneys arranged and managed by the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control.

* * * *

9.

Q. When does the basketball season end for teams and individuals?
A. The basketball season for all teams and all students ends on the final day of the state final tourney or with the end of the season in the school if prior to the final tourney.

10.

Q. May High School players and teams play independent basketball in the interim between the sectional tourneys and the final tourney if the season in the school is closed?

A. No. Such playing would constitute a violation.

11.

Q. May more than 20 games be played by a team by juggling the players so that no student plays more than 20 games?

A. No. The 20-game requirement holds for teams as well as students.

Q. May an "A team" or "1st" team be designated as a "B" team and thus evade the rule?

A. No. The wording of the rule and the spirit of the rule are clear and binding.

* * * *

COACHES

1.

Q. Who may coach a High School team?
A. Qualified teachers in the grades, or High School who are regularly licensed and regularly employed as such by the trustee or school board.

* * *

Q. Who is a paid coach?

A. Any person who receives, directly or indirectly, remuneration of any kind—money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., from outside sources—in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any High School athletic team. See number one above.

Q. Are paid coaches permitted in the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. No. Any remuneration received by a coach must come from the school trustee or the school board from public school money.

CONTRACTS.

Q. May a High School cancel a contract for an official or game without making settlement?

A. No. Contracts are binding and a settlement by mutual consent or according to the stipulations of the contract must be made.

Q. Is there any penalty for the cancellation of a contract by an official?

A. The I. H. S. A. A. expects all approved officials to abide by their contracts and will handle on its merits any case of violation by the school or official.

Q. If a school team disbands, would the school be responsible for contracts made?

A. Yes.

Q. If contracts specify that first teams shall participate, can second teams be used?

A. No. It is recommended that contracts specify the ranking of the teams.

Q. If game contracts do not clearly specify the ranking of the teams what ranking is understood as binding?

A. First team ranking.

Q. How may High School Principals secure blank contracts for games and officials?

A. By writing to the Commissioner.

ENROLLMENT

(See Undue Influence Rule. It Takes Precedence.)

1.

Q. What is a five-year man?

Students who have been enrolled in High School for twenty or more days between September 1 and December 1, or between December 1 and March 1 or between March 1 and June 1 for four times are ineligible respectively, for football, basketball and spring athletics, with the following exceptions:

A student who enters High School for the first time at the beginning of semester II of any school year, may be enrolled four times of twenty or more days each between December 1 and March 1 following this first semester of his enrollment, and he may be eligible for basketball for these four seasons provided he does not play in any game during his first semester of enrollment. A student, who enters High School for the first time at the beginning of semester II, may be enrolled four times of twenty or more days each between March 1 and June 1 following this first semester of enrollment, and he may be eligible in spring athletics for these four semesters, provided he does not participate in spring athletics during his first semester of enrollment.

Q. May a student, who has been in High School four full years, but who has not participated in any athletics, participate in athletics? A. No. Enrollment rather than participation is the determining factor here.

Q. Which is the determining factor in eligibility-enrollment or participation?

A. Neither one. Both are factors and must be considered.

Q. If a student changes High Schools, when is he eligible?

A. He is just as eligible in the new school as he was in the old school, provided his parents actually and legitimately change their place of residence to the new school district and provided the student changes high schools at that time. Students, whose parents change their place of residence during a semester, may complete the semester in the school in which they have been enrolled. If they do not actually change their place of residence to the new school district, he will be eligible after he has been enrolled one calendar year in the new school, provided no undue influence is used by any person to secure him as a student or his parents as residents. See "undue influence" rule. 187

Q. When are students, who finish the work given in one High

School, eligible in another High School?

A. Students finishing the work in a High School giving less than four years of High School work are just as eligible in a new High School as they were in the old High School.

What is a semester?

A. One-half of a school year constitutes a semester in the I. H. S. A. A., and parts of two semesters or a part of one semester does not make a semester in the I. H. S. A. A.

Q. When is a student eligible in school "A" if he withdraws from school "A." enters school "B" and later returns to school "A," his parents never changing their place of residence from the district of school "A"?

A. When the student has been enrolled one calendar year, following his latest enrollment in "A," provided he is eligible in all other

ways.

Q. How can a student gain eligibility in a High School upon en-

tering from another High School?

A. By his parents actually and legitimately changing their place of residence to the new High School district or by enrollment for one calendar year.

9.

Q. Does the twenty-day enrollment requirement mean school or calendar days?

A. School days.

10.

Q. If a student fails in all subjects for a semester does this enrollment count as a semester?

A. Yes. Enrollment is enrollment and always counts as such.

* * * * 11.

Q. Is a student, who has been out of High School for a semester or more and who has played independent ball during that time. eligible when he enters school at the beginning of a semester?

A. Yes, unless he violated his amateur standing in some way by playing on the independent team and provided he is eligible in all

other ways.

GAMES

1.

Q. What is considered a game of basketball?

A. A game of any kind in the I. H. S. A. A. is an "inter" contest as distinguished from an "intra" contest. An admission fee is no part of a game and has no bearing one way or the other.

Q. May a member school of the I. H. S. A. A. schedule and play single games with teams and schools in Indiana not members of the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. Yes. Provided these teams and schools are not public High Schools and also provided the members of the I. H. S. A. A. observe

all of the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

Q. What is the difference between a preliminary game and a

regular game? A. There is no difference as far as the I. H. S. A. A. is concerned,

as the same rules and regulations govern.

Q. If a "practice" game of basketball is played is it to be counted

as one of the twenty games on the regular schedule?

A. Inter-"practice" games are regular games and must be counted as such. Intra-"practice" games are not counted as regular games. In fact, there are no such things as practice games in the I. H. S. A. A. There are practice games within the school only.

Q. Does the omission of an admission charge make any difference as to the designation of a contest as a game?

A. No. Games are "inter"-contests with or without admission

charges.

Q. Is an alumni game considered a game? A. Yes. Such must be counted as one of the 20 games permitted on the regular schedule.

Q. What is considered an "inter" game? A. Any game in which a High School team plays against students or players not belonging to the High School.

A. November 30 of each year.

GIRLS' ATHLETICS

1.

Q. Are girls, as well as boys, bound by the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. Yes. All students on all teams in High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. are bound absolutely by its rules and regulations.

2.

Q. May girls play basketball according to boys' rules?

A. No. Girls must play according to girls' rules by Spalding and the three-court plan shall be used, except as mutually agreed otherwise.

.

Q. Is the I. H. S. A. A. opposed to inter-school basketball games and tourneys for girls?

A. No, but they are not recommended. Special care should be used, however, in such games and tourneys to know that girls are

* * * *

4.

Q. May men coach girls in athletic games?

A. Yes. It is recommended however that women coaches be employed for girls. This applies to officials also.

5.

Q. May girl's basketball teams play in state tourneys or national tourneys?

A. No.

physically fit at all times.

PARTICIPATION.

1.

Q. May a student play on any team other than a High School team?

A. A student becomes ineligible in High School for the entire season of that sport in which he participates as a member of any team other than the High School team. There is an additional penalty for participation out of season as set out in the rules.

190

Q. What is considered participation in a sport for a season?

A. Playing in a part of one game in a sport constitutes participation in that sport for that season.

* * *

3.

Q. May member schools play against non-public High School, College, Y. M. C. A. and independent teams?

A. Yes, in single games, but not in tourneys, meets and leagues. In single games the member schools must obey all of the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. and there must not be any public High School students on the opposing teams.

PRIZES AND AWARDS

1.

Q. Is a High School permitted to give sweaters to athletes?

A. Yes. The I. H. S. A. A. recommends that the giving of prizes, gifts, sweaters, etc., be kept within reasonable bounds at all times and that such as are given have a symbolic value only. All prizes should be given by the school. No more than one sweater in each major sport may be given to a High School student for participation in High School for the entire four years.

.

Q. May schools give awards to students for scholarship, sports-manship and conduct?

A. Yes. And such may be accepted from outside sources if sanctioned by the High School Principal.

* * *

Q

Q. What gifts, awards and prizes may athletes receive?

A. The I. H. S. A. A. recommends that the giving of awards, prizes, medals, etc., be kept on a reasonable basis at all times, and that such as are given have a symbolic value only and be given by and with the consent of the school authorities.

Q. When did the sweater rule go into effect?

A. September 1, 1930.

5.

Q. If a student received a sweater in a sport prior to September 1, 1930, should it be counted as the one sweater permitted in that sport?

A. No. The sweater rule is not retroactive in its applications.

* * * *

6.

Q. May the sweater rule be evaded by giving coats or other gifts?

A. No. The Board has decided that this rule should not be evaded in spirit or intent.

PROFESSIONALISM

1

Q. What constitutes professionalism in the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. Accepting remuneration, directly or indirectly, for playing on athletic teams, officiating in athletic games or managing athletic teams, or playing, officiating or managing under assumed names. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted, if accepted in service and not in any other way.

* * * *

2.

Q. If a student violates his amateur standing in one sport does he become ineligible for all sports?

A. Yes. A professional in one sport is ineligible for all sports.

3.

Q. Does a student become ineligible in all sports, if he plays on a team other than the High School team in one sport?

A. No. A student becomes ineligible only in the sport in which he participates as a member of a team other than the High School team, unless he violates his amateur standing or some general rule of the association and then he becomes ineligible in all sports. Playing out of season carries a penalty.

A

Q. Are High School students permitted to play on teams that split the gate receipts among the players including the High School students?

192

A. No. This would be considered professionalism.

RESPONSIBILITY

1.

Q. Who is the responsible party in I. H. S. A. A. athletics?
A. The High School Principal is the responsible party as far as the I. H. S. A. A. is concerned.

* * *

Q. Who is the proper official to sign contracts for games?

A. The High School Principal always. He may delegate this authority, but the Principal will be held responsible for contracts. It is recommended that this authority be not delegated.

Q. Who may manage a High School team?

A. A High School Principal or teacher authorized by him. Student management is not permitted.

SCHOLARSHIP

1.

Q. May back work be made up and counted toward eligibility?

A. Yes. Back work cannot be made up, however, during a grading period or semester for eligibility during that grading period or semester. Special privileges should not be granted to athletes. (See Summer School Work.)

.

Q. Would a student, declared ineligible by one principal, be in-

eligible under another principal?

A. Yes. If the student is ineligible according to the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. The I. H. S. A. A. has no jurisdiction unless its rules are violated.

* * * *

Q. May a student, who receives his High School diploma, be eligible afterwards?

A. No. The granting and acceptance of a High School diploma makes a High School graduate.

* * *

4.

Q. May an ineligible student practice with the regular team?
A. Yes. At home in regular practice, but ineligible students should not appear in athletic suits at games.

A. No. The passing marks of the schools are usually honored, but the Board of Control reserves the right to check the validity of grades and credits and to act on their findings.

. Who is a post-graduate?

A. A post-graduate is a student who has finished his High School work and has received his High School diploma. Students who have completed sufficient work to receive a diploma, but who continue in school until commencement, must be considered eligible or ineligible according to all other rules of eligibility, such as age, time in school, participation, work carried, etc.

7.

Q. What constitutes the last semester in eligibility?

A. The last semester for any student is the last semester in which the student was enrolled in any High School for any length of time.

* * * *

Q. At the end of the second grading period in a semester, is a student eligible if he makes passing grades in three regular High

School subjects for this period?

A. In order to be eligible at the end of any grading period in a semester, a student must have passed in three regular High School subjects for the current grading period and his average grade in each of three regular High School subjects for all of the grading periods in that semester must be passing. A student must MAINTAIN his work in order to be eligible—weekly, by grading periods and by the semester.

9.

Q. Is a "condition" or an "incomplete" considered a "pass" in the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. No. The I. H. S. A. A. considers a "pass" to mean that all work has been done and has been made a matter of final record at the end of the grading period or semester.

10.

Q. Is a student, who carries three regular High School subjects and one or more eighth grade subjects, considered a High School student?

A. Yes. A student who carries fifteen hours of regular High School work is a High School student, provided such a student has been promoted to High School in the regular way and according to good school procedure.

11.

Q. Is a student, who has made sufficient credits to graduate at the end of semester one, eligible for athletics during semester two?

A. Yes. Provided he is eligible in all other respects and does not actually graduate at the end of semester one. Such a student must carry regular work during semester two.

12.

Q. Are the same standards of eligibility required for intra-school games as for inter-school games?

A. No. The I. H. S. A. A. has no such requirements, but such

are strongly recommended.

13.

Q. Is a student, who has been ineligible for a semester on account of scholarship, eligible for the night of the last day of the semester?

A. Yes. Provided he has passed in three regular High School subjects and his credits have been made a matter of final record in the Principal's office prior to the contest.

36. 36

What constitutes scholarship eligibility?

A. In order to be eligible for a current semester a student must have passed in three regular High School subjects in his last semester of enrollment in any High School and he must be maintaining a similar amount of work for the current semester. This statement for semesters holds good for grading periods of the semester also.

15.

Q. If a student misses school for a few weeks in order to work

is he eligible during this time and when he returns?

A. This is a school problem and must be answered by the consideration whether regular school work to the extent of fifteen hours is being maintained or not. Usually students who miss school work are not passing in their school work.

16.

Q. If a student becomes ineligible on account of scholarship at the end of a semester, does this make him ineligible for one whole semester afterwards?

A. Yes.

17.

Q. If a student becomes ineligible at the end of a grading period

in a semester when can he become eligible?

A. At the end of the next regular grading period in that semester, provided he passes in three regular High School subjects during the period and also provided his average in each subject for all grading periods of the semester are passing in a similar amount of work.

18.

Q. When is a student, who intends to enter High School, eligible? A. When he actually enters, provided all other requirements have been met.

19.

Q. If a student becomes ineligible on Friday at the end of a grading period is he eligible for that night?

A. No. A student is ineligible whenever he becomes ineligible.

20.

Q. If a student becomes eligible on Friday at the end of a grading period is he eligible for that night?

A. Yes. A student is eligible whenever he becomes eligible.

21.

Q. When is a student maintaining his work during a semester?
A. When he is passing in three regular High School subjects during the current week, the current grading period, the last grading period and for all grading periods of the semester according to averages.

22

Q. If a student fails to pass in three regular High School subjects during the last grading period of a semester but passes in three regular High School subjects for the semester, will he be eligible at the beginning of the first grading period of the next semester?

A. Yes, the books are considered closed at the end of the semester.

23.

Q. If a student passes in three regular High School subjects during the last grading period of a semester but fails in three regular High School subjects for the semester, will he be eligible at all for the next semester?

A. No, the books are considered closed at the end of the semester.

SENIOR AND JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL TEAMS AND PLAYERS

1.

Q. May a ninth grade student play on the Senior High School team if he is enrolled in the Junior High School?

A. Yes, provided he is not a member of the Junior High School team also. Students in the 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th years of school work are considered eligible students in the I. H. S. A. A.

2

Q. May a 9th grade student play on the Junior and Senior High School teams during the season of a sport?

A. No. Not unless the student is regularly promoted to the Senior High School at the end of Semester I.

Q. Are eighth grade students eligible for teams lower in ranking than the first High School team?

A. No. Eighth grade students are not eligible for any High School teams.

Q. Does the I. H. S. A. A. have any jurisdiction over eighth grade students?

A. No. Not as long as they are really eighth grade students.

Q. What is considered a High School student?

A. Any student who carries as much as fifteen hours of regular High School work, provided such a student has been promoted to High School in the regular way and according to good school procedure.

6

Q. May a ninth grade student play on the Junior High School team in one sport of a season and on the Senior High School team in another sport in another season?

A. Yes.

* *

JUNIOR AND SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC REGULATIONS

1. The Indiana High School Athletic Association covers the students, boys and girls, in the 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th years of school work.

- 2. The High School Principal in any High School belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. is considered the responsible party in athletics as far as the I. H. S. A. A. is concerned.
- 3. The I. H. S. A A. considers it the duty and responsibility of the Senior High School Principal or Principals to extend the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A., with such explanations as may be necessary, to all Principals in the school system having 9th grade students enrolled.
- 4. A High School student is one who carries at least 15 hours of regular High School work, provided such a student has been promoted to the High School in the regular way and according to good school procedure.
- 5. The I. H. S. A. A. requests Principals having 9th grade students enrolled to confer and cooperate with the Senior High School Principal or Principals regarding the participation of 9th grade students in inter-school athletics.
- 6. The I. H. S. A. A. does not attempt to determine or classify Junior High Schools and Senior High Schools. The State Organization is interested in the athletic activities of the 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th year students in inter-school games and contests.
- 7. A ninth grade student, in whatever type of school enrolled, is subject to the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. when participating in inter-school athletics.
- 8. A ninth grade student may participate on the Junior High School team or on the Senior High School team in a sport during the season, but he can not participate on both teams in a sport during the season.
- 9. A ninth grade student may participate on a team made up of seventh, eighth and ninth grade students, or on a team made up of 8th and 9th grade students, and these teams may play against similar teams from other schools provided the games are under the supervision of the responsible Principals.
- 10. Students below the 9th grade are never eligible for Senior High School teams.
- 11. The I. H. S. A. A. has no jurisdiction over students below the 9th grade.
- 12. The I. H. S. A. A. believes that 9th grade students belong in athletics to the schools, Junior or Senior, in which they are enrolled, but the above regulations have been made to meet the many situations presented by the several school arrangements in the state causing the 9th year student to be enrolled in 8-4, 6-6, 6-3-3, 6-2-4, etc., schemes.
- 13. The I. H. S. A. A. believes that a system of schools should have rules and regulations in inter-school athletics that are somewhat uniform. There are good reasons for introducing and requiring in the Junior High School rules and regulations in athletics required in the Senior High School.
- 14. The participation of a 9th grade student in inter-school games as well as his enrollment in the ninth year must be considered and

evaluated in the same way whether he be enrolled in the Junior High School or in the Senior High School.

- 15. All ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth grade students must have been regularly promoted from the eighth grade in order to be considered eligible for athletics.
- 16. Ninth grade students, who are members of teams made up of 7th, 8th and 9th grade students, or 8th and 9th grade students, are not permitted to enter tourneys and meets in which more than two teams compete, except in carnivals, play days, etc., held in the same city school system. This exception shall not be interpreted as giving sanction to regular athletic tourneys and meets.
- 17. All I. H. S. A. A. supplies and publications will be sent to Junior High School Principals upon request.

BASEBALL

1.

- Q. Does a High School student violate the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. by playing Independent Baseball during the summer?
- A. High School students may play Independent Baseball during the summer months, when school is not in session, without jeopardizing their standing in High School, provided they do not accept remuneration directly or indirectly and also provided they do not play under assumed names. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted by such players, if accepted in service and not in any other way. All such playing should be checked carefully by Principals.

(Note: This answer applies to other summer sports, provided other rules and regulations of I. H. S. A. A. are observed.)

2.

- Q. Is a student who plays on an Independent Baseball team during semester one, ineligible for High School baseball during semester two?
- A. Yes. Such a student is ineligible for baseball for both semesters as baseball is a school year sport.

SUMMER SCHOOL WORK

1.

Q. Does summer school work in a school other than his home

school jeopardize the standing of a student?

A. No, provided the home school authorities recognize the work of the non-home school for credit and also provided the work does not count toward a College Degree. In fact, the I. H. S. A. A. recommends summer school work of an approved type for students needing credits. (See standards and requirements of State Board of Education.)

2.

Q. If a student fails to pass in three regular High School subjects during semester two, may be count work done in summer school

toward eligibility?

A. Back work during the summer may be counted toward eligibility provided: (1) it be done according to the regular rules of the school and according to good school procedure (2) no more than two credits be given for work done during the summer months (3) all work be done and the credits be made a matter of final record in the Principal's office prior to the opening date of the semester in which eligibility is desired (4) all work and credits be bona fide in every way and certified as such by the High School Principal. (See standards and requirements of State Board of Education.)

* * * * MISCELLANEOUS

1.

Q. May a High School schedule and play games during the week?

A. The I. H. S. A. A. has no ruling in regard to this matter, but recommends that games be not so scheduled and not so played except in emergencies.

2.

Q. May students, who are ineligible for the first team, play on teams of lower ranking?

A. No. Ineligibility for one team means the same for all teams.

* * * *

Q. Are Parents and Physicians' Certificates required in all sports?
A. No. They are required in football, basketball, track and field, boxing, wrestling and swimming for all participants—boys and girls.

.

Q. Does the I. H. S. A. A. stipulate any price for tickets to other than tourneys and meets held strictly under the supervision of the Board of Control?

A. No. Other than a recommendation that reasonable prices be made at all times for all games.

* * * *

5.

Q. Is a student, who is expelled from High School one semester, eligible for the following semester?

A. The I. H. S. A. A. has no jurisdiction unless its rules and regulations are broken. Expulsion and suspension from school are

usually not athletic matters at all. All rules of the I. H. S. A. A. are binding on a student under expulsion or suspension. See Conduct rule.

3

Q. May a High School support a grade team out of its funds? A. Yes.

7.

Q. May two or more High Schools combine to form one athletic team?

A. No. This is not permitted under any conditions.

8.

Q. Does the I. H. S. A. A. have a rule regarding the use of tobacco?

A. No. Other than that the I. H. S. A. A. considers the conduct of players as an element in their eligibility. This matter properly belongs to the High School Principal.

"Any student, whose conduct or character is such, in the judgment of the Board of Control, as to reflect discredit upon his High School or upon the I. H. S. A. A., is not eligible."

9.

Q. May the rules of a school be changed or special examina-

tions be given in order to make students eligible?

A. The I. H. S. A. A. expects its members to observe not only the letter but the spirit of its rules and regulations. Changing of school rules and special examinations are not looked on with favor. The I. H. S. A. A. recommends no spites and no favors for athletes.

10

Q. Does wrestling come under the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.? A. Yes. All "inter" athletic participation comes under the I. H. S. A. A.

11.

Q. May High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. take part

in a track meet or tourney games outside of Indiana?

A. All games, meets, tourneys and inter-scholastic athletic activities participated in by the High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. must be held under the direct supervision, management and auspices of the member High Schools concerned, or under the I. H. S. A. A. Inter-state basketball tourneys are forbidden by the National Federation to which Indiana belongs.

Q. May High School students take part in tourneys, games and meets held under auspices other than the High Schools concerned or

the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. No. Not during the school year. Students may participate in track and baseball during the summer months in meets and games held under non-High School or non-I. H. S. A. A. auspices, provided they do not violate their amateur standing in any way, and provided they secure permission of their Principal. See regulations for baseball in this handbook.

13.

Q. This question is often asked: "What will be the penalty for

violation of such and such a rule?" A. Penalties in the I. H. S. A. A. are not assigned in advance, as this democratic organization is built on the idea that the observance of its rules and regulations is more to be desired than the enforcement of them. The I. H. S. A. A. believes that the essence of proper and willing observance is higher than enforcement and that we should resort to enforcement only when observance falls down.

What is considered the school year?

A. A school year covers all time from the first day to the last day of the school year, including vacations.

15.

Q. Are tourney schedules drawn or arranged?

A. All tourney schedules in the I. H. S. A. A. are drawn by lot by the Board of Control and no schedule has ever been arranged or "fixed."

16.

Does the Commissioner have a vote in the Board of Control and in the Athletic Council?

A. The Commissioner is not a member of either group and has no vote in any of their deliberations.

17.

May a married student be considered eligible? A. No, see rule.

202

Q. If a student is expelled from High School during a semester and does not finish the semester, could he be considered eligible for the next semester?

18.

A. No. Such student is a failure for his last semester in High School.

19.

Q. How are the funds of the I. H. S. A. A. invested?

A. In U. S. Government Securities.

20.

Q. How are these Government Securities protected?

A. Burglary and Robbery Insurance are carried on the bank vault box and the Commissioner carries a Fidelity Bond.

Q. Who examines the financial books of the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. Ernst and Ernst, Public Accountants, the Board of Control and any High School Principal so desiring.

Who audits the financial books of the I. H. S. A. A.?

Ernst and Ernst, Certified Accountants.

23.

Q. How often is an audit made?

A. Annually. The same is printed in the annual Handbooks of the Association.

24.

Q. Who is eligible for election to the Athletic Council?

A. Any bona fide faculty representative of a High School belonging to the I. H. S. A. A.

25.

Q. How are Board of Control members selected?

A. By the members of the Athletic Council from their own membership.

Q. Do Board members represent districts?

A. Not necessarily. They represent enrollment classes of High Schools.

27

Q. Do Athletic Council members represent districts or classes? A. They represent classes and districts.

28.

Q. When and how may Principals submit proposals for the consideration of the Athletic Council?

A. Principals may submit such proposals at any time in a written way to the Commissioner who will submit them to the Athletic Council for consideration and action.

STATEMENT OF CASH RECEIPTS AND DISBURSEMENTS

The Indiana High School Athletic Association, Indianapolis, Indiana.

We have made an examination of the records of cash receipts and disbursements of THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION for the fiscal year ended November 14, 1938. In connection therewith, we examined or tested accounting records of the Association and other supporting evidence and obtained information and explanations from employees of the Association.

The statement of cash receipts and disbursements included herein sets forth the recorded cash transactions of the Association for the fiscal year ended November 14, 1938.

Scope of Examination and Other Specific Comments

Cash on deposit at November 14, 1938, amounting to \$2,174.32, was verified by direct correspondence with the Fletcher Trust Company, Indianapolis. The recorded cash receipts for the year ended at that date were traced to deposits as evidenced by bank statements on file. The disbursements through the bank account were supported by canceled bank checks, with the exception of those outstanding at November 16, 1938, the date to which our examination of the records of cash transactions was extended. Invoices and other data in support of disbursements were examined and no discrepancies were noted.

United States Government securities on hand at November 14, 1938, were presented for our inspection and are shown by schedule included in this report. We accounted for the proceeds from interest coupons and traced the proceeds from the sale of bonds into the records of cash received. The bonds purchased during the year, together with accrued interest thereon, were supported by invoices on file.

The Association was protected by fidelity bond and insurance policies as follows:

We did not verify the proceeds from the sale of tickets and concessions for the state final basket ball tourney. The minute book of the Association Board of Control records the fact that the complete report on the proceeds from this source, as submitted by the Commissioner, was checked and approved as correct by the Board.

On October 1, 1938, the Association distributed \$47,290.00 to member schools. Each school in the membership received \$10.00 for each year of membership in the Association and \$10.00 for each year of participation in a sectional tourney during the calendar years 1936, 1937 and 1938.

The minute book of the meetings of the Board of Control and of the Athletic Council was reviewed by us.

Opinion

In our opinion, based upon our examination, the accompanying statement of cash receipts and disbursements correctly sets forth a summary of the recorded cash transactions of the Association for the fiscal year ended November 14, 1938.
